Welcome and 4 thank you for joining us for today's California citizens 5 redistricting commission communities of interest input meeting. This one is focusing on Riverside and San 6 Bernardino Counties. Please note that we will be happy 7 to take calls focusing on other areas of the state as 8 9 well. 10 I'm Commissioner Ray Kennedy. I'll be co-chairing 11 today's meeting along with Commissioner Le Mons. 12 And I would ask our commission secretary, Mr. Singh, 13 to call the roll, please? 14 MR. SINGH: Thank you. Commissioner Le Mons? 15 VICE-CHAIR LE MONS: Here. 16 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Sadhwani? 17 COMMISSIONER SADHWANI: Here. 18 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Sinay? 19 COMMISSIONER SINAY: Here. 20 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Taylor? COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Present. 21 22 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Toledo? 2.3 Commissioner Turner? 24 COMMISSIONER TOLEDO: Present.

1 Commissioner Vazquez? 2 COMMISSIONER VAZQUEZ: Here. MR. SINGH: Commissioner Yee? 3 COMMISSIONER YEE: Here. 4 5 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Ahmad? COMMISSIONER AHMAD: 6 Here. 7 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Akutagawa? Commissioner Andersen? 8 9 COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Here. MR. SINGH: Commissioner Fernandez? 10 11 COMMISSIONER FERNANDEZ: Here. 12 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Fornaciari? 13 COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: Here. 14 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Kennedy? 15 CHAIR KENNEDY: Here. 16 MR. SINGH: Roll call is complete. CHAIR KENNEDY: Thank you, Ravindar. I'll start by 17 18 sharing a little bit about the Commission. Every ten 19 years after the federal government publishes updated 20 census information, California must redraw the boundaries of its congressional, State Senate, state assembly, and 21 22 State Board of Equalization Districts so that the 23 districts correctly reflect the state's population. 24 In 2008, California voters authorized the creation 25 of the Commission when they passed the Voters FIRST Act.

1 The act authorized the Commission to draw the new

2 district lines for State Senate, state assembly, and

3 | State Board of Equalization Districts. Later, in 2010,

4 the Voters FIRST Act for Congress added the

5 responsibility of drawing congressional districts to the

6 | Commission's mandate.

The fourteen-member Commission is made up of five
Republicans, five Democrats, and four not affiliated with
either of those two parties. The Commissioners were
selected following a yearlong application review process,
with the first eight members having been selected by
random draw, and the six remaining Commissioners being
selected by the first eight.

The Commission must draw the district lines in conformity with strict, nonpartisan rules set out in the state constitution designed to create districts of relatively equal population that will provide fair representation for all Californians. One of those rules is minimizing the division of counties, cities, neighborhoods, and communities of interest to the extent possible.

We can obtain the city and county information from those jurisdictions, but we need the neighborhood and communities of interest information from Californians directly. That's why we've launched these communities of

1 interest public input sessions to get that valuable information from you directly. We encourage all 3 Californians to participate in these sessions. If you 4 would rather submit communities of interest input over 5 the internet, you can do so from our website or by visiting DrawMyCACommunity.org. Skip the line, go 6 7 online. Now, I'll call on my fellow Commissioners to 9 introduce themselves and to say hello. To see the 10 biographies for all fourteen Commissioners, for 11 additional information on the redistricting process, or 12 to sign up for our updates, please visit our website at 13 WeDrawTheLinesCA.org. Please also follow us on social 14 media. You can find us on Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, 15 LinkedIn, and YouTube at WeDrawTheLinesCA. There, you'll 16 find a lot of useful information about redistricting, and 17 updates from the Commission. 18 So we'll start with my co-Chair, Commissioner Le 19 Mons. 20 VICE-CHAIR LE MONS: Good morning, California. 1 CHAIR KENNEDY: Thank you, Commissioner Toledo. 2 Commissioner Turner? 3 Commissioner Vazquez? COMMISSIONER VAZQUEZ: Good morning, California. 4 5 I'm very excited to be here today. I'm calling in from Los Angeles, California, but I'm super excited today 6 because I'm originally from the 909. I am an I-E girl at 7 heart, so I'm very excited to hear about your communities 8 9 of interest. 10 CHAIR KENNEDY: Excellent. Thank you, Commissioner 11 Vazquez. 12 Commissioner YEE. 13 COMMISSIONER YEE: Good morning, California. 14 Russell Yee, in my hometown of Oakland. I'm here to 15 learn about San Bernardino and Riverside counties, 16 especially, and anywhere else that Californians are 17 calling in from today to share about their communities of 18 interest. 19 CHAIR KENNEDY: Thank you, Commissioner Yee. 20 Again, I'm Ray Kennedy. I live in Morongo Valley, 21 one of the rural Joshua Tree gateway communities in San 22 Bernardino County. I moved here a little over a year ago 23 after living in Palm Springs for fifteen years. So I'm 24 very interested in hearing about areas throughout both of

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the counties.

This meeting is primarily for communities of interest testimony focused on San Bernardino and Riverside counties and surrounding areas. However, anyone in California can call in to provide input. We will take general public comment at the end of the meeting.

Today, we're joined by our line drawing team,

HaystaqDNA and Q2 Date & Research, LLC, who will be

displaying maps of the areas that our participants

describe. We're also joined by Katy, our comment

moderator, who will be introducing attendees when it's

their turn to speak.

If you have registered for a time slot, we encourage you to connect or call in during that timeslot. When you join the meeting, please use the raise hand button at the bottom of your screen to enter the queue. When it's your turn to speak, Katy will be identifying you by your assigned unique ID number. You will then be reconnected to the session with the ability to enable your own video and or audio. Katy will then assign you a speaker order number before you begin speaking. Please make note of your speaker order number for future reference, as you'll be able to use that number to identify your communities of interest testimony on our website at a future date.

