

Good evening, my name is Mary Anne Foo. I have been a resident of Orange County for over 20 years.

I am the Executive Director of the Orange County Asian and Pacific Islander Community Alliance (OCAPICA). OCAPICA is a nonprofit organization located in Garden Grove. Our mission is to improve the health and social and economic well-being of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders (AAPIs) in Orange County.

OCAPICA has been working with the Coalition of Asian Pacific Americans for Fair Redistricting (CAPAFR) to bring people together to learn about redistricting. At today's regional hearing, individual members of the public who received education from CAPAFR are testifying about their communities of interest.

Several areas of Orange County are home to significant AAPI populations, and AAPI populations continue to grow rapidly within the county. In 2000, AAPIs made up about 15% of Orange County's total population. Census 2010 data show that AAPIs now make up over 20% of the county's population.

AAPIs are concentrated in several areas of the county. In north county, there are significant AAPI populations in Fullerton, Buena Park, Brea, La Palma and Cypress.

In central county, Garden Grove and Westminster are home to a large AAPI population, with the most numerous group consisting of Vietnamese Americans, who also live in adjacent areas such as Fountain Valley, Midway City, Stanton and parts of Santa Ana. The attached map shows AAPI population density for north and central Orange County.

In south county, Irvine has a sizable AAPI population, including many Chinese and Korean Americans.

Many residents of these areas are immigrants or refugees and are bound together by key needs around education language access, jobs and the economy. For some of the north county cities, these ties extend to cities in Los Angeles County such as Cerritos, Artesia and La Mirada.


Other interests tie these communities together as well. Many AAPIs have small businesses and would benefit from common representation so that their small business needs can be addressed by policymakers. Orange County is home to over 63,000 Asian American-owned businesses, representing the third-highest number of Asian American-owned businesses in the country.¹

Greetings. I am Paul Joo, an Orange County resident. I am a certified public accountant and own a firm with offices in Garden Grove and Brea. My firm provides accounting, tax and audit services to small and mid-sized businesses in a variety of industries.

I am civically engaged and am the current president of a community organization called the Orange County Korean-U.S. Citizens League. I have received education from the Coalition of Asian Pacific Americans for Fair Redistricting (CAPAFR) and would like to provide the commission with information about my community of interest.

There is a sizable Korean American population located in Fullerton and Buena Park. The attached map shows the Korean American population in these cities, which also shows concentrations of Korean Americans in surrounding cities such as Brea, La Palma, Cypress and Cerritos.

The residents of these cities, including Korean Americans, share common interests and needs for education and language access. Many of the residents in this area are also immigrants.

The Korean American population in Fullerton and Buena Park has strong cultural ties, indicated by the significant number of Korean restaurants in this area, the large segment of the population regularly attending church, and the paramount importance that the community's value system places on education. There is a growing Korean American population in adjacent areas such as Brea and Cypress, and these cultural ties extend to these areas, as well as areas in Los Angeles County such as Cerritos.

Notably, Brea has entered into a sister city arrangement with the city of Anseong in South Korea to promote cultural awareness and learning through exchange programs and educational events. Also, during the past decade the Korean American business community in Fullerton and Buena Park has expanded into Brea. With a high number of Korean Americans going to church, the growth of the Korean American community in Brea is marked by the establishment of several Korean American churches.

The many Korean American small business owners in Fullerton, Buena Park and Brea have shared economic interests that would be well-served by having common representation. Because of high rates of limited English proficiency, these business owners also have common language needs. As the owner of a firm providing professional services to small and mid-sized owners in the area, I know that many Korean American businesses face language barriers to understanding complex rules around taxes, auditing and accounting and have a need for policymakers who are sensitive to these needs.

Good evening. I am Saima Husain. I am the Director of Programs at the South Asian Network (SAN). SAN is a grassroots, community-based organization dedicated to advancing the health, empowerment and solidarity of persons of South Asian origin in Southern California.

