And welcome and thank you for tuning in to the 5 California Citizens Redistricting Commission's 6 Communities of Interest Public Input Forum. I am 7 Commissioner Pedro Toledo and I will be co-chairing 8 today's meeting with Commissioner Derrick Henry Taylor. 9 With that, let's take the role. 10 MR. SINGH: Yes, Chair. 11 Commissioner Turner? 12 Commissioner Vazquez? 13 Commissioner Yee? 14 COMMISSIONER YEE: Here. 15 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Ahmad? 16 COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Here. 17 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Akutagawa? 18 COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: Here. MR. SINGH: Commissioner Andersen? 19 20 COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Here. 21 MR. 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1 COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Here. 2 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Le Mons? Commissioner Sadhwani? 3 COMMISSIONER SADHWANI: 4 Here. 5 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Sinay? COMMISSIONER SINAY: 6 Here. 7 MR. SINGH: Commissioner Taylor? CHAIR TAYLOR: 8 Present. 9 MR. SINGH: And Commissioner Toledo? 10 CHAIR TOLEDO: Present. 11 MR. SINGH: The roll call is complete. 12 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you, Ravi. I will start by 13 sharing a little bit about the Commission. Every ten 14 years after the Federal government publishes updated 15 Census information, California must redraw the boundaries 16 of its Congressional, State Senate, State Assembly, and 17 State Board of Equalization Districts so that the 18 districts correctly reflect the state's population. 19 In 2008, California voters authorized the creation 20 of the commission when they passed the Voter's FIRST Act. 21 It authorized the Commission to draw the new district 22 lines for State Senate, State Assembly and State Board of 23 Equalization Districts. In 2010, the Congressional 24 Voter's FIRST Act added the responsibility of drawing 25 Congressional Districts to the Commission. The fourteenmember commission is made up of five Republicans, five

Democrats and four not affiliated with either of those

parties.

The Commission must draw the district lines in conformity with strict nonpartizan rules designed to create districts of relatively equal proportion and population that will provide better representation for all Californians. When we receive Census data, the Commission begins drawing maps using six line drawing criteria as outlined in the California Constitution. One of these is minimizing the division of counties, cities, neighborhoods and communities of interest to the extent possible.

We can obtain the city and county information from those jurisdictions but we need neighborhood and communities of interest information from Californians directly. That's why we have launched these communities of interest input forums to get that valuable information from you directly. We encourage all Californians to participate in this process.

If you would rather submit community of interest input over the internet, you can do so from our website or by visiting drawmycacommunity.org. Skip the line and go online.

Now I will call on all Commissioners to introduce

1 afternoon, California. We're looking forward to hearing from all of you. My name is Linda Akutagawa, and I am coming from the beaches of Southern California in 3 4 Huntington Beach and look forward to hearing about your 5 counties. CHAIR TOLEDO: Commissioner Jane Andersen? 6 7 COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Good afternoon, California. 8 And particularly the -- those in the counties to our 9 North Del Norte, Humboldt, Trinity, Mendocino, Lake, 10 Sonoma, and Napa. I'm coming to you from the Bay Area, 11 Berkeley, California, and I'm really looking forward to 12 hearing from Californians about themselves. Can't wait. 13 Thank you very much. 14 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you, Commissioner Andersen. 15 Commissioner Alicia Fernandez? 16 COMMISSIONER FERNANDEZ: (Speaking Spanish). Good 17 afternoon, California. I'm from YOLO County and I'm very 18 excited to hear about our -- from our counties to the 19 west and north. So yes, please, as Commissioner Ahmad 20 said, keep them coming and also go to our website and you 21 can -- there's many ways for you to submit your input. 22 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you, Commissioner Fernandez. Commissioner Neal Fornaciari? 2.3 24 COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: Good morning, California 25 in the north coast. Really excited to hear today all

1 about your communities of interest and what's important 2 to you. Thanks for joining us. 3 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you. Commissioner Ray Kennedy. 4 COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Thank you, Chair. 5 Kennedy. I live in Morongo Valley, which is a Joshua Tree Gateway Community in rural San Bernardino County. 6 7 moved here a year ago after living in Palm Springs for fifteen years. Very much looking forward to hearing 8 9 about communities in the northern part of the state. 10 Thank you so much. 11 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you. Commissioner Antonio Le Mons? 12 13 Commissioner Sara Sadhwani? 14 COMMISSIONER SADHWANI: Good afternoon, California. 15 So glad to be here. Looking forward to learning a lot 16 more about our northern counties today from all of our callers. I'm calling in today from Pasadena, California. 17 18 I'm looking forward to hearing from everyone. Thank you 19 so much. 20 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you. 21 Commissioner Patricia Sinay? 22 COMMISSIONER SINAY: (Speaking Spanish). Good 23 afternoon, California. It's such an honor to hear from 24 you about your community. I'm Patricia Sinay from San

Diego. (Speaking Spanish) the San Diego.

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1 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you. Commissioner Trena Turner? COMMISSIONER TURNER: Good morning, California. 3 4 Commissioner Trena Turner calling in today from Fresno, 5 California, representing the amazing Central Valley where it's over 100 degrees today. And all of the rest of our 6 7 Californians, looking forward to hearing from you today. CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you. 8 Commissioner Angela Vazquez? 10 COMMISSIONER VAZQUEZ: Good afternoon. I'm Angela 11 Vasquez. I'm coming to you today from Los Angeles, 12 California. I'm very much looking forward to hearing 13 your input today. Thanks so much. 14 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you. 15 Commissioner Russell Mark Yee? 16 COMMISSIONER YEE: Greetings, California, and 17 especially those in the Northwest. I'm Commissioner 18 Russell Yee here in my hometown in Oakland. And Oakland 19 in the northwest have something in common that is 20 redwoods, except that we have only one and only one 21 virgin of growth, redwood left, old survivor, which you 22 can see to my right. Whereas you have whole forests and 2.3 the greatest forests. 24 It's been way too long since I've been up there to 25 enjoy those forests. So whether you're on the -- right

on the coast there or a little bit further inland, we look forward to hearing from you today.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you, Commissioner Yee.

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And I'm Pedro Toledo. I coming to you from

Petaluma, California. This is home for me. My parents

immigrated here in the 1950s and were prosperous here in

Sonoma County and have had a long -- lifelong connection

to this area. So really happy to be your Chair today and

to learn more about the communities of interest from

across the north coast.

With that, this meeting is primarily focused on the meetings of interest, testimony focused on Del Norte,
Humboldt, Mendocino, Lake, Napa, Sonoma and Trinity
Counties and surrounding areas. However, anyone in
California can call in to provide input. General
comments will take place at the end of the meeting.

Today, we're joined by our line drawing team,

HaystaqDNA and Q2 Data and Research. We'll be displaying

a map of the area that attendees describe. Please start

with the area you would like to discuss and be as

specific as possible about the boundaries of where your

community is located.

It is our goal to find the area on the map you would like to discuss prior to your testimony. If you are within a specific neighborhood or a large city, please



mention it by name. Once we're able to locate your area.

Your three-minute testimony will begin. Attendees will

not be able to share their own screen.

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We also are joined by Katy, our comment moderator, who will be introducing attendees when it is their turn to speak. When you join the meeting, please use the raise and the button at the bottom of your screen to enter the queue. If you have registered for a timeslot, we encourage you to call in during your appointment time block -- time slot.

When it is your time -- when it's your turn to speak, Katy our comment moderator will be identifying you by your assigned unique ID number. You will be reconnected to this session with the ability to enable your own video and/or audio.

The comment moderator will sign your speaker order number before you begin speaking and please make a note of this for future reference. You will be able to use this number to identify your community of interest testimony on our website at a future date. The commission will be enforcing a three-minute time limit with a warning at thirty seconds and fifteen seconds remaining.

At the beginning of your input, you will see a map on the screen. Please remind the mapper what area you

would like to see on the screen and be as specific as possible about the boundaries of where your community is located.

Are there nearby areas you don't want to be included in a district with? Why or why not? Has your community come together to advocate for important services, better schools, roads, health centers in your neighborhood?

online. Submit your COI input today.

MS. SCOTT: Yeah. Hi.

PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Go ahead.

MS. SCOTT: First of all, this is a wonderful opportunity and thank you. It's cloudy and cool on the coast. My name is Barbara Scott and I am in Zone A at The Sea Ranch, which is in the very northern part of Sonoma County, bordering right on Mendocino.

My husband and I have lived in Sonoma County for seventeen years since we retired and moved up here from San Diego. We were drawn to this area for many reasons, its rural nature, its very strong sense of community, strong desire to preserve our coast to cite a few.

Here at Sea Ranch, we have bluffs, beaches, forests and abundant wildlife. We protect nature's gifts. We even have a seal docent program to monitor the harbor seals during birthing season. We have over forty miles of hiking trails and a vibrant equestrian center.

