Dear Commissioners:

On behalf of the Tri-Valley City Councils, we wanted to express our desire that efforts be made to keep our communities together during the process of drawing new legislative districts for the California State Senate and Assembly. We recognize the fact that the Citizens Redistricting Commission has a unique and challenging responsibility, but we believe that the Tri-Valley meets the criteria to be considered a community of interest, and that our boundaries should be respected during the redistricting process.

The Tri-Valley region is spread over three neighboring valleys at the eastern end of Alameda County and the southern end of Contra Costa County, and is comprised of the adjacent cities of Livermore, Pleasanton, Dublin, San Ramon, and Danville. Despite the fact that we are in two separate counties, our residents identify far more with the Tri-Valley region than either Alameda or Contra Costa County. In fact, we believe that the Tri-Valley can be considered a model for regional collaboration throughout the State of California in many traditional and non-traditional ways.

The Tri-Valley shares a common identity and spirit among its residents. Residents of our five cities depend on the same transportation networks, we have similar demographics and sources of employment, businesses have formed partnerships throughout the area, our children play in the same sports leagues, and local governments collaborate on a multitude of regional projects.

Some specific examples on how our five jurisdictions formally collaborate include the Tri-Valley Transportation Council, which identifies and funds needed projects to relieve congestion in our region. We are all partners in the Tri-Valley Housing and Opportunity Center, which is an agency that jointly manages our five cities affordable housing programs and services. Tri-Valley Community Television is another entity that focuses solely on programming unique to our region. Other smaller agencies such as the Dublin San Ramon Services District, Livermore Amador Valley Transit Authority, and Zone 7 are entirely within the Tri-Valley. Our five City Councils meet together in joint sessions on issues of regional concern every few months, while our Mayors, City Managers, and staff meet both formally and informally several times a month to further solidify our public partnerships.

Our cultural and economic life also revolves around the Tri-Valley community. For instance, the Tri-Valley Convention and Visitors Bureau is a non-profit organization dedicated to expanding tourism options amongst our five cities. Innovation Tri-Valley is a private sector collaborative of leading businesses from the five cities to promote


economic development. The Tri-Valley Business Council is another entity that represents private business interests in the five cities. Most significantly for our future, the five Tri-Valley cities are partners in I-GATE (Innovation Green Advanced Technology Excellence) with the Lawrence Livermore National Lab, Sandia National Lab, other Tri-Valley businesses, non-profits, educational institutions, and government agencies to collaborate on making our area a high-tech innovation hub, attract new businesses, and expand educational opportunities.

The Tri-Valley has flourished over the years due to our tremendous cooperation, and our region is poised for even greater excellence moving forward. However, in order to continue to thrive and achieve our mutual goals, we must be able to continue working together in close collaboration with legislators dedicated to the needs of the Tri-Valley. We appreciate your consideration of our request that the Tri-Valley be considered a community of interest, and we hope that the Commission will make strong efforts to keep us together while drawing California State Senate and Assembly districts.





*Written Testimony to the California Citizens Redistricting Commission
Public Input Hearing: June 27, 2011 in San Francisco, CA*

Good afternoon. My name is Carlo De La Cruz with the Asian Law Caucus. ALC is the nation's oldest legal and civil rights organization based here in San Francisco.

My testimony today is regarding the San Francisco and Northern San Mateo Assembly and Senate maps. On the Assembly side, I would like to thank you for your preservation of important communities of interest in the Visitation Valley, Excelsior, Mission, and greater Chinatown areas. Also, thank you for your attention to the needs of the Daly City community by keeping this area unified and whole in one legislative district.

However, we are concerned that the interests of the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender community are not fully respected in the proposed Assembly map for San Francisco. In particular, the Haight-Ashbury, Twin Peaks, and Diamond Heights are separated from the rest of the LGBT community in the adjacent Castro neighborhood. Please consider uniting these important LGBT communities by placing them wholly in the Eastern SF Assembly district.

We are also concerned that the Asian American and immigrant communities in the Outer Mission and Crocker Amazon neighborhoods have been separated from their neighbors in the Excelsior and Visitation Valley area. As currently drawn, Outer Mission and Crocker Amazon are in the Western SF District and are grouped with the neighboring communities of Ocean View and West of Twin Peaks. Ocean View and West of Twin Peaks are very similar to each other according to levels of educational attainment, languages spoken at home, and rates of homeownership. However, Ocean View and West of Twin Peaks share little in common with the Outer Mission and Crocker Amazon. We contend that the Outer Mission and Crocker Amazon share much more in common with the Excelsior and Visitation Valley neighborhoods, and should therefore be moved into the Eastern SF district.

Across this entire area of Outer Mission, Crocker Amazon, Excelsior and Visitation Valley, the residents share many characteristics including foreign-born status, very low per capita income, similar levels of educational attainment, as well as similar rates for unemployment, high density of families with children under the age of 18, the presence of single-family, owner-occupied homes, not to mention that these areas share the highest rates of foreclosure in the City.

In order to reach population equality, we would request that the Presidio, Marina, and Pacific Heights neighborhoods be removed from the Eastern SF district.

On the Senate maps, we would like to note that the City of Daly City and parts of South San Francisco would compose a very small minority of the Senate district that incorporates all of the City of San Francisco. As drawn, the voice of the San Mateo residents will be highly marginalized compared to the power of the San Francisco constituents. We urge the Commission to consider this particular dynamic and to adjust the Senate lines accordingly.

