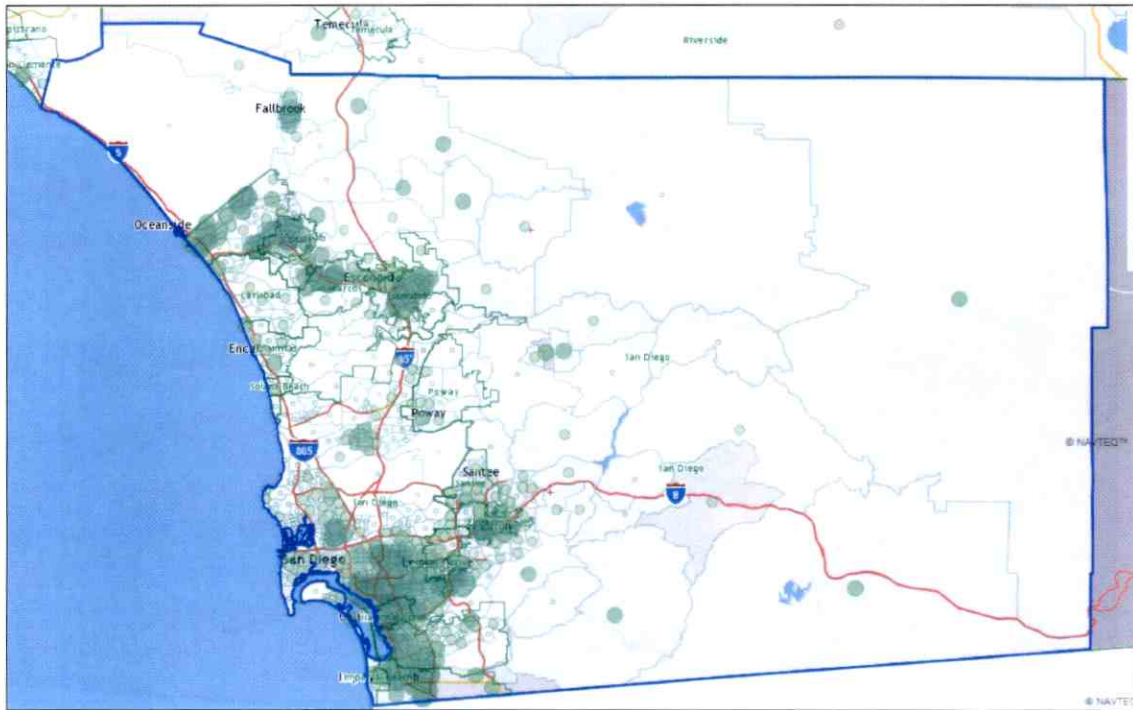


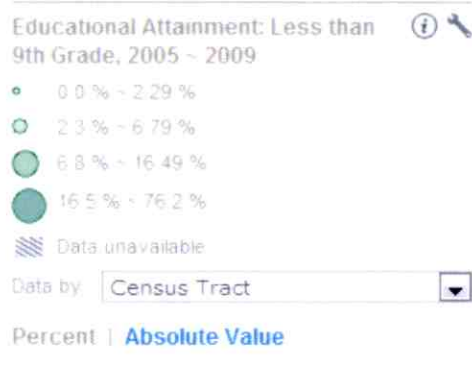

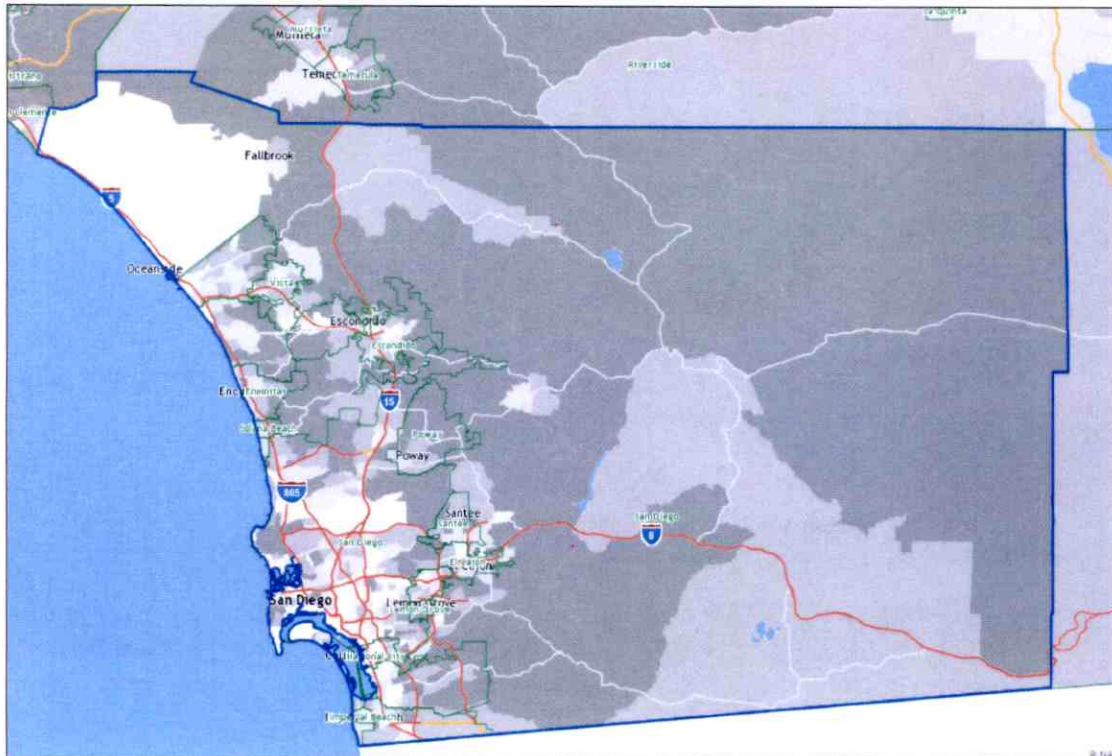

Population, age 25 and over, whose highest level of schooling is less than 9th grade.



