





Thank you very much, Commissioners, for providing the opportunity for public comment.

My name is Hermelinda Sapien, I am the President and CEO of Center for Employment Training – CET. CET headquarters and main campus are located in San Jose, County of Santa Clara. CET has been in operation for 45 years. CET's purpose is to train, prepare and place in jobs low-income, unskilled people from throughout Santa Clara County. In this area, CET annually trains approximately 800 people in 13 different occupations. Occupations selected by CET for programs reflect the job market in the Region. CET graduates are placed in High Tech Companies, Utility Companies, Hospitals, Clinics, Schools, Universities, Apartment and Industrial Buildings and Hotel and Hospitality businesses.

In the 60's and 70's this region became the center of innovation for the world because of the common interest that bonded our community, such as quality education, healthcare, parks and recreation, good jobs, and philanthropy.

Today, we have the same community and although the economy has caused changes in our strategic thinking, we remain a community that cares about all the common interests of our citizens. Like never before in our generation, we have seen our resources dwindle, while our community needs have soared. The more we keep community common interest together, the better we use our resources. Of most concern is the possible dilution of services to the most vulnerable.

This is no time to divide our community; this is a region that is bouncing back and innovating in green and solar technology, which, if combined with high technology, will soon return Silicon Valley, and in particular San Jose, to a world class of innovation and ideas. All this will translate into good paying jobs, where people share the same standard of living, healthcare, recreation, educational opportunities for their children and better ways of communication.

Our kind of industrial setting does not match with San Joaquin Valley, which is highly agricultural. Another important point to make is that our flood plans are very different from other areas. A lot of work in flood control has been done in Santa Clara County and in San Jose that need to be maintained for local quality of water, health, and a strong economy

Our area of services is within Assembly Districts 22, 23, 24, 27 and 28, within State Senate Districts 11 and 13 and within Congressional Districts 15, 16 and a small area of 11 and 14.

I respectfully urge the Commission to consider the points I have made that unite our community, when deciding on redistricting. We especially urge you to keep San Jose as one community in one Congressional District

Good evening. My name is Jacquelyn Maruhashi. I have lived in San Jose for 26 years.

I am a staff attorney with the Asian Law Alliance (ALA) in San Jose, California. ALA is a non-profit community law office with 6 attorneys. In the 34 years of our existence, ALA has helped tens of thousands of people in obtaining decent housing, justice in the immigration process, and access to basic human and legal rights.

Asian Law Alliance has been a member of the Coalition of Asian Pacific Americans for Fair Redistricting (CAPAFR) since it was created back in May 1990. I was involved on redistricting issues back in 1991 and 2001 both at the State Assembly level and locally in Santa Clara County.

CAPAFR's goal is to bring people together to learn about redistricting and assist individual members of the public who received education from CAPAFR to testify about their communities of interest.

There are over 628,000 AAPIs (Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders) in Santa Clara County, representing the second-largest AAPI population in the state, by county. AAPIs continue to grow rapidly. In 2000, AAPIs made up 28% of the county's population, and now they make up over 34%, based on Census 2010 figures. The attached map shows areas of AAPI population density in Santa Clara County.

While AAPIs live throughout Santa Clara County, there are concentrations in various parts of the county. Evergreen and the Tully Road/Senter Road area of San Jose are home to a sizable AAPI population, including a large number of Vietnamese Americans and to a lesser extent Filipino Americans. Berryessa and Milpitas have high numbers of AAPI residents. Many AAPI residents also live in cities in west Santa Clara County, such as Santa Clara, Cupertino, Sunnyvale and Mountain View.

The communities in which AAPIs live have shared needs and interests around housing, economy and jobs, and education. For example, the attached map shows income levels within Santa Clara County and illustrate the need that low-income residents in the east side of the county have for effective representation on issues of social services and jobs & economy. AAPIs have common policy concerns around these needs and interests that would be best-served if the areas in which they live are kept intact within districts.

We have been working to ensure that the Asian Pacific American voice is heard in this redistricting process. As you are aware, in the 2001 redistricting process, Berryessa, a San Jose neighborhood with a majority AAPI population, was divided into 4 Assembly Districts. This in effect, prevented the residents of Berryessa from having any say at the state level for the past ten years. Please keep our communities intact. Thank you.