Good evening ladies and gentlemen of the commission, I am Alec White, a high school student from Marin Academy in San Rafael, Marin County. I previously spoke at the May 19th meeting in Santa Rosa, and I am here today to advocate that you keep Marin and almost all of Sonoma County in the same congressional district instead of placing Marin and Del Norte County in the same district. These two counties are nearly a six hour drive from each other. Let's look at the counties inside the North Coast district. Mendocino County is mainly rural with an economy based on wineries and tourism. Humboldt and Del Norte Counties have some small cities and tourism based economies. These counties may be filled with sparsely populated beautiful landscapes such as the Lost Coast you would want to vacation in but they are not filled with suburban transplants from San Francisco who commute there for work. Marin and Sonoma Counties are filled with suburban transplants from San Francisco, not rural residents with economies based mostly on tourism.

Marin and Sonoma Counties fit well together as two suburban communities of interest near San Francisco. Combined, they have around 735,000 people, only 33,000 above the population for a congressional district. These 33,000 residents can easily be placed into a district that represents the rural and agricultural residents of Napa and the North Coast. This leads me to discuss the congressional district that combines Yuba City and Santa Rosa. Yuba City has an agriculture based economy, is not connected to the San Francisco Bay Area and should be placed in a district that combines the northern Central Valley, a mainly rural area with a few small cities such as Redding. Santa Rosa has 160,000 people; that does not sound like a rural community to me. It is a city filled with residents moving north from Marin County who will be connected to Marin County by the proposed commuter SMART train. It is a city where I attended school for one year. I did not attend school in Del Norte County, in fact, I never been to Del Norte County.

Overall, I strongly believe that Marin and Sonoma Counties, including Santa Rosa should be in the same district. They both share a delicate balance of agricultural communities, rural coastal areas and yet the population is mostly in the category of suburban residents. They border each other, instead of being a six hour drive away from each other. They are both in the same region of the Bay Area, the North Bay. They belong in the same district. Thank you.

Honorable Chairman:

At its June 13, 2011 meeting, the Dana Point City Council ("DPCC") voted unanimously to object to certain state Senate and Assembly district boundaries proposed in the Commission's first draft of the district maps ("First Draft"). As part of that action the DPCC also unanimously approved the attached Resolution, which opposes any state Assembly or Senate redistricting plan that would (a) divide the City geographically and/ or (b) place the City outside of any state Senate or Assembly districts that do not include our neighboring south Orange County cities.

The DPCC strongly feels that our entire city should be grouped with other south Orange County cities for state Senate and Assembly purposes because of the common issues these cities face as well as the strong working relationships and cooperative arrangements they have developed over many, many years. Shared issues include, but are by no means limited to, ocean water quality, regional transportation at both the local (Orange County Transportation Authority) and state (Caltrans) levels, regional land use planning and affordable housing.

On behalf of the DPCC, I would strongly and respectfully request the Commission to reconsider the state Senate and Assembly district boundaries proposed in the First Draft in view of the City's comments set forth above. RESOLUTION NO. 11-06-13-02

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DANA POINT, CALIFORNIA, OPPOSING ANY PROPOSED REDISTRICTING PLAN THAT SPLITS THE CITY AND/OR PLACES THE CITY OUTSIDE OF THE DISTRICT INCLUDING OTHER SOUTH ORANGE COUNTY CITIES

The City Council of the City of Dana Point does hereby resolve as follows:

WHEREAS, on June 10, 2011 the California Citizens Redistricting Commission released maps showing a proposed new redistricting for State Assembly and Senate Seat purposes; and

WHEREAS, the proposal divides the City of Dana Point creating two districts within its geographical boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the City Council is opposed to any redistricting which divides the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council believes the City should be included, in its entirety, in the same districts for Assembly and Senate Seat purposes as the rest of what is traditionally considered to be South Orange County based upon the similarity of issues, and historical working relationships the City has with such other South Orange County cities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Dana Point as follows:

SECTION 1. The Council hereby formally opposes the redistricting proposal released on June 10, 2011 and any other proposal by which the City is split into multiple districts.

SECTION 2. The City Council hereby formally opposes the redistricting proposal released on June 10, 2011, and any other proposal by which all, or any part of the City is not included the same Assembly and Senate districts as most, if not all, of the cities traditionally considered to comprise "South Orange County" are located.

SECTION 3. The Mayor and City Manager, and/or their designees are hereby authorized to send letters and or appear at meetings, and participate in such other lawful activities as they deem necessary and appropriate to advocate the above noted positions on behalf of the City.

Written Testimony to the California Citizens Redistricting Commission
San Francisco Public Input Hearing: June 27, 2011

Good evening Commissioners. I testified before the Commission during the last Bay Area hearing in Oakland, CA and apologize for being unable to personally testify before you tonight. I have asked Nadia Hussain to read my testimony and respectfully thank you for consideration despite my absence.

I have been a resident of Alameda County for almost 30 years, obtaining my education from public schools in New Haven Unified School District of Union City and the University of California Berkeley. After my graduate school education, I returned to work in Hayward, CA. I thank the commission for keeping Union City intact and wish to testify tonight to address the neighboring cities of Ashland, Castro Valley, Cherryland, Hayward, San Leandro and San Lorenzo.

Currently, the Commission's draft Assembly and Senate maps split a community of interest consisting of San Leandro, San Lorenzo, Cherryland, and Ashland. I ask the Commission to unite these cities in a central Alameda County district. Ashland is currently an unincorporated community with close ties to San Leandro, so much so, that it was known as San Leandro South. Cherryland is an unincorporated community which appears on the Hayward U.S. Geological Map. School age children in Ashland and Cherryland attend schools in San Leandro, San Lorenzo, Hayward and Castro Valley. San Leandro has more in common with San Lorenzo, Cherryland, and Ashland than with Oakland.