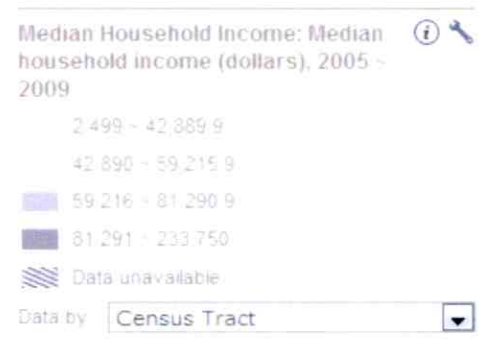

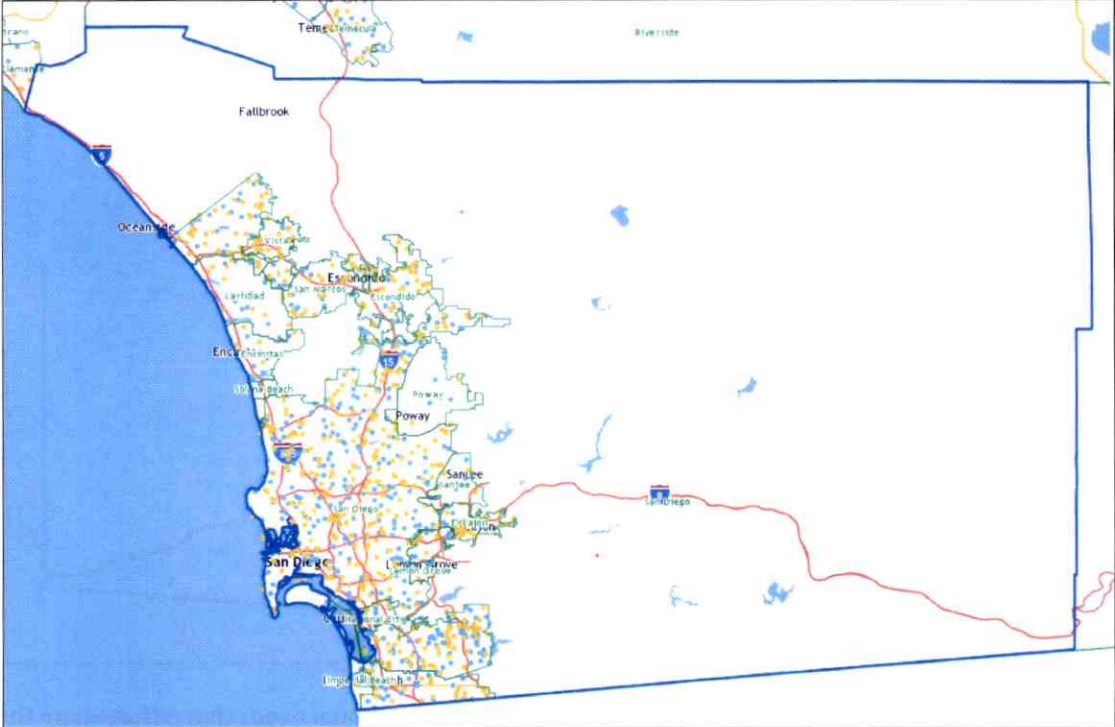

## District 73: Oceanside, Vista, Fallbrook and San Marcos

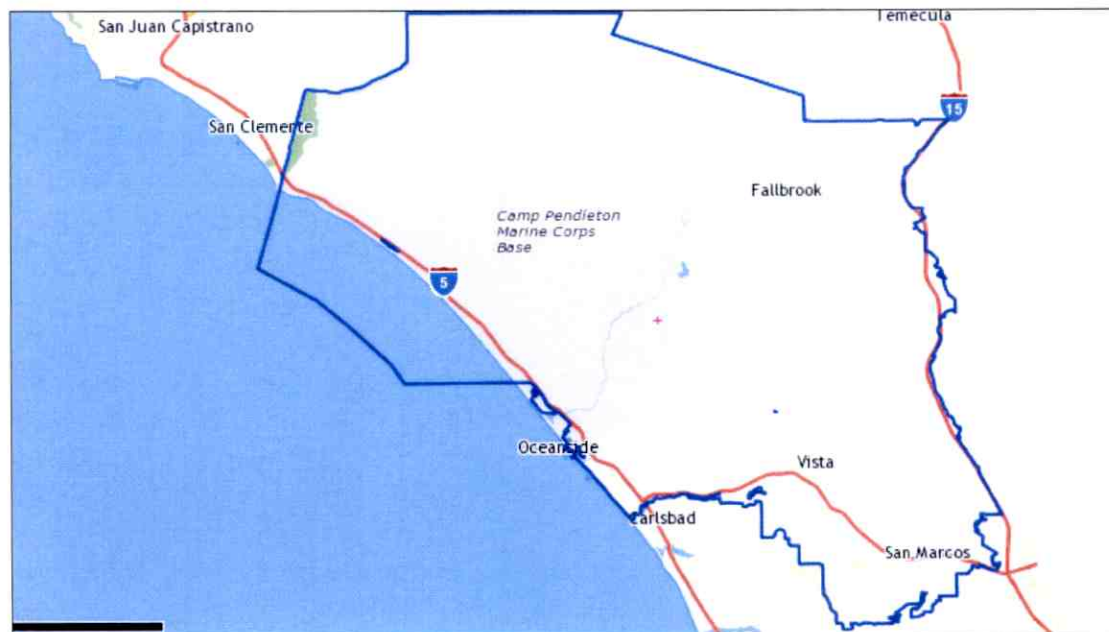
The cities of Oceanside, Vista, Fallbrook and San Marcos form a buffer between the city of San Diego and the rest of California to the north. These cities formed as agricultural land began to yield to population pressures further to the south and along the coast. Oceanside developed first due to the presence of Camp Pendleton and its historic function as the colonial land-grant capital and county mission site.

The general layout of the cities is bounded by the Ocean to the west, the county line to the north, US Interstate 15 to the east and CA freeway 78 to the south. Once the fifth largest agricultural county in dollar volume in the United States and second in California to Fresno County, it is currently composed of mixed urban and small private agricultural areas.

The water shutdown in the central valley cut 50% of San Diego County's drinking water and all of San Diego County's agricultural water supplies. The water loss ended \$5 billion in county agricultural income per year, created very large groups of displaced immigrant workers and wiped out major sources of general fund income. The immigrant workers then predominantly shifted to the construction industry and displaced the vast majority of local workers and companies.

The cities have been divided politically into a series of north/south districts that joined Riverside or Orange County communities into districts with these cities in North San Diego County. The former 74<sup>th</sup> joined coastal cities to the south with pieces of Oceanside and Vista. One result is that the provision of services to the new District 73 cities is often determined by the willingness of surrounding communities to fund those services. The result is that those services have so poorly reflected local needs and solutions that billions of dollars have been hugely wasted.

The core of our suggestion is to consider Oceanside, Vista, Fallbrook and San Marcos as a single community of interest (COI) and end their inclusion in districts constructed with parts in other counties or other communities.

The population demographics of the three communities is nearly the same. Each community has undergone strong population growth. San Marcos had a population of 16,000 in the year 2000 and is currently around 84,000.