1 Neighbors take care of each other here.

Volunteers work hundreds of hours preserving our way of life. There's a community garden, the Posh Squash, which grows fruit, vegetables and flowers. Your work on redistricting is critical to meet the needs of all the constituents. Our very strong wish is that no changes will be made to our current division.

We believe that Humboldt, Del Norte, Mendocino, Sonoma, and Marin Counties must remain together. We share many services -- I lost my voice --that depend on all remaining connected.

These counties are contiguous from Marin all the way to the Oregon border. Protection of the ocean is paramount. Mendocino and Sonoma also share health facilities. The ambulance service, the hospital, and our local clinic in Molalla.

I belong to a group that supports local schools from Jenner to Elk. We tutor, we mentor students, we help families, we deliver food to families who qualify on a federal program.

The coast is precious to us. It's a resource. And through our present connections, we will strive to protect it, our environment and our way of life. And I hope you will take this into consideration. And thank you so much for your time. I'm done.

MR. BURTLEBOW: Thank you. This is Steve Burtlebow (ph.). I live in the Rincon Valley, which is in in Santa Ros a, on the east side of Santa Rosa. I am very interested in the in the coast. And at the moment, our county is upgrading its -- or updating its local coastal plan.

So I'm in the area of Santa Rosa. If you can see my pointer, that is in the upper, right-hand corner. It is a -- an area that is connected both with the Sonoma Valley, which goes down toward Kenwood and the city of Santa Rosa, which is primarily to the west of us.

We -- we value the coast as a place that we can visit frequently. And we want to see that the coastal areas remain in a single district. As the speaker before me has said, this district has customarily gone all the

way from Marin County to the Oregon border. And -- and many of the issues along the coast require an understanding of what's going to the north, what's going

to the south.

- We also have had a serious issue of wildfires.

 And -- and that is something that unites Mendocino and

 Sonoma and Lake Counties, all of which have suffered

 those -- those experiences. So my -- my thinking about

 redistricting is that to the extent you can continue

 people in their current district, they become acquainted

 with their representatives. And any time you shift

 people from one district to another, you're interfering

 with that connection.
- So to the extent that you can maintain the existing districts from here to the Oregon border, please do so. Thank you for this opportunity.

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MR. SIMMONS: Hi everyone. Can you focus in on Humboldt, Del Norte and Trinity Counties? My name is Matthew Simmons, and I live in Humboldt County in Arcata, California. And I wanted to talk today about why these three counties are a community of interest. And the reason is that they're linked together by rivers and roads.

So first of all, if you look at Trinity County, the Trinity River, which starts in the mountains and Trinity County flows into Humboldt County that links up with the Klamath River and eventually enters the Sea in Del Norte County. The Trinity River therefore forms a community of interest that links these three counties together.

There's common interests associated with the river, including fisheries and rafting and water -- water quality and -- and so that all links those together. And then the other big thing that links these three communities together are roads. If you're located in Del Norte County, all of the major roads head south into Humboldt County.

Even though Del Norte borders Siskiyou to the east, you actually can't take any major roads into Siskiyou County. And the vast majority of traffic is heading

north to south or south to north between Del Norte and Humboldt.

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The same goes for Trinity. Highway 299 links

Trinity and Humboldt again together. And so all of that,

all these connections together form these three counties

into one community of interest that shares a lot of

common cultural interests and you know, common economic

interests.

And you know, it goes on more than that. Del Norte and Humboldt have the Humboldt and Redwood National and State Parks, which link them together as a community of interest. And Del Norte and Humboldt are both famous for being home to some of the largest old growth redwood groves left in the entire state. Yeah, I think that's enough for my comments, but thank you for this opportunity.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you, Mr. Simmons.

PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. Right now we will have 001. I'd like to ask those who have called in to please press star 9 to raise your hand indicating you wish to comment. Please press star 9 raising your hand indicating you wish to comment. That is for those that have called in by telephone. But right now we have 001.

CURLEY O'BRIEN: Can we focus on Mendocino, 6 7 Lake, Napa and Sonoma, please? Great. Good afternoon. My name is Molly Curley O'Brien, and I am the director of 8 9 grants and government programs at Rebuild North Bay 10 Foundation, an organization committed to serving Lake, 11 Mendocino, Napa, and Sonoma Counties in both wildfire 12 resilience and recovery efforts. 13 We know that in California, 2020 was the state's 14 worst wildfire season on record. And of the twenty most 15 destructive wildfires in California's history, six have 16 occurred in our organization's region in the last five 17 years, with four of those specific within Sonoma County 18 where our headquarter quarters are located. Here's the 19 thing, statewide, forty percent of forested lands are 20 privately owned. However, the percentage is much higher 21 here in the North Bay. 22 For example, only eleven percent of the land in 23

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the funds, coordination and expertise to both address this forest management challenge and make sure their properties, vegetation management projects, are shovel ready.

They are eager. They want to protect their land and their neighbors land, but need help doing so and also need the right representation at the state level to be supported in these efforts.

What are we doing about this in our region now? For example, the North Bay Forest Improvement Program is an innovative landowner incentives pilot program funded by a \$1.5 million from Cal Fire's Wildfire Resiliency and Forestry Assistance Grant.

It supports planning and implementation of projects on private forested lands to reduce wildfire risk and also provides financial incentives for landowners to conduct this critical work with a focus on serving disadvantaged communities, specifically in Mendocino and Lake. The project is moving forward, making an impact, but we could collectively be doing more.

So how do these fire needs relate to redistricting? State representatives partnering with us to successfully mitigate our fire risk and equip us to take on these significant challenges will mean a lot.

To the Commissioners, I respectfully call on your



team to further support landowners in this pursuit by making sure representation at the State level is both accurately aware and actively supporting this important work moving forward.

We ask you to ensure California is more fire safe and resilient by drawing districts that will keep our fire hazard in areas united. Specifically North and East Sonoma County with Napa Lake and Mendocino counties. And if Santa Rosa can't be kept whole, then the northern and eastern regions of the city with greater fire risk --

MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds.

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MS. CURLEY O'BRIEN: -- north and north and eastern counties who share similar risks and needs for resilience. This is a sure bet way to build resilience against the megafires that we have come to accept as normal. Nothing about this is normal and there is much more within our --

MR. MANOFF: Fifteen seconds.

MS. CURLEY O'BRIEN: -- control to do something about. Thank you for the opportunity to share what we are doing to protect our communities and regions and how our state can play an even more integral role within these efforts.

16	In order to maximize transparency and public
17	participation in our process, the Commissioners will be
18	taking community of interest input by phone. To call in,
19	dial the telephone number provided on the livestream
20	feed. It is 877-853-5247. When prompted, enter the
21	meeting ID number provided on the livestream feed. It is

23	Once you have when you prompt when prompted to
24	enter a participant ID simply press the pound key. Once

on the map to discuss, please, let the mapper know what that area is. And with that, the floor is yours.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I wanted to speak to the Smith River and Crescent City area in Del Norte County. In March of 2011, the tsunami hit the Northern California coast and wiped out the Crescent City Harbor. At that time, I was the president of the senior center board, and as we discovered during the emergency that the senior center kitchen was the designated FEMA kitchen.

The evacuated individuals and families went to the high school on higher, safer ground, and the kitchen was not available to feed the evacuees. Working with the Red Cross, we organized the hot meals to be delivered.

The point of this is that I was in the Board of Supervisors' chambers the next morning with the disaster relief organizer, local elected officials and two of the three district representatives, along with Governor Brown's emergency service person from Sacramento. The person not there was a representative that only had one coastal county in their district. The two, including the representative that traveled during the twenty-four-hour critical period from Washington, D.C. to Crescent City, managed to be there because they understood the counties in the coastal districts.

This was before the redistricting that that took the

the Del Norte to Marin County districts were implemented

3 and they worked. The example is that when a

4 representative is so far removed from these large rural

5 areas, they don't know the challenges about traveling in

6 | a timely manner to get to that area during a disaster.

I've been listening to some of the redistricting commission meetings and testimony from other zones, and I know that has been stated that people don't want their current districts changed until you have the Census data and hear the voices of the residents, we don't know how

you are finding that the Northern California coastal

the districts will change. But if you're looking -- if

districts need to expand, please look at the populated

15 counties and leave the Marin to Del Norte coastal

16 districts intact.

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We have many communities that are tied together.

18 Highway 101 is the lifeline to the northern counties

19 from -- from Marin and Sonoma counties. Caltrans, CTA

20 Board Districts, health care districts, community

21 college, the area on aging that I worked with that came

22 out of -- based out of Humboldt County, all run to the

23 north to south.

We need to keep 101 Corridor through these together and fire districts. And how they work with each other

1 within the different counties is a huge situation --MR. and I would like to assert, as the last caller did, to

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keep Marin with the North Coast District all the way up to Del Norte. Our reasons are many. Well, I -- well, certainly we do share a bay coastline with the East Bay and with San Francisco.

