

**CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE**

**8251. Citizens Redistricting Commission General Provisions.**

- (a) This chapter implements Article XXI of the California Constitution by establishing the process for the selection and governance of the Citizens Redistricting Commission.
- (b) For purposes of this chapter, the following terms are defined:
  - (1) "Commission" means the Citizens Redistricting Commission.
  - (2) "Day" means a calendar day, except that if the final day of a period within which an act is to be performed is a Saturday, Sunday, or holiday, the period is extended to the next day that is not a Saturday, Sunday, or holiday.
  - (3) "Panel" means the Applicant Review Panel.
  - (4) "Qualified independent auditor" means an auditor who is currently licensed by the California Board of Accountancy and has been a practicing independent auditor for at least 10 years prior to appointment to the Applicant Review Panel.
- (c) The Legislature may not amend this chapter unless all of the following are met:
  - (1) By the same vote required for the adoption of the final set of maps, the commission recommends amendments to this chapter to carry out its purpose and intent.
  - (2) The exact language of the amendments provided by the commission is enacted as a statute approved by a **two-thirds vote of each house of the Legislature** and signed by the Governor.
  - (3) The bill containing the amendments provided by the commission is in print for 10 days before final passage by the Legislature.
  - (4) The amendments further the purposes of this act.
  - (5) The amendments may not be passed by the Legislature in a year ending in **nine, zero or one (9, 0 or 1)**.

**Comment [JCW#1]:** Since a 2/3rds vote is required in EACH house of the Legislature, attaching a bill containing these proposals to another bill will require some searching for one that ALSO will require a 2/3rds vote in EACH house.

Barring that, and in the interests of time ... the bill containing these recommendations should stand on its own merits without being buried within some totally unrelated matter, no matter its own importance or fortunes.

**Comment [JCW#2]:** If the schedule of events specified in the act is to be accelerated by the proposed 4.5 months, then some activities will occur in a year ending in nine (9) and the legislature needs to be precluded from enacting changes during that year.

**8252. Citizens Redistricting Commission Selection Process.**

(a) ...

- (1) By ~~January 1 in 2010,~~ **August 15 2019**, and in each year ending in the number zero thereafter, the State Auditor shall initiate an application process, open to all registered California voters in a manner that promotes a diverse and qualified applicant pool.
- (2) The State Auditor shall remove from the applicant pool individuals with conflicts of interest including:
  - (A) Within the 10 years immediately preceding the date of application, neither the applicant, nor a member of his or her immediate family, may have done any of the following:
    - (i) Been appointed to, elected to, or have been a candidate for federal or state office.
    - (ii) Served as an officer, employee, or paid consultant of a political party or of the campaign committee of a candidate for elective federal or state office.
    - (iii) Served as an elected or appointed member of a political party central committee.
    - (iv) Been a registered federal, state, or local lobbyist.
    - (v) Served as paid congressional, legislative, or Board of Equalization staff.
    - (vi) Contributed two thousand dollars (\$2,000) or more to any congressional, state, or local candidate for elective public office in any year, which shall be adjusted every 10 years by the cumulative change in the California Consumer Price Index, or its successor.
  - (B) Staff and consultants to, persons under a contract with, and any person with an immediate family relationship with the Governor, a Member of the Legislature, a member of Congress, or a member of the State Board of Equalization, are not eligible to serve as commission members. As used in this subdivision, a member of a person's "immediate family" is one with whom the person has a bona fide relationship established through blood or legal relation, including parents, children, siblings, and in-laws.
- (b) The State Auditor shall establish an Applicant Review Panel, **by August 15 or any year ending in nine (2xx9)**<sup>1</sup>,

**Comment [JCW#3]:** The consortium on January 18, 2012 proposed changing the startup time by advancing all dates by 4.5 months. In discussion, the Commissioner appeared to be receptive to this recommendation.

I have created a table (in the back of this document) to show existing to new date relationships and to summarize all date changes.