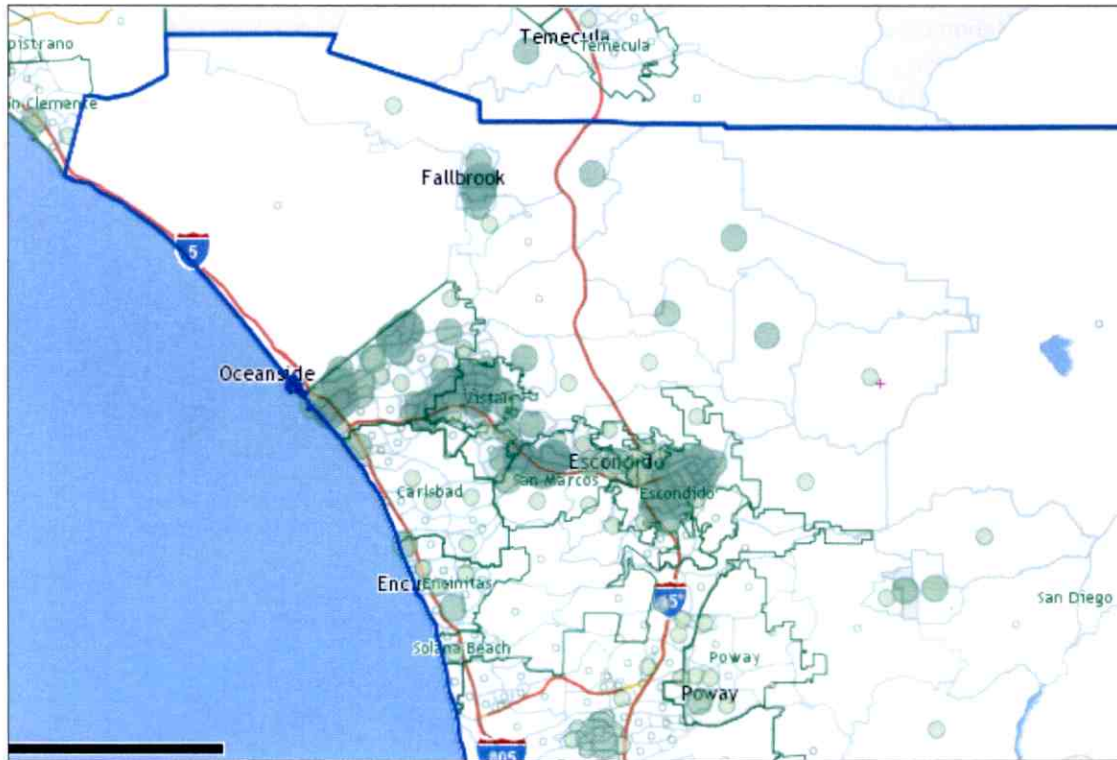

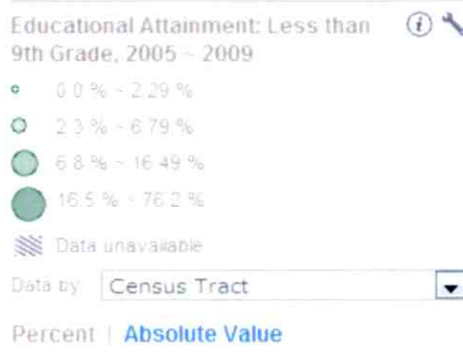

### Educational Attainment: Below 9<sup>th</sup> Grade

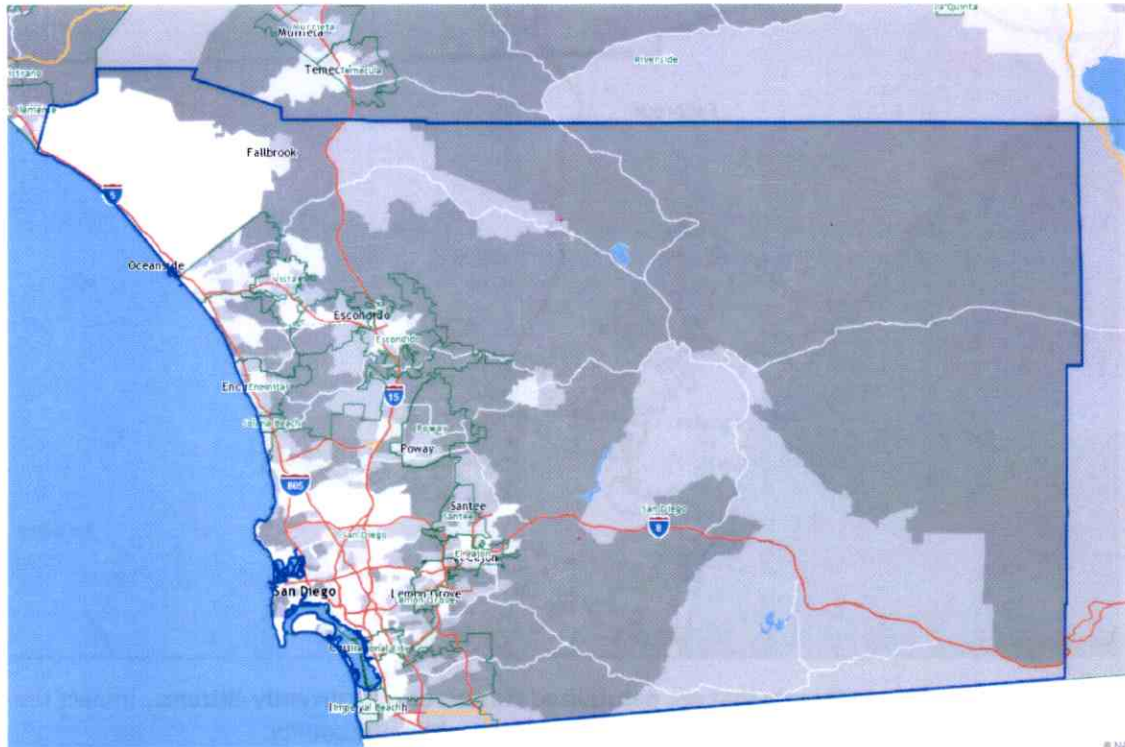
Population, age 25 and over, whose highest level of schooling is less than 9th grade.

The cities share another problem in common: education. The immigrant agricultural workers left