

Suggested Revisions to CRC Draft Congressional Map

This plan reduces community splits from 8 to 4. This plan only splits Lake Balboa, Lake View Terrace, North Hills and Studio City. 3 of 4 splits in this plan are for VRA purposes--in each case, Latino majority blocks in the community are adjacent to the district SFVET, a Section Two seat. This plan increases the CVAP of SFVET to 50.85%



May 13, 2011 you were provided a plan dealing with splitting the Westside of Los Angeles into three compact parts for used in other districts. This was done in part to keep the most active area in California from being packed into a single district. The first draft maps from the Commission has created issues in the AD, CD, and, SD plans. This is a submission of corrections for the Congressional Districts in and near the Westside.

The "W. LA – Downtown" or "WLADT" District travels from Pacific Palisades through the Santa Monica Mountains to Beverly Hills & West Hollywood before heading downtown. This plan creates many splits of the three sections of the Westside.

West Westside: Malibu is sent alone east to "EVENT". Pacific Palisades & parts of Brentwood are in "WLADT" with the balance sent south to "CRSLP". Santa Monica is sent south to "PVEBC".

East Westside: Beverly Hills & West Hollywood were placed in "WLADT". UCLA, Westwood, Century City, West Los Angeles, Cheviot Hills/Rancho Park were all sent south to "CRSLP".

South Westside: Venice, Marina Del Rey, Westchester, and, parts of Mar Vista were given to "PVEBC". Culver City, Palms, and the balance of Mar Vista were sent east to "CRSLP".

This plan "Westside Congressional Correction" provides a method to reunite the various parts of the Westside and places them within the districts already drawn by the Commission.

STEP ONE: Santa Monica, Pacific Palisades, all of Brentwood are reunited with Malibu (and pick up the unincorporated area of Topanga) in "EVENT". This required giving population to "SFVWC" & "AVSCV". This gave an opportunity to make the City of Ventura whole (in EVENT) and the City of Santa Clarita whole (AVSCV). Also a group of islands belonging to Santa Barbara County were moved to "SLOSB".

STEP TWO: Culver City, Palms, and the balance of Mar Vista were reunited with the rest of the South Westside in "PVEBC" with Santa Monica already having been sent to "EVENT".

STEP THREE: The Westwood Finger of "CRSLP" is moved to the Downtown section of "WLADT". This allows the East Westside to be reunited. With the adjustments for population already made in the other areas "WLADT" crosses into the Santa Monica Mountains into North Hollywood and parts West. To adjust to these lines "SFVET" loses its southwest leg and is moved north; "SFVWC" is moved further into Ventura to make the balance of adjustments with "AVSCV".





- ✓ The Santa Clarita Valley Senate Seat goes from the top of the Grapevine (at the Kern County line) to the Pacific Ocean.
- ✓ This is the only district in the state that is both coastal and inland.
- ✓ This district does not represent "communities of interest."
- ✓ This district is not compact.

Support nesting the Santa Clarita Valley Assembly District with a East Ventura County Assembly District (Simi Valley, Moorpark, Thousand Oaks & Camarillo)

- ✓ The Commission already nested these communities in the congressional seat.
- ✓ Santa Clarita Valley and eastern Ventura County have historically been together in a Senate Seat (1980s, 1990s and 2000s)
- ✓ SCV and Simi Valley are tied together by the 118 Freeway that serves the job centers of Valencia, Chatsworth and Simi Valley.
- ✓ Tied together by the San Gabriel Mountains and they share the 11,000 acre Santa Clarita Woodlands that supports a wildlife corridor.
- ✓ Both Assembly Districts have similar industries – biotech; aerospace/defense & film industry.



We are nestled between Western Ave to the east, Van Ness to the west, Florence to the south, and Gage to the north.

My brothers and I and most of life long friends are proud graduates of Crenshaw High School. I am also a graduate of West Los Angeles College. We enjoy the programs and events at the Expo Center at Exposition Park, especially the African American Museum. Leimert Park Village is a meeting place for our community events, such as the June'teenth Heritage Festival, which will be held this weekend. We participate in educational programs at USC, and I am a card carrying member of LACMA. We shop at the Crenshaw/Baldwin Hills Mall and the former Fox Hills mall, now Westfield mall, where I got my first "real" job as a senior in high school. My nephew and I love to visit the LA Zoo in Griffith Park, and visit our local park, Van Ness Recreational Center. We also volunteer at many of our community's places of Faith, who rendered much needed services to the least among us. All of these sites, including my own family church, Mt Gilead Missionary Baptist Church are located in all or at least two of our districts, the 33rd Congressional District, 48th Assembly District, and 26th Senate District and are all valuable assets to our communities well being and growth.