We already have ABAG and BCDC to take care of those interests around the bay shoreline. But Marin County shares economic interests as well as its values with the north coast, we share different values from a heavily urbanized area. I'd like to say that we are separated by the Golden Gate Bridge from San Francisco and the Richmond San Rafael Bridge from the East Bay.

It makes much more sense to keep the 101 Corridor intact. We have historically shared a State Assemblyman, a State Senator, and a U.S. Congressional Representative. We have been well-served in that arrangement for the last ten years. I see no reason to change it.

Marin has agricultural interests that it shares with the counties going north along the coast. It has a recreational interest that are broad and diverse, but very different from those that are in the city -- cities.

We are distinctive for a different kind of tourism than that which is -- attracts people to San Francisco and the East Bay. Much more natural, use of the park, uses of open space, high value surrounding open space and its uses and beauty.

1 Let's see, what else we have here. We also share an interest in disaster preparedness. We are -- Marin County has a great risk of wildfires too, so it makes 3 4 sense keeping us together with the other counties that 5 share that -- those threats. Let's see --Thirty seconds. 6 MR. MANOFF: 7 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- that's about all I have to say at this time. I would like to be able to come in -chip in, in the future. And I'm also concerned that 10 the -- I feel the outreach has been entirely inadequate 11 to the public. There have been very few --12 MR. MANOFF: Fifteen seconds. 13 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- notices in the press. 14 very concerned about that. And I'd like to make 15 people -- make sure people know about the important work 16 that you're doing. Thank you. 22	live in the unincorporated area of Sonoma County, north
23	of Sebastopol, in more of the western coastal area. What
24	I would like to say, in addition to all of the issues

that have already been raised about maintaining the

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continuity of the coastal counties, which included, you know, forests, coasts, our water availability issues, fires, all those things are critically important to the counties in the north coast area of California.

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But in addition to that, there are communities of interest that include farms and agriculture. Immigrant services are provided in the north coast area that are different than what is provided in other parts of the more urbanized part of the state.

The -- the area in the north coast is really distinct from the -- any of the area south of the Golden Gate Bridge, where it's more urbanized right up to the ocean. And we have a much more rural area that really has a community of interest requirement in order to maintain the -- the kinds of -- the kinds of amenities and the open space that are really desirable on the north coast.

We also have transportation issues in common. Many things have been already listed, but I really want to encourage you to consider the entire north coast as one common interest area because of the multitude of communities of interest that we share. Thank you very much and thanks so much for your service on this.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your comments.

 Kathryn Murray and I live in Crescent City, California,

 in Del Norte County. And we -- we would -- I agree with

 the last speaker that it's critical that we stay within

 the coastal region for representation for a number of

 reasons.
- I was the Mayor of Crescent City in 2011 or 2012 and president of the Redwood Division of California League of

Cities during my tenure as council member and Mayor. And I was born and raised in Humboldt County.

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So I've always thought of Del Norte as kind of my backyard. And over the years, with my experience being involved with our community, I realize how critical it is for us to stay with within our current congressional district.

We have a major road issue, which I don't know if anyone else has brought up, but it is Last Chance Grade and we have wonderful representatives working because this is going to probably cost one million dollars to repair. And right now we have two to four-hour delays on that road and it's critical for businesses. We have a lot of dairy and other types of businesses that we work with Humboldt County on, and that road is the only way to get from there to here.

We also have our identity. We have College of the Redwoods, which is along the coast. We have a branch here. We also have our community wellness center, which was originated in Humboldt County. And -- and we have a couple of -- several tribes. And we also have the state and national parks. And one year ago when I was on the Chamber of Commerce Board, our motto was "Where the Redwoods Need to See". It's not "Where the Redwoods Meet I-5".

1	So our identity as a coastal community is critical
2	to who we are in terms of our our pride. We attract
3	tourists this way. So it's an economic factor for us.
4	We don't really have anything in common with the counties
5	east to us. We also are in damming the Klamath River,
6	and I know that the farmers over to the east of us would
7	prefer that we have the dams for their farms, which is
8	understandable, but it's critical to the habitat that we
9	have them for our fishery to keep the get the Klamath
10	Dams undammed.
11	So I I I'm really excited that I have an
12	opportunity
13	MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds.
14	MS. MURRAY: to speak, and I hope that you will
15	take everyone's speaking into consideration. We
16	appreciate you taking the time to listen to us and share
17	our values and our concerns. Thank you very much.
18	CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your comments.
19	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. Up
20	next, we have a caller with the last four 8689. That's
21	caller 8689. If you will, please follow the prompts to

23	Caller 8689, you are currently unmuted. I have a

for future reference. Please let the mapper know what area you will discuss today. And with that, the floor is yours.

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UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Hi. If you could zoom in on Humboldt, Trinity, and Mendocino Counties. I am a resident of Humboldt County and I'm calling to talk about the agricultural interests that bind together this region. So first, Humboldt, Mendocino, and Trinity County form what is called the Emerald Triangle.

Since the 1960s, cannabis farmers have been growing cannabis in this region because of the wild and rugged hills, and the remote rural location made law enforcement difficult when this was still an illicit industry. And this has helped influence the culture of this region. So it is a largely cash-based economy historically, and it has spurred a notable counterculture -- cultural kind of resonance between all of these areas.

Now that we have a legal cannabis market, all of our counties are also working together to try to figure out a way that we can have a cannabis economy and environmental impact regulations and have these two things coexist. So it's important for us as -- as a -- as a cannabis community to have our interests represented together in Trinity, Humboldt, and Mendocino counties.

Additionally, something that binds very together are

our Timberlands. We are the largest timber producing area of The State and the management issues facing

Timberland are generally similar here and more similar here than they are further inland.

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So here we have the same sort of resource management concern, like preservation of our northern spotted owls and -- and other things like fire regimes are similar between all of these areas.

This region is also starting to grow its small winery businesses. So Humboldt County in particular is really growing in interest in wineries. And this invites us to Mendocino County and Sonoma County to the south of us. So as climate change is going to affect agriculture in our region from warmer temperatures to less precipitation, it's important that we are bound together because we are better able to mitigate and adapt when we are together.

So this part of Northwest California is very rural.

We are different though, in our ruralness than other

parts of California. We have a strong local

environmental protection. We have about --

MT. MANOFF: Thirty seconds.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- and we have a concern about climate change. And that is something that binds us together in the northern part of Zone A as one

1 community of interest. Thank you. 2 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your comments. 3 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. And 4 I'd like to remind those who just called in, to please 5 press star 9 to raise your hand indicating you wish to comment. Please press star 9 indicating you wish to 6 comment. 7 Caller with the last four 9200, you are up right 9 now. Caller with the last four 9200, please follow the 10 prompts to unmute by pressing star 6 on your keypad. 11 Caller 9200, you are unmuted. I have a couple of 12 brief instructions. Your speaker order number will be 13 Number 10. If you will please make note of that for 14 future reference. And if you will, please, let the 15 mapper know what area you will discuss today. With that, 16 the floor is yours. Go ahead. 17 MR. ENRIQUE: Thank you. My name is Elliot Enrique 18 (ph.) and I'm calling -- I'm a lifelong resident of 19 Sonoma County. And I live in the unincorporated areas of 20 Sonoma County. And I'm calling to urge the Commission to 21 do what it can to not split the Latino community when 22 drawing the new lines.

The Latino community, Latinx community people

deserve to have their voices heard. And currently our

communities have been split into multiple State and

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1 Federal Districts.

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If we can keep the Latino community unified, that we -- would that would greatly help to get our voices heard and increase the possibility we could elect a Latino to office within our region. Specifically,

6 Latinos are concentrated in the Southwest Santa Rosa,

7 Roseland, Rohnert Park, Windsor and in the City of

8 Sonoma. Thank you for your time.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your comments.

PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. And again, for those in the queue, please press star 9 indicating you wish to comment. If you wish to comment at this time. And Chair, we do not have any raised hands at this time. I will defer to you.

With that, I'm going to -- do we have -- Katy do we have any callers on the line? I know folks are probably dialing in.

PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Chair, we do not have any callers at this time.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Okay. But that will take a couple of minutes and I'm going to do something new.

I'm going to invite Commissioners to share memories about the north coast and your experiences at the North Coast, starting with Commissioner Fernandez. So if you have memories, of course they shouldn't be around lines

and line drawings. They should just be memories from this area and maybe vacations. I know many of you have come to this area and -- and if you could just share your experience or your, you know, your memory, of course, hopefully positive.

COMMISSIONER FERNANDEZ: Great. Thank you. I think my very first memory of the coastals was growing up being a first generation and a child of immigrants.

We didn't -- we didn't have vacations. So this was the first time we were going to have an overnight because one of our relatives had rented a house on the coast.

And I want to say it was in Sonoma County because it was in the Windsor area, and it was the most remarkable memory that I had -- that I have at that time because I'd never been to the coast.