The Commission will be enforcing a three-minute time

limit with a warning at thirty seconds and another with fifteen seconds remaining. At the beginning of your input, you will see a map on the screen. Please remind the mapper what area you would like to see on the screen, and be as specific as possible about the boundaries of where your community is located.

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We'd like to remind everyone that registration is not required to participate in this public input meeting. While there are no clear rules on how to define a community of interest, we've identified a number of ways for you to describe your community. Begin with your county or city. Mention the street names and significant locations in your neighborhood to help us identify the boundaries of your community. Tell us, what are your shared interests? What brings your community together? What's important to your community? Are there nearby areas you want to be in a district with? If so, why do you want to be grouped with those areas? Are there nearby areas you don't want to be in a district with? Ιf not, why not? Has your community come together to advocate for important services, better schools, roads, or health centers in your area?

1 Again, for those who prefer, you're invited to use our communities of interest tool online to draw a map and 3 describe your community by visiting 4 DrawMyCACommunity.org. Skip the line, go online, and 5 submit your communities of interest input today. We will now begin today's public input, and I'll 6 7 pass this over to Katy, our comment moderator. We will start with people who are registered, and then open the 8 9 phone lines if there's time before the next session. 10 Katy, welcome and thank you for your support. 11 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Good morning, Chair and 12 California. You're welcome. Thank you for having me. 13 Welcome to the public input session. Please use the 14 raise hand button at the bottom of your screen to enter 15 the queue. When it is your turn to speak, you will be 16 identified by your assigned unique ID number. You will 17 be reconnected to the session with the ability to enable 18 your own video and or audio. MR. CREFFIELD: Yes. Hi, Mark Creffield, greater High Desert Chamber of Commerce, speaker 008. Map area would be the San Bernardino County High Desert, Victor Valley area. Again, hello. Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to provide testimony today.

I am Mark Creffield, the President and CEO of the Greater High Desert Chamber of Commerce. Our chamber represents the City of Adelanto, Hesperia, Victorville, and the town of Apple Valley, and surrounding San

1 Bernardino County High Desert communities. We used to have several smaller chambers, but the business community found that we were usually -- they were usually a member 3 4 of multiple chambers in our region because our community 5 is one high desert community. The prior Commission was first to draw the High 6 7 Desert, Victor Valley into one district at Congressional 8 and assembly level, and it has improved representation in 9 our areas. We strongly feel the San Bernardino County 10 High Desert and surrounding areas should be kept together 11 as a community and not divided up. This also includes 12 the entire High Desert from Pinon Hills to the Morongo 13 Valley. Thank you very much for your time and having me 14 today. 15 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 16 right now we will have 006. And then up next will be 17 007. Right now will be 006. 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MR. CORDERO: The City of Rancho Cucamonga, in San Bernardino County.

PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Go ahead.

MR. CORDERO: My name is John Gallegos Cordero, and I am a resident of Rancho Cucamonga. Rancho Cucamonga, Upland, and Clairemont have benefited from all the development along the 210 corridor, linking our cities in commerce, leisure, and entertainment. As well, we are some of the fastest growing areas in the county when it comes to economic development.

Rancho Cucamonga is linked to our sister cities to the west through youth sports, recreation, and education. Rancho Cucamonga and Upland are in the same regional counsel district, number 9, of the Southern California Association of Governments and in the Inland Empire Division of the League of Cities.

The San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors

placed Rancho Cucamonga and Upland in the Second

District, and Redlands in the third District. Rancho

Cucamonga serves as a commercial center for residents of

Upland, Ontario, and Clairemont, with the Victoria

Gardens, as well as the only professional sports stadium,

LoanMart Field. Our cities also share the Sycamore Hills

Plaza, where our Rancho Cucamonga residents shop at the

1 Inland Empire's only Wholefoods store, located in Upland. 2 Upland is also the home to the San Antonio Regional 3 Hospital, which services include Clairemont, Chino, 4 Fontana, Montclair, Ontario, Rancho Cucamonga, and 5 Upland. The hospital also owns a satellite location in Rancho Cucamonga -- in the city of Rancho Cucamonga, the 6 7 San Antonio Medical Plaza. Three Rancho Cucamonga high schools -- Etiwanda, Los 9 Osos, and Rancho Cucamonga High School -- compete in the 10 Baseline league, a high school athletic conference in CIF 11 Southern Section that also includes high schools in 12 Western communities. In contrast, three Redlands high 13 schools compete in a separate league, the Citrus Belt. 14 And lastly, the three Rancho Cucamonga high schools 15 are part of the Chaffey Joint Union High School District, 16 which includes schools from, of course, Rancho Cucamonga, 17 Ontario, and Montclair, and some portions of -- of the --18 And that concludes -of Fontana. 19 MR. Mr. JACKSON: Hello. I would like to talk about the cities of Moreno Valley, Perris, Hemet, and San Jacinto in Riverside County. That's the cities of Moreno Valley, Perris, Hemet, and San Jacinto. We are -- my name is Corey Jackson; I actually live in the city of Moreno Valley, and I also serve as a member of the local NAACP. And I'm here to talk about the African-American communities in those cities of Moreno Valley, Perris, Hemet, and San Jacinto.

It's an essential that we ensure that the AfricanAmerican voice, as a minority population, is not weakened
according to your Voting Rights Act and community of
interest criteria. Currently, the center of the
community is separated currently right now by two
assembly districts, assembly district 61 and assembly
district 42. The city of Moreno Valley has the largest
population of African-Americans, and the city of Perris

has the second largest population of African-Americans in
Riverside County.

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However, since the last redistricting process, our population is shifting to the cities of Hemet and San Jacinto. All four cities have been able to elect other African-Americans to local office. Therefore, we ask that these cities be included in the same assembly, Senate, and congressional district to protect the voting strength of our community, who share a common history, a common culture, we celebrate some of the same cultural events such as Kwanzaa and Juneteenth, and attend our events. We worship in many of the same places of worship, and we are deeply concerned with issues of racism, public safety, voting rights, education. And we share some of the very same health concerns, such as infant mortality, hypertension, and colon cancer, which is -- affects some of us being some of the lowest mortality rates of any other group.