**Comment [JCW#4]:** I proposed addition of a specific date at this point. The consortium proposed acceleration of all dates by 4.5 months. So, if the selection process is to start in August, then the Applicant Review Panel needs to have been selected, trained and seated in order to pursue their duties in a timely manner.

The earlier start date is also necessary to provide additional time for the review of the flood of applications anticipated (experience from 2010).

consisting of three qualified independent auditors, to screen applicants. The State Auditor shall randomly draw the names of three qualified independent auditors from a pool consisting of all auditors employed by the state and licensed by the California Board of Accountancy at the time of the drawing. The State Auditor shall draw until the names of three auditors have been drawn including one who is registered with the largest political party in California based on party registration, one who is registered with the second largest political party in California based on party registration, and one who is not registered with either of the two largest political parties in California. After the drawing, the State Auditor shall notify the three qualified independent auditors whose names have been drawn that they have been selected to serve on the panel. If any of the three qualified independent auditors decline to serve on the panel, the State Auditor shall resume the random drawing until three qualified independent auditors who meet the requirements of this subdivision have agreed to serve on the panel. A member of the panel shall be subject to the conflict of interest provisions set forth in paragraph (2) of subdivision (a).

(c) Having removed individuals with conflicts of interest from the applicant pool, the State Auditor shall **no later than August 1 in 2010, February 15 in 2020** and in each year ending in the number zero (0) thereafter, publicize the names in the applicant pool and provide copies of their applications to the Applicant Review Panel.

(d) From the applicant pool, the Applicant Review Panel shall select 60 of the most qualified applicants, including 20 who are registered with the largest political party in California based on registration, 20 who are registered with the second largest political party in California based on registration, and 20 who are not registered with either of the two largest political parties in California based on registration. These subpools shall be created on the basis of relevant analytical skills, ability to be impartial, and appreciation for California's diverse demographics and geography. The members of the panel shall not communicate with any State Board of Equalization member, Senator, Assembly Member, congressional member, or their representatives, about any matter related to the nomination process or applicants prior to the presentation by the panel of the pool of recommended applicants to the

**Comment [JCW#5]:** There has been discussion to STRONGLY recommend that the BSA commence all their processes earlier than the deadlines specified in this law.

**Comment [JCW#6]:** Date adjusted forward by 5.5 months rather than the 4.5 recommended by the consortium.

A full 6 months (preceding activity) for completion of the collection (two passes) and screening of all applications is more than adequate. The existing regulations define the process in great detail.

Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly.

(e) By ~~October 1 in 2010~~, June 15 in 2020, and in each year ending in the number zero (0) thereafter, the Applicant Review Panel shall present its pool of recommended applicants to the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly. No later than ~~November 15 in 2010~~, July 1 in 2020 and in each year ending in the number zero (0) thereafter, the President pro Tempore of the Senate, the Minority Floor Leader of the Senate, the Speaker of the Assembly, and the Minority Floor Leader of the Assembly may each strike ~~up to two applicants no more than one applicant~~<sup>2</sup> from each subpool of 20 for a total of ~~eight~~ four<sup>3</sup> possible strikes per subpool. After all legislative leaders have exercised their strikes, the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall jointly present the pool of remaining names to the State Auditor.

(f) No later than ~~November 20 in 2010~~, July 5 in 2020, and in each year ending in the number zero (0) thereafter, the State Auditor shall randomly draw eight names from the remaining pool of applicants as follows: three from the remaining subpool of applicants registered with the largest political party in California based on registration, three from the remaining subpool of applicants registered with the second largest political party in California based on registration, and two from the remaining subpool of applicants who are not registered with either of the two largest political parties in California based on registration. These eight individuals shall serve on the Citizens Redistricting Commission.