Additionally, residents of Ashland, Castro Valley, Cherryland, Hayward, San Leandro, San Lorenzo, and Union City obtain medical care from Kaiser Union City, Kaiser Hospital in Hayward and St. Rose Hospital in Hayward, Loral Grove Hospital in Castro Valley, and Eden Medical Center in San Leandro.

Ashland, Castro Valley, Cherryland, Hayward, San Leandro, San Lorenzo and Union City have overlapping school districts, religious institutions, ethnic shopping centers and cultural activities. Many residents in this area, both Asian American and non-Asian American, are limited English speaking and need language assistance to access vital government services.

Good evening. My name is Lillian Galedo. I have lived in Alameda County for 35 years and have been the Executive Director of Filipino Advocates for Justice for more than 30 years. FAJ started in Oakland in 1973, and opened an office in Union City in 1982 to serve the Filipino community in mid and south Alameda County. For more than 38 years, FAJ has served the more vulnerable in our community. Ours is a community that is predominantly immigrant.

For the past several months FAJ has worked with the Coalition of Asian Pacific Americans for Fair Redistricting to insure that the Asian community, which is now more than 25% of Alameda County, be heard as a community of interest.

Over the past two decades we have seen the Asian Community in Central Alameda County grow to be significant percentages of the cities of Union City, Hayward, San Leandro, San Lorenzo and Castro Valley. Asians are 24% of the population in both Hayward and San Lorenzo, 28% of San Leandro, 18% of Castro Valley, and in Union City Asians are nearly 52% of the general population.

I'm here to ask the Commission to keep Union City, Hayward, San Leandro, San Lorenzo and the unincorporated areas of Cherryland, Castro Valley and Ashland together in the new Assembly, State Senate and Congressional districts for the next decade. Except for Hayward, with a population of more than 141,000, all the other cities are under 80,000 and should be kept intact.

These areas share a similar history in that they were primarily agricultural 50 years ago, and were built out over the last 40 years. Asian Americans in Central Alameda County have long shared the same churches, businesses, commercial and recreational areas, non-profit infrastructure, and educational and cultural institutions, in addition to a similar socio economic profile.

We have checked in with some of our local allies and know that they feel as we do that the interests of residents of Central Alameda County would be best-served by having a common representative at state and federal levels.

Therefore, I recommend that the Commission keep Union City / Hayward / San Leandro / San Lorenzo and the unincorporated cities of Ashland, Cherryland and Castro Valley of Alameda County together as a community of interest.

I testified before at the Oakland hearing on May 21st, and unfortunately, I could not attend today's hearing and have asked Emily Chang to provide my testimony.

As a resident of Fremont for over 30 years, I have strong ties to the community through the Asian Pacific Islander American Public Affairs Association (APAPA), a statewide organization promoting civic participation by Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders (AAPIs), and deeply understand our communities of interest. I would like to ask the Commission once again to keep together Fremont and Newark because of their similarities.

These areas have large AAPI populations, including many South Asian residents. Fremont should be kept whole and placed in a district with Newark because fragmentation of these areas means fragmentation of a large AAPI population. The residents of these areas have other ties, such as being part of the Ohlone Community College, Union Sanitary District, Alameda County Water District, and Washington Township Hospital service areas.

I also ask the Commission to put Fremont and Newark with areas in Santa Clara County such as Milpitas and Berryessa. As I have stated before, many of us from Fremont shop at Milpitas Square, the largest Asian American center in the area, as well as the Great Mall. There are a lot of similarities in terms of demographics (such as income level, ethnic mix, age), types of business and industry, and the close proximity through highway 880 and 680.

As of now, the Commission's draft Assembly and Congressional maps split the City of Fremont and I strongly urge the commission to maintain the integrity of similar communities by keeping Fremont, Newark, Milpitas, and the Berryessa area of San Jose within the same Assembly, Senate and Congressional districts.

Dear Commission Members:

The Commission released its first visualization maps of the proposed districts and these visualizations showed the City of American Canyon being separated from all other cities in Napa County and placed in a different Congressional District.

On June 7, 2011 the City Council of the City of American Canyon adopted Resolution #2011-36 in protest of this visualization. This Resolution was submitted as Public Comment to the Commission on June 8, 2011. On behalf of the American Canyon City Council, Council Member Belia Ramos Bennett attended the Commission meeting on June 9th to express the City's concern and to formally present the Council's action.

When the first round of preliminary maps were adopted by a 14-0 vote of the Commission, the City of American Canyon and its residents were very disappointed to note that there had been no changes to the preliminary map for the Congressional District. Though the City Council had not addressed the Assembly District visualizations, the same is true for both the Senate and the Assembly District Maps.

You might ask why this is such a concern? The City of American Canyon has been part of Napa County since its incorporation in 1992; always in the same legislative districts. With the assistance of our legislative representatives and County officials, the City has spent an extensive amount of time and resources to establish its identity in Napa County and to separate itself from the City of Vallejo by obtaining its own post office and zip code.

Being separated from the rest of Napa County in our representation would cause confusion on the part of our residents. It would weaken our voice in conjunction with the common industries served and related business infrastructure within the County. American Canyon businesses play a vital role to the premium wine industries of Lake, Mendocino, Sonoma, and Napa Counties.

We, the City of American Canyon, and our residents strongly oppose being placed in a different Congressional, Assembly or Senate District than the other cities/town in Napa County. We urge the Commission to keep Napa County whole and within the same Assembly, Senate, and Congressional districts.