Good evening. My name is Alain Dang. I will address both Little Saigon in San Jose and core cities within Santa Clara County that have shared interests.

I grew up in Cupertino but know the Little Saigon area of San Jose very well. During my childhood, my family went to Little Saigon to eat and shop a few times a week, and we continue to do that today. We have our favorite spots in Little Saigon – Century Mall, places on Tully Road, and the new shopping center at the intersection of King Road/Silver Creek Road and Capitol Expressway.

The first concentration of Vietnamese businesses located in downtown San Jose because it was cheap and accessible. The downtown area was redeveloped and as a result, the mom-and-pop operations got priced out and moved southeast to the Tully and Senter road area that became the Little Saigon area in the 1980s. That's where my family always went for Vietnamese food and groceries. In the 1990s and 2000s, the Little Saigon area expanded northeast to the Story Road area, and that area became another focal point of development, mostly because of large tracts of developable property.


The Little Saigon area in the Tully Road/Senter Road area and Story Road area has always been an important entry point for Vietnamese immigrants – they start businesses and live in Little Saigon, and then "move up" to the newer and larger homes in the Evergreen neighborhood, which is southeast of the Tully Road/Senter Road area. For these reasons, the Evergreen neighborhood has much in common with Little Saigon. I've attached a map that shows the boundaries of Little Saigon, bounded by Story Road to the north, King Road to the east, Capitol Expressway to the south, and Senter Road to the west. The map also shows Vietnamese American population density of Evergreen, Little Saigon and surrounding areas.

In addition, the common denominator of the cities on the westside (Cupertino, Mountain View, Sunnyvale, and Santa Clara) are the public schools. The Cupertino Union School District and Fremont Union High School District cover Cupertino, northern Saratoga, west San Jose, Sunnyvale and the far western reaches of Santa Clara. Even back in the 1980s, Cupertino had a significant Asian population, though it exploded in the last two decades to become the Taiwanese American capital of northern California. In recent years, more South Asians and Koreans have moved in, but it is still overwhelmingly Taiwanese. West San Jose and Saratoga are extensions of this, with high tech professionals populating this area because of the high achieving schools. This extends northward through Sunnyvale and into Santa Clara as well. Most of the Chinese (Taiwanese mostly) businesses and services have clustered in and around Cupertino, while El Camino in Sunnyvale is the Indian business district, before it turns Korean once you cross into Santa Clara.

My name is Rudy Nasol; I am a US citizen of Filipino descent and lived in Berryessa with my family for almost 40 years. I served as a Trustee in the Berryessa Union School District for nine years. I have been an active member of the Berryessa Citizens Advisory Council for many years.

In 2001, I have testified before members of the State Assembly Legislative Committee on redistricting where I pleaded to keep the Berryessa area in one Assembly District to protect our community interest where a majority of the residents are Asian/Pacific Islander. To our community's disappointment, the process was totally gerrymandered to protect the political interest of the incumbent politicians. Berryessa was divided into 4 Assembly Districts. That process totally disenfranchised our community; we cannot and should not allow such thing to happen again.

I am again pleading our case to keep Berryessa in one Assembly District. Berryessa share the same community of interest with municipalities north of our border such as the City of Milpitas and the City of Fremont. Berryessa, Milpitas and Fremont have very significant Asian/ Pacific Islander population.


The Berryessa, Milpitas and Fremont population make us a community of interest. We appeal to you to keep us in one Assembly District. Thank you.



Dear Honorable Commissioners:

Members of the California Citizens Redistricting Commission, my name is Ty Greaves and I would like to welcome you to my city, San Jose. I live about 4 miles North of here in an area call Berryessa which honors one of California's oldest families.

