COMMUNITY INDICATORS

## EMPLOYMENT

Orange County enjoys a diverse economy, with economic output and employment well-distributed among sectors:

- After shrinking from mid-2009 to early-2010, Orange County's total civilian labor force has mostly remained above 1.6 million throughout the remainder of 2010, similar to the size of the labor pool from 2006 through mid-2009.
- Non-farm industry accounts for 99.8% of the total labor force.
- As of December 2010, the largest labor markets included Trade, Transportation and Utilities (18%), Professional and Business Services (18%), and Leisure and Hospitality (13%).<sup>15</sup>

Small businesses flourish in Orange County's entrepreneurial climate:


- In 2009, fewer Orange County residents worked in large firms of 500+ employees (15%) than the statewide average (21%).
- Larger firms witnessed the most significant employment losses between 2004 and 2009 (-33% among firms with 500+ employees).
- At the same time, small firms with fewer than 20 employees only witnessed a 2% decline in employment.<sup>16</sup>

Orange County's unemployment rate remains below state and national averages:

- Unemployment in the last half of 2010 improved slightly from earlier in the year, finishing at 8.9% in December 2010 (not seasonally adjusted).
- While this rate is historically quite high for Orange County, it remains below the state average for December 2010 (12.5%) and on par with the national average (9.1%).<sup>17</sup>

## HOUSING

As of January 2010, there were 1,040,544 housing units available to Orange County residents:<sup>18</sup>

- A majority of occupied units were owner-occupied (60%) compared to renter-occupied (40%).
- Approximately half (51%) of the existing housing units in Orange County were single-family detached units.<sup>19</sup>
- In 2009, single-family permits comprised 62% of total permits issued, compared to 41% in 2008.
- Only 2,184 residential building permits were issued in 2009, representing a decline of 31% in one year and 77% since 2004.<sup>20</sup>

## AVERAGE HOUSEHOLD SIZE

The average household size in Orange County is 3.0 persons:

- Among all counties in the nation, Orange County has the 122nd highest average household size, which is higher than California (2.9) and the United States (2.6).<sup>21</sup>
- Santa Ana has the highest household size in the county (4.5) and the seventh highest household size in the nation when compared to cities with more than 20,000 residents.
- In addition to Santa Ana, eight Orange County cities have higher household sizes than the county average, including Garden Grove (3.7), Buena Park (3.6), Stanton (3.4), and Anaheim (3.4).<sup>22</sup>

## **Statistics for Santa Ana and Anaheim submitted by Armando de la Libertad**

### **Civil Rights & Legal Services**

- In 2008, the percent of foreign born population in Santa Ana was 48.4%, with about 39,000 people entering the U.S. after they year 2000; Anaheim's percent of foreign born population was 37.1%, with 30,147 people entering the U.S. after the year 2000; Garden's Grove percent of foreign born population was 46.9%, with 18,871 people entering the U.S. after the year 2000 (Nativity & Place of Birth of Resident Population 2008 Data Chart, U.S. Census Bureau, 2008)
- The Legal-Aid Society provides free and low cost civil legal services to low-income persons and seniors. Their Orange County offices are located in Santa Ana and Anaheim

### **Crime**

- In 2010, there were 1,161 violent crimes reported to law enforcement in Anaheim and 1,510 crimes reported in Santa Ana, compared to the nearby cities of Garden Grove (539) and Orange (150) (FBI's Preliminary Annual Uniform Crime Report, 2010)
- Garden Grove has created a Gang Suppression Unit to combat gang activity, Santa Ana has created a Graffiti Task Force and the Santa Nita Gang Injunction; Anaheim has a similar program, the Gang Reduction Intervention Partnership.

### **Education/Educational Access**

- According to EdTrust West, the Average Four Year Graduation rate for CA is 76.1% for CA, however, it is 50.1% for Santa Ana and 61.8% for residents (2009 O.C. Dropout Summit Report to America's Promise Alliance).
- 37 elementary, middle, and senior high schools in Santa Ana were on the last "Persistently Lowest-Achieving Schools" list; 12 elementary schools in the Anaheim City School District and 8 middle/senior high schools in Anaheim Union High District were on the "Persistently Lowest-Achieving Schools" list; 19 elementary/middle/high schools in Garden Grove were in the "Persistently Lowest-Achieving Schools" list published by the CA Department of Education (April 14, 2011).
- Based on 2010 API scores, 10 schools in Anaheim City School District, 4 schools in Anaheim Union District, 9 schools in Garden Grove Unified School District, and 9 schools in Santa Ana Unified School District did not meet growth targets (CA Department of Education, Orange County School API Report, 2010).