behind when the water was shut-off, form a large body of very poorly educated adults in these three communities. They also form a body of parents whose children have a harder time in our school system.

**Median Household Income: Median household income (dollars)**

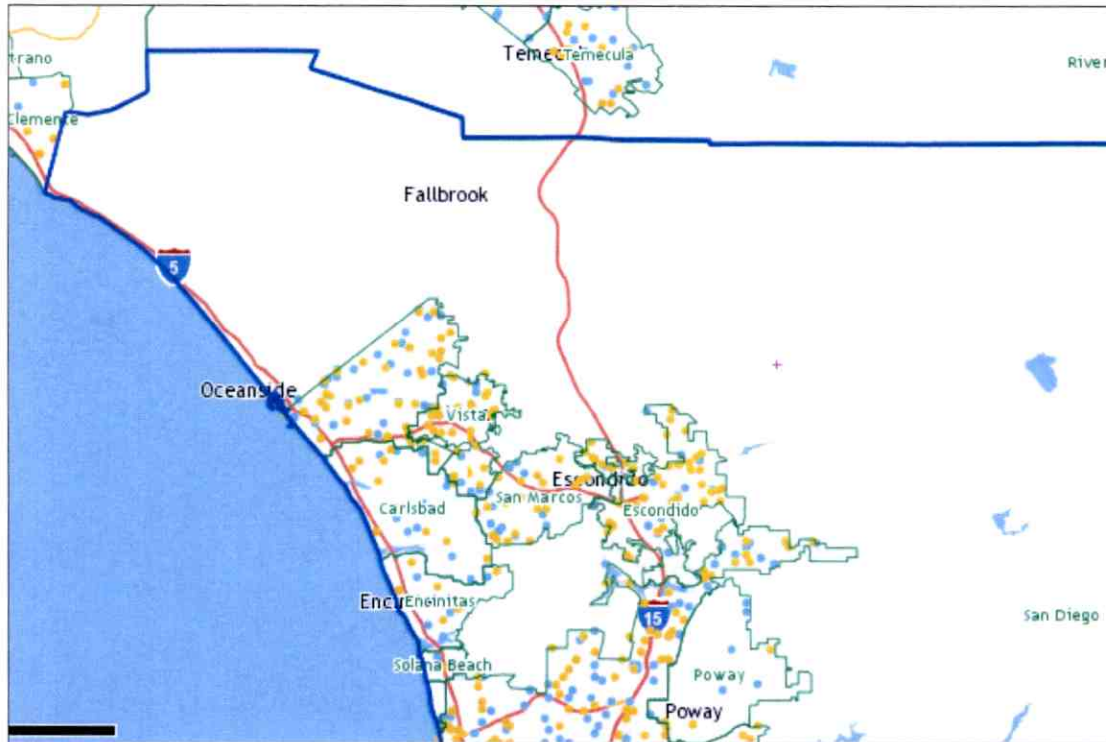
Median household income in 2008 inflation-adjusted dollars.