Not including Moreno Valley, Perris, Hemet, and San Jacinto in the same districts would dilute our ability to elect our own representatives as a minority group.

However, equally as important is that we ask not to be included with cities such as Temecula --

MS. RAMOS-EVINGER: Thank you so much. And I'd like to see the cities of like, Chino Hills, Brea, and Yorba Linda. And good morning, Commissioners. My name is Sarah Ramos-Evinger, and I'm a proud resident of the city of Chino Hills. I'm also the president of the Chino Valley Fire District. And I also serve as the fire district's liaison to the Carbon count -- Carbon Canyon FireSafe Council, which includes residents from the city of Chino Hills and Brea.

Our city -- our -- Chino Hills has a population of over 80,000 residents, and is nestled next to the beautiful Chino Hills State Park. Our city has a strong equestrian and recreational lifestyle, including many

biking, hiking, and riding trails. One of the major challenges facing Chino Hills is the threat of wildfire.

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Chino Hills is designated by Cal Fire as a very high fire hazard severity zone. Last year, we had the Blue Ridge fire that burned nearly 14,000 acres and forced the evacuation of many residents and adjacent communities of Brea and Yorba Linda, California. As president of the Chino Valley Fire District, we work closely with the cities of Brea, California, and Yorba Linda, located in North Orange County on mutual aid fires, issues such as the Blue Ridge fire, or if a fire occurs in the Chino Hills State Park, which our communities touch.

Additionally, we have a major thoroughfare, called Carbon Canyon, that connects the city of Brea with Chino Hills. I, along with thousands of other Chino Hills residents, use Carbon Canyon each day to go to work or do business in Brea or North Orange County. The 91 freeway to the south of our city connects Chino Hills and Yorba Linda and North Orange County. It would make sense that Chino Hills be included in the same legislative congressional district as Brea and Yorba Linda due to our common fire and transportation areas. Thank you again to the Commission for your time and service to our residents of California. That concludes my comments.

MS. MORRIS GREEN: My community of interest is the Victor Valley region of the High Desert. This would include the incorporated communities of Victorville, Adelanto, Upper Valley, and Hesperia, and the surrounding unincorporated areas, including Mountain View Acres, Spring Valley Lake, Phelan, Pinon Hills, El Mirage, Silver Lake, Lucerne Valley, Big Bear, and Wrightwood. My name is Phyllis K Morris Green. I have lived in the Victorville -- Victor Valley area for approximately fifty-four years, currently residing in the city of Hesperia with my husband. And then I also care for my mother who resides in the city of Victorville.

As an attorney, I have provided representation to citizens throughout San Bernardino County. The Victor Valley area is unique in that we are under-resourced and underserved. The ability to access appropriate resources is critical toward enhancing public safety and providing safe communities. To reduce recidivism, we must have strong social service networks.

Yet, when we seek services that include but are not limited to substance abuse treatment, mental health treatment, therapy for behavior disorder, domestic violence counseling services, and even shelters and transitional housing, we find agencies with long waiting lists requiring clients to call daily, often waiting weeks to obtain a spot for accessing services. Yet, research shows that connecting clients with services early in the process increases the likelihood of achieving a successful rehabilitation.

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When we do locate an agency for our client, the agency is likely to be in one of four cities or Barstow. After locating services for the clients, we must then navigate issues of transportation. The most convenient form of travel is by car. However, many individuals, clients and non-clients do not own a car. According to the Database.IO -- that's the letters I-O -- the poverty rates for the four cities within the region are as follows: Victorville at 22.8 percent; Adelanto at 35.4 percent; Apple Valley at 17.8 percent; and Hesperia at 21 percent. Although Victor Valley Transit Authority services the region, it's schedule, at times, is not a viable alternative because of the lack of frequency regarding arrival and departure times, with many stops limited to make travel laps, and not --

But it 18 really speaks to the fact that this is a full community. 19 So bottom line, the -- the districts that we have 20 right now, I think, are probably the best that we could 21 ever get. That would include the interests of this 22 collective area -- this Pomona Valley. And if -- if there were any changes, it would be detrimental. 23 24 would sever our ties. 25 And just -- just on a note, I happen to live in

They're already unified. And if you've been to the Coachella Valley, you know that once you get outside of the past, it's a very different world. We are the Low Desert. Our geography is the same. And we should be contiguous so that my home and my business are in the same district.

Right now, we have people who literally across the street is another assembly district. And I don't believe this is good. This -- this is literally segregation and it shouldn't be done. We should all be learning to work together to achieve goals and to solve problems as one community, because we are all desert people.

And out here, our two economies are driven by tourism and by agriculture. And so if any expansion is done, our district should go east so that we include the agricultural community of the Imperial Valley and the agricultural community of the Palo Verde Valley, so that our three agricultural desert regions are connected, and

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I am the founder of Millionaire Mind Kids, nonprofit organization. My headquarters has been located in the city of Victorville for the past sixteen years, and I serve some of the most vulnerable and underrepresented families across Victor Valley and the Congressional District. Currently, the eighth District, represented by Congressman Jay Obernolte, encompasses most of the eastern desert regions of the state. The Victor Valley contains four incorporated municipalities. The largest is Victorville. The common interests that currently exist within our congressional districts are the median household income, which is about 56k annually. While meeting with other community members, we worked on reimagining a community of resources that would uplift our entire district region, but specifically Victor Valley.

In addition to municipal services, we share shopping, outdoor recreation, lakes, ski resorts, parks and Wildlife, there are other resources in our community agree are desperately needed that will enhance our quality of life and our economy. These needs are a trauma center, a major hospital and access to health care specialists without having to go down the hill as we refer, down the Cajon Pass.