With our main office located in Artesia, we are familiar with the needs of the significant South Asian populations in Artesia and Cerritos, which together are known as Little India. The attached map shows South Asian population in this area as well as north Orange County.

While the South Asian community is diverse in many aspects, the residents of these areas have shared interests around immigration and common social service and health needs. Because of these ties, we believe that Artesia and Cerritos should be kept together within the same legislative and congressional districts.

South Asian families that have immigrated to the U.S. face considerable challenges to staying together and obtaining visas for spouses, children, and siblings. Because of the U.S. system of quotas on family-based visas, family members from India in particular face waiting periods of six, eight or even eleven years before being able to reunite with their sponsoring family members in the U.S.

Like other communities, the South Asian community faces issues of domestic violence, and it also faces issues of human trafficking and elder abuse. Individuals and families facing these issues have common needs for services that are culturally competent and language-appropriate.

Seniors are among the most vulnerable segments of the South Asian community. While Artesia and Cerritos have sites for government-provided meal programs, many South Asian seniors typically cannot participate in these programs because they are vegetarian or require their food to be halal. Additionally, AAPIs including South Asians make up a majority of individuals receiving assistance from the state's Cash Assistance Program for Immigrants (CAPI) program. CAPI is a state program that provides cash assistance to senior and disabled non-citizens who are ineligible for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) or State Supplemental Payment (SSP) due to their immigration status. CAPI perennially faces the threat of funding cuts due to the state's budget difficulties.


Because of the concerns shared by their residents around immigration, social services and health, we request that the Commission keep Artesia and Cerritos together within state and congressional districts.

Since Artesia and Cerritos cannot by themselves constitute an entire legislative district, we suggest that they be paired with cities in north Orange County such as La Palma, Buena Park, northern Cypress and Fullerton. As shown on the attached map, there is a concentration of South Asians in La Palma and Buena Park. This population is growing and should be included with Artesia and Cerritos because of their shared concerns around state-provided social services.

My name is Lac Tan Nguyen. I am President of the Vietnamese American Community of Southern California. We are a community organization here to serve the interests and retain the culture of the Vietnamese American community in Southern California, particularly in Orange County through social, educational, and cultural events. We also help identify resources to refer and provide to the Vietnamese community to assist in their integration as Vietnamese Americans.

I have received education about redistricting from the Coalition of Asian Pacific Americans for Fair Redistricting (CAPAFR) and would like to provide information about my community.

Orange County is home to the largest Vietnamese American population outside of Vietnam. Most of this population is concentrated in Little Saigon. The core of Little Saigon is made up of Garden Grove and Westminster. Vietnamese Americans also live in Fountain Valley, parts of Santa Ana, Midway City and Stanton. The attached map shows the population density of Vietnamese Americans in this area.

Vietnamese Americans originally settled in Orange County as refugees. More recently, Vietnamese Americans have come to the U.S. as immigrants. Vietnamese American community members have an affinity to Little Saigon because of its cultural and social institutions. Every year, Little Saigon residents celebrate the lunar new year by participating in the Tét Festival of Southern California, which is the world's largest Tét Festival outside of Vietnam. The three-day festival has over 100,000 visitors annually and helps preserve Vietnamese culture and heritage.

Residents of this area have shared needs around language access. Many Vietnamese Americans have limited ability to speak English and rely on Vietnamese language newspapers and radio stations for their media services. The Vietnamese American community also has common social needs. While the area supports a strong commercial district, many residents are low-income and need representatives who can address their needs.


While the heart of Little Saigon lies in Garden Grove and Westminster, surrounding areas have concentrations of Vietnamese Americans and should be kept together with Garden Grove and Westminster. For example, areas in west Santa Ana have senior housing facilities where Vietnamese American seniors reside.

We recognize that Latinos have an interest in a Voting Rights Act district in Santa Ana, and we respect this interest. We do think it is still possible to maintain a Latino Voting Rights Act district in Santa Ana while also keeping the west part of Santa Ana in another district with Garden Grove.