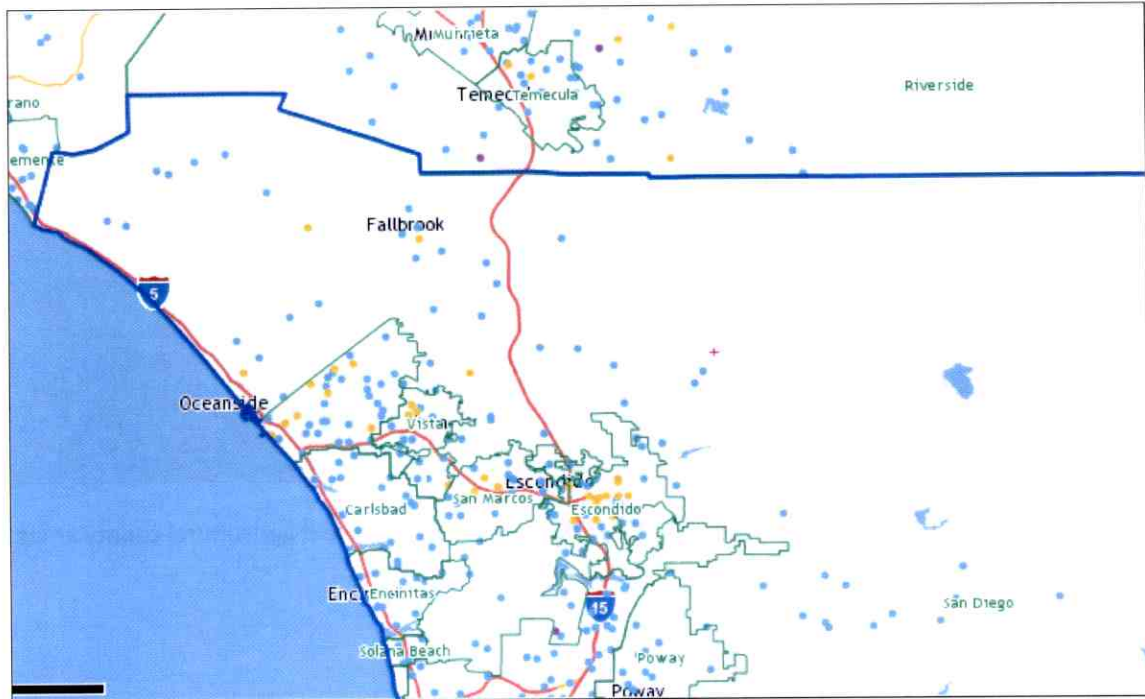


**Citizenship Status: Immigrants that are naturalized citizens or not currently citizens...** impact the North San Diego County in common ways that are unique within the county.