So it was just so beautiful. It was very cold, I will say that much, but it was just so beautiful and clean and just the nature and everything that was just -- just so fresh. So yeah, just great memories. And so I'll go from that then to my adult life when I actually took a road trip from Sacramento to Crescent City and one of our callers is from Crescent City, that was Caller Number 8. And just the drive up there was so beautiful.

And you went through so many different communities and just the natural -- the forest, and then you had the

1 agriculture. It's just all -- I mean, I'll have to say, it's God's country and it's beautiful and thank you for 3 sharing it. Thank you for preserving it. And I will just let another Commissioner share their stories. 4 5 you for this opportunity. CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you, Commissioner Fernandez. 6 7 Any other Commissioner want to share their -- their memories of -- of the North Bay? 8 9 Commissioner Kennedy? 10 COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Thank you, Chair. Many years 11 ago, I enjoyed some vacation time in Sonoma County 12 watching wildlife along the coast and enjoying the river. 13 And then more recently, I had the opportunity to make the 14 drive from Santa Rosa up to -- up into Lake County and 15 back through Mendocino County and down the 101 back to 16 Santa Rosa. 17 And I really enjoyed my -- I took an afternoon and just drove all the way around the lake in Lake County. 18 19 And just very interesting to see how the different -- or 2.0 how the different communities around the lake differed 21 from each other as you as you drove. I was driving 22 clockwise around the lake and just great scenery, nice 2.3 communities. Thanks. 24 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you, Commissioner Kennedy.

COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Oh, and I did -- I did -- on

- the drive from Lake County over into Mendocino County, I
 did, of course, see the damage. So very aware of that as
 well.
- 4 CHAIR TOLEDO: Certainly.
- 5 | Commissioner Fornaciari?

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- COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: Thank you. Yeah, I have a lot of memories of that area. My earliest memories -- my uncle's uncle had a -- a house on Clear Lake, and we spent a number of summers at his house learning how to fish, learning how to water ski, just having a great time. My wife and I spent our honeymoon up in Mendocino at the Hill House. It's also featured in Murder, She Wrote as the Hill House of Cabot Cove.
- And so we -- we stayed there. We stayed there a few times. The River -- The Sea Ranch, my boss had a cabin up at the Sea Ranch, so we stayed there a number of times. And we've also spent quite a bit of time in Sonoma County, and Marin County and Napa County. So it's -- it's -- we spent an awful lot of time up there and north coast. It's a great place to visit.
- 21 CHAIR TOLEDO: Any other Commissioner?
- 22 Commissioner Sinay?
- COMMISSIONER SINAY: Thank you for letting us share our memories. Having lived in the Bay Area, I've
- 25 obviously been to Napa Valley and Sonoma for girl's

1 | weekends and couple weekends and things like that.

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But that the -- the north coastal is dear to my family because my daughter's godmother lives up there and her godmother daughter is my goddaughter. So we share -- our families are intimately connected and they live in Santa Rosa.

And when Anne got married it was truly special because she had eight flower girls. She had no -- it was all flower girls and -- and ring bearers and we their reception was on the coast. And it was the most fun these kids have ever had. And the adults had fun, too. But it was just an amazing, beautiful experience.

And we love going up to visit them, going to the Schulz Museum and the children's museums up there and just enjoying the nature. They have been evacuated twice because of fires from their homes. So we -- we feel very connected to those fears that the community has lived through as well.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you.

And Commissioner Andersen?

COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Thank you. Well, you know, living in Berkeley, I have the chance to go to Marin, Sonoma, Napa all the time and have many, many, many memories from a long time ago and currently, you know, diving off the coast and then, you know, I've also had

the pleasure of driving up and down, also taking the train all the way up and down the coast.

And you know, from setting out on the Del Norte

Bluffs to whale watching off Mendocino, camping in Camp

Mendocino Campgrounds, the roads to Rhododendron grove

there, Timber Cove, Sea Ranch. So there's, you know,

many, many, many. But as my very earliest ones is I had

a dear friend who was from Crescent City. And this is

when I did not -- we did not live in California at all

the time.

And I heard the stories of the Easter Sunday earthquake in Alaska and the Crescent City, how it was badly damaged and had twelve-foot, I think it was twelve or maybe twenty-foot and change in the water -- in the tide and how it just destroyed, you know, Crescent City. And then I've had many earthquake memories of being up around Mendocino.

And so I'm a structural engineer. So those all pertain, you know, I think of those quite often. But then my next earlier when I was in my teens and we drove through the tree -- the redwood -- big redwood tree in the car, and there was a camper or it was small camper Volkswagen van in front of us. And the woman with her children who was driving got stuck and didn't know what to do. And my father got out and helped her drive

1 through it. And then we all had a picnic together.

We didn't know who they were or anything at about them but we had a picnic together in their marvelous campgrounds afterwards. So I have many, many wonderful memories from this area, and it's a pleasure to be able to hear from people from this area.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for sharing. Anybody else want to share?

Commissioner Yee?

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COMMISSIONER YEE: Yes. So many memories of the north coast. Like Commissioner Fornaciari, my wife and I actually spent part of our honeymoon in the north coast starting off in Bodega Bay going up to Mendocino and elsewhere.

Many trips since then backpacking River. National
Park. Humboldt redwoods. And Staying the Lost Coast.
Wow. That's a way to get far away from everything. And
also having opportunities to run three different
marathons in the area of new the Giants in Humboldt
Redwoods, Santa Rosa Marathon, I ran twice and then most
recently a do-it-yourself marathon I ran and included San
Quinton, San Rafael in and around there.

There's so many good memories and I always like to go to Point Reyes. Oh, my goodness. Wow. Just amazing and beautiful. But also all the cities and little towns

1 and all the farmland and you know, some urban pockets and all their concerns. And so we certainly want to keep 3 hearing from all the different residents of the north 4 coast and hear what's on your minds. Thank you. 5 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you, Commissioner Yee. 6 Anyone else want to share? 7 COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: Commissioner Toledo, isn't that the Point Reyes lighthouse in your picture? 8 9 CHAIR TOLEDO: That is the Point Reyes Lighthouse. 10 And so I'll share since no one else is -- wants to share 11 at this time. 12 So I-- I actually came -- you know, my -- my father 13 came to Sonoma County as a farm worker in the '50s. And 14 he -- but I wasn't born until the late '70s. And so by 15 that time they had moved to Alameda, the City of Alameda. 16 And it wasn't until after -- after I had finished my, you 17 know, college studies and graduate school that I came up to Sonoma County and -- and actually my father had passed 18 19 away and -- and I wanted to connect with, you know, with 20 his agrarian past. 21 And so I came up to Sonoma county and started 22 working for the Redwood Community Health Coalition. 23 you know, the first time -- and I remember driving up to 24 Sonoma County and I certainly had visited prior, but

coming up to move in I remember thinking, oh, my gosh,

this is so different than -- than, you know, what I had been used to in in the Bay Area.

And I remember seeing the cows and all of the cultural land. And -- and this is what's -- this was going to be home. Right. And so -- and my house was a little farmhouse. Actually, it's a pretty big farmhouse with a septic and well and for someone who, you know, grew up in the city, that was, you know, that was different. And I had to get used to septic and well and -- and everything that comes along with country living, including gophers and wild turkey is everywhere.

smell. And I think you smell this in Davis too, and sometimes with, you know, the cow -- it's a cow smell and -- and so in the evening getting used to this. And now I don't even smell it because it's -- it's normal. And it's such a great place. And I've had the opportunity to go up and down the north coast through my years here and -- and just love -- love it. It's home. It feels home.

And the smell of -- we call it Petaluma -- Petaluma

People here are so welcoming. And it's so beautiful and I feel so fortunate to be -- be able to live and work in the north coast. And certainly it's an area that has had a lot of issues in the last couple of years, including now we've had two, three major fires in the

last couple of years in the Sonoma County area. And having to respond to the thousands upon thousands of evacuees coming from all over was a challenge.

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And I remember waking up -- it was at the time when I used to wake up at 4 o'clock in the morning to go to the gym. Once upon a time, I used to do that. And I guess it was a couple of years ago, because I was seventeen. And so I woke up and there were all these people driving around and I could smell smoke, but I didn't quite know what it was. And of course, I was summoned into the health center because we would we're going to open up for the evacuees who are, you know, who were impacted.

And -- and I mean, to some extent, we've -- because we've been we've been very fortunate in Petaluma not to have fires directly in the city of Petaluma. Most of them have happened farther north. The evacuations of them have tended to be in Sonoma and Marin counties.

And so this is these are the areas where the evacuees from -- from up north in lake counties have tended to come or will go for -- for shelter and for emergency response. So it's just a lovely place.

Anyone else want to share their stories, if they have any?

Oh, Commissioner Fernandez?