### **Environment/Sustainability**

- Santa Ana River Watershed is shared by Santa Ana, Anaheim, Fullerton, and East Garden Grove...
  - Cities need to implement programs to reduce dependence on imported water, increase water use efficiency, water storage, and water use (Presentation by the Bren School of Environmental Science & Management University of California, Santa Barbara, No Date)
- Garden Grove and Santa Ana have partnered with Habitat for Humanity. Both cities have opened Habitat stores and have begun a sustainable enterprise for building affordable and eco-friendly homes (Habitat for Humanity, Orange County)

### **Health Care/Public Health**

- Santa Ana and Anaheim have among the highest number of residents without health insurance; nearly 33% of Santa Ana residents and about 22% of Anaheim residents do not have health insurance (American Communities Survey, 2010)
- “There were 34,508 persons in Orange County’s Medical Services Initiative program in August 2010 as reported by the. Fourteen ZIP codes including those from Westminster (92683), Santa Ana (92703, 92704, 92707), Anaheim (92804, 92801, 92802, 92805), Garden Grove (92843, 92840, 92841, 92844), Costa Mesa (92627) and Fountain Valley (92708) accounted for more than 50% of the indigent population.” (Medically Indigent Care Reporting System, 2010)
- Santa Ana and Anaheim accounted for approximately 48% of the total Spanish-speaking Medi-Cal eligible people in Orange County. (“Orange County Geographic Health Profile,” Orange County Health Care Agency Research and Planning, 2011)
- Five cities accounted for 92% of the total Vietnamese speaking Medi-Cal eligible people in Orange County: Westminster, Garden Grove, Santa Ana, Anaheim, and Fountain Valley (“Orange County Geographic Health Profile,” Orange County Health Care Agency Research and Planning, 2011)

### **Heritage/Culture/History**

- Many homes are multi-generational in ownership... parents buy the house, kids move away, come back, inherit the home, their kids in turn grow up, move out, and are now coming back. On my block alone, at least one third of the homes are now seeing the third generation return. It’s the same for residents of Santa Ana and Anaheim
- Little Arabia (Center is at Brookhurst and Ball) and several mosques also happen to be in Anaheim, East Garden Grove, and Santa Ana. Arab Americans are invisible because they are not counted as a separate group in the US census or in voter data.
- Anaheim and Santa Ana share a history of attracting immigrants because of jobs in restaurants, hotels and service industry.
- Anaheim and Santa Ana share a cultural history of celebrating traditional holidays such as the 16th of September, Day of the Dead(Dia de los Muertos) and the Posadas at Christmas.

### **Housing**

- Large sections of Anaheim along with large sections of Fullerton, Buena Park, Cypress, Stanton, Garden Grove, and Orange have 20-80% renter population, similar to those cities, where as the rest of Anaheim (closer to the 91 Freeway), Villa Park, North Tustin have fewer than 20% renters (MALDEF, Orange County Percentage Rented of Occupied Housing Units Map, 2010)
- Anaheim and Santa Ana had a high percentage of Bankruptcies and Foreclosures than most cities in Orange County (HealthyCity.org, 2010)

### **Labor/Workforce/Job Training/Employment/Industry**

- Lots of blue collar and hospitality areas (work at Disneyland, convention center, resort hotels, the Honda Center, Angels Stadium, or Knotts) provide jobs for many Orange County Residents.

- Santa Ana (14%) and Anaheim (11.4%) were among the top 5 cities in Orange County with the highest unemployment rate in April 2011 (Employment Development Department, 2011)

### **Language Barrier**

- Santa Ana and Anaheim are home to a larger percentage of English language learners (ELL's) in schools, many who are Latino (2009 O.C. Dropout Summit Report to America's Promises Alliance).
- The most prolific home language of the majority of ELL's in Anaheim City School District (93.4% of ELL's), Anaheim Union School District (88.6 % of ELL's) and Santa Ana Unified School District (98.4% of ELL's) and Garden Grove (66.8%) is Spanish (California Department of Education, Educational Demographics Office Data 2009-2010. Accessed June 15, 2011).

### **Media/TheArts/ Sports**

- The Honda Center and the Angels Stadium provide employment for residents of Orange County
- Anaheim promotes and supports Santa Ana's Art District as a cultural neighborhood (Anaheim's Visitor & Convention Bureau). Given the number of people who visit Anaheim, this could be bringing a good number of tourists to Santa Ana's Art District.
- Anaheim and Santa Ana share many cultural events in music, art and dance. Such as Ballet Folklorico, mariachi music and artists (painters and musician's).