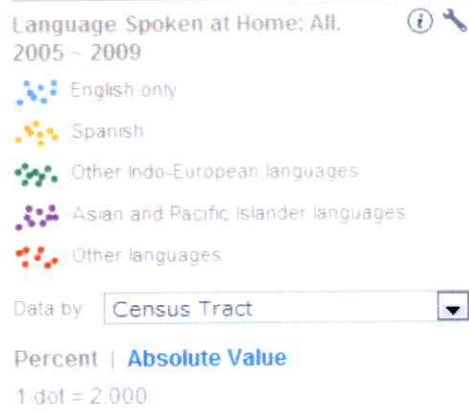

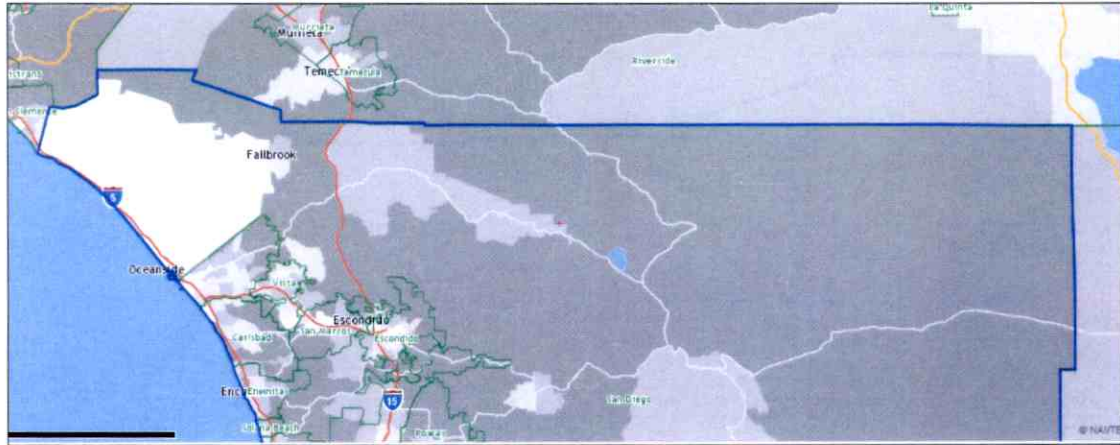

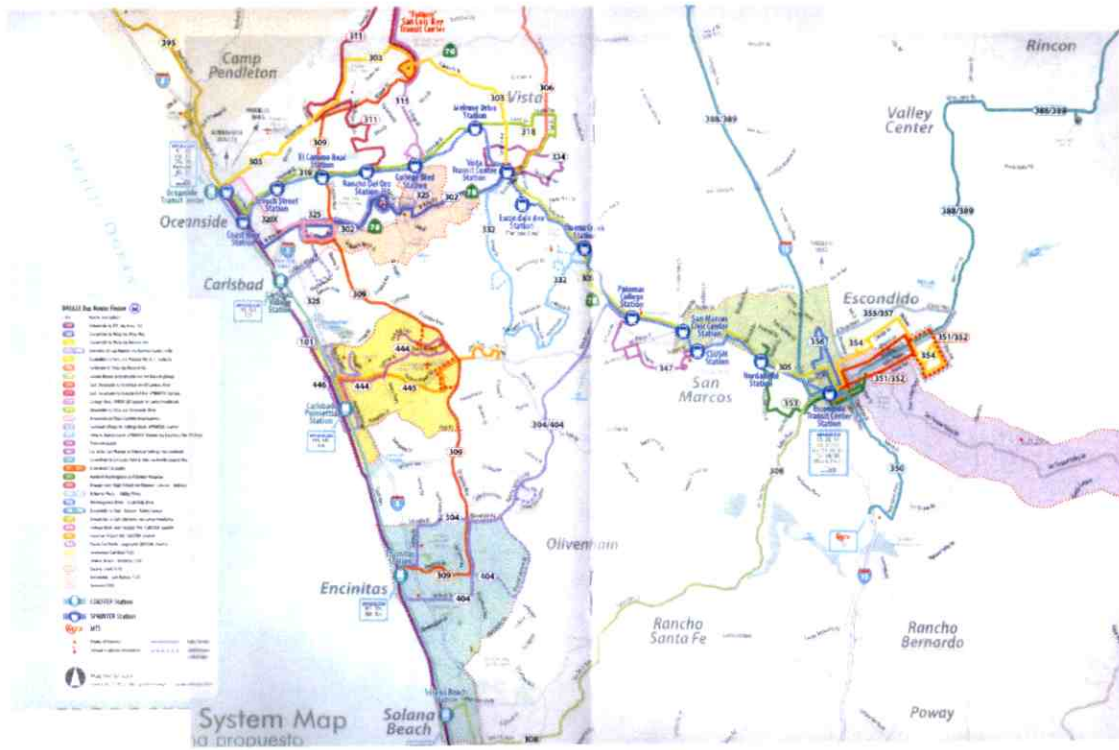

The proposed Assembly District provide a broad and diverse range of economic and social interests.

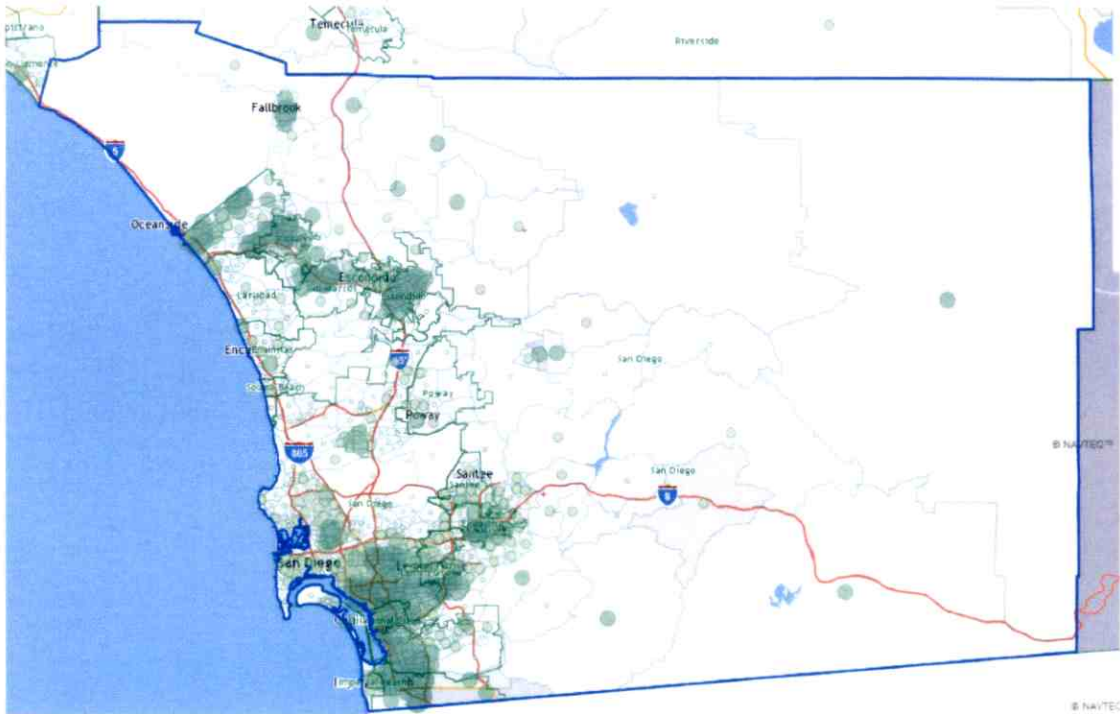
The district has common demographic areas of:

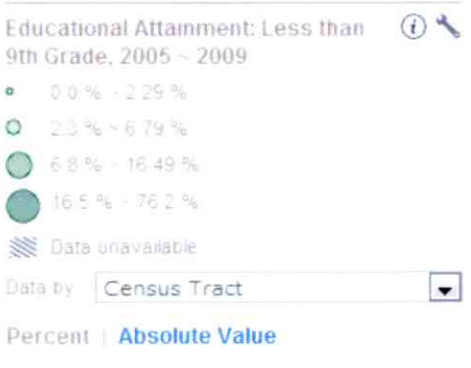

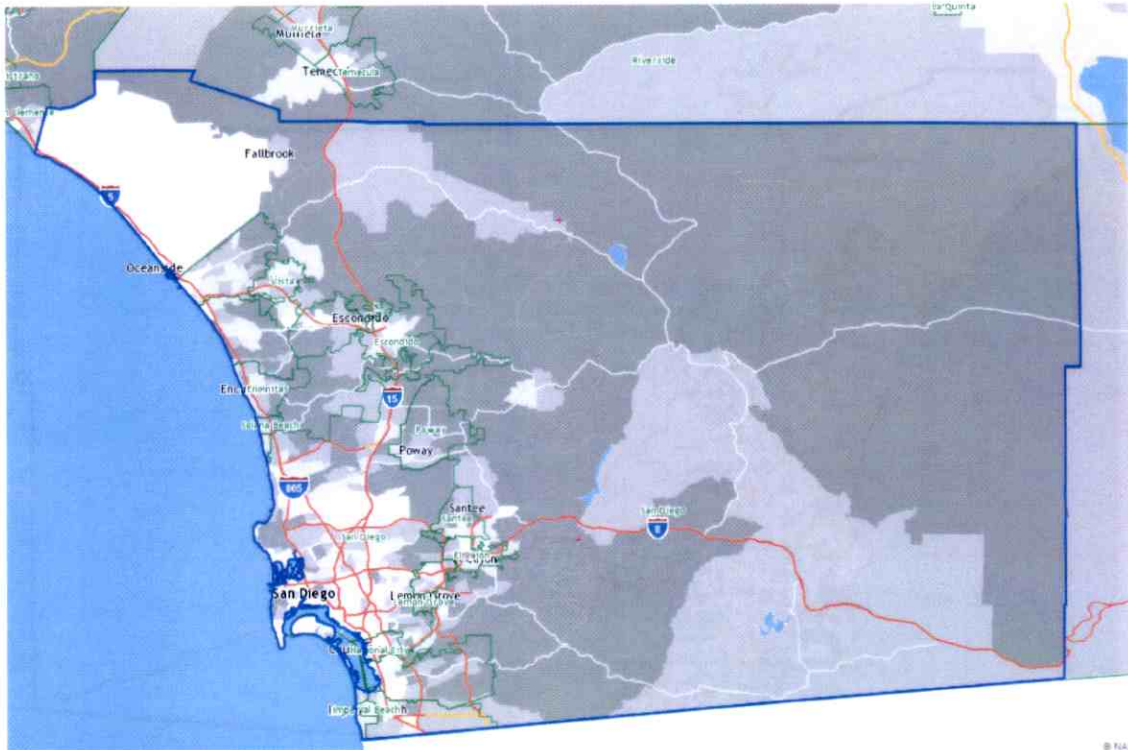

Population, age 25 and over, whose highest level of schooling is less than 9th grade.