Please do not dilute the voice of Vietnamese Americans in Orange County. Please keep our community whole. Thank you.

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Communities of Interest in Central Orange County

State Legislature Commentary

- The Commission should follow the spirit of Proposition 11 and nest two Assembly Districts into each Senate District.
- A State Senate seat in Central Orange County should include all of Santa Ana, the "flatlands" area of Anaheim and sections of surrounding cities with similar demographics. Those sections could possibly also include the southwest section of Orange, the west section of Tustin, and parts of Stanton and Buena Park.
- Of the two Assembly Districts nested into the Central Orange County Senate District, one should be anchored in Santa Ana and surrounding areas in south Anaheim, southwest Orange and westward Tustin. The second Assembly District should be anchored by the "flatlands" area of Anaheim, and portions of Stanton and Buena Park with similar demographics.

Congressional Commentary

- It is essential to keep Anaheim and Santa Ana in the same Congressional District.
- The two cities are linked by a high blue collar working class, immigrant population. This area also has a high number of Spanish speakers, young average age, and common health concerns.
- This link between the cities would allow voters to elect a member of Congress of their choice who would be able to properly represent them in the House of Representatives.
- Dividing these two cities would dilute the voice of this working class area and their voice would be lost by being put into more affluent district that would have different interests.

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Anaheim

- Anaheim is the 10th largest city in the state and a worldwide tourist attraction due to Disneyland, yet it is currently split into 3 Senate Districts and 6 Assembly Districts in the State Legislature due to gerrymandering. There is definitely a big difference between the working class, high immigrant flatlands section of Anaheim and the Anaheim Hills which is more affluent and less ethnically diverse, but the city should not be too fragmented by this Commission.

Santa Ana

- Santa Ana is one of the largest cities in California with a high blue collar working class, Latino immigrant community. It's about 75% Latino and a similar portion speaks Spanish.
- It is important for Santa Ana to continue to have their voice heard in Sacramento and Washington with a representative from their community.

Santa Ana LULAC #147 is prepared to submit redistricting plans in a timely manner to the state commission.



My name is Troy Nguyen. I am a Board Director of the Vietnamese American Chamber of Commerce (VACOC). VACOC is a nonprofit organization composed of local business owners and corporate representatives throughout Southern California. Our mission is to provide a strong network that allows businesses to advertise, build partnerships, and give back to the greater community.

VACOC has participated in meetings conducted by the Coalition of Asian Pacific Americans for Fair Redistricting (CAPAFR) to learn about redistricting. We ask the commission to keep together the Vietnamese American community in Garden Grove, Westminster and surrounding areas.

This area, known as Little Saigon, is a robust commercial district. The many Vietnamese American business owners in the area have similar economic concerns around business regulation and licensing.

A number of Vietnamese Americans live in Fountain Valley and own businesses in Garden Grove or Westminster. To ensure that these Vietnamese American business owners have representatives to turn to, Fountain Valley should be kept in the same district as Garden Grove and Westminster.

Lastly, the Vietnamese American community is an emerging political force. Within the past decade, we have seen Vietnamese American voters elect their preferred candidates to local and state office. Dividing our community would be a huge setback to our path to fair representation. Please keep our community whole.

My name is Joanna Lee and I am the Senior Research Analyst in the Demographic Research Project and Census Information Center, or CIC, at the Asian Pacific American Legal Center. I am here to present data supporting the testimony you've just heard.

Asian American and Pacific Islanders comprise over one-fifth of Orange County's total population. The AAPI population has increased 40% in the past decade countywide.¹ Table 1 shows AAPI population figures for cities in northern Orange County as well as two neighboring cities in Los Angeles County.

