Subject: Destroying Lompoc Representation

Message Body:

With every redistricting over the years, the City of Lompoc was devastated. I recall being put in the same Senate District with Simi Valley yet bypassing Santa Barbara. Then the disaster of 2000, being in the same Congressional District as Thousand Oaks and the same State Senate District as Santa Clarita.

Now it is even worse:

The proposed state assembly and senate districts split Lompoc in half between two districts, ensuring that on some city streets, neighbors directly across the street from each other will be represented by different state senators and assembly members. The new lines will place the U.S. Postal Service and Ryon Park in different districts even though across the street from one another, and Lompoc Valley Medical Center and Lompoc High School will reside in different districts.

The proposed lines for state senate zigzag through the city, following Bailey Avenue, West Ocean Avenue, North K Street, East and West College Avenue, North Seventh Street, and East Pine Avenue. The lines for the new state assembly district follow a different zigzag through the city, including Bailey Avenue, West Ocean Avenue, North O Street, West Laurel Avenue, North K Street, East and West College Avenue, North A Street, and East Pine Avenue.