1 Our university, we all agree education is a key to access to quality jobs, which builds thriving economies. Health and wellness centered communities are all of our 3 4 community interests and our common interests. - 24 imperative needs from our congressional representatives.
- So we're currently represented by Judy Chu, who I



personally voted for but she was elected because her values and campaign platform appealed to the voters of my district. As an Armenian-American, I can tell you also that this community, specifically, including the San Gabriel Valley, is home to a strong and proud Armenian community which has endured long and arduous history of constant battles for recognition of the Armenian Genocide, safety for Armenians against hate crimes in California, as well as a long list of other important issues which we believe are important, such as ensuring equitable access to public services.

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So as a minority group in the U.S., breaking up our community's collective voice may jeopardize everything that we've fought generations to secure, which is a seat at the table in American civil society and a representative who actually cares about our needs.

So for this reason, I have to request that the San Gabriel Valley and the 27th Congressional District as a whole remain as intact as possible with a higher priority remaining to the eastern portion. The communities of Upland and Claremont may have slightly different beliefs and legislative needs, and I do believe that they deserve to be lumped into a district which does satisfy those legislative priorities.

MR. BARTZ: Good afternoon. I want to thank the Commission for taking my testimony today. My name is Don Bartz. I was born and raised in San Bernardino County in the high desert and have lived there all of my life. I currently work in water and sit on the Technical Advisory Committee for the Mojave Water Agency.

For those of you who don't know, the Mojave Water

Agency is the water master for San Bernardino County High

Desert and encompasses 4,900 square miles of the high

desert. The district includes many small towns like

Phelan, Canyon Hills, Lucerne Valley, Barstow, and also

larger, more populated cities like the entire Victor

Valley in the Morongo Basin, where we have locals call

the high desert.

The High Desert community share common concerns and issues. For example, we understand that water is precious and always work to preserve it in good years and bad because we are desert communities. For this reason, we have one water master that monitors how much water we are taking from the ground. Recently, we've seen an explosion of illegal marijuana growers across the high desert area affecting Phelan, to the Lucerne Valley to the Morongo Basin.

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These groups have threatened their water supply and there's the potential for contamination and harmful pesticides to enter our groundwater. This is why we have one water master to help monitor our groundwater and for pollutants, in naturally occurring elements which could be harmful to people like Arsenic and Chromium 6. I would ask the commission to consider the San Bernardino County High Desert a community of interest because of our shared issues surrounding public health like water as well as our rural desert way of life.

The prior commission cut up a San Bernardino County
High Desert at state level. But we are combined at the
Congressional District. I would like to see us stay
together at all levels of representation, and I
appreciate you taking the time to listen to my concerns.

I'm a resident of Chino Hills for nearly thirty years, which is located in western San Bernardino County. Our boundaries are within the 60 freeway to the north, the 91 freeway to the south, the 57 freeway to the west, and the 71 freeway to the east. Those are almost like natural boundaries for us.

I would like to express my support today for having Chino Hills grouped with other Inland Empire communities in The State and federal legislative districts who more closely mirror our community demographically, culturally, and economically. Chino Hills is currently grouped through the eastern San Gabriel Valley and North Orange County communities, which is separated by the 57/60 confluence to the West, if you take a look at it on the map.

But it doesn't make much sense to me. The city
would benefit much more by having the same
representatives as Chino and other Inland Empire
communities like Ontario, Montclair and even East Vale.
A big anomaly is that Chino and Chino Hills share a
school district for one. We also share a fire district
and we share a water district. Yet we are separated by

1 | Congressional Assembly and Senate districts.

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The population and housing developments in Chino
Hills have also grown at a much faster rate than the
other communities who share state and federal districts
that we are currently adjoined with. Our city is
represented by also a county supervisory district number
four, which also includes the cities of Montclair,
Ontario.

So for me, it really doesn't make much sense for us to continue to be adjoined with Orange County and L.A. County anymore. We've grown thirteen percent from the 2010 census estimate of 74,800 to an estimated 85,100 from the predicted for the 2020 census. And it's well known that the population that we have has been shifting eastward from Orange County and San Gabriel Valley to Chino Hills and East Vale for years.

We're a very diverse community. We roughly identified 50 percent white, thirty percent Asian, twenty-nine precent Latino in the last estimate. And we're sure to reflect more changes when the current census data is available. What are we known for?

MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds.

MR. GALLAGHER: Our city is known for attractions like the State park, big league dreams ballpark and so on. We are tied economically with you on Terra Airport,

1 I want to mention. And as this economy starts to open up, more of our residents are going to be commuting 3 east --4 MR. MANOFF: Fifteen seconds. MR. GALLAGHER: -- to Ontario instead of Orange 5 County to work. Chino Hills growth and expansion is much 6 7 more in line with that of Chino, Ontario, Montclair, and East Vale. We are uniquely San Bernardino County and --8 9 MR. MANOFF: Time. 10 MR. GALLAGHER: -- we'd like to move in that 11 direction. 12 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 13 right now we will have caller 2452. That's caller with 14 the last four of 4252. So the 17 solution is to have us all at the same table discussing 18 these things. And also before we put a policy together 19 to discuss what the possible unintended consequences 20 would be before the vector gets so big that now 21 everybody's dug in and at each other's throats and this 22 is what's been going on. 2.3 And we need to stop this because we are all in this 24 We're agricultural or tourism or restaurants.

That's our livelihood and if you separate us from being

able to talk with one another, it will do nothing but frustrate the services across the valley and frustrate the community as a whole. And with that, thanks for allowing me to talk. And you guys have a nice day.

I belong to the country club here, like so many. We have, as you know, so many different groups of people. The snowbirds are gone pretty much right now. It's kind of hot.

But anyway, I lived in Newport Beach, raised our kids there, had a second home in La Quinta for -- oh gosh, it must have been thirteen years and then moved here to a full time community, which we when we moved out here full time, we wanted to be a part of, and we love it.

But what I'd really like to say is I've been



disappointed over the years with the last group of
redistricting that happened. It appears that it was just
not contiguous and that it was pretty much gerrymandered.

