Re: Region Los Angeles County: San Fernando Valley (part of L. A. City) “The Valley”/**West Valley/ Woodland Hills**

Thank you for serving your State on this important, ground breaking commission. I would like to comment about the area of The Valley we live in. I live in the community of Woodland Hills. Our bordering neighbors live in Calabasas, West Hills, Hidden Hills, Canoga Park, and Tarzana.

However, we are an important part of a broader area we call WEST VALLEY. The West Valley is all the small and medium sized towns that are west of the 405 Freeway (or Sepuveda Blvd.), between Mulholland Hwy on the south, and the Santa Susanna mountains on the north, L. A. county line on the far west, the Verdugo and San Gabriel Mountains on the east. The towns are best shown on Neighborhood Council maps, but they go from North Hills to Chatsworth, from Encino to Calabasas. We are surrounded by mountains!

The less said the better about the 2000-2001 redistricting done by the legislators. I have reviewed the maps, and note these horrors:

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The 38<sup>th</sup> AD was spread over 45 miles – including 8 communities in the Valley (Northridge is one, again), 3 in San Gabriel Valley, 7 in Santa Clarita Valley and 5 in various other valleys.

40<sup>th</sup> AD splits up Woodland Hills again, Van Nuys again and Northridge again .

41<sup>st</sup> is also terrible: Another piece of Woodland Hills, then grabbing towns all the way from the heart of L. A., parts of the Valley, to Westlake Village in Ventura County. (40 miles)

Please keep the West San Fernando Valley intact. Our weather, our utilities, our traffic congestion,, our job markets, our shopping, our population, so many things unite us and for which we need proper representation

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I would like to add that Calabasas is an historic part of the West Valley. This city, too, should remain with their neighboring communities such as Hidden Hills, Woodland Hills, and Tarzana and never be joined with Malibu or any other coastal region. They are Valley, Malibu is coast.

The 37<sup>th</sup> Assembly District includes portions of four of our northern communities (West Hills, Canoga Park, Chatsworth and Northridge) but then goes on to include Santa Clarita (in the Santa Clarita Valley) all the way up to Palmdale in Antelope Valley, over 60 miles from end to the other! Three separate inland valleys! (the Valley is only 23 miles wide).

The 38<sup>th</sup> AD was spread over 45 miles – including 8 communities in the Valley (Northridge is one, again), 3 in San Gabriel Valley, 7 in Santa Clarita Valley and 5 in various other valleys.

40<sup>th</sup> AD splits up Woodland Hills again, Van Nuys again and Northridge again .

41<sup>st</sup> is also terrible: Another piece of Woodland Hills, then grabbing towns all the way from the heart of L. A., parts of the Valley, to Westlake Village in Ventura County. (40 miles)

Please keep the West San Fernando Valley intact. Our weather, our utilities, our traffic congestion,, our job markets, our shopping, our population, so many things unite us and for which we need proper representation