COMMISSIONER FERNANDEZ: I'll share a little. Sorry about that. I forget that I'm in the office today. So I did want to share. I know one of the callers was talking about the Latino communities. And I do -- many of my tios and tias from Mexico, they immigrated to Windsor, Petaluma and Santa Rosa.

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And so we -- we kept those connections. And I would say at least once a month, you know, my dad would load up the car with all ten of us and we'd go visit our cousins in in that area and we'd head to a park or head to whatever.

But for me, it was -- it just brings back good
memories in terms of family and the culture. And yes, I
did have the wonderful smells of the cows, but we also
get those in Yolo County. So it was very familiar sound.
I don't know if I want to call it comforting, but it is a
familiar sound.

And we did have one of my uncles and aunts, they also were on a dairy farm. So that was something different that I'd never been exposed to. But it was -- it's just -- every time I think of that area, it just brings back very good memories. So again, just super happy that I was able to experience that.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Sorry, I believe we have a caller on -- in the queue. I just want to highlight that we

1 will be sharing memories as time permits here in this 2 session, but also in future sessions as time permits. 3 So with that, Katy, please open up the phone line. PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: I would like to just 4 5 verify that 007 is ready at this time to make their comment by using the raise your hand option at the bottom 6 7 part of your screen. And there is the raised hand. 10 11 007, I'm promoting you now. 007, your speaker order 12 number will be Number 11. If you are, please make note 13 of that for future reference. You can now enable your 14 audio and video in the lower left of your screen. 15 you'll please run the mapper of what area you would like 16 to see. With that, the floor is yours. Go ahead. 17 MS. GRIFFITH: Hi there. My name is Caroline 18 Griffith (ph.). I live in Humboldt County in Eureka. 19 we're kind of looking at the map area that I want to see. 20 Yeah, right there. 21 So I guess when -- when describing where I live to 22 people I think one of the first things that I say is 23 Humboldt County. We do feel cohesiveness as a county, as 24 a rural, coastal, and also heavily redwood forested 25

county.

Another way that I would describe our community is really just the north coast. So I would say that we do identify with areas to the north and the south, Del Norte and Mendocino really because of the same rugged coastline, some of the same industries related to the coast. Also, similar threats due to climate change. I guess all of the north coast really has that same threat there.

Another way that I do really describe where I live to people is the Emerald Triangle. Humboldt, Trinity and Mendocino Counties where historically where cannabis was grown -- black market cannabis.

The industry has now shifted to being legal, but it's still a big part of our economy here is that. There are also areas that were traditionally really heavily impacted by timber and logging, and now the economies have really shifted more towards cannabis agriculture in general.

We do have wine growing regions in Trinity County and also a lot of outdoor recreation. That is a big part of our economy and our just lifestyle here in Humboldt County. And I think because of this, there's also a really heightened awareness of our environment and the risk to our environment. And much like the state, we're impacted by drought. But that is definitely a huge issue

up here.

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And with our water, the water that would be coming especially from Trinity County out into the coastal areas being funneled to the Central Coast, I think that's a -- that's a really big issue that kind of brings us all together is water issues here in this region.

I think that, you know, when talking about like areas that we do or do not want to be put together with, we do have a lot more in common with other coastal north coast areas versus the more inland counties like Siskiyou, Shasta, Tehama, different political leanings, different environments, different culture. So yeah, right there with that little hand is a very good --

MS. GRIFFITH: -- indicator. And I think also like there is a big emphasis on small agriculture here and small farming --

Thirty seconds.

MR. MANOFF: Fifteen seconds.

MR. MANOFF:

MS. GRIFFITH: -- is something that is important to our area with cattle grapes, organic produce, farming, and of course cannabis are also things that define us.

Thank you very much for the opportunity to speak.

23	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Great. Good afternoon,
24	Commissioners. I am a resident of Trinity County. It is
25	rugged mountainous heavily forested and lies along the

- 1 Trinity River within the Salmon and Klamath Mountains. It should be in a district with Siskiyou, Shasta, Modoc and Lassen Counties because it has more in common with 3 4 them given the type of terrain and extensive wild river 5 and stream system, heavy rain and snowfall than it does with the coastal counties that it's currently connected 6 7 with. Environmentally speaking, beaches and mountains are 8 very different and they should be in separate districts, 10 so the needs of residents are served equally based on 11 their geography. Thank you for allowing me to speak 12 about Trinity County today. 13 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your comments. 14 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 15 with that, Chair, we do not have any other callers this 16 time. 17 CHAIR TOLEDO: Great. With that, let's -- let's

I so appreciate hearing everyone's stories and memories of the region.

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Sadly, I have never traveled north of San Francisco, so I very much look forward to the opportunity to -- to travel to the northern coastal counties as well as other counties up north. But certainly some of your stories of the scent of cows and well water and septic tanks definitely struck a nerve with me.

Where I grew up was -- I actually did not grow up in California. I grew up in western New York in in a very rural area between Buffalo and Rochester, near -- near Native American reservations, and certainly can identify with the scent of cows and -- and growing up with, well water. And we even used to have a natural gas tank on our -- on our property where we would fill -- fill our cars with gas.

So -- so that definitely reminded me of home. And I certainly look forward to the chance to, to travel to some of these places, hopefully in the very near future. And certainly, I hope before we're -- we have to start drawing maps. As I've said before, I'm a big proponent of seeing the places, talking with folks if it's safe to do so, you know, before we have to start drawing. So I'm definitely looking forward to that.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Absolutely. And thank you for

1	sharing.
2	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Chair, real quick
3	CHAIR TOLEDO: Yes?
4	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: This is Katy. I'd like

14	Commissioner Fornaciari, then Sinay.
15	COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: Yeah. I just want to also
16	comment on the on the Charles Schulz Museum in the
17	gift shop. Just an incredible place to go visit. It's
18	really cool.
19	He was from Minnesota and he lived in Santa Rosa
20	after World War II. And he missed ice skating, so he
21	built an ice rink and had the senior world ice ice
22	hockey championships there for years.
23	And the museum and in the gift shop are adjacent to
24	the ice rink there, which is around the corner from his

house. But I think his house burned down in the fire,

and boy, the neighborhood just north of the museum, was completely wiped off the map in the fires. It was incredible to go there and see that.

Oh, and I also wanted to -- two other things.

Tomales Bay is just awesome. Beautiful place to go.

They have some oyster places on the side of the bay and sit out there and eat some oysters and drink a beverage of your choice. And then there's a Marin Sonoma Cheese Trail where you can go cruise around different small cheese manufacturers and eat the product of the Happy cows.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Absolutely. Certainly had oysters and -- and cheese, lots of cheese and oysters.

Commissioner Sinay?

COMMISSIONER SINAY: I was just thinking as folks were talking about the rugged -- you know, how that rugged coastal area I remember driving, we decided to drive from San Francisco all the way up to Eureka on the coast. And I think I was blue most of the way. I mean, I get carsick and that was just not a good way to go.

And once you commit, it's hard to commit because as people were saying. So that's -- that's one of my -- I want to say it is a good memory, even though just remembering it. And then the other is the first time I went to Petaluma learning that that's the arm-wrestling

1 capital of the world. 2 CHAIR TOLEDO: Right. I always wondered about that because I do know that there's a little -- a statute 3 4 with -- with folks arm wrestling. And I always wondered 5 what that was about. So it wasn't until you -- you mentioned that that I found that out. Thank you. 6 7 With that, Katy, do we have any other callers in the 8 queue? 9 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Chair, we do not have any callers at this time. 10 11 I would like to remind those who have called in to 12 please press star 9 raising their hand. I want to make a couple of comments about how I think the current districts are not quite working out. And so we have the Sonoma County being split and it's currently represented by someone from Napa County and then someone from Marin County, at least at the -- at the state level.

And the problem is that both Marin and Napa are very wealthy compared to Sonoma County. And so the interests of Marin County in particular are often the voice of our representative. And I don't feel that much in common with Sausalito, Mill Valley, these very wealthy communities and their diversity problem relative to much more alignment with the coast, with Mendocino County -- even those are places I visit more often than I go down

1 to Sausalito.

2.0

And so to me, Sausalito would be better served by being part of San Francisco than being part of Sonoma County district just because where there's wealth, there's power. And that means that there will be -- continue to be representation by those who can afford to, you know, have people vote for them at the ballot box. Right. And so same is somewhat true for Napa County.

Right?

And so we have a split in -- in my particular region of the North Bay, where we have these wealthier communities that maybe don't have the same alignment and interests as ours, you know. And the thing that really irked me the most was Marin County and our leader there working very hard to get an exemption for the RHNA numbers.

Right? Our -- our affordable housing numbers and to classify Marin County as rural, even though it's fifteen minutes from San Francisco.

MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: And that doesn't align with my priorities at all. And so I just -- in thinking about that, you know, let's have the very wealthy of Marin County be tied in with the very wealthy of San Francisco and allow our rural districts to be --



1 MR. MANOFF: Fifteen seconds. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- really speak with one 3 voice. CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your comments. 4 5 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. like to remind those calling in to please press star 9 to 6 7 raise your hand indicating you wish to comment. And the reason we feel is that American Canyon very much belongs in Napa County is because of so many ties that we have, including our school districts, our immigrant communities, the many, many services that provide for those immigrant communities, health care, afterschool programs, food programs, training programs, farm worker, housing, et cetera. And the businesses that we work in are connected from American Canyon all the way up to Calistoga.

So we just want to make sure that as City of

American Canyons that we consider the gateway to Napa

Valley is kept with all of Napa County, even though the

zip code says it's somewhere else.

I know my own zip code here in the City of Napa says
I am somewhere else. The zip codes don't tell the tale.
So we would very much appreciate if you consider that,
and there may be others as well -- that we preserve our
geographic integrity as one whole Napa County. Thank
you.

PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much.

And as a young boy, I still have memories 2.3 of adventure and just enjoy that whole area so much. 24 Thanks.

So we've found that our representation by being joined to the other north coast counties has been much 6 7 more effective than when we were during the San Francisco. 8 9 And not to denigrate any of the people who represented us at that time, but really we've had much 10 11 more attentive and much more, I think, logical 12 representation in the current district order when we're 13 joined to the north coast. The Trinity flows into 6 7 the Klamath River in Humboldt County. So we would like 8 to stay in the same district as Humboldt so that we don't have to deal with two separate sets of officials when it 10 comes to Federal issues and State issues. And there are 11 a lot of them because they are very regulated rivers and 12 they have endangered species. 13 So I'm asking that you please consider that when you 14 are drawing up a district. They bypassed major population centers to connect basically Sausalito to Del Norte County by bypassing the

And I can't find that right now, but in the Senate district they Bypass Rohnert Park and Pine Grove and Petaluma. And the Assembly District, they bypassed Rohnert Park and connected with the upper reaches of Lake County and parts of the Central Valley. We need to have North Bay districts, two assembly North Bay districts, one State Senate North Bay District and one Congressional North Bay District.

I would suggest that you go by watersheds. So you look at the Russians and you look at the Navarro River as the northern fringes of the Congressional and the State Senate District and works south and east.

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As we noted at the start of our meeting, every ten years after the Federal Government publishes updated

Census information, California must redraw the boundaries of this Congressional, State Senate, State Assembly and

State Board of Equalization Districts so that the districts correctly reflect the state's population.

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Our fourteen-member independent commission was authorized by the California voters to draw the new district lines. We are here today to obtain communities of interest information from Californians directly. We encourage all Californians to participate in this process. While there are no clear rules on how to define a community of interest, we've identified ways for you to describe your community.

You can begin with your county or your city. You can mention the street name to significant locations in your neighborhood to help us identify the parameters of your community.

What are the shared interests of your community?

What brings your community together? What is important to community? Are there nearby areas you want to be in a district with? Are the nearby areas you do not want to be in a district with? And please explain to us why or why not.

Has your community come together to advocate for important services, for better schools, for better roads or health centers? What are the things that can improve your neighborhood? If you'd rather submit COI input over the internet, you can do so from our website at

drawmycacommunity.org. Skip the line and go online.

I will pass this over to Katy, our comment moderator, to config -- to continue with public input.

We will start with the people who are registered and then open the phone lines if there's time before the next session.

MS. MCCLEARY: Well, thank you very much. My name is Patty McCleary, and I live in Hiouchi, which is ten miles east of Crescent City, located in Del Norte County. I believe that our common interest is that Del Norte County be joined with Humboldt, Mendocino and other coastal counties in short, known as the North Coast.

Del Norte, is tied to Humboldt, for example, because of Highway 101, our only road to the rest of California. So one of the activities of interest ongoing is big repair to Last Chance Grade. And so the two communities have been working with Caltrans to repair this essential roadway, which has kind of slid off the it's slid and it's subject to closures.

In addition, Redwood National and State Parks. A significant component of the donor economy spans Del Norte and Humboldt County. Redwoods are found only in coastal counties, and efforts to protect and steward them

1 | are shared values with coastal counties.

Six Rivers National Forest can be found in Del Norte and Humboldt, and we host one of the Six Rivers, the Smith River. Del Norte is home to some of the best remaining salmon and steelhead populations. And protecting and restoring wild salmon fisheries and coastal streams is a common industry and pastime.

We want to be with redwood counties. Northwest
Californians share and love public lands. Del Norte and
Humboldt will be affected by climate change in ways
similar as compared to climate effects in Modoc and
Siskiyou counties. Those counties that are around
Highway 5 and well to the east.

In addition, because Del Norte County is one of the smaller counties in the state, I'd like to point out that because of our small size, we share significant resources found only in Humboldt. For example, the Humboldt RCD consults with our RCD residents of Del Norte County seek hospital and doctor services in Humboldt County. And then there's Humboldt State University, now at Polytechnic.

And we -- I work for Smith River Alliance. We rely on the experts and students at Humboldt State to do a lot of our science and a lot of our work with fisheries. In addition, the public agencies --

1 MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds. 2 MS. MCCLEARLY: -- the public agencies that serve north coast counties include the CDFW North Coast 3 4 Regional Water Quality Control Board. It's a unified 5 management structure. And finally, I wanted to say Del Norte should be grouped with north coast counties like --6 7 MR. MANOFF: Fifteen seconds. MS. MCLEARY: -- Humboldt and Mendocino, not with 9 Tehama, Siskiyou and Shasta County. Transportation, 10 common economies, shared infrastructure, community 11 colleges and hospitals are very important and I hope you 12 consider that. Thank you. 13 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 14 with that, Chair, that is all of our public comment at 15 this time. 16 CHAIR TAYLOR: Excuse me. Forgot to unmute. Number one, they say, we didn't know you were ever that young. And then they're fascinated by the size of

the redwood trees and -- and the fact that you can drive through, I guess, monuments I dare say. So it is -- it is a beautiful, wonderful space.

- I understand -- I understand our community members when they say they want to preserve that area, its value, its importance to -- to the people, to the community members that are there and to -- to Californians as a whole. And it's also wonderful to see the -- (audio interference) remind us we're all in this community together.

I believe that's really important. I think that there's no downplaying how important the coastal identity is to Humboldt County and to its community members. And I believe pairing us up with folks in the east is sort of -- I don't think that we're on quite the same page. I think folks in the east tend to align a bit more with Central California.

So I'm really hopeful that this commission will see to Paris up with folks south and north of us on the coast. I think that's kind of the area we most closely aligned with, particularly with sea level rise affecting us a little stronger on the coast. So I think that tends to be something that's a little more urgently felt for people that live on the coast. And that is the main

1 thing. Okay. Thank you so much for your time and I hope you have a wonderful day. 3 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 4 I'd like to remind those calling in to please press star 5 9 indicating you wish to comment. And I just wanted to share a

few shared interests and that would be we're a rural, small community.

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We are -- we have conservative values. We do have higher poverty levels per capita than California or the nation. We're recreational opportunities with and we also have logging, fishing industry and tourism and we're self-reliant.

We're a conservation area and reduce taxes. that bring us together are outdoor activities. We're family oriented and generational. We have good communal support, community engagement.

We're patriots. We are local autonomy. We share patriotism, self-governance. We are a small-town relationships, friendships and we respect each other

regardless of our political affiliation. And we do also share that we have the lack of health care in this community.

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So what is important to our community is being represented by a Legislature that is sensitive to the real values and needs self-reliance, strong economy, free society and then security, both financial and emotional. So there are — the nearby areas that we believe that we should be linked with would be the Siskiyou-Shasta area. We're similar rural life experiences. We have more in common, I think, than some of the more southern coastal communities.

And specifically with Shasta, we do a lot with the medical, with Mercy Hospital. We -- we have a lot of kids that go from here to Shasta college. And then in the construction industry, we have a lot of companies that actually come out of Shasta County. So the others would be the Lassen, Modoc, Tehama, Sierra, and Humboldt and all our significantly rural areas and are dependent on renewable resources to support our economy.

And we also enjoy a rural economy that results in -against a one size fits all and basically Sacramento
telling us what to do and -- and really has no clue to
the -- where the rural significance that we have. There
are also some areas that are -- we don't want to be

1 paired with --2 MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds. 3 MS. SANDERS: -- would be Sonoma and Marin County. There's no shared values. We have very economic -- our 4 5 economy is very different as far as -- our geographical also would be --6 7 MR. MANOFF: Fifteen seconds. MS. SANDERS: -- we're about six hours apart. 9 rural versus urban and we don't have the representation 10 that can spread and our national resources are very 11 different. So -- and then as far as what we've come 12 together --13 MR. Short. I am calling from Del Norte County. I would just like to voice my opinion in our redistricting discussion here.