(g) No later than ~~December 31 in 2010~~, August 15 in 2020 and in each year ending in the number zero (0) thereafter, the eight commissioners shall review the remaining names in the pool of applicants and appoint six applicants to the commission as follows: two from the remaining subpool of applicants registered with the largest political party in California based on registration, two from the remaining subpool of applicants registered with the second largest political party in California based on registration, and two from the remaining subpool of applicants who are not

**Comment [JCW#7]:** Date adjusted forward by 3.5 months rather than the 4.5 recommended by the consortium.

This now provides 4 months for the ARP to complete its selection process rather than two (experience from 2010 indicates that more time for this task is useful).

**Comment [JCW#8]:** Date adjusted forward by 4 months rather than the 4.5 recommended by the consortium.

This change provides only 30 days, which should be more than enough, for the Legislative Leaders to make their decisions rather than the 45 in the current law.

**Comment [JCW#9]:** I propose limiting the number of strikes to one per leader per subpool. It is intended to provide a greater number of applicants to both the initial lottery selection of the first eight and for those Commissioners to have a larger pool to select the final six from.

This change should allow the selection process(es) more latitude to meet the intent of the law and improve diversity on the Commission.

Of course, this number can be zero, too, which would eliminate politics from the selection process and also eliminate the STRIKES WITHOUT EXPLANATION.

**Comment [JCW#10]:** Date adjusted forward by 4 months rather than the 4.5 recommended by the consortium.

Even though this change spans the Independence day celebrations, what better time to select members of an INDEPENDENT commission with all the hoop-la and celebration possible.

registered with either of the two largest political parties in California based on registration. The six appointees must be approved by at least five affirmative votes which must include at least two votes of commissioners registered from each of the two largest parties and one vote from a commissioner who is not affiliated with either of the two largest political parties in California. The six appointees shall be chosen to ensure the commission reflects this state's diversity, including, but not limited to, racial, ethnic, geographic, and gender diversity. However, it is not intended that formulas or specific ratios be applied for this purpose. Applicants shall also be chosen based on relevant analytical skills and ability to be impartial.

(h) Upon selection of the final Commissioner (number 14), the Commission shall hold their first business meeting within twenty (20) calendar days. During that meeting, the Commission shall advertise for the following positions: 1) Executive Director. 2) Recording Secretary/Concierge. 3) Website management consultant. 4) Other officers and staff as desired. The Commission shall also schedule additional meetings for the near term to take action on staff and consultant appointments.<sup>4</sup>

(i) Upon selection of an Executive Director, the Commission shall advertise for the following positions: 1) Permanent legal counsel. 2) Communications, Outreach, Public Awareness and Press liaison person. 3) Other staff as may be desired.<sup>5</sup>

**Comment [JCW#12]:** The prior Commission could accelerate this process through the issuance of generic qualifications for these offices.

It is the NEW Commission which will evaluate the candidates and actually make a selection.

**8252.5. Citizens Redistricting Commission Vacancy, Removal, Resignation, Absence.**

(a) In the event of substantial neglect of duty, gross misconduct in office, or inability to discharge the duties of office, a member of the commission may be removed by the Governor with the concurrence of two-thirds of the Members of the Senate after having been served written notice and provided with an opportunity for a response. A finding of substantial neglect of duty or gross misconduct in office may result in referral to the Attorney General for criminal prosecution or the appropriate administrative agency for investigation.

(b) Any vacancy(ies), whether created by removal, resignation, or absence, in the 14 commission positions shall be filled ~~within the 30 days after the vacancy occurs, by lottery,~~ from the pool of applicants of the same voter registration category as the vacating nominee that was remaining as of November 20 in the year in which that pool was established. If insufficient applicants are available for service, the State Auditor shall fill the vacancy by lottery from a new pool created for the same voter registration category in accordance with Section 8252.

(1) Multiple concurrent or overlapping vacancies shall require the Commission to cease all work until all vacancies have been filled. Otherwise Commission business may proceed as usual.<sup>6</sup>

(2) Prior to certification and publication of the decennial maps and for one year after, the position(s) shall be filled within 30 days of their occurrence.<sup>7</sup>

(3) Commencing one year after certification and publication of the decennial maps, the position(s) shall be filled as soon as practical after the vacancies occur, but no more than one year after the initial vacancy.<sup>8</sup>

**Comment [JCW#14]:** The key change here is three-fold.

First, the selection to fill a vacancy should be random, therefore a lottery process is required. The interviews can be held for each of the candidates if a long time has elapsed since any prior interview, but the selection should still be bereft of opinion.