My priorities are ensuring that 1) ethnic minority communities are given a maximum level of participation, and 2) that communities of interest are respected

Ethnic Minorities - There is a concentration of Asian voters (>50% of the population) in a region extending from Fremont, though Milpitas, and ending in Northern district of San Jose (Districts #4). This is a special enclave given that the California average is 13% Asian. But their voting power is diluted by current boundaries where this region is served by:

- 4 US Congressional Districts (11, 13, 15 and 16)
- 2 California State Senate Districts (10 and 13)
- 4 California Assembly Districts (20, 22, 23, and 24)

Communities of Interest - This area has natural common interests in

- Commitment to Education – The average 2010 API in California is 768. But the School performance in Fremont to North San Jose corridor is impressive:
 - Fremont Unified - API 867
 - Milpitas Unified - API 831
 - Berryessa Union School District - API 823
 - Piedmont High School - API 808
- Ecosystem management of the San Francisco Bay shore wetlands along the western boarder and the open spaces along the golden hills to the east
- Traffic corridor management of the Bay Area Rapid Transit extension south from Fremont through Milpitas, the planned extension into San Jose District #4, and the major commute routes of I-880 and I-680

These facts argue strongly that the Commission would fulfill its charter by revising the district boundaries for the US House, California State Senate, and the California Assembly so that these natural affinities are respected.

Good evening. My name is Matthew Mo. I have lived in the Evergreen neighborhood for 27 years. Also, I spent ten years in the real estate business in Evergreen.

Many years ago, the Evergreen neighborhood used to be mostly agricultural with orchards and cattle ranches. The last agricultural area in Evergreen, Mirazo Winery, is now a residential project with 100 units.

The Evergreen neighborhood has been very urban for a long time. Despite this, during the 2001 redistricting Evergreen was placed with rural areas to the east in Assembly District 28. I ask the Commission to keep Evergreen with San Jose rather than rural areas to the east of Evergreen.

The people living in the downtown area of San Jose and the Evergreen neighborhood are very similar. They share middle income levels with many employed in the high-tech companies in the downtown area. In fact, many work in downtown San Jose and live in Evergreen. In addition, people in Evergreen go west to the Evergreen business district for shopping, dining and entertainment. These stores include Eastridge Shopping Center, Lion Asian Market, Marina Asian Market, and many more retail and ethnic business outlets. They do not go east or south for their daily needs.

We share the same transportation concerns with the people who live in downtown San Jose and in the area north and west of them. We use the same thoroughfares to get to work such as Capital Expressway and Highway 87 for our commute.

Also, both San Jose City College and Evergreen College are a part of the San Jose-Evergreen Community College District, but are in different Assembly Districts. San Jose City College is in Assembly District 24 while the Evergreen Community College is in District 28. Both colleges list courses in the same catalog. Students or residents in either district can take courses at either college, depending upon their schedules.

By placing the Evergreen Community College with its counterpart college district in San Jose in the same district, the shared interest of students and residents at both campuses will be unified because these people attend the same college district.

As an Evergreen resident, I ask that this Commission consolidate our community and keep the Evergreen neighborhood with downtown San Jose. I suggest that you use the boundaries of the Evergreen Elementary School District, as these are commonly used boundaries for the Evergreen neighborhood.

Good evening. My name is Wesley Mukoyama. I have lived in the City of Santa Clara for 37 years. I am the former Executive Director of Yu-Ai Kai Community Center, a Japanese American nonprofit organization in San Jose.

I request that the Commission keep together the cities of Santa Clara, Cupertino, Sunnyvale and Mountain View as a community of interest. All of these cities have tech companies including Intel, Yahoo, Google, and Apple among others. As a result, these areas have many middle to high income wage earners who work in the high tech field. Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders (AAPIs) make up a significant portion of this community of interest, and like other members of this community, have shared needs and interests. One of these shared interests is having good school districts. In addition, Mountain View, Sunnyvale and Santa Clara share the Highway 101 corridor so they have similar transportation issues.

Another is ethnic shopping areas. Santa Clara, Sunnyvale and Mountain View have common thoroughfares such as El Camino Real. A number of the Asian ethnic shopping areas are located along El Camino Real in Sunnyvale and Santa Clara. Many of us shop along El Camino Real as well as in Cupertino at the Asian Plaza off Wolfe Road.

Please keep the cities of Santa Clara, Cupertino, Sunnyvale and Mountain View together as a community of interest.