I believe that it would be best for Del Norte County that -- if we could revert back to being in District 1 again. We -- a previous caller spoke about our coastal fisheries and our redwoods and how we are compatible with other coastal counties. But I do have a slight rebuttal to that.

We do enjoy a rural lifestyle up here in the very northernmost corner of California. And we enjoy an economy based on renewable resources in addition to our fisheries. And up here being in the northwest corner, we are pretty much left out in District 1 the way the lines are presently drawn. We are at the very top of the district with very little representation. However, I should I should say that Mike McGuire, as our representative does, does a commendable job.

But our -- however, we are at the very top of the district, the way it is presently drawn and are largely well in, in my opinion, are largely kind of forgotten up in this -- this top corner. And few districts in California experience the isolation as far as representation goes like we do.

The -- the -- the previous presentation spoke to

COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: Actually, I was realizing that, Commissioner Taylor, when -- when you were sharing about once being young and taking the pictures amongst the redwood trees, it brought back some real great memories for me too.

When I was a kid, one of the things that my dad used to like to do is we take road trips for our family vacations. That was all I knew for a long time.

And what he would do is he would -- he would have to travel to different locations across California and then into Oregon and Washington. So the way he made it work was we started our family vacations, drive to whatever location nearby he would be, he would work, and then my sister and I and my mom, we would just kind of play. And so a lot of that meant road trips up and down the California coast.

And I remember it just really brought back memories about, you know, going to see the redwoods and just being in awe of how not only how tall it was, but the fact

that, you know, when you're a eight, nine, even seven-year-old kid. You know, the fact that you could drive a car through the redwoods was awe inspiring. And I still remember to this day, you know, staying in Eureka, California, I always thought I'd loved the name Eureka.

Remember staying there and then driving up into

Oregon and through Washington and just visiting a lot of
the national parks. My dad was a big fan of the national
parks and different state parks as well too.

So we did a lot of crisscrossing across the state.

So you know, being up in Humboldt and I'm going to assume that we also went into Del Norte as well too, because of the redwoods, going to Shasta, because of the lake and all that.

That was when I was a kid as a -- I would say as a perhaps as a younger adult, you know, being able to explore Napa and Sonoma with my family or not my family, but with my friends, and more recently, spending some time up in the Sonoma area because my husband -- his cousins, his late cousin's husband, after her passing, moved up to Occidental.

So if you're from the Sonoma area, you can imagine Occidental's like this really little town. And it just really is amazing to see just how much diversity there is in terms of the kind of landscapes, the places that, you

know, is just available, you know, just in our one state. 1 And so just hearing some of what people are calling in to tell us about, it -- it really brings back some great 3 4 memories of a time up there, even when I was a kid. 5 CHAIR TAYLOR: Thank you, Commissioner Akutagawa. Commissioner Andersen, do you have a couple other 6 7 words? COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Well, certainly it's a, you 9 know, huge part of the state and it has, you know, all 10 sorts of memories through these counties. The couple 11 ones that come to mind -- we were talking about, you 12 know, when you're young is my aunt and uncle and cousins 13 had -- would always go Dylan Beach which is, you know, 14 it's across from Inverness and Inverness called in. 15 And it's actually -- there's a body of water there 16 where the -- we do our planning and unfortunately we saw 17 quite a few of those small, little boats all loaded full 18 of the guys with their clamming shovels, all their 19 outfits, but they'd come over, a few more people get in 20 and then the boat would sink in. 21 Just it's a small -- over to a sandbar. So it's 22 not -- you know, they're all essentially standing chest 23 deep in the water going, I know, you know, you shouldn't 24 have put more people in. And it was marvelous times, 25 certainly marvelous times. But then we also, again, sort

of as we're young, was a couple of weddings, and one was actually it was in Humboldt, was almost into Trinity.

And it was it's very, very different temperature—wise as you go up over some of the ridges in a swath of mountains in Humboldt. And this was out in very dry, dusty, you know, I don't actually remember even where it was because I was young. But I have no idea who was getting married.

But it was you know, I remember thinking, wow, we've really gone to different parts -- different terrains even though it's up north, which, you know, you tend to think, oh, it's all one area. But just a fun -- few other fun things.

COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: I was just going to say, 3 you know, I -- at some point, I am planning to get up to 4 Arcadia, California, because I don't know about all of 5 you, but there is a -- someone mentioned dairy farms up there and there's a small cheese maker called Cypress 6 7 Grove. And I don't know if any of you are familiar with 8 9 Humboldt Fog Cheese, but that is my favorite cheese. 10 I am like -- I am making -- I am at one point, I am going 11 to get up there because I want to visit -- I want to 12 visit their -- their-- their- dairy farm because I love 13 that cheese. So I thought I'd just mentioned that just as a, you know, a side here. 14 15 CHAIR TAYLOR: It is -- it is -- it is one of my 16 thoughts that food ties us all together. 17 COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: It certainly does. 18 CHAIR TAYLOR: So if it's the -- if it's the cheese, 19 it's the cheese. 20 COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: I have a slightly different 21 one. You know, the fire concerns are always, you know, 22 huge here. And I have some dear friends who were 23 evacuated in Sonoma and actually up in Lake and thank 24 goodness their places were saved. But we had -- we 25 visited at the time and saw, you know, the devastation.

1	But just recently we were back in that area and it
2	was amazing to see and really wonderful to see how
3	regrowth has happened and how buildings that were burned
4	to the ground are now brand new buildings in there. So
5	it was a very resilient area, which is which is great
6	because, you know, this is a time where it's a huge
7	concern to all of us. But if we stick together, you
8	know, we can be resilient. You know, it was a very
9	heartfelt situation. It's good to see.

MR. MIKE: Good evening. Thank you, all of you, for taking the time and the effort to listen to us spread over this giant area in far northern California. I'm calling in -- my name is Mike, and I'm calling you from Del Norte County. Actually, I live 300 meters from the Oregon State line.

And I wanted to make a comment on any consideration you have of breaking up the second Congressional District and as well as the Assembly and the Senate districts.



From what I've read and from what -- I've lived in, I live in Del Norte, I've lived in Humboldt County, I've lived in Mendocino County. So I have an understanding of the whole stretch of the -- of the district.

2.0

You guys did a good job in 2013 in forming the

Second Congressional District as well as the Senate -
the State Senate Districts and the Assembly District.

And I think if we look back in history, you're going to

see that way back in the '40s and the early '50s when

they formed area codes, they wanted to form coherent

communities. And that's why the 707 area code roughly

corresponds with the Congressional District that you guys

formed because this is a coherent community.

And to alter what the good work you did in 2010 that resulted in 2013 in the change would be a big mistake.

And here in Del Norte County, it would take me five or six hours, conceivably more to go to Siskiyou County. I have nothing in common. I've never been over there.

It's a long, long, long way. And it is a very, very different mindset.

I heard you before -- I tried from 5 o'clock to call in and I couldn't get anything to happen. I could hear you, but I didn't get recognized. I heard you talking about dairy farms, and that's another thing that pulls us together. There's extensive dairy farming down in Sonoma

- County. There's a lot of dairy farming in Humboldt
 County and up here in Del Norte County we have a lot of
 dairy.
 - Here in Smith River, we have a lot of dairy. And I commend you when you come to Humboldt and looking for cheese, come on up to Crescent City and look at Rumiano Cheese Company. They do some fantastic things. That's
- 9 The 101 is falling into the ocean on Last Chance Grade.

R-U-M-I-A-N-O. We're real tenuous up here right now.

- The -- the wonderful taxpayers are spending millions and millions and millions of dollars to keep the highway from completely falling into the ocean. And we all appreciate it very much. But that's our only connection to California that goes in the ocean.
- Our connection is only to Oregon. 101 is our link.

 101 links this entire district together, mentally,

 psychically, spiritually. This is one district. So I

 implore you folks, please --
- 19 MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds.

MR. MIKE: -- don't -- don't alter the good stuff that you did back in 2010 by forming the Second District and the Senate District and the Assembly Districts as they are. If you have to cut anything off, maybe a little bit of the eastern part of Trinity County would be something that would maybe --

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that makes sense to us when you consider that we have a variety of communities in our county.

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You can almost think about like three -- Sonoma

County makes three different unique places. There's West

County that includes, you know, Sebastopol, Guerneville,

Jenner, places that pop up in the forest or on the Sonoma

coast near Lake Sumner along the Russian River. Many are

more urban areas like Santa Rosa, Petaluma, Rohnert Park,

everything along the 101 corridor.

And then third you have the areas of the east and the southeast, which would be Sonoma, Kenwood, Glen Ellen, Schellville, all the stuff along Highway 12. It's really much more like the wine country than, you know, it's more wine country than the other groups, and they're all significantly impacted by the wine economy and tourism in the way that is similar -- more similar to Napa County, which is why it makes sense that some districts include the town of Sonoma with Napa County as well.

