1 DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: Roll call is complete, Chair. COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Thank you so much. I will start by sharing a little bit about the 3 4 Commission. Every ten years, after the Federal 5 Government publishes updated census information, California must redraw the boundaries of its 6 7 Congressional, State Senate, State Assembly, and State Board of Equalization districts, so that the districts 8 9 correctly reflect the State's population. In 2008, California voters authorized the creation 10 11 of the Commission when they passed the Voters FIRST Act. 12 It authorized the Commission to draw the new district 13 lines for State Senate, State Assembly, and State Board 14 of Equalization districts. 15 In 2010, the Congressional Voters FIRST Act added 16 the responsibility of drawing congressional districts to 17 the Commission. The fourteen-member Commission is made 18 up of five Republicans, five Democrats, and four not 19 affiliated with either of those two parties. 20 Commission must draw the district lines in conformity 21 with strict, nonpartisan rules, designed to create 22 districts of relatively equal population that will 23 provide fair representation for all Californians. 24 The census redistricting data was released the week 25 of August 9th. When the official California

redistricting database is available later this month, the Commission will begin drawing maps using six line-drawing criteria as outlined in the California Constitution. One of these is minimizing the division of cities, counties, neighborhoods, and communities of interest to the extent possible.

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We can obtain the city and county information from those jurisdictions, but we need the neighborhood and communities of interest information from Californians directly. That's why we have launched these communities of interest input sessions, to get that valuable information from you directly. We encourage all Californians to participate in this process.

If you would rather submit your community of interest input over the internet, you can do so from our website, or by visiting drawmycacommunity.org. Skip the line, go online.

Now, I will call on all Commissioners to introduce themselves and to say hello. To see the biographies of all fourteen Commissioners for additional information, or to sign up for our emails, please visit our website at wedrawthelinesca.org.

I'll begin with my Co-Chair, Commissioner Fornaciari.

And I would like to welcome all of California to join us this afternoon and provide your input on what you think is important about redistricting. We really value your input and looking forward to hearing more. Thank you. COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Thank you. Commissioner Akutagawa. COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: Hello California. Welcome, and we're looking forward to hearing all of your input. For those of you who are listening in, it's not too late for you to call and join us, and tell us about your communities, your nuance, what you tell us will help us draw better maps. And we very much want to hear from you. And we appreciate all who have called and who are calling in, hopefully soon. Thank you. COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Thank you. Commissioner Andersen. COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Hello California. And I'm coming to you from Berkeley, California. I really look forward to hearing about your communities of interest today all across this wonderful state of ours. you. Commissioner Fernandez. COMMISSIONER AHMAD:

1 translated) Good afternoon, California. I'm Alicia Fernandez from Yolo County. I'm looking forward to all 3 of the input. And as our lessons-learned subcommittees 4 always say, keep them coming. 5 COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Commissioner Kennedy. COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Thank you, Chair. 6 7 I'm Ray Kennedy. I'm joining today's meeting from my home in Morongo Valley, home of the rural Joshua Tree 8 9 Gateway Communities in the desert of southern San 10 Bernadino County. I really want to invite Californians 11 to help us understand their communities. 12 We'll have plenty of time later on to talk about 13 districts. But what we're trying to do now is to 14 understand communities throughout California. So please 15 feel free to call and tell us about what makes your 16 community special to you. Thank you. 17 COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Commissioner Le Mons. 18 COMMISSIONER LE MONS: Good afternoon, California. 19 Thank you, Chair. 2.0 I'm looking forward to hearing community input today 21 as we are winding down our community of input meetings. 22 We've learned tons as we have been working over this over 2.3 the last several months, and look forward to hearing 24 more.

COMMISSIONER AHMAD:

1 COMMISSIONER SADHWANI: Thank you, Chair. My name is Sara Sadhwani. I'm calling in today from 3 Claremont, California. And I'm looking forward to 4 hearing more communities of interest testimony. Thank 5 you so much. COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Commissioner Sinay. 6 7 COMMISSIONER SINAY: (In Spanish, not translated) Good afternoon, California. We're really excited that 8 9 you're spending your afternoon with us and sharing your 10 communities. I'm serving you from San Diego. 11 COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Commissioner Taylor. 12 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Good afternoon, California. 13 Good afternoon, everyone. I hope that everyone is well. 14 I'm Commissioner Derric Taylor, joining you from Los 15 Angeles. Keep the communities of interest input coming. 16 That's the purpose of our Commission, and without you, 17 our work is not possible. So please, please, please, 18 keep the information and the input coming. Thank you. 19 COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Commissioner Toledo. 2.0 COMMISSIONER TOLEDO: Thank you, Chair. 21 My name is Pedro Toledo, and I'm coming to you from 22 Petaluma, California, up in the north Bay -- San 23 Francisco North Bay near -- or in the wine country. 24 looking forward to hearing all about your communities of 25 interest, and continuing to learn more and more about all

