H.B.U.H.S.D. Boundaries


HBUHSD is located on the central Orange County coast in California, U.S.A.



Statement by Peter L. Kim
City of La Palma, CA
Re: The "Long Beach Port" Congressional District
June 18, 2011 – Fullerton CRC Public Input Hearing

Dear Commissioners:

My name is Peter Kim and I serve as a member of the City of La Palma's Traffic Safety Committee. The City of La Palma is a very small, incorporated city located in the County of Orange with a population of less than 16,000 residents.

The reason I address you today is that the Commission has placed the City of La Palma in the "Long Beach Port" district, which 96% of the Congressional district is located in the County of Los Angeles.

The problem with the current proposal is that the "Long Beach Port" district does not respect the fundamental guidelines of this Commission. It does not respect county boundaries like it should by placing a small city like La Palma located in Orange County with a district that is almost completely made up of cities in Los Angeles County. Furthermore, the communities of interest such as social and economic factors are extremely different from the other cities located in Los Angeles County. La Palma is very similar to its neighboring Northern Orange County cities such as Buena Park, Cypress, and Fullerton. That is why the Commission has placed the City of La Palma with these cities for the proposed Assembly, Senate, and Board of Equalization districts.

In addition, because the city is of small size, if the city were to remain as is in this "Long Beach Port" district, it will be considered insignificant to the individual who will serve as our future representative to Congress. I urge that the Commission place the City of La Palma in a Congressional district where it encompasses Orange County cities. Placing La Palma in the proposed "La Habra-Yorba Linda" or "West Garden Grove" district would achieve this goal and I respectfully ask that you correct this mistake.

To Whom It May Concern:

I was elected to the Ocean View School District Board of Trustees in November 2004. I was re-elected in November 2008 and am up for re-election again in November 2012. The position I hold is non-partisan and is a four (4) year term, with two board members slated in the presidential election and three in the gubernatorial.

Our elementary school District, which is over 100 years strong, covers the cities of Huntington Beach, Fountain Valley and the unincorporated area of Midway City and services students from Kindergarten through the eighth grade. Other school districts that cover the city of Huntington Beach are Huntington Beach City School District (K-8), Westminster School District (K-8), Fountain Valley School District (K-8) and Huntington Beach Union High School District (HBUHSD) (9-12). These five school Districts work closely together with regards to our shared students, parents and taxpayers – our shared communities.

School districts must follow both Federal and State laws and receive funding from Federal, State and local municipalities. The above-mentioned school districts work closely together with regards to providing legally required services to students with disabilities, those with low socio-economic statuses and the like. For example, Ocean View School District (OVSD) is the lead agency for the deaf and hard of hearing program for the K-8 students. Student from the districts of Ocean View, Huntington City, Westminster and Fountain Valley with this disability are serviced by OVSD. We work closely with the other three districts to meet their local criteria and with the HBUHSD to ensure the district criteria is met and the children are ready for the high school program.

With this in mind, I write this letter to express my deep concern that the current draft of Congressional districts split our shared communities. In the current draft the city of Huntington Beach is split from the neighboring cities of

Westminster and Fountain Valley. Should the proposed boundaries become permanent, they will make it very difficult for our local school Districts, whose boundary lines will now cross congressional districts. These new congressional districts will also make it very difficult for those congressional officials that will have to cover differing areas of interest. I *disagree* that Irvine, Aliso Viejo and Laguna Niguel share a common interest with Huntington Beach. The demographics, educational needs and legal requirements for these cities severely differ. Combining these cities will create a problem with regards to how the voters impact our legal requirements and our funding. The taxpayers of these communities will NOT be adequately represented, as they will not be able to create one voice.

As I have stated the cities of Huntington Beach, Fountain Valley and Westminster share educational ties, but more than that they share cultural and commercial bonds. I strongly support changes to the district lines that will unify the school district boundaries and thus keep Huntington Beach, Fountain Valley and Westminster intact. Please consider this as you deliberate on the placing of congressional districts.