Second, multiple vacancies is a really special case and cessation of Commission activity during the refill process will ensure that a balance exists on the Commission when decisions are to be made. Also, there is a possibility that those vacant positions occur within only one subpool.

Third, there is a difference between the active and inactive periods for the commission defined as being one year following the publication of the maps. The urgency for refilling a vacant position changes at that point.

These several changes in item (b) (1), (2) and (3) address each of those concerns.

**8253. Citizens Redistricting Commission Miscellaneous Provisions.**

- (a) The activities of the Citizens Redistricting Commission are subject to all of the following:
- (1) The commission shall comply with the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act (Article 9 (commencing with Section 11120) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2), or its successor. The commission shall provide not less than ~~14~~ 10 calendar days' public notice for each meeting, except that meetings held in ~~September~~ during the 30 days immediately prior to the required publication date for the final maps<sup>9</sup> in the year ending in the number one may be held with three calendar days' notice.
  - (2) The records of the commission pertaining to redistricting and all data considered by the commission are public records that will be posted in a manner that ensures immediate and widespread public access.
  - (3) Commission members and staff may not communicate with or receive communications about redistricting matters from anyone outside of a public hearing. This paragraph does not prohibit communication between commission members, staff, legal counsel, and consultants retained by the commission that is otherwise permitted by the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act or its successor outside of a public hearing.
  - (4) The commission shall select by the voting process prescribed in paragraph (5) of subdivision (c) of Section 2 of Article XXI of the California Constitution one of their members to serve as the chair and one to serve as vice chair. The chair and vice chair shall not be of the same ~~party~~ subpool.

**Comment [JCW#15]:** 30 days is quite arbitrary. Other suggestions have ranged from 14 to 21 to 30 days for this period.

It is recognized that things can get a little crazy during the final process of refining the maps while also permitting adequate time for public review and meeting a mandatory date for their completion and certification.

**Comment [JCW#16]:** Proposition 11 defined this as from a PARTY without recognizing that the "Other" subpool was composed of persons from several parties. The requirement should be SUBPOOL to ensure that one of the major parties is always represented as either chair or vice-chair of the Commission.

- (5) The commission shall ~~hire~~ bear the sole responsibility in the hiring of all commission staff, legal counsel, and consultants as needed. The commission shall establish clear criteria for the hiring and removal of these individuals, communication protocols, and a code of conduct. The commission shall apply the conflicts of interest listed in paragraph (2) of subdivision (a) of Section 8252 to the hiring of staff to the extent applicable. The Secretary of State Bureau of State Audits shall provide support functions to the commission until its staff and office are fully functional. Any individual employed by the commission shall be exempt from the civil service requirements of Article VII of the California Constitution. The commission shall require that at least one of the legal counsel hired by the commission has demonstrated extensive experience and expertise in implementation and enforcement of the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. Sec. 1971 and following). The commission shall make hiring, removal, or contracting decisions on staff, legal counsel, and consultants by nine or more affirmative votes including at least three votes of members registered from each of the two largest parties and three votes from members who are not registered with either of the two largest political parties in California.
- (6) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, no employer shall discharge, threaten to discharge, intimidate, coerce, or retaliate against any employee by reason of such employee's attendance or scheduled attendance at any meeting of the commission.
- (7) The commission shall establish and implement an open hearing process for public input and deliberation that shall be subject to public notice and promoted through a thorough outreach program to solicit broad public participation in the redistricting public review process. Each submission to the Commission shall be certified by the submitter to be true and correct as to the veracity of the information content. Each document submitted to the Commission must be properly identified as to its source and supporters. The hearing process shall include hearings to receive public input before the commission draws any maps and hearings following the drawing and display of any commission maps. In addition, hearings shall be supplemented with other activities as

**Comment [JCW#17]:** The current Commission has had some troubles in navigating State rules and procedures in the hiring of Staff and Consultants. This will permit the Commission some leeway in the process while operating within the intent of State rules and laws concerning hiring and contracts.