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Dear Commissioners,

My name is Alla Kapralova. I have lived in Santa Clara County for almost 20 years; 16 years out of these in Cambrian Park, City of San Jose.

Per my name and my accent you have, probably, guessed that I came to this country from the former Soviet Union. As many immigrants from this country, I am a computer programmer. Currently my little house in Cambrian Park serves me not only as a residence, but also as a business because I perform all my work by telecommuting. Literally, I spend 24 hours at home or in the neighborhood.

I came here today because I am concerned about my 15th Congressional, 11th Senate and 24th Assembly Districts. Looking at the shape of each of these areas, it is hard to believe that these phantasmagorical images are just maps of voter districts.

I do practically all my business and errands in Los Gatos and Saratoga. Whether it is a business lunch or a dinner or picnic with my friends, I find an appropriate café or restaurant or park in these two towns. I do shopping in not so huge but comprehensive Saratoga mall. My daily gym, as well as my closest DMV and AAA office are in Los Gatos. I practically never have a reason to go to the southern or northern parts, or even downtown of San Jose. My closest neighbors follow similar patterns. Our ties with businesses and friends in surrounding towns of Los Gatos, Saratoga and Campbell are strong and have been lasted for years.

However, all of the current districts include remote areas as far as Milpitas or Gilroy but miss either Saratoga or Los Gatos or both.

Current lines do not look as fair lines to me. It would be a mistake to separate us again.

I ask that when drawing districts you be sure to include Saratoga, Los Gatos, Cambrian Park and Campbell together in one district.

I do not think that race, ethnicity, religion, language can be considered as criteria for dividing or merging. But common interests and activities, as well as favorite shopping locations should be.

Public Input Hearing: May 23, 2011 in San Jose, CA

My name is James Nguyen and I have been a resident of Sunnyvale since 2006. I teach at De Anza College in Cupertino and am the Assistant Director for the Asian Pacific American Leadership Institute. I lived in Santa Clara when I was attending graduate school, so I believe that I know and understand the areas of Sunnyvale, Cupertino, Santa Clara and Mountain View well.

I request that the Commission keep together the cities of Santa Clara, Cupertino, Sunnyvale and Mountain View as a community of interest due to the significant population of AAPIs, socioeconomic factors, shared economy and jobs, education system, and housing.

AAPIs make up a significant portion of this community of interest, and like other members of this community, have shared needs and interests. The AAPI population in this community is diverse and is made of up several ethnic groups, including Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Asian Indian, Vietnamese, and Filipino. The attached map shows AAPI population within the geographical areas of this community of interest. Many Asians are attracted to move into this area due to the high quality education and jobs with the many high-tech companies in the area.

Several of the cities in this community of interest are part of the same school districts. For instance, the Fremont Union High School District has five high schools, all of which are contained within Sunnyvale, Cupertino, and West San Jose. The Cupertino Union School District has elementary schools that are located in West San Jose, Cupertino, Sunnyvale, and Santa Clara. The connection between cities and shared school districts underscores the shared interests that residents in these cities have with regard to K-12 education. The attached map shows similar levels of academic performance in the cities of Sunnyvale, Cupertino, Santa Clara and Mountain View. Also, De Anza College and Mission College, two community colleges in this community of interest, attract students and employees from all across the geographical area represented by this community of interest.

There are many technology companies in Santa Clara, Sunnyvale, Cupertino, and Mountain View; these companies and their relationships with employees constitute additional ties that bind together this community of interest. Workers commute to these companies from Santa Clara, Sunnyvale, Cupertino, Mountain View and surrounding areas. A sampling of technology companies demonstrates the connection of these cities: Yahoo! (Sunnyvale), Intel (Santa Clara), Google (Mountain View), Microsoft (Mountain View), and Apple (Cupertino).

Another industry prevalent in the area is the defense industry. Moffett Field Air Base is located in Mountain View while Lockheed Martin is in Sunnyvale, adjacent to one another.


Shared borders, roadways and geographic features also provide similarities among these cities. The 101 freeway runs through parts of Mountain View, Sunnyvale and Santa Clara, while the 280 freeway connects Mountain View, Cupertino, Sunnyvale, and Santa Clara. El Camino Real runs through and connects Santa Clara, Sunnyvale, and Mountain View.