The northern cities of Orange County as well as cities in southern Los Angeles County – Fullerton, Buena Park, Brea, Cypress, La Palma, Cerritos and Artesia – make up overlapping communities of interest as you have heard from the testimony of AAPI community members. These cities share similar social and economic characteristics, bolstering the community members' testimony about communities of interest, and also suggesting that these cities be drawn together in the same district. Table 2 shows per capita income, percent foreign born, percent limited English proficient and median Academic Performance Index score for schools in those cities.

There is also a large Asian American community in the city of Irvine. Table 5 shows the number of Asians in Irvine compared to other adjacent cities. Over 43% of the city's population is Asian American while many of the cities around Irvine do not have a large Asian population.

In summary, AAPI community members have asked the commission to (1) keep Westminster, Garden Grove, Fountain Valley, Midway City, Stanton and the west part of Santa Ana together in one district as a community of interest, (2) keep the south L.A. County cities of Artesia and Cerritos together as a community of interest and placed with La Palma, Buena Park and northern Cypress, (3) keep the north Orange County cities of Fullerton, Buena Park and Brea as a community of interest and placed with La Palma, northern Cypress and Cerritos, (4) keep these north Orange County and south L.A. County cities together because of their commonalities, and (5) keep Irvine whole in one district.

My name is Sundaram Rama. I am the Executive Director of The Cambodian Family, which is a nonprofit organization located here in Santa Ana. The Cambodian Family is a multi-ethnic human services agency that serves immigrants and refugees.

There are close to 2,000 Cambodian Americans living in Santa Ana, concentrated in the heart of Santa Ana. Much of this population lives around Minnie Street in a low-income housing area, which also has a large number of Latino residents.

My agency works with both Cambodian American and Latino families. We have Khmer-speaking and Spanish-speaking staff who go door to door providing services. We also work with other Latino organizations.

Cambodian Americans share similar levels of income with the many Latinos residing in Santa Ana. Cambodian Americans and Latinos also have similar levels of educational attainment. Because of common needs, Cambodian Americans would be best served by being placed in a district drawn to protect the Voting Rights Act interests of Latinos in Santa Ana. I wholeheartedly support the drawing of such a district.


Please do not divide Irvine as you draw new district lines. Irvine deserves unified representation at the state and federal levels.

Map of Asian American Population in Irvine¹









Assembly District 1

- Entire City of Orange, Entire City of Villa Park, and Santa Ana (minus 50,000 residents in Southwest Santa Ana that are a large Asian/Vietnamese population.) should make up AD#1.
- The Voting Rights Act requires Latino residents to be in one district. Orange County might have two Latino Assembly districts. If they do, Santa Ana and Anaheim will probably be in different districts.
- The cities of Santa Ana and Orange (the city of Villa Park is an island inside the city of Orange) have a long history and many historic buildings that are fairly unique to Orange County. They also share transportation and water infrastructure.
- The communities of Orange and Villa Park share a common means of communication. The masthead of the leading newspaper of the area, The Orange County Register has a regional section insert serving Orange and Villa Park. There is also a specially produced Santa Ana version of the same paper.
- The communities of the Santa Ana and Orange share the 55 and 22 freeways as their primary means of transportation.

Assembly District 2



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


I am a ten-year resident of the City of Santa Ana, the county seat of Orange County, and practice law in the City of Santa Ana as well. In my practice, a substantial amount of my clientele are residents of the City of Santa Ana. The City of Santa Ana has a vibrant and diversified community, but constitutes a community of interest on socio-economic basis (Low to middle, with a strong working class predominantly), a strong Hispanic presence, with a substantial new-immigrant presence in Hispanic and Asian communities throughout the city, as well as a significant number of young urban professionals who have purchased homes in Santa Ana. To divide the City of Santa Ana, the 69th Assembly District or the 34th assembly district by splitting the City of Santa Ana between districts would have a strongly detrimental effect on representation of their interests in the State Assembly and Senate.