With the criteria requiring that redistricting “respect counties, cities, communities of interest, and neighborhoods,where possible” I offer these suggestions with respect to Napa County the city of American Canyon.

Napa County is in the First Congressional district (DISTRICT) together with counties to the West and Northwest and its State Senatorial and assembly districts are located within the DISTRICT. American Canyon is of course within the County of Napa. Historically the DISTRICT’s economy was and is agriculture. In the proposed redistricting, Napa County would also be in a district whose economy is agriculture. However, the agricultural similarity between the DISTRICT and proposed redistricting is in the name only. With the development of “wine producing,” together with its accompanying tourist, economy in Napa, the County has more “community of interest” with DISTRICT would have in the proposed district. The map I submit, California’s Wine Growing Region, very dramatically illustrates this point as it places Napa County in the North Coast region.¹

The differences in “community interests” are further illustrated by the differences of the work force in the two new proposed districts, Farm Workers, both permanent and migrant. This work force is the foundation of the agricultural economy. Within the Migrant workforce, there are those who migrate with their family and those who migrate unaccompanied by family.

Twenty some years ago, the farm workers’ workforce, in all agricultural areas, was typically a small permanent work force which worked full time supplemented by a Migrant workforce mostly at the time surrounding harvest time. Today the Napa County’s workforce, and by extension, the other wine growing regions’ work force has changed dramatically. These work forces jumped still consist of a small workforce that works most of the years but the migrant work force has an increase by two thirds in the months of late February and early March to October and early November.² Although no follow up studies have been made which confirming this workforce change, data collected by the Napa County Housing Commission on the occupants of the Migrant Farm Worker Housing Centers for the past three years seem to verify that this workforce change is permanent.³ These housing graphs are very pertinent because they show the influx of migrant workers into the Napa area. **By contrast, the proposed future district for Napa County has migrant farm worker housing for families.** Because family migrants include their children during their search for work and during their work, it stands to reason that the proposed district’s workforce follows the peaking of the workers during August to September, the time when children are not in attendance in school.

This latter conclusion is reinforced by the Operation of the OMS Migrant Family Housing Centers, operated by the State of California, Department of Housing and Community Development, Office of Migrant Services. ⁴ This map shows migrant farm worker housing, which is only Family housing, operated by OMS and is only located in the Central Valley and the Sacramento Valley and none is located in North Coast area including Napa County. Comparing Exhibit 1 with Exhibit 4, lead to the unescapable conclusion is that there is no “community of interest” between Napa County and the geographical areas in the proposed district with regard to migrant farm worker housing.

This lack of “community interest” extends to family farm worker affordable housing. In DISTRICT, there presently exists only one family farm worker affordable housing project, 15 units located in Lake County. Contrast this with the proposed district which has two farm worker affordable housing projects. Both located in Yuba City, Sutter County. One project which contains one hundred units consisting of a mixture of four bedrooms, three bedrooms, and two bedroom units, owned and operated by a non profit organization. The other is a project owned and operated by Yuba City a mixture of two and three bedroom units. Farm worker affordable housing always meets with considerable resistance, and this includes the North Coast region and the Sacramento Valley regions. Today most housing proponents suggest the reason for the absence of farm worker affordable housing in the North Coast area is the increasing price of real estate. This would place elected officials of the proposed district in an almost untenable position, trying to format farm worker affordable housing solutions for two regions with totally different “community interests,” different farm worker workforce and very different costs for establishing such housing


An Assessment of the Demand For Farm Worker Housing In Napa County provides as brief, but informative discussion on the problems associated with providing farm worker affordable housing in Napa County.⁵ In the area of farm worker affordable housing, the State of California places on each County and its existing cities the responsibility of providing such housing. However, the state provides very few resources on how to accomplish this goal. One resource the state has provided is permission for a County and its cities to address the problem jointly and use each of their resources jointly in addressing and complying with the responsibility. Because of the existing “agricultural preserve” in Napa County, this tool is of utmost importance. By placing American Canyon in a different district from Napa County, you will be removing probably the most important tool they have in addressing the farm worker family affordable issue. Allowing these two entities to jointly work on this issue, a solution may be found preserving the agriculture preserve and its contribution to the continuing economical development of the area. Further such a solution would provide some answers on how the state as a whole could develop other agricultural preserves which would further the economical stature of the state.



administrative headquarters out-of-county report all of their employment in their home county, even if they have substantial numbers of workers in Napa County. Thus, their Napa County employees would be attributed elsewhere. Conversely, some multi-county employers headquartered in-county report all of their employment as though it is in Napa County, even if they have significant numbers of workers employed in other counties.

One of the most remarkable findings of reported hired farm workers employment is the dramatic change over the past 15 years in the pattern of reported monthly employment. Not only has peak monthly employment increased, but substantial increases occurred in every month. The 3-year averages of monthly employment for 1987-89 as compared with 2002-04 is shown in Figure 24. During the period 1987-89, peak monthly employment was significantly greater than employment during the remainder of the year, jumping by two-thirds as compared with the two preceding months. However, by 2002-04, peak employment extends for several months. And farm employment during every month during 2002-04 was substantially greater than during the earlier period, in particular in April and May, when it was up by 80%.

These findings suggest that there may be a significant increase in the number of regular or year-round farm laborers employed on Napa County farms. Similarly, peak employment during the grape harvest has increased by more than 1,200 individuals

during this 15-year interval, suggesting that there are now many more short-term seasonal workers during the recent period.