You could even put a town like Healdsburg in that third group as the types of businesses you see in Sonoma Plaza they're nearly identical to the Healdsburg Plaza with farm to table restaurant tasting rooms, you know, small boutique storefronts. So anyway, it's fine if these different parts of Sonoma County are all put

1 together.

But I just want to call and say that it makes sense if the eastern part is peeled off from Santa Rosa and West County and put in with Napa County. That's really all I had to say. And I appreciate you taking the time to listen to me and thank you for holding these hearings. I appreciate your time.

CHAIR TOLEDO: I was just wondering if you could give a little bit more specificity to the -- when you -- when you're speaking about the eastern part of Sonoma County, are there any demarcations or streets or -- or roads that you would highlight as being in the eastern section that you mentioned?

MR. ADAM: Well, so, you know, I would call it broadly speaking, the Sonoma Valley, the Highway 12 Corridor from, you know, where 121 comes across and hits Highway 12 in Schellville, then goes up to the City of Sonoma and then up into Glen Ellen and Kenwood, Rincon Valley. That's southeast.

If you -- if you kind of if you were to if you were to look at that, I would call it, for lack of a better phrase, the lower, right quadrant of East County. That's more wine country. I mean, it's just rolling hills with vineyards very similar to Napa. So I would say the Highway 12 Corridor --

1 MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds. MR. ADAM: -- the Highway 121 Corridor down Highway 3 37. 4 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you very much. 5 MR. ADAM: All right. Thank you. I appreciate it. MR. ROGERS: All right. Well, thank you so much.

My name's Chris Rogers. I'm the mayor for the city of

Santa Rosa. I also have a pretty unique perspective on

this, having represented the whole Northern California

working for five different Assembly members, Senators or

Congress members over the last decade prior to my own

public service.

First, a special shout out to Commissioner Toledo and does an incredible job here in Sonoma County, particularly down in Petaluma. I just wanted to say thank you for his work. I wanted to call in today -- we've gone through the redistricting process, decentralize it, and gone through this communities of interest conversation.

So rather than giving you one definitive way to cut the maps, I really want to give you a couple of options.

I know it's a jigsaw puzzle for the entire state.

At first and foremost, I want to punctuate the point that you've heard from folks who have dealt with the new district, that it's a coastal district, both the Congressional and the Senate. That really is a critical district for our state to make sure that the coastal communities are adequately represented in Sacramento and in D.C. Those issues are unique to those communities, and that representation really matters.

Outside of that, one of the other communities of interest that we see locally is really the topographical features that lead to fires, where fires start, and where the fire preparedness needs to be done throughout all of our communities.

2.0

And that's really along the Highway 12, that was pointed out near Oakmont in Santa Rosa and moving over into the Calistoga and Napa area as well. That's a pretty significant community of interest when we talk about how to prepare and respond to emergencies.

Outside of that, there are communications and transportation corridors that I think are critical for your consideration. One is the Smart Train, which is Sonoma and Marin County. We have a shared tax measure that funds that train. A critical connector is the Highway 37 Corridor, which needs significant funding and has significant issues and therefore needs to have strong representation from those communities as well. That's really four communities -- four counties that feed into that network.

And then the final one is looking at where Sonoma

Clean Power and Marin Clean Energy have their

constituency. Sonoma Clean Power is largely Sonoma

County and Mendocino County. And with Marin County, I

know the reluctance to ever cross the Golden Gate Bridge.



1 A potential fix to that would be to attach it to Richmond, which is the Marin Clean Energy District down 3 that way. With that, I just want to thank you for your 4 5 I know it's been a long day and I've had a chance to hop on and off and hear people's comments. 6 7 Happy to answer any questions about our own community. 8 But just want to thank you for your time. 9 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your comments. 10 PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. And with that, Chair, we do not have any other -- we 11 12 don't have any other callers at this time. 13 CHAIR TOLEDO: While we're waiting for callers since 14 we've been talking about cheese and dairy, I figure we 15 can talk about -- and since a couple of the recent 16 callers have brought up wine, wanted to see if anyone has 17 their favorite winery or wines from the -- from the north 18 coast area. So anywhere in the north. 19 And we'll start with Commissioner Kennedy. 2.0 COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: I visited the Korbel Winery 21 years ago and discovered a red sparkling wine that 22 apparently is very limited edition. It's very difficult 2.3 to find outside of Sonoma County. So if anyone does have

the opportunity, it's -- it really was a wonderful find.

And I always look for it, but I'm always disappointed

because I haven't been back to the Korbel Winery since then. CHAIR TOLEDO: We'll have to find you some Korbel's sparkling wine. COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Well, it's a very deep -it's like a sparkling burgundy. It's not, you know, it's very full bodied. And I've never had anything like it anywhere else.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Very good. Sounds awesome. Any other Commissioners have their -- Commissioner Andersen and then Fornaciari. Then we'll go to Sinay.

COMMISSIOENR ANDERSEN: Just a -- I do have very fun stories of -- up in the wine country in areas. But I did know a fellow who years ago started growing wine in the Andersen Valley. So Husch Vineyards. He's passed away many years ago, unfortunately. But some excellent wines. And it was then -- now it's a -- it's a huge grapegrowing region.

But he was one of the very first ones out there because he said it's got great soil and he would go in to it like any vintner would, the particulars of the acidity in the soil and the temperatures and how the fog rolls through. And it was always a delight to go to go any of those areas. I highly recommend.

19	mine got married in Sonoma. And she planned her whole
20	wedding from France because her husband was working in
21	France. And she asked me to be her she said, I know
22	you're not having bridesmaids at your wedding, so I'm not
23	going to ask you to be a bridesmaids.
24	Will you just be my marriage my wedding
25	coordinator? I was like, what?

I finally talked her out of that. I said it was a 1 But luckily I didn't do it because they got bad idea. 3 married in this little church and they didn't know where the lights were or anything. The minister got completely 4 5 lost, so by the time he arrived, it was already getting dark. 17	I'm from Trinity County. I wish to talk about our ties
18	to the coast.
19	Our natural water flows are all to the coast. The
20	Trinity River, with its many tributaries, provide cold
21	water that flows through Humboldt County and Hoopa
22	Reservation, where it enters the ocean at the Klamath
23	River in Del Norte County.
24	Other Trinity watershed flows into the Mad River and
25	Eel River that enter the ocean in Humboldt County. We

are tied economically through these flows by fishing, recreation, and tourism -- I hope my peacocks aren't singing too loud in the background -- along with Highway to 99 and 36 that run to the coast in Humboldt County. I was very happy the way we were included with the coast as the only water ties we have to the valley is water that is stolen from the Trinity and piped over.

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They have a much different purpose for our water than we do and we need to stay with the coast. On the rare occasion I drive down to Shasta County and see Whiskeytown Lake full, I am reminded of how it is kept that way by piped Trinity River water. While the Trinity Lake looks like a half-grain bathtub, and the fish in the river suffer the low flow and warm temperature consequences.

We are also tied to Humboldt and Mendocino by our cannabis agriculture, long known as the Emerald Triangle, its difficulties, problems, and economic benefit. We face the same wildfire problems as the coastal counties. Excluding just last year, the August complex fire coming out of Mendocino in Southern Trinity County very hard and we lost 228 homes. And that's really what I had to say. And I want to thank you guys for holding these hearings. CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your comment.

PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. And

- We moved here 20 years ago from San Francisco. We bought a home in the redwoods where we can look at the water across from us.
- Because the water is clear and it is untamed, it is peaceful. It's fabulous to be able to view that right across from my home. We are really wanting to be able to

conserve the ocean as it is. And being able to have a continuous coastline from the Golden Gate Bridge to the Oregon border has helped us preserve our oceans as it is.

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Additionally, living in southern Mendocino County, there is a concern about healthcare. We have a medical clinic that is really lovely. It closes every night at 6 o'clock and remains closed on the weekend. Now Southern Mendocino County and northern Sonoma County depend on that clinic for day-to-day care.

But I also would like to share with you an experience I had some months ago. About 2 o'clock in the morning, I awoke with a very pounding, rapid heartbeat that seemed to be skipping a beat.

Because of course, our clinic was closed, there was no hospital in the area, I called 9-1 -- my husband called 911 and our volunteer fire department came out, the ambulance came out and that was paramedics medevac me to Sonoma County to Sutter Hospital, which was the closest hospital that was able to care for me.

So it is really important that Sonoma and Mendocino County remain together because of the shared medical experiences. Again, we live in an absolutely fabulous area that is conserved, is cared for in an environment that is treasured. And we really find that are being in our contiguous area along the coast --

1 MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- of region 1W, has served us well. This allowed us to conserve. And I thank you 3 4 for the time. 5 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your comments. PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. And 6 7 with that, Chair, that was all of our callers at this 8 time. 9 CHAIR TOLEDO: Perfect. So I will share a little 10 bit in terms of reminders.