Redistricting Orange County: Summary (maps to follow separately)

Orange County's population of **3,009,217** in the 2010 census entitles it to representation equaling:

- 4.28 Congressional Districts (of 702,905 apiece)
- 6.46 Assembly Districts (of 465,675 apiece)
- 3.23 State Senate Districts (of 931,350 apiece)

In each case, this proposal seeks to limit the county to one district "shared" with a neighboring county.

External borders

North: The Puente Hills not only contain part of the LA & Orange County border, but people rarely travel over them and most often travel around them. North Orange County and the southern San Gabriel Valley are not contiguous in practice. Asian groups in both areas are separate communities of interest.

Northern Northeast: The gap following SR-91 towards Riverside and San Bernardino Counties (Chino Hills, Corona) is an inferior community of interest. The county line should be respected if possible.

Balance of Northeast: The depopulated Cleveland National Forest and the Santa Ana Mountains form a border that should be respected. Few people drive through rather than around them.

Southeast: While Camp Pendleton forms a natural boundary between Southeast Orange County and Northwest San Diego County, the highly-traveled I-5 quickly connects southern OC cities such as San Clemente to northern SD cities like Oceanside.

West: Above the Pacific Ocean to the southwest, OC's northwest border with LA County is permeable and frequently crossed. Whether one creates the shared district here, versus to the southeast, depends on the numbers of leftover votes in other counties.

As it happens, in Congressional Districting the numbers work out so that a district crossing OC's southeast border makes great sense (because the "leftover" portions of the combines San Diego and Imperial County area and the "leftover" portions of Orange County combine to make about one district.) In Assembly Districting, San Diego and Imperial combined to make almost exactly seven districts on their own (such that about 3500 people can be shared with a Riverside County district), so for these purposes it makes sense for OC's districts to cross the LA County line, especially in the Cerritos/La Mirada area.

Internal borders

Contiguity: What communities fit together will depend as much on freeway as on geographic proximity. Areas such as the Cleveland National Forest and Santa Ana Mountains are for the most part a depopulated "dead zone." Even though, say, CD-42 appears contiguous on a map, in practice it is not contiguous because one rarely drives, say, from Yorba Linda to Mission Viejo directly.

Communities of interest: The African-American community tends not to be concentrated geographically. The Latino community is prevalent, among other places, in the Buena Park and La Habra through Orange and Anaheim (west of the 55) and Santa Ana and Placentia. Asians communities are spread throughout OC, but there is a high enough concentration of geographically coherent communities in Garden Grove and Westminster to have a significant effect on districts. Placing these Asian areas in the same districts as the Latino areas pits these groups against one another, rather than allowing both to exert greater influence in separate districts. These Asian communities can best coalesce politically by being joined to the South and West with areas such as Fountain Valley, Huntington Beach, and Seal Beach.

Redistricting: A Guide

Following natural, established, and recognized boundaries: One charge of the Redistricting Commission is to avoid a result that looks like a gerrymander – which confuses and saps the confidence of the public. The best way to do so is to, when possible, draw lines that make sense to people. This means, when possible, respecting county borders and respecting city borders. One exception is when constructed or natural boundaries (such as, respectively, major freeways and rivers) exist. Anaheim is an example of a city that is difficult to keep in one district due to its being so long and narrow. The Costa Mesa Freeway (SR-55) is a recognized marker that can divide it in a way that people intuitive understand, especially given the hillier topography, lower density, and higher wealth of most communities to the east of it.

Districts in this proposal are as compact as feasible. Following city lines has a disadvantage, in terms of compactness and “look,” in that cities themselves sometimes have awkward borders. Still, people are used to these. Where possible, the best lines will be ones that can be described in the fewest words.