The commission shall display the maps for public comment in a manner designed to achieve the widest public access reasonably possible. Public comment shall be taken for at least 14 days (7 days during the last 30 days prior to the publication and certification date) from the date of public display of any map.

- (b) The Legislature shall take all steps necessary to ensure that a complete and accurate computerized database is available for redistricting, and that procedures are in place to provide the public ready access to redistricting data and computer software for drawing maps. Upon the commission's formation and until its dissolution, the Legislature shall coordinate these efforts with the commission.

**Comment [JCW#23]:** There has been a lot of discussion about this point in that 14 days may usually be too long and is certainly unproductive during the final run to publication.

**8253.5. Citizens Redistricting Commission Compensation.**

Members of the commission shall be compensated at the rate of three hundred dollars **(\$300)** for each day the member is engaged in commission business. For each succeeding commission, the rate of compensation shall be adjusted in each year ending in nine by the cumulative change in the California Consumer Price Index, or its successor. Members of the panel and the commission are eligible for reimbursement of personal expenses incurred in connection with the duties performed pursuant to this act. A member's residence is deemed to be the member's post of duty for purposes of **reimbursement of expenses**.

**Comment [JCW#24]:** There has been some discussion concerning special cases where child, elder or hospice care is required of close relatives and dependents to enable the Commissioner to serve and participate in all Commission meeting and activities. Some adjustments in State law may be needed not just for the CRC, but for all California Commissions.

**8253.6. Citizens Redistricting Commission Budget, Fiscal Oversight.**

(a) In 2009, and in each year ending in nine thereafter, the Governor shall include in the Governor's Budget submitted to the Legislature pursuant to Section 12 of Article IV of the California Constitution amounts of funding for the State Auditor, the Citizens Redistricting Commission, and the Secretary of State that are sufficient to meet the estimated expenses of each of those officers or entities in implementing the redistricting process required by this act for a three-year period, including, but not limited to, adequate funding for a statewide outreach program to solicit broad public participation in the redistricting process. The Governor shall also make adequate office space available for the operation of the commission. The Legislature shall make the necessary appropriation in the Budget Act, and the appropriation shall be available during the entire three-year period. The appropriation made shall be equal to the greater of ~~three million dollars~~ ~~(\$3,000,000)~~ nine million five hundred thousand dollars (\$9,500,000), or the amount expended pursuant to this subdivision in the immediately preceding redistricting process, as each amount is adjusted by the cumulative change in the California Consumer Price Index, or its successor, since the date of the immediately preceding appropriation made pursuant to this subdivision. The Legislature may make additional appropriations in any year in which it determines that the commission requires additional funding in order to fulfill its duties.

(b)  
(a) The Governor shall annually include in the Governor's Budget submitted to the Legislature amounts of funding for the Citizens Redistricting Commission that are sufficient to meet the ongoing expenses of the Commission in maintaining Commission records, maintaining and updating the Commission website and responding to Freedom of Information requests during the remainder of their term of office. The Governor shall also make adequate office space available for the operation of any Commission activities during this period. The appropriation shall be available each of the remaining years of their term and shall be equal to the greater of Six Hundred Thousand dollars (\$600,000) or the amount expended annually pursuant to this subdivision in the immediately preceding redistricting process, as each amount is adjusted by the cumulative change in the California Consumer Price index, or its successor, since the date of the immediately

\$1,500,000 – to the BSA and the Commission for outreach consultants in at least four stages:

- 1) During rules revision
- 2) During the application process
- 3) While holding COI hearings and drawing maps
- 4) During the law revision process

\$4,500,000 – to the Commission for operations, consultants and other supports while collecting information, creating, drawing and defending the maps.