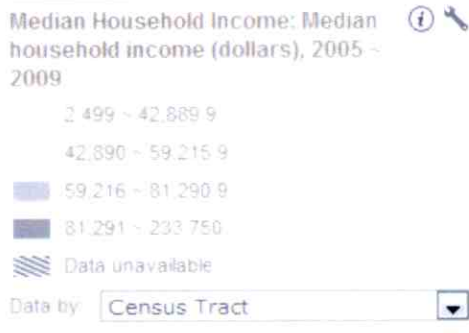

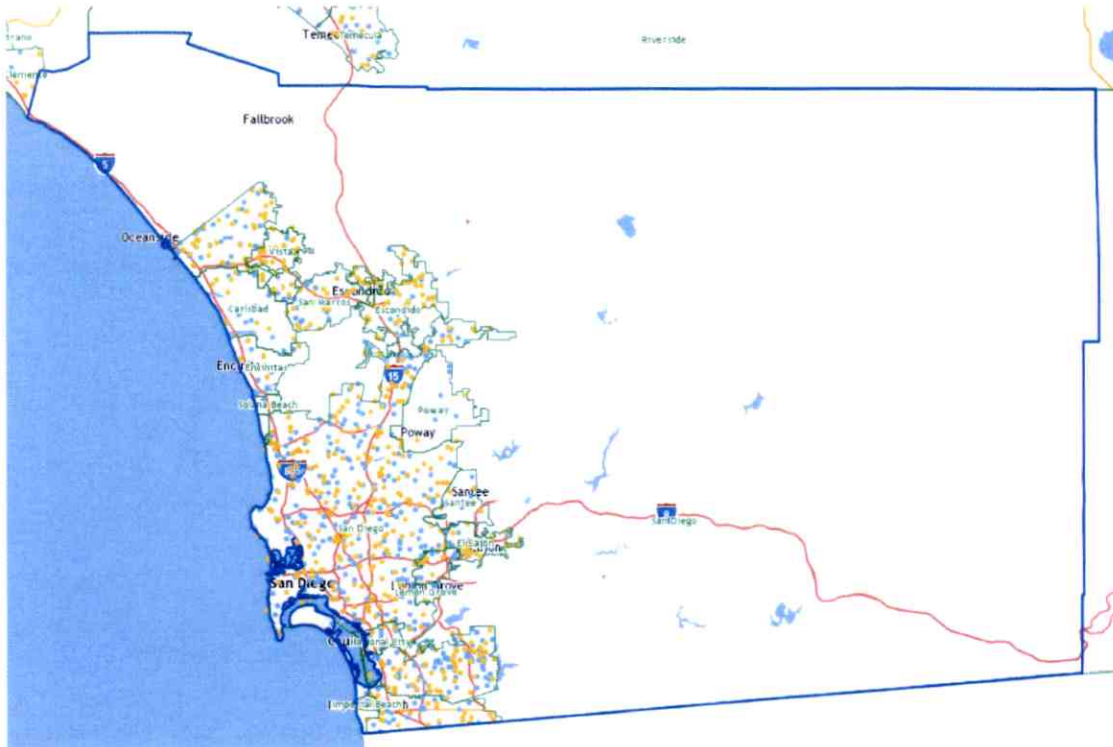

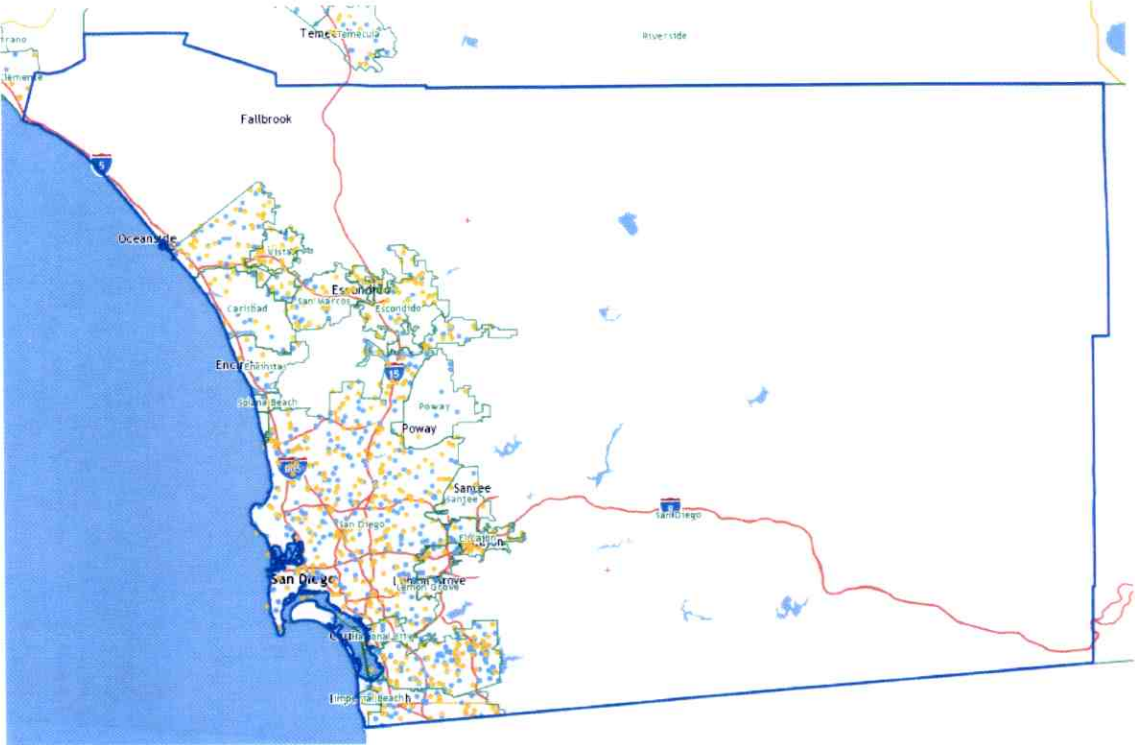