For your reference, I've included a map of OVSD and the HBUHSD. I apologize for not being there in person to answer any questions the panel may have, but I will be out of state at the time of the hearing. I am submitting this letter in hopes that it will have the same force and effect of being there personally. Should you have any questions, I will be returning on July 1, 2011 and happy to help in any way that I can. Feel free to contact me at the above listed addresses or phone numbers.

I thank you, in advance, for your consideration of these points as you make your final decisions.

As the Acting Superintendent of Ocean View School District, I whole-heartedly concur and support Mrs. Cotton's letter that accompanies mine for your consideration. Allow me to restate and reiterate many of the important factors regarding this issue should the proposed redistricting occur:

- The city of Huntington Beach is split from the neighboring cities of Westminster and Fountain Valley. Should the proposed boundaries become permanent, they will make it very difficult for our local school Districts to work closely together to meet state and local educational criteria.
- These new congressional districts will make it very difficult for those congressional officials that will have to cover differing areas of interest.
- The cities of Irvine, Aliso Viejo, and Laguna Niguel have very different demographics, educational needs, and legal requirements than those of Huntington Beach. Combining these cities will create a problem with regards to how the voters impact our legal requirements and our funding.

Over the years, Ocean View School District has developed important educational and cultural ties. As Mrs. Cotton mentioned, this 'community' has enjoyed a valuable relationship, working toward similar goals and requirements.

I strongly urge you to consider district lines that will unify the school districts, keeping Huntington Beach, Fountain Valley, and Westminster together, as you deliberate on placement of congressional districts.

Honorable Chairman:

At its June 13, 2011 meeting, the Dana Point City Council ("DPCC") voted unanimously to object to certain state Senate and Assembly district boundaries proposed in the Commission's first draft of the district maps ("First Draft"). As part of that action the DPCC also unanimously approved the attached Resolution, which opposes any state Assembly or Senate redistricting plan that would (a) divide the City geographically and/ or (b) place the City outside of any state Senate or Assembly districts that do not include our neighboring south Orange County cities.

The DPCC strongly feels that our entire city should be grouped with other south Orange County cities for state Senate and Assembly purposes because of the common issues these cities face as well as the strong working relationships and cooperative arrangements they have developed over many, many years. Shared issues include, but are by no means limited to, ocean water quality, regional transportation at both the local (Orange County Transportation Authority) and state (Caltrans) levels, regional land use planning and affordable housing.

On behalf of the DPCC, I would strongly and respectfully request the Commission to reconsider the state Senate and Assembly district boundaries proposed in the First Draft in view of the City's comments set forth above. 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RESOLUTION NO. 11-06-13-02

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DANA POINT, CALIFORNIA, OPPOSING ANY PROPOSED REDISTRICTING PLAN THAT SPLITS THE CITY AND/OR PLACES THE CITY OUTSIDE OF THE DISTRICT INCLUDING OTHER SOUTH ORANGE COUNTY CITIES

The City Council of the City of Dana Point does hereby resolve as follows:

WHEREAS, on June 10, 2011 the California Citizens Redistricting Commission released maps showing a proposed new redistricting for State Assembly and Senate Seat purposes; and

WHEREAS, the proposal divides the City of Dana Point creating two districts within its geographical boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the City Council is opposed to any redistricting which divides the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council believes the City should be included, in its entirety, in the same districts for Assembly and Senate Seat purposes as the rest of what is traditionally considered to be South Orange County based upon the similarity of issues, and historical working relationships the City has with such other South Orange County cities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Dana Point as follows:

SECTION 1. The Council hereby formally opposes the redistricting proposal released on June 10, 2011 and any other proposal by which the City is split into multiple districts.

SECTION 2. The City Council hereby formally opposes the redistricting proposal released on June 10, 2011, and any other proposal by which all, or any part of the City is not included the same Assembly and Senate districts as most, if not all, of the cities traditionally considered to comprise "South Orange County" are located.