\$2,000,000 – for litigation support and consultants.

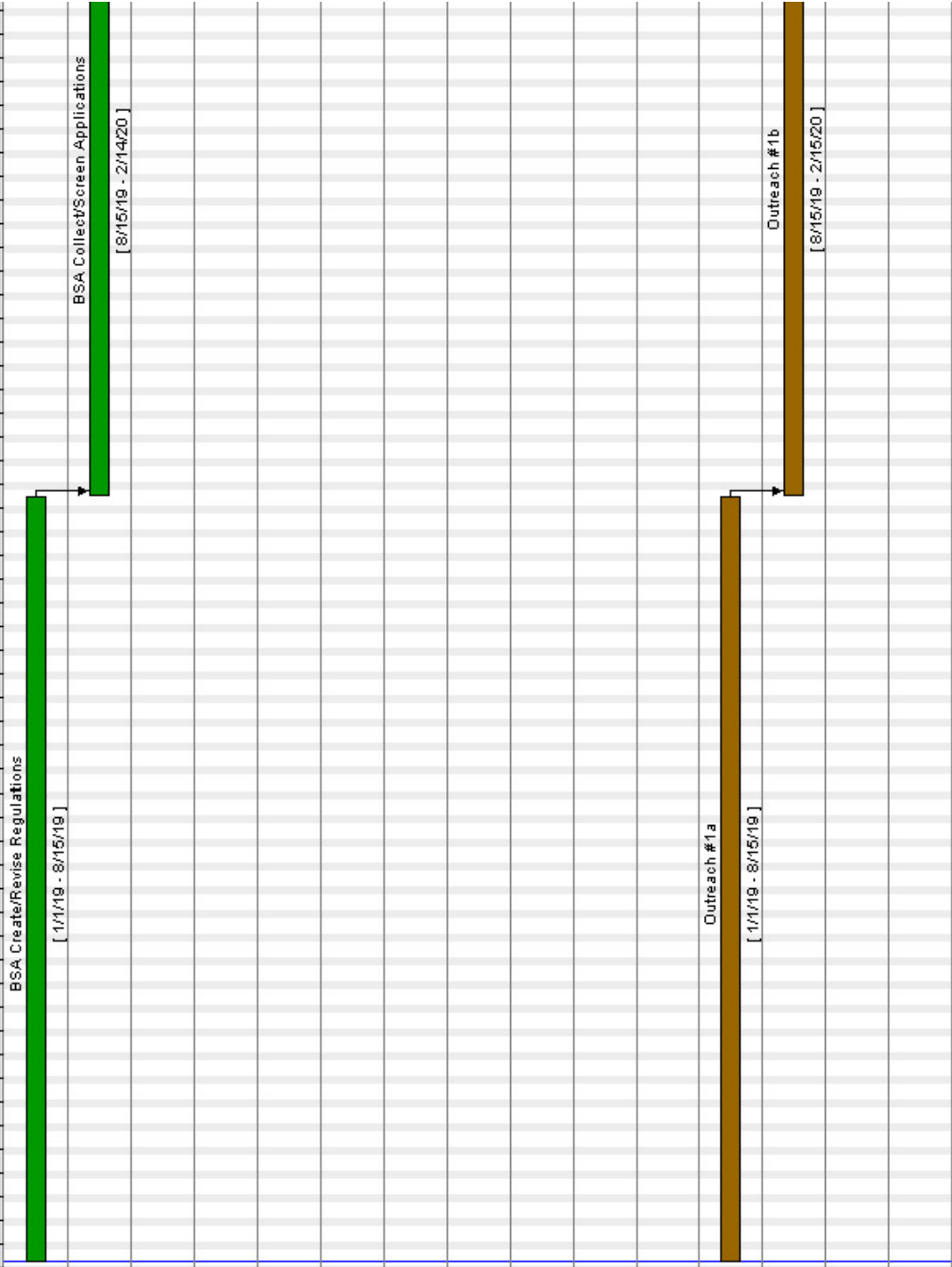