### **Poverty**

- Percentage of poverty between 2005-2009: Anaheim-12.96%, Santa Ana-17%, Garden Grove-13.09% (American Communities Survey data for years 2005-2009)
- 24 Schools in the Anaheim City School District have 50% or more students on the Free or Reduced Lunch program/15 schools in the Anaheim Union High District have 50% or students on the Free or reduced Lunch Program; 60 Schools in the Garden Grove Unified School District have 50% or more students on the free or reduced lunch program; 59 schools in Santa Ana have 50% or more students on the free or reduced lunch program (CAL Works, 2010)

### **Seniors**

- The vast majority of zip codes in Santa Ana and Anaheim have upwards of 2, 100 residents of ages 65 and/or older, whereas some southern and the vast majority of eastern Orange County have less than or equal to 2,000 residents of ages 65 and/or older (Orange County Health Care Agency, 2010. Data Source: Claritas 2007 Orange County Population by zip code).
- Anaheim, Garden Grove, and Santa Ana each have at least one senior center with ongoing recreational, health, and educational programs

### **Small Business**

- Out of 23,947 firms in Anaheim in 2002, 1.3% were black-owned, 1.5% were American-Indian owned, 16.7% were Asian-owned, and 25% were women-owned (Data suppressed for Hispanic-owned firms) (US Census Bureau, 2009)

- Out of 19,673 firms in Santa Ana in 2002, 15.9% were Asian-owned, 25.4% were women-owned, and 30.8% were Hispanic-owned (Data suppressed for black-owned and American Indian-owned firms) (US Census Bureau, 2009)

### **Transportation**

- OCTA's Bus #57/47 join Santa Ana, Anaheim, Fullerton, providing transportation to workers and students in these cities to major employment sites: Disneyland, Hotels around the Disneyland area, the Block of Orange, The Angel's Stadium, Santa Ana College, and CSUF.
- Closes Amtrak stations: Anaheim, Fullerton, Santa Ana

### **Veterans**

- Anaheim and Santa Ana have two out of the four community-based veteran outpatient clinics in Orange County (Department of Veteran Affairs).
- Anaheim and Santa Ana have provided resources in each of their veteran centers for veterans to apply for USA Small Business Administration loans

### **Youth**

- Anaheim—14% of 7<sup>th</sup> graders, 25% of 9<sup>th</sup> graders, and 33% of 11<sup>th</sup> graders stated that they have used alcohol, at least once during the past month (California Healthy Kids Survey, Key Findings, 2008)
- Santa Ana—19% of 7<sup>th</sup> graders, 29% of 9<sup>th</sup> graders, 37% of 11<sup>th</sup> graders stated that they have used alcohol, at least once during the past month (California Healthy Kids Survey, Key Findings, 2008)
- Garden Grove—14% of 7<sup>th</sup> graders, 22% of 9<sup>th</sup> graders, and 27% of 11<sup>th</sup> graders stated that they have used alcohol, at least once during the past month (California Healthy Kids survey, 2008)
- Santa Ana, Anaheim, and Garden Grove have the highest teen pregnancy rates in Orange County (National Vital Statistics Report, Center for Disease Control, 2008)

Redistricting Commission Hearing – July 13, 2011

Good morning commission members.

My name is Jesus Silva and I live and work in Fullerton. I am a junior high school teacher and I would consider myself to be a community leader in my city and for my students.

This is my second time speaking in front of you. I spoke before you on June 18, when you held a hearing in Fullerton. At that time, I was advocating to keep, South Fullerton, West Anaheim and Santa Ana in the same Assembly and Congressional District.

Based on your most recent visualization maps, I want to thank you for being receptive and addressing my concerns and the concerns of many of the speakers who were at the June 18 hearing. However, in taking a closer look at our latest maps, you seem to be moving in the direction of **not** including South Fullerton in the same districts as West Anaheim and Santa Ana.

And this is why I am here today. I would like to draw your attention to the Academic Performance Index (API) scores. As you may or may not know, the API scores are what the State uses to determine which schools are succeeding and which schools are not succeeding. If you look at the scores of the schools in these three communities, you will see that the vast majority of these schools have scores that fall between 600-700.

[Another indicator of standardized test scores or API scores is the socio-economic level of the students and families. I have heard many professors/researchers say that a great indicator of standardized test or API scores is the quality of grass and flowerbeds in the front yards of the homes.]

So I would say that, this data indicates that these three communities have a lot more commonalities and should be considered as one community of interest. Currently, the South Fullerton schools have lower scores than the North Fullerton schools. (it is no coincidence that all the million dollar homes in Fullerton are located in N. Fullerton) As a result of these scores, the South Fullerton schools have been classified as Program Improvement schools (PI). (South Fullerton contains the majority of High density housing and the majority of families on the federal lunch program) The API scores for the last five years have been between the high 600's and the high 700's.

Currently, both school districts in Anaheim have been classified as Program Improvement Districts. In the last five years the majority of the schools have API scores between the mid 600's to the high 700's.

The Santa Ana schools are in a similar position as Anaheim. The Santa Ana School District has also been classified as Program Improvement Districts. The five years API scores for the Santa Ana schools has ranged between the high 500's to the high 700's.