As discussed previously, there are several shortcomings of these data. For example, the QCEW reports indicate that just 12 Napa farm labor contractors reported hired workers in 2004. However, there were 41 farm labor contractors registered with the Napa County Agricultural Commissioner as of December 20, 2005. Nearly half (20) have out-of-county business addresses. Some of those on the current list of registrants are vineyard management companies that also operate a farm labor contractor business and are likely classified as farm management companies, not labor contractors, in the QCEW file.

It is likely that some, if not most, of the out-of-county farm labor contractors attribute their employment to another county. In a study of farm labor market intermediaries for the California Department of Industrial Relations that examined individual quarterly employment reports for the year 2000 submitted by agricultural employers in considerable detail, it was found that multi-county firms normally attribute all of their employment only to their headquarters county (Villarejo 2003). This can result in substantial distortion of reported county-level employment if there are a significant number of workers hired by multi-county agricultural businesses.

A second finding of the DIR report was that many farm labor contractor and farm management firms self-identify their business classification incorrectly to EDD, most often indicating their business as a farm, not as an agricultural service business. Examination of the year 2000 data for Napa County, which was studied in conjunction with the DIR report, shows that this effect was especially significant for Napa County farm management firms – employment in this category was understated by as much as 50% in the 3rd Quarter 2000. Correspondingly, employment by grape farm operators was significantly overstated, by as much as 30%. To illustrate the size of this effect, the data for September 2000 is summarized in Figure 25.

The obvious and rather striking conclusion illustrated in Figure 25 is that farm employment reported by farm management firms in Napa County was very slightly greater than the corresponding figure reported by grape farm operators. It is important to realize that the total employment for the three SIC categories shown in Figure 25 remains the same after correction. Only the SIC category for incorrectly classified employers has



been reassigned. There were 17 employers that were misclassified: 16 should have been categorized as farm management firms, and one was a farm labor contractor.

This example indicates that EDD QCEW reports of Napa County employment and payroll for each of the categories of grape farm operators, farm labor contractors and farm management companies are probably incorrect. However, total employment for all three categories together is more reliable.

In 2000, these three categories of employers – grape farm, farm labor contractor, farm management – accounted for 94% of reported farm employment in Napa County. The only other category with significant numbers of workers in 2000 was ornamental floriculture and nursery crop production (SIC = 0181), which accounted for just 2% of Napa County farm employment.

Finally, it was also found in 2000 that at least 15 multi-county employers of farm labor that were active in Napa County, including farm labor contractors, farm management firms and grape farm operators, reported all of their employment in another county. It is not known whether this is still a significant reporting problem for recent years.





Should Napa County and its municipalities decide to increase housing options for farmworkers currently commuting from non-adjacent counties, we estimate that an additional 175 rooms (or 43 units at an average of 4.1 rooms per unit) are needed to bring crowding levels to 1.5 persons per room, while an additional 999 rooms (244 units) are needed to bring crowding levels to 1 person per room.

Affordable Housing

The need for more affordable housing for farmworkers is apparent, based on high rates of crowding, difficulties paying rent and a reported inability to pay for basic needs such as food and health care. This is clearly an issue with which Napa County has struggled for many years, with no clear solutions. Attempts at providing affordable housing for farmworkers in Napa County have faced a number of challenges, including documentation requirements and housing costs that may be are often higher than what farmworkers are willing or able to pay. The survey findings indicate that farmworkers spend an average of \$250 per adult per month for rent. While it will be difficult for affordable housing programs to compete with that figure, it will be important to take that into account when developing future housing options for farmworkers. It is also important to keep in mind that farmworkers already spend an average of 35% of their income after remittances on rent.

Competitive Housing Costs

Virtually all farmworkers come to the United States to work, save money and send remittances to their families in Mexico and Central America. It is apparent that most are willing to endure crowded and substandard housing conditions in exchange for lower rent. Average farmworker housing costs are \$250 per month. Efforts to improve farmworker housing conditions will need to be competitive in order to attract farmworkers.

Family Housing

The assessment findings indicate that 40% of farmworkers live with a spouse and/or children while working in Napa County. Of households with children, a relatively high percentage (63%) include children and parents only. Nonetheless, 25% live with extended family members, while 12% live in households which include unrelated adults. More affordable family housing is needed to obviate the need for families with children to live with unrelated adults in order to pay the rent. The same is true for those living with extended family members who would prefer to live in "nuclear" family situations. Current farmworker housing programs provide options for undocumented unaccompanied men and documented families. There is however a gap in services for undocumented families. Additionally, 24% of households with children consist of three or more children, indicating a need for three and four bedroom units.

Farm Labor Camps

The farm labor camps serve an important function, providing safe and clean housing, nutritious meals and other important services for numerous farmworkers each year. They provide housing for anyone employed in agriculture in Napa County, regardless of immigration or documentation status and charge on a daily basis, eliminating the need for security deposits and first/last month's rent, which represent hardships for many farmworkers. Farmworkers are responsible only for their rent, and are not dependent on others for paying rent. A focus group discussion with farmworkers living in one of the public farm labor camps indicated relatively high levels of satisfaction with conditions there. Nonetheless, the labor camps appear to be most attractive to those that do not have the option of sharing with family or friends. Focus group participants indicated that one of the main reasons that they live in the labor camp is because they do not know anyone with whom to share housing. Conversely, the main reasons they prefer to live in private sector housing is greater independence and the ability to find cheaper housing, even if it may be more crowded or of lower quality and not include food. In order for the farm labor camps to continue to serve the important function that they do, they will need to remain competitive with private sector housing costs.