40: Seal Beach, Stanton, Garden Grove, Westminster, Hunt. Bch, Fountain Valley, Costa Mesa (W of 55)

42: Cypress, La Palma, Fullerton, La Habra, Brea, Yorba Linda, Placentia, Yorba Linda, Tustin, Villa Park, Anaheim (E of 55/91/90), Orange (E of 55), North Canyons

46: Dana Point, Laguna Niguel, San Juan Capistrano, San Clemente, East Canyons, NW San Diego County (including San Onofre, Oceanside, Fallbrook, Carlsbad, and Vista; excl. Encinitas, Escondido, San Marcos)

47: Santa Ana, Anaheim (W of 55/91/90), Orange (W of 55)

48: Newport Beach, Costa Mesa (E of 55), Irvine, Laguna Beach, Lake Forest, Mission Viejo, Laguna Woods, Laguna Hills, Aliso Viejo, Rancho Santa Margarita, most of Canyon Country

Rough outlines of Assembly Districts (numbering to be determined, needs more population balancing)

A: Brea, Fullerton, Placentia, Anaheim (W of roughly Harbor Blvd.)

B: Anaheim (E of Harbor Blvd.), Orange (W of 55), Santa Ana

C: Seal Beach, Stanton, Garden Grove, Westminster, Huntington Beach (W of SR-39, Beach Blvd)

D: Huntington Beach (E of SR-39), Fountain Valley, Costa Mesa, Newport Beach, Aliso Viejo, Laguna Beach, Irvine (S of I-5),

E: Yorba Linda, Orange (E of 55), Villa Park, Irvine (N of I-5), Laguna Woods, North Canyons, Tustin

F: Lake Forest, Rancho Santa Margarita, Laguna Hills, Laguna Niguel, San Juan Capistrano, San Clemente, South Canyons, Mission Viejo

G (shared district): Buena Park, Cypress, La Palma, La Habra (OC), La Mirada, Cerritos, Norwalk, east half of unincorporated area between Whittier and La Mirada.

Assumptions based on the prioritized criteria and geographical knowledge:

1. Boundaries will respect counties and cities.
2. Districts should nest within each other. Therefore, one Assembly District should be in only one State Senate District, and one Board of Equalization District. However, Congressional Districts would include more than one Assembly District, but hopefully never more than parts of two Assembly Districts.
3. Committee should have discussed geographical barriers throughout the state.
4. Committee probably has discussed weather patterns – e.g. cool coastal areas vs inland desert, high mountain areas with snow, etc.

Background of Author

As a resident of San Clemente for 15 years and a resident of California for 25 years (previously living in Westwood/Los Angeles area), I define my "community" as where I live, shop, dine and participate as a citizen. And being the last city going south in Orange County, the perspective is of being a long distance from centers of government power.

Personally, I have commuted to my company's offices (Irvine, El Segundo and Long Beach) and to project assignments as far north as Santa Monica, as far east as Chino, and as far south as San Diego, which means my extended "community" would include multiple counties. The traffic patterns in rush hour would also indicate that people in San Clemente and neighboring cities north tend to drive north to their place of work. The commutes tend to be north in the AM and south in the PM.

Since I am not a native of California, I've always enjoyed exploring areas around my community, do travel to San Jose to visit my sister, and in the past year have spent time and dined in San Diego, Oceanside to the south, as well as Culver City, Pasadena, and Los Angeles to the north – just as part of my own personal interest. Locally, I attend the Swallow's Day Parade in San Juan Capistrano, the San Clemente Fiesta and Ocean Festival, and tomorrow I'll be at the Alzheimer's Walk in Dana Point.

I mention these points to indicate that my bias is to keep San Clemente with other cities with similar interests, and to mention that I do frequently venture outside my city.

