Specifically, the district "names" (e.g. IGWSG for my Congressional District, #43. I know that CVAP refers to Citizen Voting Age Population, but what do LCVAP, BDCVAP, and ADCVAP refer to? Am I being obtuse? Did I miss a glossary somewhere?

Why publish all these statistics but not tell us what they mean?