And you know, we have a majority of -- oh, I shouldn't
say majority, but the full timers are pretty much -- no,
how can I say this without sounding like I don't want to
sound.

I think you're well aware of our demographics down here and you're probably well aware of how the districts were drawn up. And it just appears to me that it's not inclusive. It's just become more and more exclusive, especially with the current powers that be allowing more credence given to non-citizens. And I know that's not one of the criterias that you're using for your districting, but it's really a unique situation down here in the valley.

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And I really believe that we should be one district, that we should all work together to be represented. And that the way that it is now is just totally unacceptable because it's pretty much just pits socioeconomic and ethnic groups against one another down here. So I really don't want the Coachella Valley to continue in this way.

So my input is just that you may consider -- I mean, we have people working in agriculture that own businesses in agriculture that are voting in different districts and

1 their businesses are. So some of those things just don't make any sense and they're just not making any sense in 3 bringing all of us back together. I just want to close 4 in saying that we in our country club, we have a lot of 5 Hispanics working here, a lot of people that come from 6 all over the country. 7 And you know, we as a unit in our country club, we love our workers. We're like a family. And I think 8 9 that's true all over the valley. And I just want to --10 MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds. 11 MS. LLOYD: -- give my input and say, all right. 12 just thank you so much for what you're doing. And I'm 13 just going to opt for one district with everyone being 14 represented. CO-CHAIR KENNEDY: Welcome back, everyone, to today's California Citizens Redistricting Commission

Communities of Interest input meeting. We also encourage folks to visit our Communities of Interest tool online to draw a map and describe your community. That tool is located at drawmycacommunity.org.

As we noted at the start of our meeting today, every ten years after the Federal Government publishes updated census information, California must redraw the boundaries of its Congressional, State Senate, State Assembly, and State Board of Equalization districts, so that the districts correctly reflect the state's population.

Our 14-member independent Citizens Redistricting

Commission was established by California voters to draw those new district lines. We are here today to obtain communities of interest information from Californians directly. We encourage all Californians to participate in this process. While there are no clear rules on how to define a community of interest, we've identified a number of ways for you to describe your community.

1 MR. FOLKS: Hi, good afternoon, Commission members. 2 Can you hear me fine? 3 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Yes, we can. MR. FOLKS: Okay, let's see. Can you hear me? 4 5 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Yes, we can hear you. Thank you so much. I'm going to be 6 MR. FOLKS: 7 speaking today briefly about the desert community, known as Yucca Valley, that is right on the border between San 8 9 Bernardino and Riverside County. Yes, right near that 10 Greek blotch, correct. Thank you so much. And thank you 11 for the opportunity to provide input today with respect to the redistricting effort. 12 13 My name is Tyler Folks (ph.), and I'm a resident of the town of Yucca Valley, where I've lived for half of my 14 15 life. Prior to moving to the High Desert town of Yucca 16 Valley, I lived in what is colloquially known as the 17 Lower Desert, or more formally known as the Cahuilla 18 Valley. 19 When my family and I made the decision to move from 20 the Lower Desert, we chose to live in Yucca Valley, due 21 to both its proximity to the Cahuilla Valley and its 22 likeness. It was important for our family to live in a 23 community that was familiar and that shared many of the 24 same resources and interests. The connection between the

Cahuilla Valley and the Morongo Basin is ultimately why

my family and I chose to live in the town of Yucca
Valley.

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The connection the two communities share is critical to one another, as they share many key resources, including geographical interests, tourism, education, healthcare, and human capital. These shared interests, I believe, are paramount to both communities and should be sustained.

As an example of how the two communities are connected, my family members and I commute from the Morongo Basin to the Cahuilla Valley each day during the work week for employment. As I'm speaking to you today, I'm calling from the city of Rancho Mirage, which is located in the heart of the Cahuilla Valley. This daily commute that my family and I have undertaken is not unique to our family.

The town of Yucca Valley is largely comprised of a commuting demographic. Most of them travel to the Lower Valley and its many desert cities for employment. The Lower Desert communities such as Palm Springs, Rancho Mirage, and Cathedral City also reciprocate in this special relationship, as many of their residents and tourists often commute to the High Desert for both work and leisure.

While I'm a resident of the town of Yucca Valley,



1 and I'm a contributing member of the larger Morongo Basin, I receive my employment, my healthcare services, 3 and many of my recreational opportunities from the 4 Cahuilla Valley. Decisions that are my by or for the 5 Cahuilla Valley directly impact the High Desert community and vice versa. It is due to the reasons stated that I 6 7 believe it is critical to recognize that the Cahuilla 8 Valley and the Morongo Basin are important to one 9 another, as they share a strategic relationship. 10 I hope the Commission will take into consideration 11 the comments I provided today, and will recognize and 12 sustain this shared community interest through the 13 redistricting process. And that will be it for my 14 comments. I really appreciate your time. 15 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 16 Right now, we have 023. And I would like to remind 17 those calling in, that -- 023 will be right now. 023 18 disappeared into the abyss? Honorable Commission members. Thank you for the opportunity to provide critical input today with respect to communities of interest. My name is Curtis Yakimow, and I serve as the town manager of the town of Yucca Valley here in the Morongo Basin. I'm also a resident of Morongo Valley or the unincorporated San Bernadino County that borders the Riverside county line.

As the Commission begins its work through this community outreach process, I wanted to share a couple of important thoughts related to Yucca Valley, the greater Morongo Basin, and our definition of what we would like to see as communities of interest with respect to Yucca Valley. And while I'm speaking today, representing the town of Yucca Valley, I'm also speaking as a resident, and I know that my story is not unique.

I was born and raised in Palm Springs, moved up to Yucca Valley in 1995, when I joined the town of Yucca Valley -- excuse me, I moved to Morongo Valley. I chose to live in Morongo Valley due to its proximity to both, Palm Springs and Yucca Valley. It was important for me to find a community that was unique and allowed for the sharing of critical resources such as healthcare, transportation, and employment. I found just that in the Morongo Basin, including communities like Morongo Valley, Joshua Tree, Yucca Valley, other unincorporated areas in

San Bernadino County.

