As a resident of Sonoma COunty, I respectfully request that in regards to Congressional District 6 (currently represented by Lynn Woolsey (D-Petaluma), that you separate Sonoma and Marin counties. We have very little in common with Marin County. (There are a few things, but not enough to keep Sonoma and Marin Counties tied together.) Economically, and culturally, we share much more in common with Napa County.
