Hello,

My name is Mario Ortega and I have kept up with the online commission meetings. Residents of North Redlands need your help.

I am a life-long resident of Redlands and an alumni of the University of Redlands. Redlands has long suffered from gerrymandering. I support 4-3-2-1 proposal for San Bernardino County and I agree with the San Bernardino congressional district that goes into Redlands.

However, I ask that the Commission consider taking in most of North Redlands, including the University of Redlands and its surrounding neighborhoods into the San Bernardino Congressional District. At the local level, North Redlands is its own community of interest that best matches the San Bernardino Congressional District.

Redlands is a tale of 2 cities. Neighborhoods north of Interstate 10 tend to be low-income, diverse, neglected, and largely under-represented on the Redlands City Council. Most of the wealth, the mansions, and high property values in Redlands are south of Interstate 10, where most city councilmembers live. It is pointed out frequently in the Redlands Daily Facts Newspaper. I have attached an image of property values to clearly show socioeconomic differences and an article in the newspaper showing North Redlands as a separate community of interest from South Redlands.

Flores said he defines north Redlands as the area north of the 10 Freeway to Pioneer Avenue, between Tennessee and Church streets.

Regardless of where one draws the line, one thing is clear: those who identify themselves as leaders of the north Redlands community said the interests of all residents must be represented on the City Council somehow.

"We as a visioning committee have been trying to be that voice of advocacy for north Redlands," Saucedo said. "We've been able to bring some issues to the council. We feel we can work with anybody because we feel our issues are anybody's issues who live in Redlands. They don't just belong to those in north Redlands."

Among the top issues facing residents in north Redlands are neighborhood improvements, infrastructure, community programs, traffic alleviation and business, Saucedo said.

"We really need to focus on the Orange Street Business Corridor, which is Orange Street between Colton and San Bernardino avenues," Flores said. "We need to gather business in that area and revitalize it so it's conducive to business. We're trying to take the Orange Street businesses south of the freeway and stretch that down to San Bernardino so the same business area exists north of the freeway. We've been striving to do this for some time."

Joe Gonzales, vice chairman of the North Redlands Visioning Committee, said although the council of late has been from south Redlands, much work has been done in recent years to the area in terms of sprucing up its curb appeal.

Mayor Pat Gilbreath, who is running for re-election, said she started a community garden in north Redlands to allow residents to rent plots of land and grow their own produce. She said with the assistance of the Redevelopment Agency, the city has also been able to fund improvement projects in the area, including some to homes,

some to streets and others to sidewalks.

"The council that came in in 1999 really made a commitment that they were going to address the concerns of north Redlands and that really is when the transition (to improve north Redlands) happened," said Councilman Jon Harrison, who is also seeking to retain his seat. "Since that time, there's been tremendous effort to have a connection with individuals that express that north Redlands and the council has responded very favorably to address their needs."

The leaders of north Redlands said they do not know enough about Gardner, Layne or Gardner to comment on whether they represent the people of north Redlands well but said they are planning to have a candidate forum so they and voters can get a better look.

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

I would like to address the current task you have to redraw the district lines. I am hoping that you will understand the special needs our community has and the unique geographical situation we are in.

Individually, our town of Wrightwood is bonded by our location – both the side of town in San Bernardino County as well as the Los Angeles County side. We share common businesses, schools, services, roads, etc. and we would never expect the town itself to be divided. When I look at our community from a more traditional sense though, we include the towns of Phelan, Pinon Hills, and West Cajon Valley. I would even stretch that to include areas of Oak Hills and Baldy Mesa. My children attend school in Phelan and various lessons and activities in Pinon Hills, Wrightwood, and Phelan. We shop in Phelan and even in West Cajon Valley from private growers. The entire tri-community region shares a newspaper as well. We all use the same parks, schools, churches, community organizations, etc. We share the same dangerous roads and traffic problems and seem to have similar concerns about water and land management. It has never occurred to me that Wrightwood is not a part of the tri community. Since the day we moved to this town, we have known that our lives revolve around the small desert areas surrounding our town.

It doesn't make much sense for our town or parts of our larger community to be broken into different districts. If Wrightwood was suddenly placed with cities south of us (technically over an entire mountain range) then our interests would not be represented. Besides some of the townsfolk who work off the mountain, most of us do not even frequent the areas south of the San Gabriel Mtns. We do not share geographical, cultural, or even financial similarities with the communities south of us.

I hope that you take our lifestyle into account when you are choosing our boundaries. At the very least our school district's boundaries should give you a giant clue as to where our community lies. Having such a small population in each town makes us join together for many things and I hope our representation reflects that.

Subject: First Draft of INYO/MONO/SAN BERNARDINO county maps

Message Body:

The "California Congressional -SB (Rialto, Fontana, Colton, San Bernardino)" & the "California Congressional - INMNOSB" are (1) poorly disguised attempts to entrench Joe Baca and Jerry Lewis for 10 more years--its as if the district lines are being drawn on partisan basis; Fontana to the North of the Freeway is demographically quite different from the South side of the Freeway and could be put into the adjacent congressional district with Ontario and Rancho (and Redlands, which is closely tied to Loma Linda over the past 30 plus years and connected by the I-10) could be the replacement area; (2) the district which includes INYO & MONO looks remarkably like the district created for Jerry Lewis' re-election committee in 2000; Inyo & Mono should be included with the other Northern California (at least Mono)--in the 1998 congressional race, Time Magazine called the old 40th CD a Northern California district because of the majority of the land mass being in Northern California.!

To add the population count for the INMNOSB district (and assuming its stuck with Redlands & Yuciapa), include Highlands & everything to the Northeast of Highway 215 & Highway 30 in exchange for Mono & Inyo. It takes 6 plus hrs to get to Bishop from Victorville and 7-8 hours from Redlands and you could not find more demographically dissimilar areas. The INMNOSB map dilutes Hispanic and African American voters.

Message Body:

Why in the world are you carving out Oak Hills, Phelan, Pinion Hills from MOIOSBKN (and putting them in the new LA County District)--they are part of the Victor Valley (Hesperia, Victorville), the school districts interconnect, the kids grow up together, they are connected by Phelan Road, Baldy Mesa Road and Sheepcreek Road; also Adelanto is next to Victorville, the kids in Adelanto go to Victorville High Schools, trade with stores and shop at the mall in the area (Adelanto has limited shopping). This map is an attempt to isolate (and dilute the voting power of) an active and growing African American neighborhood from its county region, a region that African American voters and candidates have made gains in in the past 3-4 years. ADELANTO and the Phelan-Oaks Hills-Pinion Hill area should remain together--make up the difference by shipping INYO & MONO to Kern or one of the central-to-north counties (Touloume, Alpine, etc)

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