- 11 COMMISSIONER YEE: Hello California. I'm Russel
- 12 Yee, here in my hometown of Oakland. And the most
- 13 | important thing to say today is, Happy Birthday,
- 14 California. Today is Admission Day. You're 171. Still
- 15 | a very young state. And certainly with your input and
- 16 help in this redistricting, we're going to help -- you're
- 17 | going to help us make the state even more golden. So
- 18 Happy Birthday to us all.
- 19 COMMISSIONER AHMAD: And myself, Commissioner Ahmad.
- 20 | I'm from the Bay Area. I am once again very excited to
- 21 hear all of the community of interest input from
- 22 throughout the state, and I look forward to a great
- 23 meeting.
- I just also want to remind folks that we are active
- 25 on social media. So please follow us, the California

1 Citizens Redistricting Commission, on social media. can find us on Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, LinkedIn, and YouTube at wedrawthelinesca. Following us on social 3 4 media is another way to get useful information about 5 redistricting and updates from the Commission. Before we continue, could I please have our Spanish 6 7 interpreter provide the language line numbers one more 8 time. 9 INTERPRETER JOHANNA: Thank you, Chair. This is the 10 Spanish interpreter. 11 (Spanish interpretation provided) 12 INTERPRETER JOHANNA: Thank you. 13 COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Thank you so much. 14 And while we wait for folks to get gueued up, I just 15 wanted to go over a few housekeeping items. 16 This meeting is for communities of interest 17 testimony focused on the whole State of California. 18 will also be taking general public comment at the end of 19 the meeting. 2.0 Although the Commission has divided up California 21 into eleven zones, that is in no way related to, or 22 reflective of, redistricting lines or boundaries. 2.3 Commission created the zones to assist Commissioners and 24 our team in our outreach efforts only, not as an 25

indication of planed boundaries.

Today, we are also joined by our Line Drawing Team,
HaystaqDNA and Q2 Data & Research, who will be displaying
a map of the area that attendees describe. Please start
with the area you would like to discuss, and be as
specific as possible about the boundaries of where your
community is located. It is our goal to find the area on
the map you would like to discuss prior to your
testimony.

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If you are within a specific neighborhood of a large city, please mention it by name. Once we are able to locate your area, your timer will begin. Attendees will not be able to share their screen.

We are also joined by our Spanish interpreters, and Katy, our Comment Moderator, who will be introducing attendees when it is their turn to speak.

When you join the meeting, please use the Raise Hand button at the bottom of your screen to enter the queue. If you have registered for a timeslot, we encourage you to call in during your appointment timeslot. When it is your turn to speak, Katy, our Comment Moderator, will be identifying you by your unique assigned ID number. You will be reconnected to the session with the ability to enable your own video and/or audio.

At the beginning of your input you will see a map on the screen. Please remind the mapper what area you would like to see on the screen, and be as specific as possible about the boundaries of where your community is located.

Now, a quick reminder about communities of interest. While there are no clear rules on how to define a community of interest, we've identified ways for you to describe your community. You can begin with your county or city. You can mention the street names and significant locations in your neighborhood to help us identify the parameters of your community. You can talk about what your community's shared interests are, and what brings you together.

You can also talk about what's important to your community. Are there areas nearby that you would like to be in a district with? Are there other nearby areas that you don't want to be in a district with? Why or why not?

You can also talk about how your community has come together to advocate for important services such as

better schools, roads, or health centers in your
neighborhood.

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We also invite you to use the communities of interest tool to draw a map and describe your community. You may do so by visiting drawmycacommunity.org. This website is available in sixteen different languages. Skip the line, and go online. Submit your COI input today. And please encourage at least three other people to do the same.

As a reminder, even though we are focusing on the whole state, Californians are welcome to provide their input from anywhere across the state, and/or submit their input through the community of interest input tool.

We will now begin the public input sessions, and we'll start with people who are registered, and then open the phone lines if there is time before the next session.

If you are calling without an appointment, please do not hang up, as you will lose your place in line.

I will now pass this over to Katy, our Comment Moderator.

COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you, Chair.

0-0-3, I will be promoting you now. 0-0-3, your speaker order number will be number 1. If you will please make note of that for future reference. And if you will please let the mapper know what area you would

like to discuss. The floor is yours.

SPEAKER 0-0-3: Good afternoon, Commissioners. I'r addressing the area currently defined as Assembly

District 35, the County of San Luis Obispo, and the northern portion of Santa Barbara County, to include Santa Maria, the city of Guadalupe, and the surrounding areas.