As a unique community, yet we are in an area that shares so much with our neighboring cities down the hill, including Palm Springs, Cathedral City, Rancho Mirage, and others. This affiliation between the Cahuilla Valley and the Morongo Basin is such a part of the fabric of our community. It is clearly a community of interest that needs to be sustained. Like me, many residents in Yucca Valley depend on the desert cities for healthcare. Having our four children born at Desert Hospital is a great example. Those resources are critical.

Our local hospital in Joshua Tree is one of three facilities operated by Tenet Health, with the other two hospitals located in Palm Springs and Indio. It is so common for our residents to rely on the specialty healthcare available down the hill. And while that may be a strange saying to some, everyone in Yucca Valley or even the Morongo Basin knows what down the hill means. It's where people go for connection to healthcare, entertainment, dining.

Similarly, when we engage with our residents in Yucca Valley, many will say, I work down the hill. Or put in another way, if the Yucca Valley resident working in Palm Springs is asked where they live, they will often respond, up the hill in Yucca Valley. While there are

- 1 many other examples, suffice it to say that our
 2 residents, and me personally, consider the Cahuilla
 3 Valley to be heart and parcel of the way of life here in
- Yucca Valley. And we trust that the Commission will recognize and sustain this shared community of interest in the redistricting process.

I am looking to see the entire Morongo Basin, and even up to Bakersfield, so probably a zoomed-out view would be helpful.

So my name is Dawn Rowe, and I am the Vice Chairman of the San Bernadino County Board of Supervisors. And a part of the area that I represent on the board includes the Morongo Basin.

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I moved to the area almost twenty years ago when my husband was stationed at the Marine Corps base in Twentynine Palms. And unfortunately, he was killed in Iraq. But I chose to make the Morongo Basin my home, where I raised my two kids who are now in college. I have a unique perspective of this entire area, not only because of my Marine Corps affiliation, but also because I worked as both an Assembly and a Congressional Field Representative for the area for over ten years.

While the community of interest for the federal level for our area is really appropriately aligned to serve the communities well, and it makes sense to have the Morongo Basin included in there. I don't necessarily feel that that's the case with the Senate district. The Morongo Basin in the 8th Congressional District has military members who reside in the area, who seek services aboard the installations.

We have natural resources in the area that are shared with our congressional representatives, who work well for that area. And we have intertwined relationships with other federal partners, such as the

Bureau of Land Management and National Park Services, since nearly ninety percent of the 8th Congressional District is comprised of public lands.

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And unfortunately for our residents in the Morongo Basin, the 2012 redistricting plan drew our community into the 16th State Senate District, which stretches as far north as Bakersfield and Kern County, which is really why I'm here to speak.

That State Senate District has a population based that, for me, is over 200 miles away from this community of interest that I am speaking of today. And it is a very difficult task for any elected official to understand the scale of our local concerns, let alone dedicate the appropriate time and resources to solving our problems in the Morongo Basin.

There are several critical State issues facing our community that require strong representation from our State elected officials. These include illegal cannabis cultivation, and threatened species management. To date, there are over 860 illegal cannabis farms operating in San Bernadino County, many of which are located in the Morongo Basin.

Additionally, our community is facing the prospect of the California Fish and Game Commission permanently listing the Western Joshua Tree as a threatened species,

which is a move that will have a devastating effect on the future growth of the Basin. And in the absence of a regional conservation plan, we will really struggle. In order to adequately address these critical issues of our community and the local governments in the Morongo Basin, we need intervention and help from our State resources.

So accordingly, I respectfully request that this Commission consider including the Morongo Basin in a State Senate District with a population base that has more shared interests. Thank you.

PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much.

Riverside is now the largest, and has been for a long time, the largest city in the Inland Empire, the 13th largest estate, and is also a member of the Big City Mayors Coalition. This city is still growing. The region is growing. It is a substantial economic driver. It is still a place where houses can be built. It has affordable housing,

1 strong community of interest that needed to be assembled to be able to have its own Assembly -- two of its own Assembly district majorities, its own Senate majority, 3 and a Congressional majority, all coming from the ability 4 5 for the city of Riverside. With this, now the city of Riverside has a substantial voice in the inland -- from 6 7 the Inland Empire in Sacramento and in Washington, D.C. Riverside's representation should still be substantial and have the ability to have majorities that 10 we can send to Sacramento and to Washington. a quiet community in west San Bernadino County. And the

boundaries are Los Angeles County, the cities of Pomona

and Diamond Bar to the north and northwest. There is the

51 Freeway -- so sorry, 71 Freeway to the east, and the

Orange County cities of Brea and Yorba Linda to the

south.

There are some really awesome little treasures there, including Chino Hills State Park, that has hiking trails and a lot of diverse plant and animal life. Last year, there was the Blue Ridge fire, which burned a lot of the State Park, 8,700 acres, and they forced mandatory evacuations of many residents in Chino Hills, Brea, Yorba Linda. A lot of my students and other teachers had to get ready to evacuate -- and evacuate.

So the cities of Chino Hills, Brea, and Yorba Linda have common fire safety issues in a mutual aid agreement. And additionally, these cities are connected by Carbon Canyon, which is SR-142. It's a major thoroughfare that connects Chino Hills to the city of Brea and north Orange County.

So I use this Carbon Canyon daily for my commute between Chino Hills and north Orange County. However, Carbon Canyon doesn't permit large trucks to utilize it, and it's a very tight road, which can lead to accidents, and it can narrow, and users can get stuck in traffic for a very long time.