**Testimony by Robert Armenta, Jr.
Vice-President of Public Affairs
Planned Parenthood of Orange and San Bernardino Counties**

My name is Robert Armenta, Jr. and I am the Vice President of Public Affairs for Planned Parenthood of Orange and San Bernardino Counties. I am here on behalf of the more than 100,000 patients, WIC clients, and health education students we serve every year with life-saving breast and cervical cancer screenings, well woman exams, nutritional services, accurate information and more. We know how important family planning care and safety net healthcare providers are to the community, especially those in Santa Ana and Anaheim.

As you know, Communities of Interest with significant similarities must be drawn into districts together whenever possible. The Santa Ana and Anaheim flatlands populations have many similarities worth considering. Both regions have especially high teen birth rates. The current 69th Assembly District, which covers Anaheim and Santa Ana, has the highest teen birth rate in Orange County and 7th highest in the state. The overlapping 34th Senate District also the highest teen birth rate in Orange County and 4th highest in the state. (*"No Time for Complacency," Public Health Institute May 2008 Update.*) Additionally, Regions of Santa Ana and Anaheim make up 4 of the top 5 areas with the highest teen birth rates in Orange County, with central Santa Ana at 88.2 births per 1,000 females aged 15-19 years and central Anaheim with 64.7 births per 1,000.

In addition to higher than average teen birth rates, this population also faces increased financial challenges. In April of 2011, Santa Ana and Anaheim had some of the highest unemployment rates in Orange County, with Anaheim at 11.0% unemployment and Santa Ana with 13.6% unemployment (*Monthly Labor Force Data for Cities and Census Designated Places (CDP), April 2011*) When community members lose their job, and often their health insurance as well, they turn to safety net providers like Planned Parenthood for their health care. Protection of the safety net is a shared interest and need of this population.

Based on the needs of the population Planned Parenthood serves, I respectfully urge the Commission to keep our neighborhoods with similarities TOGETHER when drawing Assembly, State Senate, and Congressional districts. Please keep Santa Ana AND the flatlands of Anaheim (west of the 57 fwy, south of the 91 fwy) TOGETHER. If other areas are needed to reach the required population counts, please add-in other adjacent, SIMILAR areas including:

- South Fullerton (south of Chapman Avenue and including Fullerton College)
- East Garden Grove (east of Euclid Ave. if not Brookhurst)
- Southwest Orange (west of the 55 fwy and including Chapman University)

The first draft Commission maps for the Assembly, Senate, and Congressional districts do not pair Santa Ana and the flatlands of Anaheim. When revising these maps, I urge you to consider the needs, and health, of these communities. Thank you for your time and consideration.

Redistricting Bulletpoints-Diamond Bar

- The new Congressional District boundaries contained in the Redistricting Commission's first draft maps are opposed by the City of Diamond Bar.
- The new boundaries tie the most northwestern point of the San Gabriel Valley, Pasadena, to the most southeastern, Diamond Bar.
- It goes without saying that the social, economic, and transportation issues of these vastly different corners of the diverse San Gabriel Valley differ greatly, and sharing a single representative will put these cities at odds constantly.
- For example, major investments in transportation are needed on the western side of the SGV to build the Gold Line, while those on the 57/60 corridor in the southeastern SGV need millions in federal dollars to complete necessary freeway improvements. In reality, we do not believe two projects of this magnitude can receive the proper amount of attention with one representative torn between the significantly different interests at opposite ends of the proposed district.
- Diamond Bar's current Congressional district boundary is drawn to include cities with similar characteristics – primarily residential bedroom communities with less than 100,000 residents.
- These communities are also of much lower densities with some of the last significant open space areas and wildlife corridors in all of Southern California. These factors alone separate Diamond Bar from the vast majority of the cities in the proposed district that lie to the west of the 605 Freeway. Clearly, under the Commission's concept of "Communities of Interest", Diamond Bar has closer ties to cities like Chino Hills, Brea, La Habra, Yorba Linda and Fullerton than Pasadena, Alhambra, and Monterey Park when considering the social, economic, and environmental characteristics of the community.
- Simply put, the communities on the southeastern end of the San Gabriel Valley face much different, but no less important issues than those in and around larger cities like Pasadena and Glendale and require distinct representation. The lack of proximity between the ends of the district is too problematic.