The districts that you have drawn, particularly the Assembly District, Vermont Square-Florence, Firestone and Congressional District - Inglewood-South Gate, completely separates and diminishes our communities political, economical, and educational voice that we have worked so hard to establish.

We have been meeting with our community to determine what our best options are, and we respectively recommend to the commission the maps submitted by the African American Redistricting Collaborative.

Remarks to Re-Districting Commission Pertaining to the
Unincorporated Area of Los Angeles County Known As Topanga and
Pertaining to Education

My name is Geri Kenyon. I have lived in the community of Topanga since 1977, and have worked for the LAUSD as a school psychologist since 1978, retiring in 2009.

I object to the proposed re-districting as an educator who has worked in and with schools in areas reaching from Topanga through Pacific Palisades, to Santa Monica, to Malibu, through Venice and into West Los Angeles and Culver City.

The Commission's proposed district ignores this school community and presents instead a geographic area reaching into the Santa Clarita Valley and even far beyond, an area remote from these associated communities.

As a school psychologist my work has dealt primarily with special needs children and their families and the community agencies that provide service to them. I have worked with such agencies as the St. John's Hospital unit in Santa Monica, and the UCLA Neuropsychiatric Hospital Unit in West Los Angeles while I was assigned to sites including Venice High School, University High School, Topanga Elementary School and McBride Special Education Center.

I am sure you are aware of the unremitting activism of these families as they work to assure the best possible educational outcome and quality of life services for their children.

This new plan destroys the ability of these families and providers to work together for special needs children and families through legislative action and outreach. We cannot reach into the Santa Clarita Valley and we do not have these connections and patterns of communication and support with those remote communities.

Likewise, those living in the Santa Clarita Valley and beyond would undoubtedly have very similar concerns - just as we know nothing of their communities, they would know nothing of ours.

As well, as we work to integrate special needs children into our general education programs and into ^{our} ~~their~~ communities, here, too, we see the difficulties created by this re-organization of our political representation. With the increasing pressures on our educational systems and their fundamental importance to our society it makes sense to support current representative systems and connections in our

Good evening Commissioners.

I want to go on record with my concern for what I think is a potential setback in the recent gains made by the cities of Carson, Compton, and Long Beach in the area of education. The potential setback, I feel, stems from the proposed district maps for the two new Congressional Districts that include the cities of Compton, Carson, Lawndale, Inglewood, Lynwood, and Southgate - to name just a few of the cities in one - and the map that includes Long Beach, Paramount, and Los Alamitos next door to the Carson-Compton district.

These two maps represent nine - count them - NINE (9) DIFFERENT SCHOOL DISTRICTS. Nine different Superintendents, Boards of Trustees, etc. for the two Congress members to become acquainted and try to work with. The children and parents in our three cities, Carson, Compton, Long Beach, now only work with three. Furthermore, there are partnerships in place that are the result of years of working together with state and federal electeds with whom we now have strong relationships. To break up such an established Community of Interest is unfair to those kids and families, but seems to be a departure from your own practice and policy.

In the May 28 Northridge hearing Commissioner Ward was talking about our region and said to one of your map drawers, Ms. MacDonald, "... you made the statement 'we start with C.O.I. testimony when we are drawing. Did you mean just this district, or in general?'; to which Ms. MacDonald replied 'In general. I mean we basically use everything, but you've got to start somewhere. . .'"

I agree with that, and that somewhere should be Communities of Interest; especially where our kids, school performance and overall quality of education are concerned. Our representatives should deal with as few school districts as possible and keep their current partnerships in tact to serve our children and families. So please reconsider these maps and a re-draw that considers these Educational Communities of Interest.

We have recently viewed the proposed re-districting lines for the 36th Congressional District and feel that they alienate our members and citizens in the Port of Los Angeles.

A vast amount of our membership resides in and around the Port of Los Angeles. Approximately, 40% of our Longshore workforce resides in the cities of San Pedro and Rancho Palos Verdes. 