I'm happy that Chino Hills is working with the nearby city of Brea on solving some of the traffic issues. I would like to see that Chino Hills -- I would like -- it would make sense that Chino Hills to be

1 included in the same legislative or congressional district as Brea and Diamond Bar due to the environmental and wildfire, and transportation issues, that all three 3 4 of those communities share. 5 So thank you again to the Commission for your time, and for your service to all the residents of California. 6 7 Thank you. PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. And with that, we do not have any other callers at this time. 10 11 CO-CHAIR KENNEDY: Very good. Those include traffic, transportation 2.3 issues, homeless issues, which are big, shopping, and 24 dining. All of these cities would benefit from

development along Interstate 10, linking them together in

commerce, leisure, and entertainment.

and we need to work together to achieve our goals and solve our problems together as the Coachella Valley community.

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Third, are all of the Coachella Valley cities and our local Indian tribes work together through the Coachella Valley Association of Governments, where they jointly address public safety; infrastructure; homelessness; conservation; environmental issues; and energy needs, etcetera. So we need to stay united.

Valley was approximately 388,000 full-time residents.

However, that population increases in the winter months.

When over 100,000 snowbirds arrive, we are large enough
to have one Assembly district. Although, these visitors
are not residents of California, they do increase the
size of our community, and should be considered when
drawing the lines.

- 21 | Pazant (ph.). I am a school board member for the Alta
- 22 Loma School District in Alta Loma, which is a part of
- 23 Rancho Cucamonga, California, obviously. And I'm calling
- 24 regarding the situation where our city is divided into
- 25 | two Assembly districts. Not even our city, just our

little corner, Rancho Cucamonga.

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So I don't know if you know that Rancho Cucamonga is located in the foothills of San Bernadino County's west end. It's made up of three minor communities, or smaller ones, Etiwanda, Alta Loma, and Cucamonga. Our school district consists of ten schools. And two of our tenant schools belong to Assemblyman Holden, who resides in Pasadena. And the rest of our district belongs with Mr. James Ramos, which is part of San Bernadino County.

And the part that makes it so difficult for us and for this area, is that we are definitely a member of San Bernadino County. And to be represented just a teeny, tiny bit by Assemblyman Holden, who is, you know, an hour away from us, west of us, in a different county, in a different city, makes it very improbable for us to be serviced correctly for those two schools in that area.

We would appreciate the redistricting to include all of us in San Bernadino County with Mr. Ramos, because we're definitely all in San Bernadino County.

Mr. Ramos is very attentive to our school district needs and our city's needs, because he lives in San Bernadino County, and we do too.

Mr. Holden, on the other hand, is from Pasadena, Los Angeles County. He rarely comes out to see us. He rarely services the people that live in that teeny, tiny

- 1 part of his district. He'll send out an email occasionally, or maybe come, if we invite him, he'll show 3 up maybe once a year, because his major interest is Los 4 Angeles Cunty. And I get that. And he is a fine 5 Assemblyman for them, but for us, in San Bernadino County, we need to be contiguous and be represented by 6 7 Mr. Ramos in the county where we reside. The last Commission drew most of our community into 9 Los Angeles County for that little bit. But we want to 10 stay all in the county that we reside in, so we can be best served, and best have our needs be met, and best 11 served our state if we're all in one Assembly district. 12 13 That's all I have to say. 14 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 15 And with that, Chair, we do not have any other 16 callers in the queue. 17 CO-CHAIR KENNEDY: Thank you, Katy. We will stand 18 by for a couple of minutes. We've had good luck so far 19

I am a former director of Three Valleys Municipal Water 8 District, District 1, in Pomona. 10 The areas that are related to my two cents here are 11 basically all the cities in the eastern most part of Los 12 Angeles County and some cities in the western part of San 13 Bernardino County and the north or west part of Riverside 14 County. 15 So these are cities that include Pomona, where I 16 live, Claremont, La Verne, San Dimas, Walnut Diamond Bar, 17 and parts of Covina. And the other cities are like 18 Montclair, Chino, Chino Hills, et cetera. 19 So what I -- the point that I would like to make is 20 that in the work that we did with state representatives 21 and the Assembly District and state senators was very 22 important in educating delegates on the critical issues 2.3 at hand about water and any and all legislation related 24 to water issues that impacted our region.

And it was very, very important that we understood

- 1 that the water issues were of a regional nature and a
- 2 | statewide nature, not just selected to one little city or
- 3 | what have you, that these were very critical issues that
- 4 impacted the shortages of water, for example, in
- 5 especially like Walnut and Diamond Bar, which do not have
- 6 | their natural -- any natural spring water. And they rely
- 7 on imported water for 100 percent of their water.
- 8 So providing a reliable resource of water in the
- 9 area was very much a part of a working relationship with
- 10 our state senators and our state assembly members in our
- 11 district. And these districts are overlying in the
- 12 different counties. And it was very important that we
- 13 | had these type of working relationships and continue to
- 14 do so in the future, especially at this particular time
- 15 when there is a severe water drought in The State of
- 16 | California.
- 17 | So I just wanted to --
- 18 MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds.
- 19 MR. WATERS: -- let you guys know that it was very,
- 20 | very important to have these outlying districts as they
- 21 | are right now, and they should remain pretty much the
- 22 same.

14	Mojave Desert, I look at communities like Phelan,

Okay. So it helps me to read my statement so I can stay within two minutes now.

So thank you so much for your help and for providing me the opportunity to testify with you all today. My name is Stephanie Vita Pasadena (ph.), and I am a resident of this region in Victorville. I've lived here for the last ten years, and I just wanted to testify on behalf of the community that our neighborhood can best be described as a suburb region with urban problems.

As you can see on the map, we are a suburb, but we are unique in that we have urban problems because of the high migration that we have seen over the last ten years. And even on the map, you see the division on Highway 15 and that natural boundary that the mountain creates.

It becomes very difficult for our residents to migrate down the hill -- we actually call it that. We call it, saying, down the hill -- in order to attend university, Cal State, San Bernardino, or UC Riverside.