Natural Boundaries:

1. **Camp Pendleton** to the south of San Clemente is an open space and since the Marines are in charge, very separate in governance.
2. **Mountains and parks** create other natural boundaries further in south Orange County.
San Onofre State Beach and San Mateo State Campground act as a limit to expansion of San Clemente to the south.
Caspers Wilderness Park to east of San Juan Capistrano presents a natural divider, going east towards Lake Elsinore.
Donna O'Neil Land Conservancy and the Reserve at Rancho Mission Viejo, east of San Clemente and San Juan Capistrano are two open spaces vital to these two cities and separating them from other developments.
Crystal Cove State Park/Laguna Coast Wilderness Park to the north of Laguna Beach presents another natural boundary.
In general, the mountains have made the transportation patterns north and south, NOT east and west, so that cities feel closer sometimes to cities that are further north or south than to cities that are closer by east/west miles.
3. **I-5 Freeway** has been in existence long enough in South Orange County to be another almost natural divider as Laguna Niguel/Laguna Hills are on one side of the I-5 freeway and Mission Viejo/Lake Forest the other side of the freeway.

Community Relationships:

1. **Tri-City Group:** San Clemente, San Juan Capistrano and Dana Point (including Capistrano Beach) are the cities that I "live" in. City boundaries are confusing at times, not really straight lines. School boundaries cross city lines. These three cities coordinate law enforcement, and the patrol cars hear calls for all three cities. Chambers of Commerce among these three cities frequently co-ordinate activities.
2. **Beach Communities:** San Clemente, Dana Point, and Laguna Beach are beach-oriented communities because of tourism, cooler climate, beach activities of the residents, beach-related festivals (for whales, tall ships, ocean festival), fishing businesses, and strong environmental concerns about clean beaches and water. Also, portions of San Juan Capistrano, Laguna Niguel, and Aliso Viejo feel very connected to the ocean because of homes on the hillsides with ocean views. In general, throughout the state, communities on the ocean would most logically stick together.
3. **Related Cities:** Laguna Woods, a retirement community only, and Laguna Hills are two cities that should not be separated since Laguna Hills shopping, services, dining serve Laguna Woods and they are very much interrelated. Aliso Viejo and Laguna Niguel are also somewhat related to Laguna Woods.
4. **Chambers of Commerce:** Looking at Chambers of Commerce indicates the business/economic relationships.
San Clemente, San Juan Capistrano and Dana Point typically hold separate Chamber meetings, but do co-ordinate.
South Orange County Regional Chamber of Commerce includes Mission Viejo, Laguna Hills, Lake Forest, Aliso Viejo and Rancho Santa Margarita and has evolved over the years from one organization of the first three cities noted, to the 1991 and 2009 model where the Chamber operated as the South Orange County *Regional Chambers of Commerce* and operated five distinct, city-affiliated organizations. Then, in August 2009, the Chamber decided it would operate once again as one powerful business organization. Note: San Clemente, San Juan Capistrano, and Dana Point are *not* part of this regional chamber.
5. **League of Women Voters:** Another type of organization related to a larger-than-city area would be the League of Women Voters. The Capistrano Valley League includes members from San Clemente, San Juan Capistrano, Dana Point, Laguna Niguel, Aliso Viejo, Laguna Woods, Trabuco Canyon, and Lake Forest. There are four leagues in Orange County – north, central, north coastal and south.
6. **Capistrano Unified School District:** School districts are another entity that join cities into a community of sorts, and the Capistrano School District is a very large one, including: all or part of the cities of San Clemente, Dana Point, San Juan Capistrano, Laguna Niguel, Aliso Viejo, Mission Viejo and Rancho Santa Margarita, and the communities of Las Flores, Coto de Caza, Dove Canyon, Ladera Ranch, and Wagon Wheel. Since some cities (Aliso Viejo and Mission Viejo) are split between multiple school districts, this "community" has mixed relevance.


CONCLUSIONS:

1. San Clemente, San Juan Capistrano and Dana Point should be in the same districts – AD, SD, Congressional and Board of Supervisors.
2. Nearby cities in south Orange County bordering on the ocean have major common interests and should be kept together.
3. DO NOT ATTACH SAN CLEMENTE TO A DISTRICT IN ANOTHER COUNTY JUST BECAUSE WE ARE AT THE END OF ORANGE COUNTY