Finally, these cities share the same public transportation systems. This includes Caltrain and the Valley Transportation Authority (VTA) light rail and bus system, where residents travel from their home in any one of these cities and travel to neighboring cities for work, shopping, and recreation.

Thank you for considering my testimony. I think you'll agree that the cities of Sunnyvale, Cupertino, Santa Clara and Mountain View constitute a community of interest that should be kept together within the same district.

Testimony to Citizens Redistricting Commission, May 23, 2011

AACI is the largest nonprofit health and human service organization in Santa Clara County focused on serving the Asian American community, with a staff of over 170, and over 9,000 clients served annually.

In this county, it's important to view the Asian American community as a "community of interest" and to take this population into account during the redistricting process.

Asian Americans represent over 30% of the county's population and live in cities throughout Santa Clara County.

We serve the health and human service needs of Asian Americans throughout the county through providing primary medical care, mental health services, substance abuse treatment, problem gambling services, shelter for domestic violence victims, youth services, senior services, HIV/AIDS education and prevention and health promotion, among others.

There are many health and social services needs of the Asian American community with such a large population of immigrants and refugees from Asian countries living in this area:

- Two-thirds of Asian Americans are foreign born.
- Nearly half of Asian Americans have limited ability to read or write English.
- We serve many community members who are low income and struggling to meet their daily needs.

As you move forward with redistricting, please remember that it's critical that the Asian American community is viewed as a community of interest that should not be broken apart during this process.

This plan was formulated to provide a starting point for the redistricting of California legislative districts based on the 2010 Census. The plan draws 80 assembly districts that meet the standards of neither breaking up any incorporated city nor any county whose adjusted numbers are below the prime district target of 465,674.

Another objective was to have the deviation of districts be below 0.01%. Neither "High Tide" lines nor major bridges such as the Golden Gate Bridge or Bay Bridge were used to connect otherwise noncontiguous areas.

The largest new district is 465,697 (23 over the target of 465,674), and the smallest district is 465,651 (23 under the target). This creates a total difference of 46 votes from high to low districts for a total deviation of 0.0098797.

Nearly all "Census Places" were kept intact including all incorporated cities other than:

- Los Angeles (3,792,621 population)
- San Diego (1,307,402)
- San Jose (945,942)
- San Francisco (805,235)
- Fresno (494,665)
- Sacramento (466,488)
- Long Beach (462,257)*
- Oakland (390,724)*

* Note that Long Beach and Oakland enclosed incorporated and unincorporated Census Places that push the total population over 465,674.

Note: San Mateo and Sonoma Counties would have to remain divided due to fitting with neighboring counties. One or more of the other counties may be able to be completely in a senate district when not being required to have two full assembly districts within its boundaries.

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Note for overlay of Board of Equalization Districts.

The four Districts of the Board of Equalization can be drawn to not cross any incorporated city and only cross the lines of Los Angeles County.

District 1 would start at Del Norte County, travel through Sacramento County and pick up the remaining population from Los Angeles County via Kern County.

District 2 would start in the San Francisco Bay area, head South along the coast and pick up the remaining population from Los Angeles via Santa Barbara County.

District 3 would contain all of the City of Los Angeles and the City of Long Beach to be combined with Orange County.

District 4 would start in San Diego County and head North along the mountains but stopping to pick up their balance from Los Angeles County via San Bernardino County.

This "Starting Assembly Plan" would have to be adjusted to make this version of the Board of Equalization Districts work. Assembly districts such as the 41st would have to be redrawn to stay entirely in Los Angeles County.



Redistricting issues affecting the Almaden Valley (zip code 95120) in south San Jose

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Dear members of the California Citizens Redistricting Commission:

As a member of the Board of Directors of the Almaden Valley Community Association (AVCA – the umbrella community association for zip code 95120), Chair of the AVCA Transportation Committee, a member of the Santa Clara County Roads Commission representing County District 1 (mostly south San Jose and southern Santa Clara County), and a member of the Santa Clara County Valley Transportation Authority (VTA) Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC), I have a strong interest in civic issues in Santa Clara County, especially ones that affect the Almaden Valley. I am very concerned about redistricting as it will affect the Almaden Valley, given flagrant abuses that occurred in previous decades.

