RESOLUTION NO. 2799

**A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS  
OF THE CASTAIC LAKE WATER AGENCY REQUESTING  
THE CALIFORNIA CITIZENS REDISTRICTING COMMISSION TO  
INCLUDE THE AGENCY'S SERVICE AREA WITHIN A SINGLE ASSEMBLY DISTRICT**

**WHEREAS**, the California Citizens Redistricting Commission is charged with drawing new boundaries for Congress, California Board of Equalization, State Senate and State Assembly; and

**WHEREAS**, the Agency is responsible for delivering water to over 270,000 residents and agricultural interests to the Santa Clarita Valley (SCV) in northwestern Los Angeles County and northeastern Ventura County; and

**WHEREAS**, the Santa Clara River involves water supply and quality issues that are common to the downstream interests in Ventura County and upstream interests in the SCV; and

**WHEREAS**, SCV and Ventura County share responsibility for managing the Santa Clara River, which is the last wild river in southern California; and

**WHEREAS**, splitting the Agency's service area into two Assembly Districts would complicate (1) the resolution of regional (i.e., Santa Clara River watershed basin) water issues, (2) IRWMP (Integrated Water Resources Management Planning) for the Upper Santa Clara River watershed and UWMP (Urban Water Management Plan Act) compliance for the SCV, (3) SCV water supply planning and management (by CLWA and the four SCV water retailers) coordination with local (i.e., City of Santa Clarita and Los Angeles County) land use planning agencies (e.g., the SCV One Vision One Valley general plan amendment processes for both the City and County would be conducted within a single Assembly District) and (4) Clean Water Act compliance consistent with Basin Plan requirements.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Board of Directors of the Castaic Lake Water Agency requests the California Citizens Redistricting Commission to include the Castaic Lake Water Agency service area within a single State Assembly District.



{Statement of Matt Rosenberg} 5:15 PM 4/28/2011

Hello, my name is Matt Rosenberg. My wife, 4 year old son & I are residents of the San Fernando Valley community of West Hills. I have lived in the San Fernando Valley for nearly 30 years. This includes living in the communities of Woodland Hills, Reseda, Canoga Park, Sherman Oaks & North Hollywood.

I want to emphasize that the San Fernando Valley is a community of interest and is naturally divided by the 405 Freeway that separates the San Fernando Valley between the West Valley and the East Valley. The San Fernando Valley runs from east to west. That is why organizations in the San Fernando Valley serve either the West Valley or the East Valley. One such organization that I am active with is the West Valley Jewish Community Center.

Our community is certainly aggrieved by the current lines, and I specifically note the Congressional district lines. Canoga Park is split from West Hills, and Woodland Hills is divided from the other part of Woodland Hills. Particularly aggrieved are the folks in Southern Woodland Hills and the people in West Hills, who are part of a district that is based in Beverly Hills.

Please don't get confused by the word Hills. Woodland Hills is next to West Hills and is nowhere near Beverly Hills.

Making West Hills part of a district that is anchored by Beverly Hills means that I would have to drive down the 405 Freeway to get to a legislator's office. The problem is that you can't drive on the 405 Freeway for many hours during the day due to the constant traffic congestion.

I would also like to emphasize a second point that the communities along the 101 Freeway in the Las Virgenes and Conejo area, including Thousand Oaks, Westlake Village, Agoura Hills, Calabasas, and Hidden Hills are linked to those parts of the City of Los Angeles that are in the West San Fernando Valley. There is an economic relationship between those areas. In fact, my wife lives in West Hills and works in Thousand Oaks. In addition, the Las Virgenes Municipal Water District and the Las Virgenes

Unified School District serve portions of my community of West Hills, as well as the cities of Westlake Village, Agoura Hills, Calabasas, and Hidden Hills.

\*SECESSION: In 2002 the City of Los Angeles (measure F) voted on whether the San Fernando Valley would secede. A majority of voters in the San Fernando Valley approved the Secession vote. However the rest of the City of LA did not. The San Fernando Valley voters proposed name for the new city with 62% of the vote was "San Fernando Valley".

Hello, my name is David Gerrold and I'm here today to speak on behalf of the community of the West Valley. For the last \_\_\_ years, I and my family have made my home in the West Valley neighborhood of Northridge and we had the unfortunate experience of watching the line-drawers of 2001 cut up our community into several ill-conceived districts that paid little attention to the natural geography of our community. For my part, I believe that the approach taken by the Los Angeles Public Library is instructive.

I want to submit for the record the lists of Public Libraries operated by the City of Los Angeles, and the geographical listing of those library branches provided by the Los Angeles Public Library. (Submit map of the Libraries) You'll see that the Los Angeles Public Library divides itself up into six regions. One of those regions is the East Valley Area, including eleven libraries all located east of the 405 Freeway, also known as the San Diego Freeway. They also have a West Valley Area, consisting of ten libraries, and all of those libraries are located West of the 405 Freeway (*move your finger along the 405 Freeway on the interactive map provided*). When you go to a library located in the East Valley, they will give you a sheet telling you what the library hours are of all eleven branches located in the eastern portion of the San Fernando Valley. That's because someone who goes to one East Valley Library could just as well go to another East Valley Library.

Similarly, when you go to any of the branch locations in the West San Fernando Valley, you're given a sheet showing the ten West Valley branches, together with the address of each of those branches and the hours which they are open. That is because if you're a patron of the West Valley library, you may find it convenient to go to another West Valley library.

The Los Angeles Public Library understands that it serves the East Valley, and if you for some reason you don't find convenient hours at one East Valley location, you'll want to go to another East Valley location. They understand that they serve West Valley patrons, and if you're in one West Valley

library branch and you find that if its hours aren't convenient, you'll want to know the hours of another West Valley library.

I bring the activities of the Los Angeles Public Library to you today not merely because I have always respected the wisdom of our librarians, but because their approach to the communities of the San Fernando Valley is simply common sense. The San Fernando Valley is its own community, distinct from our neighbors over the hills and this community is naturally divided between east and west by the 405 freeway. Thank you very much.
