Generally, I believe the commission has done a good job throughout the state in selecting legislative districts that are properly formulated. However, as a voter who lives in the Coachella Valley, I believe there are changes that could be made in the proposed district for Coachella Valley that would improve the proposed "common interest" communities.

1. *Include Imperial County with the Coachella Valley in eastern Riverside County.*

Reasons for that are:

- a. The Hispanic population in the Coachella Valley and the Imperial Valley is socio-economically interrelated;
- b. Unemployment is extremely high throughout the Coachella Valley, particularly the Eastern end, and throughout the Imperial Valley.
- c. There is a common economic base, primarily agricultural, in the Eastern portion of the Coachella Valley and in Imperial County;
- d. Newly instituted industry pointing toward renewable energy resources, including geothermal, solar and wind, have targeted the East end of the Coachella Valley, and the adjacent Imperial County.

THANK YOU for listening to our large body of testimony in May (over 100 letters plus 11 speakers) from Coachella Valley that we want to keep our desert cities together in a strong tourism-based COI. Thank you also for listening to the strong May testimony from San Diegans and Imperial Co citizens who share a common "border culture" and want to be districted together. **PLEASE REMEMBER that this is what led you to draw the preliminary maps the way you did: strong testimony from all three counties before June 10!**

On June 20, we had 23 people suddenly testify that they want Imperial to be districted with "East" Coachella Valley, for what reason few could say. I even noticed that June 20's speaker #2 read the exact same words as speaker #1 and could not answer your questions. Others had no reasoning behind this "grab". I am also hearing that current Assemblyman Manny Perez lives in Indio—**could this be an attempt to cross county lines and gerrymander a district favoring an incumbent?** Please check.

PLEASE keep the preliminary maps for Coachella Valley as they are, contiguous, compact and within Riverside Co. Please keep the San Diego-Imperial "border district" as it is. We are all happy with those. **PEOPLE THAT ARE HAPPY DON'T SPEAK OUT**, so please don't take this sudden surge of comment on June 20 as anything but an illogical grab of 2-3 desert cities, across county lines, for illogical or political reasons.