The Almaden Valley Community

The Almaden Valley has a unique community identity geographically and historically. The community of New Almaden, located in Santa Clara County at the southern end of Almaden Valley, is the site of the most productive quicksilver (mercury) mine in the U. S., dating from the early and mid-1800s. Almaden Valley, which derived its name from the New Almaden Quicksilver Mines, is a neighborhood of about 40,000 people, effectively equivalent to zip code 95120, which was established for the Almaden Valley.

Geographically, as the name implies, the Almaden Valley is a valley south of Coleman Road in south San Jose, bounded by the Sana Teresa Hills on the east and the Santa Cruz Mountains on the west. Most Almaden Valley residents live in the city limits of San Jose, but the southern end of Almaden Valley is in Santa Clara County, outside San Jose city limits, but within the San Jose sphere of influence. Almaden Valley has its own community center, library, post office, shopping centers, and zip code (95120). Many residents are employed in the computer industry within San Jose and elsewhere in Santa Clara County.

Redistricting Goals for Almaden Valley

Two basic redistricting goals should be considered for Almaden Valley:

1. As an identifiable, unique area geographically and historically, Almaden Valley should be in only **one** Congressional or legislative district at each level and **not split** amongst districts at any level.
2. By interests, occupation, and outlook, Almaden Valley should be located in districts with other residential suburban parts of San Jose and Santa Clara Country. The concerns and interests of Almaden Valley residents are similar to those of other people in San Jose and other Santa Clara County cities. Almaden Valley residents do not share interests with people in agricultural, coastal, or rural communities in the Central Valley or along the central and southern California coast.

Current and Past Redistricting Abuses

Please do not repeat redistricting abuses that Almaden Valley suffered in the past and currently (2000):


1. Please put **all** Almaden Valley in **one** district at the Congressional and California State legislative levels. Almaden Valley is now split in a jagged jigsaw between Congressional Districts 15 and 16, which makes no sense. Just as Los Gatos is within just one of these Congressional Districts, put Almaden Valley entirely within **one** district at the Congressional and each legislative level.
2. Please put Almaden Valley in districts with other residential areas of San Jose and/or Santa Clara County. Almaden Valley is now in a State Assembly district with other residential areas of Santa Clara and San Mateo counties, but in the past, it has been in an Assembly district with Central Valley agricultural communities such as Los Banos. Almaden Valley, as a residential area of San Jose with people employed in high tech, shares much more in common with areas like Los Gatos or the Blossom Valley of San Jose than it does with Central Valley towns, such as Los Banos.

However, in one of the most egregious current examples of gerrymandering, Almaden Valley is in a California State Senate district (15) that extends 200 miles along the central and southern California coast to Santa Barbara County and Santa Maria. Almaden Valley residents have nothing in common with these folks along the coast so far south. Almaden Valley is not a coastal community and does not have coastal interests. It is a 30-mile, 45-minute drive from Almaden Valley to get to the coast. Almaden Valley residents have **no** shared interests with agricultural, rural communities like Santa Maria and other small agricultural and coastal communities in coastal counties. Almaden Valley belongs in a district with Santa Clara or the Santa Teresa neighborhood of San Jose, **not** with agricultural towns like Santa Maria over 200 miles away.

Summary

1. Please do **not split** Almaden Valley into more than one Congressional or legislative district at each level.
2. Please do not gerrymander Almaden Valley into districts that are over 200 miles long or into districts with agricultural and rural communities of the Central Valley or the southern California coast, with which Almaden Valley residents do **not** share common interests.

My name is Bea Mendez, I am chair of the Silicon Valley Latino Democratic Forum. Thank you for the opportunity to address you this evening.

Our forum has been actively involved in monitoring the work of the redistricting committees involved in the redrawing of the San Jose city and Santa Clara County district lines to address population changes as identified by the 2010 census.

We have urged those committees to maximize opportunities for underrepresented communities to gain influence and representation and urged them not to weaken communities of interest that already exist in the ten city districts and five supervisory districts.