Nearly one in four of the farmworkers that had never stayed at a farm labor camp was unaware of their existence. During the course of conducting surveys with farmworkers staying in motels outside of Napa County it became apparent that many were unaware of the labor camps and expressed interest in learning more. Outreach among farmworkers

living in these motels might prove especially fruitful. As noted, several farm labor contractors expressed interest in being able to offer farmworkers information about housing. In addition to direct outreach to farmworkers, indirect outreach through farm labor contractors may present an efficient means of reaching that population as well. Given that the farm labor camps already exist as a valuable resource for Napa County farmworkers, and that they have faced low occupancy rates in the past, additional funds to support outreach might be a cost-effective way to capitalize on this resource.

The elimination of meals at the farm labor camps represents a possible option for increasing occupancy rates at labor camps. A rough estimate of the cost of providing meals at the public labor camps is approximately \$6 per person per day.²¹ If existing subsidies were to continue at current levels, the labor camps could potentially lower the cost of staying there to \$5 or \$6 per night, which would no doubt make them significantly more attractive to farmworkers.

There are however a number of challenges associated with eliminating meals that would first need to be considered. The kitchens are commercial and therefore require supervision by paid staff if residents were to use them on their own. Efforts to let residents use kitchens in other counties have resulted in a number of problems, including broken equipment and allegations of food theft. Not allowing the use of the central kitchen could result in the use of hot plates and cooking in rooms, with its own set safety and public health ramifications. Microwaves do however present an alternative to hot plates.

Despite these challenges, it may be worth experimenting with that option at one of the labor camps and monitoring the results over several seasons. While eliminating meals would be preferable to closing the labor camps altogether, seeking additional public and/or private funds in addition to Measure L is another approach to lowering the cost of staying at public labor camps and increasing occupancy rates, while providing healthy meals for farmworkers.

Housing for Temporary Workers

The assessment findings indicate that approximately 1,750 farmworkers work in Napa County on a temporary basis, for less than three months out of the year. Employer interviews indicated that housing for these workers was a priority need. In order to supplement available housing at labor camps during peak periods, an option worth exploring are the mobile farmworker housing units that the California Human Development Corporation is developing. These units can be transferred from region to region based on need, potentially allowing Napa County to share their costs with other agricultural regions.

Emergency Rental Assistance

Nearly one in three farmworkers reported difficulties paying their rent at some point during the year, while one in eight were unable to pay their rent because a housemate could not pay their portion. Most addressed that situation informally, seeking loans from friends or family. This indicates an opportunity for the provision of more formal support in the form of emergency rental assistance. This could come through the County or nonprofit organizations, which may be less encumbered by the need to verify documentation status. For example, Catholic Charities has an emergency rent program in the Salinas Valley, a model that could be adopted in Napa County, or existing programs could be bolstered to reach more of the farmworker population



Safe Communities

One of the most frequent concerns expressed by farmworkers was the safety of their neighborhoods. While this is not an issue specific to farmworkers, farmworkers, like most other residents of Napa County, care about these issues. This may represent an opportunity to organize farmworkers to promote safer neighborhoods and communities.

Information and Resources

While many farmworkers are familiar with the existence of housing assistance programs, very few were able to name any of these programs or describe them in any detail. This indicates a need for more outreach and education. At the same time, a number of farmworkers described poor housing conditions, but felt they lacked recourse to address them. The nonprofit Center for Community Advocacy in Salinas has a successful program educating farmworkers about housing options and providing them with the tools to improve their housing situations. This is a model that Napa County may want to consider exploring. Information about housing options could also be provided at venues drawing large numbers of farmworkers, including flea markets and health and other service fairs that are offered on a periodic basis.

California Redistricting Commission Hearing

Testimony by Jennifer Pae

June 27, 2011

Good evening, my name is Jennifer Pae and I am testifying before you again today on behalf of the East Bay Asian Voter Education Consortium (EBAVEC), the Alameda County regional partner of the Coalition of Asian Pacific Americans for Fair Redistricting (CAPAFR). Similarly to the last time we saw you for the Commission hearing in Oakland, there will be members of the coalition who received education from CAPAFR that will be testifying again about their communities of interest and responding to the draft maps that have been released.

Currently, there are over 457,000 Asian American and Pacific Islanders (APIs) in Alameda County. APIs are one of the county's most rapidly growing populations. We had previously provided maps based on API population density in Alameda County. The first concentration of APIs is in Oakland, Alameda, and Berkeley. The second concentration of APIs is located in San Leandro, San Lorenzo, Ashland, Cherryland, Hayward, and Union City. And finally, there is a third concentration of APIs located in Fremont and Newark.

The communities in which APIs live have shared needs for language access, have similar immigrant backgrounds, and have common economic needs. APIs have common policy concerns around these needs and interests that would be best-served if the areas in which they live are kept intact within the same district. We are here today to ask the Commission to preserve these communities of interest by joining Oakland, Alameda, and Berkeley as one Assembly district and San Leandro, San Lorenzo, Cherryland, and Ashland as another Assembly district. In addition, we ask the Commission to keep the city of Fremont whole with Newark and nearby areas in Santa Clara County.

CAPAFR will be submitting response Assembly and Senate maps this week that will provide specific mapping changes that reflect our testimony.

We thank you for your time and hope that we may continue to work together in the best interest of the community.

Testimony of Diane Chin, Oakland Resident
Citizens Redistricting Commission Hearing in San Francisco
June 27, 2011

Good evening. I want to thank the Commission for this opportunity to testify before you regarding the draft maps you have offered to the public and their potential impact on my community in Alameda County.