Unfortunately, in the High Desert region, which is the region I'm speaking of today, we do not have any universities. We only have two community colleges that cover that entire region, which makes it really difficult for people that are wanting to attend school. It can take at least five years just to do two years' worth of schooling.

1 We also don't have specialty hospitals. If you want even anything specialty for like women's care, fertility, you have to go down the hill and you can be trapped in 3 traffic for over two hours. 4 5 Also, our seniors for their eye specialties, it's the same thing. Currently, (indiscernible) --6 7 MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds. MS. PASADENA: -- is not included and so that should 9 also be included in our area. 10 And we can be classified as a high poverty area with 11 very limited assets and investments. 12 Overall, our demographics have shifted with the high 13 population --14 MR. MANOFF: Fifteen seconds. 15 MS. PASADENA: -- of Latinos and people of color. 16 And that always isn't considered in how we are 17 represented in our region. 18 Okay. Thank you so much for hearing me out. 19 good day. 2.0 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 21 And with that, Chair, I believe our queue is empty 22 again. 2.3 CHAIR KENNEDY: Okay. So we can go back to the 24 video. 25 VICE-CHAIR LE MONS: Welcome back to the California

- Want to make sure that our rural communities

 continue to get the fair representation related to our

1 concerns and issues that we face in our community as 2 well.

I was recalled to active duty and retired

2013. During that time I was stationed at Fort Irwin,

after twenty-seven years in nine -- oh. Wow.

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California on the other side of Barstow. Currently, I'm working as a civilian employee at 29 Palms Marine Corp Base in, obviously, Twentynine Palms.

And reason I'm calling regarding this mapping, is what I've noted is Victorville is the home to the former George Airforce Base. Has a tremendous presence of military retirees. Barstow, where I lived briefly, has the Barstow Veterans Home and the Marine Corp Logistics Base. And of course the -- Fort Irwin -- the only town close to Fort Irwin is Barstow. And now that I'm here in Twentynine Palms working on this Marine Corp base, I note the great similarity of all the retired marines in this area.

And so I know currently we're single-district. I don't know the exact boundaries. But I just wanted from that perspective to make it clear that it's very, very similar. All of the military interests, the interest in the infrastructure and the roads because of the remote nature of the reason. It's a -- it's a very homogenous area. Very -- very easy for one representative or senator to be able to gather and understand and represent our interests; both, again, the military retirees and the infrastructure for transportation and access to things like medical care both for veterans and for being so remote -- medical care for just residents.

2	your consideration to treat the Fort Irwin/Barstow area,
3	the Victorville area, and Twentynine Palms

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I'm calling today to express my concern with the redistricting. The community of the Victor Valley, the San Bernardino County high desert, makes up unique community. And this is different from the other areas that we have in our county. I really believe that this redistricting is cutting up the high desert, which is detrimental to our representation.

I would like to see the Victor Valley, San

Bernardino County high desert remain together and not be divided again. In the past our representation has been cut up and it's really made many residents of the high desert feel that we were red-headed step-child, because our community was cut up and it hurt our representation.

We are a unique area, and I think it's important to have that unifying representation to represent the residents of the high desert, so there are concerns in that. Thank you for allowing me to express my views and opinions on this all important matter.

In the 4 same legislative district. 5 I was the former student government president for Mt. San. And I know that the two schools often share a 6 7 lot of advocacy programs and things like that. And I just think it would be a lot more beneficial that way. 8 9 And that's it. Coachella Valley for twenty-two years.

Palm Springs and Desert Hot Springs are on the west end Coachella, Fairmont and Mecca are on the East end and incorporates Native American tribal lands and casinos across the valley.

Agriculture and tourism continue to be the primary industry in our valley. And during my twenty-two years in Palm Desert the demographics have changed dramatically from a seasonal brief retirement dominated population

that all but shut down across the valley for the summer.

We have become a vibrant year-round full-time population

including residents from diverse socio-economic, ethnic,

and cultural backgrounds. We also have several who are

part-time residents who also have homes in other parts of

This welcomed growth and diversity has brought about more around the year -- year-round business opportunities and consumer demands that support our local small

the State.

businesses.

The Coachella Valley cities work well together to bring their residents a degree of cooperation and cohesiveness across the valley while maintaining their independence and uniqueness, including the predominantly agricultural and unincorporated areas.

We have a Coachella Valley administration of government that work together on cross-valley issues such as homeless commissions, shared-infrastructure projects, public safety coordination, transportation and traffic light synchronization along cross-city traffic corridors, etcetera.

After the last census our single district was broken into two, divided along a North/South Street and took two cities on the West end and assigned them to the non-contiguous district cities on the East end of the valley.

We share common issues, challenges, and tourism surges and should be one district rather than what appears to be the result of arbitrary and capricious jerrymandering.

member of the Indian Empire Latino Lawyers, I'm also a UC
Riverside graduate. And I am speaking in my individual
capacity as an immigration lawyer in private practice and
also with my pro-bono efforts we've worked with clients
through Riverside and San Bernadino Counties.

Specifically, West and Riverside County is a home to a dynamic and large Latino/Latinx Community. And we've recently seen Latino candidates have success at winning local office and the State Assembly.



We have a senate district now, number 31, that is a good contiguous mix of similar and diverse communities of interest. But on the Western side of Riverside Counties, specifically Riverside/San Bernadino Valley, Paras, and well as Corona and Norco. Latino/X assembly members currently represent both assembly district 60 and 61, which are currently nested together in Senate District 31.

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The only problem with the current configuration of Senate District 31 is that we have yet to have a Latino candidate win an election to the State Assembly -- excuse me. To the State senate -- State senate in Western Riverside County. Thus, the current district has not worked to provide us our representation.

Today, I'm respectfully -- respectfully requesting the commission adjust the lines of Senate District 31 consistent with the California Constitution and the Voting Rights Act to allow us the opportunity to elect a Latino candidate to the State senate in district -- Senate District 31.

And this is something that's really important to our community. And I'd like to thank the commission for their time. Thank you.