There are three districts in the City of San Jose, as an example, where the Latino population is sufficiently large enough to ensure the opportunity for Latino representation and we are urging the local committee to not weaken these communities of interest by diluting or over compacting.

The members of the Silicon Valley Latino Democratic Forum would like to urge you to insure that in the redrawing of the congressional, assembly and senate districts that you seriously consider these recommendations:

- The work of the commission should be conducted in an open, transparent and inclusive manner so that all communities have an opportunity to express their views and opinions and can influence the process.

- The 23rd Assembly district is currently reasonably compact and should be maintained as is, or with only minor adjustments.

- The 28th Assembly district is also reasonably compact and should be maintained as is, or with only minor adjustments.

- The 23rd and 28th Assembly districts should be nested together to form a Senate district that combines communities of interest in Santa Clara, Monterey and San Benito counties. The largest portion of the population of the Senate district should rest in Santa Clara county.

- There are common similarities in these two districts that form an effective community of interest. The income and poverty levels are similar. The socio-economic levels are similar, and there is a transportation corridor that runs through the center of each of these two districts.

- The nesting of these two assembly districts would also form a

sizable, cohesive Latino population in the Senate district, which would allow for effective representation of the growing Latino population which will soon reach forty percent in the state and region.

- We would like to caution the Commission to not dilute Latino/minority voting blocks or to draw district boundaries solely on race.

Finally, I would also urge the Commission to remember that California is now a state composed of a majority of minorities and the Commission should insure that minorities have equal opportunities to compete for these important and influential positions.




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


Strong Neighborhoods Initiative Areas

My name is P. Gregory Conlon and I reside in Atherton, California located in San Mateo County just north of Palo Alto in Santa Clara County and Menlo Park in San Mateo County.

My comments are based primarily on my experience as a Republican candidate for both the 21st Assembly District located in both San Mateo and Santa Clara County in 2010 and in the 10th Congressional District in 2008. My comments tries to point out what the Commission should not do in determining the Community of Interest in both San Mateo and Santa Clara County.

ASSEMBLY DISTRICT 21 COMMENTS-

This District runs in the north from San Carlos, Redwood City, Menlo Atherton, Woodside and Portola in San Mateo County and Palo Alto, Los Altos, Los Altos Hills in the northern portion of San Clara County and Los Gatos and the Almaden Valley in the City of San Jose in the southern portion and Santa Clara County. The two cities of Sunnyvale and Saratoga are excluded from this District even though the adjacent communities of Los Gatos and Almaden Valley are contiguous and form a common bound of communities in southern Santa Clara County.

I believe the 21st Assembly District should be split up in two or three different Districts. The northern part of the District with San Carlos, Redwood City and Menlo Atherton should be in one District. Also I believe that Los Gatos, Almaden Valley and Sunnyvale and Saratoga should be in another District. Now they are in four different Districts for the various elections of the Assembly, the

Senate and the Congressional Districts. There is virtually no community of interest between the northern cities and the southern cities named above.

Because this District is split almost in half between San Mateo County cities and Santa Clara County Districts. I encourage you to split the District at the County line or if you violate that rule have only Palo Alto in the same District as Menlo Atherton because they have common interest of Stanford University and Stanford Shopping Center as the common hubs for these towns and cities.

12th and 14th Congressional Districts Comments:

I ran for the Congressional seat of the 12th District in 2008. It is clear that the City of Belmont was excluded from the Cities of San Mateo on the north and the City of Carlos on the south of Belmont. There is in my view no way to have the District circle around Belmont for any common community of interest. San Mateo and San Carlos are intertwined and almost the same cities when driving up El Camino or Highway 101. Any new Congressional or Assembly District should have all three cities in the same District for the Congress, the Assembly and the State Senate.

Also I suggest that if possible to maintain a community of interest in San Francisco that the 12th Congressional District start at the County of San Mateo line and go south. This would remove the Sunset District in San Francisco and area east of the Sunset all the way to the San Mateo County line. In my view the San Mateo cities of Daly City, Brisbane, Colma and South San Francisco do not relate to the City of San Francisco community of interest economically or otherwise.