My name is Diane Chin. I was born in and remain a current resident of Oakland. I am a civil rights lawyer and community activist, and have worked with groups such as the Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights, Disability Rights California and Chinese for Affirmative Action. I was involved in redistricting efforts at the local and state levels following the 1990 and 2000 Censuses. More recently, I participated in the community meetings organized by the Coalition of Asian Pacific Americans for Fair Redistricting (CAPAFR) that helped produce the map that was submitted by CAPAFR earlier in this process.

I would first like to thank the Commission for keeping Oakland's Chinatown whole. This neighborhood is very diverse, with Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese and other Asian Americans living, working and owning businesses there, and sharing a variety of interests and needs.

In response to the draft maps you have presented, I am testifying today to emphasize that Oakland and the surrounding cities of Alameda and Berkeley have similar socioeconomic status, educational, and other communities of interest among and across Asian American and Pacific Islander, Latino, and African American residents. For racial and other under-served groups, many of our residents in Oakland, Alameda and Berkeley rely upon critical social services provided by government agencies and community groups that serve constituents across city lines. Because of this and common cultural, political, and experiential histories and futures, Oakland is best kept with Alameda and areas to the north such as Berkeley, rather than San Leandro and areas to the south, for assembly representation.

I respectfully request that the final Commission maps acknowledge these communities of interest and ensure that Alameda and the areas of Berkeley and Oakland designated in the CAPAFR map are grouped in one assembly district to better serve our diverse populations and to ensure that we can obtain fair and responsive representation.

**A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AMERICAN CANYON
PROTESTING THE "VISUALIZATION" MAPS OF THE CITIZENS REDISTRICTING
COMMISSION PLACING THE CITY OF AMERICAN CANYON IN A DIFFERENT

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Voters FIRST Act (Act), after a lengthy, non-partisan selection process the California State Auditor randomly selected the first eight members from a qualified pool to join the first Citizens Redistricting Commission (Commission) on November 18, 2010 with the final six members selected and approved on December 15, 2010; and

WHEREAS, the Commission must draw the district lines in conformity with strict, nonpartisan rules designed to create districts of relatively equal population that will provide fair representation for all Californians; and

WHEREAS, the Commission released its first visualization maps of the proposed districts; and

WHEREAS, these visualizations show the City of American Canyon being separated from all other cities in Napa County and placed in a different Congressional District; and

WHEREAS, the City of American Canyon has been part of Napa County and Congressional District 1 since its incorporation in 1992; and

WHEREAS, with the assistance of our congressional representatives and County officials, the City has spent an extensive amount of time and resources to establish its identity in Napa County and to separate itself from the City of Vallejo by obtaining its own post office and zip code; and

WHEREAS, this separation of the City of American Canyon would cause confusion on the part of our residents; and

WHEREAS, the City of American Canyon strongly encourages the Commission to keep County and regional areas together and consider the common industries served and related business infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, the City of American Canyon strongly opposes the proposal of being placed in a different Congressional District than the other cities/town in Napa County and urges the Commission to keep Napa County whole and within the same district; and

WHEREAS, American Canyon businesses play a vital role to the premium wine industries of Lake, Mendocino, Sonoma, and Napa Counties; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires Council Member Belia Bennett to represent and speak on behalf of City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AMERICAN CANYON, that the City Council of the City of American Canyon strongly opposes the proposal of being placed in a different Congressional District than all other cities/town in Napa County and urges the Commission to keep Napa County whole and within the same Congressional District.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Council Member Belia Bennett be authorized to represent and speak on behalf of the City of American Canyon.

Dear Commission Members:

I strongly urge you to reconsider severing the city of American Canyon from the 1st Congressional District. The Commission's "visualized boundary" would weaken the ties I and many others have fought very hard for to build for decades between American Canyon and the rest of Napa County.

I was raised in American Canyon and worked for 30 years for the American Canyon Fire Department – the last 17 years as Fire Chief. In 2008, I was elected to the Board of Supervisors with a major goal of improving the relations between the city of American Canyon and the County and raising the visibility and influence of American Canyon as an equal partner in Napa County affairs.

There is history that Commission Members need to know before driving a wedge between the City and County and risk undoing many years of work to bring the two jurisdictions together.


In 1992, American Canyon incorporated as a city. The break from the County was largely precipitated by the County using the area for years as a repository to satisfy its low-income housing state mandate with seemingly little regard for the future and well-being of its residents. A deep distrust and anger between the residents and County grew out of this situation and existed for years after the break, until several years ago when both the City and County began to reach out and seek compromise on issues that mutually benefited both jurisdictions. In 2009, the City and County finally resolved a decades old dispute and reached an agreement to settle a border dispute that would allow American Canyon to develop a city center and allow the County to preserve open space. More agreements have followed, such as road improvements to better transport wines grown and bottled in the rest of Napa County to the integral warehouses in American Canyon, where they are then transported throughout the world. American Canyon has become a critical part of Napa's supply chain. Its economic interests are intermingled, as are its social and governmental interests.

The Commission Members must also understand that the City of American Canyon has been battling since its birth in 1992 to forge an identity as part of Napa County. Our Congressman, Mike Thompson,

fought for a decade on behalf of the American Canyon's 16,000 residents to get the U.S Postal Service to issue the City its own zip code. American Canyon had been lumped in with Vallejo's zip code for years. Last year, Congressman Thompson fought a successful two-year battle with the U.S. Postal Service, which threatened to close the city's tiny post office. This is a city that has fought hard for any all recognition it now enjoys. It is just now blossoming and becoming an equal partner with the other jurisdictions in Napa County.

In closing, I cannot stress enough the importance of Commission Members understanding the history of Napa County before cutting off an integral piece and lumping it with another Congressional district. I again strongly urge the Commission Members to reconsider its "visualized boundaries" and keep the City of American Canyon and the rest of Napa County as one.



The purpose of public testimony is for Councilmembers to benefit from the views of the public. Comments from the public should be directed towards the Council. Councilmembers and staff generally avoid entering into a dialogue with members of the public who may address the Council.
- **Public comment on agendized items.** Members of the public are entitled to speak on any item on the agenda either immediately after the item is called by the Mayor or during a Public Hearing on the subject matter opened by the Mayor. Each person is entitled to speak on any agenda item only once at any meeting, and the right to speak at the appropriate time waives any further right to address the Council on that item at that meeting. Participation in debate on any item before the Council shall be limited to members of the Council, although Councilmembers may ask members of the public for additional information.
- **Public comment on unagendized items.** Members of the public are entitled to speak on matters of municipal concern not on the agenda during Public Forum. Please refer to the procedures under Item 7, Public Forum.
- **Time limit.** Each person's comments shall be limited to 3 minutes, except as provided below regarding land use Public Hearings.
- **Addressing Council at land use Public Hearings.** The applicant at a land use Public Hearing shall be permitted to address the Council for 15 minutes following the staff report. If there is a spokesperson for the opposition, the spokesperson shall be permitted to speak for 15 minutes. All other speakers will be limited to 3 minutes each. Applicant shall be permitted 5 minutes at close of public comments for rebuttal.
- **Presentation by spokesperson.** Whenever any group of persons wishes to address the Council on the same subject matter, it shall be proper for the Mayor to request that a spokesperson be chosen by the group to address the Council, and, in case additional matters are to be presented at the time by any other member of the group, to limit the number of persons addressing the Council so as to avoid unnecessary repetition before the Council.

- **Irrelevant testimony.** The Mayor shall rule out of order any testimony not relevant to the agenda item then under discussion.
- **Items submitted after packet distribution.** Materials related to any item on the Agenda submitted to the Council after distribution of the agenda packet are available for public inspection in the City Clerk's Office at 1480 Main Street, St. Helena, CA during normal business hours and placed with the agenda at the back of the Council Chamber prior to the start of the meeting.

Dear Commission Members:

The Napa Chamber of Commerce strongly urges you to reconsider severing the City of American Canyon from the rest of Napa County in all the proposed districts. American Canyon, incorporated in 1992, has put in much time and effort to be recognized as a part of Napa County. The Commission's "visualized boundary" would undermine these years of effort and weaken what needs to be a strong tie between American Canyon and the rest of Napa County.

American Canyon serves as the southern gateway into Napa County, for residents, tourists and commerce. American Canyon's roads are a critical transportation link for Napa County's residents to get to and from their jobs; tourists to get to and from our world-famous Napa Valley; and our key industry's wine and grapes to get to market. Additionally, more and more warehouses in American Canyon are now occupied by the wine industry. The City has become a critical part of Napa County's supply chain. In addition, the City of American Canyon is an important urban center that, along with the other cities, allows the County to preserve its open space and maintain its agricultural preserve. It is clear that American Canyon and Napa County's economic interests are inextricably linked.

It is very important that Commissioners understand the importance of American Canyon to the rest of Napa County before lumping it with another Congressional, Senate, Assembly and State Board of Equalization district. Again, we strongly urge that you reconsider your "visualized boundary" and keep Napa County whole.

**RE: RECOMMENDATION TO KEEP THE GREATER AMERICAN CANYON AREA* WITHIN
CURRENT CONGRESSIONAL, STATE SENATE AND STATE ASSEMBLY DISTRICTS AS
MAPPED**

The appointed California Citizen's Redistricting Commission has provided to the public on June 10, 2011 initial draft maps proposing new 2012 district boundaries for the United States Congress, the California State Senate and the California State Assembly. For all three local districts represented the greater American Canyon area has been removed from proper contiguous alignments within Napa County boundary lines and lumped into three other unmatched district formations.

It is the stated position adopted by the representative governing bodies of the County of Napa and of the City of American Canyon that American Canyon be wholly contained within Napa County boundary lines as currently drawn for all three districts in 2012. We concur with this position. Being elected representatives to the Napa County Regional Park and Open Space District, we would like to express our support as individuals for keeping the greater American Canyon area aligned with the rest of Napa County.

Since incorporation only a decade ago, American Canyon has worked long and hard to forge a regional identity based in part as a gateway to Napa. The position of American Canyon has become better aligned therefore with the rest of Napa County residents for reasons already outlined by the Board of Supervisors and City Council. Similar county connected agricultural, cultural, commercial and transportation interests of American Canyon residents will remain better served as represented in the current Congressional and State legislative districts well past 2012. They should not be expected to compete with a wider array of divergent interests from other communities south or much farther to the east or west for scarcer public services funding. Uninterrupted representation by Congressman Thompson, State Senator Evans and Assemblyman Allen can ensure this.

The greater American Canyon area is also an important geographical component of the Napa River watershed. For purposes of extensive local projects now undertaken (often matched substantially with federal and State funding) for flood control, wetlands restoration, habitat protection, natural resources mapping and educational interpretation this area remains uniquely tied to the rest of Napa County environments upstream.

The Napa County Regional Park & Open Space District (which shares the same represented boundaries as the County of Napa) has worked closely with all American Canyon representatives to fund, design and build regional trails and supporting recreational amenities within the area. This is a set of working relationships worth continuation for multi-phased recreational projects to better serve American Canyon and Napa valley residents alike.