MR. MANOFF: Thank you. Go ahead, please.

SPEAKER 0-0-3: Thank you. My name is Glen Morris. I serve as the CEO of the Santa Maria Valley Chamber of

11 Commerce, an economic development organization.

Our interest today is to encourage the Commission to retain as much as possible the current boundaries of the 35th Assembly District as they exist today. This region, the northern Santa Barbara County, and San Luis Obispo County areas share significant economic, employment, cultural, educational, and recreational overlap. We share employees, we share our markets, we share recreational areas, we share university and community college districts.

This region has recently engaged in significant and formalized collaboration and coordination between communities, regardless of county lines, to better serve our local residents. And we believe that by keeping this area as a single assembly district to the extent

1 possible, that we can continue to facilitate that shared 2 future. Thank you for your service, and we appreciate your 3 efforts. We turn the time back to you now. Thank you. 4 5 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. And right now we will have 0-0-8. And then, up next 6 7 after that will be 0-0-1. 0-0-8, I will be promoting you now. 0-0-8, your 9 speaker order number will be number 2. If you will 10 please make note of that for future reference. You can 11 now enable your audio and video in the lower-left corner 12 of your screen. If you will please let the mapper know 13 what area you would like to discuss. The floor is yours. 14 SPEAKER 0-0-8: Sure. The San Fernando Valley. 15 MR. MANOFF: Thank you, go ahead please. 16 SPEAKER 0-0-8: Sure, thank you. 17 My name is Stuart Waldman. I am President of the 18 Valley Industry & Commerce Association. I'm also 19 representing the San Fernando Valley Redistricting 20 Coalition made up of neighborhood councils, homeowners' 21 groups, chambers of commerce, and other groups that are 22 working together to ensure that the San Fernando Valley 2.3 has fair and adequate representation. 24 The San Fernando Valley is bounded by the Santa

Susana Mountains to the north, Mulholland Drive to the

south, and the San Gabriel Mountains to the east. 1 Valley is a distinct area that cannot simply be piecemealed into majority districts there in other 3 4 locations. In fact, the San Fernando Valley, someone did 5 a survey when, and you're showing the mountains, which aren't necessarily part of the Valley, but we're more of 6 7 the green part. When, in fact, someone did a survey, showing that when the San Fernando Valley was represented by districts 10 that were less than 50 percent of the San Fernando Valley, those elected officials did not have district 11 12 offices in the San Fernando Valley. They had district 13 offices out of the Valley. 14 We are asking that the communities that you are 15 looking at right now, that stretch from Calabasas all the 16 way to Glendale, be put in their own districts within the 17 Valley. That they are wholly contained within the San 18 Fernando Valley, that they do not go south of Mulholland, 19 that you keep the communities as whole as you possibly 20 can. 21 When our area is cut up, it causes problems with our 22 elected officials. We have almost 2 million people. 23 We're an area the size of Chicago. We have shared 24 interests from the freeways, from traffic, to the heat,

to the use of water that other areas don't necessary --

1 necessarily have.

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And in fact, many of you may remember, in the early 2000s, the San Fernando Valley was so fed up with the lack of representation in the city of Los Angeles, that the San Fernando Valley put on the ballot a measure to secede from the City of Los Angeles. Now, that failed in the city, and -- but it did pass in the San Fernando Valley. But that is a representation of the fact that we did not feel that we were being adequately represented by our elected officials.

So we ask, that much like the districts are now that we currently have, that our districts are wholly contained within the San Fernando Valley as you can best do that.

We appreciate the last redistricting. It took districts that had 34 percent of the Valley, 42 percent of the Valley, 15 percent of the Valley, and it made districts that were wholly contained within the Valley. So we hope that you'll do the same again.

And I want to thank you for your time. We also have a report coming out by Cal State Northridge next week.

MR. MANOFF: Time.

COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much.

24 And right now, we will have 0-0-1, and then up next 25 after that will be 0-1-2.

0-0-1, I will be promoting you now. 0-0-1, your speaker order number will be number 3. If you'll please make note of that for future reference. You can now enable your audio and video in the lower-left corner of your screen. If you'll please let the mapper know what area you would like to discuss. The floor is yours. I'm Sandra SPEAKER 0-0-1: Thank you very much. Cattell with the Sierra Club -- Santa Clarita Sierra Club. My area is the norther part of L.A. County. I am in Santa Clarita, and I'm going to be addressing Congressional District 25, Assembly District 38 and 36. We would like to see those areas stay in the north L.A. County, with the county line to the north, the county line to the east, the county line to the west, and the San Gabriel Mountains and the Santa Susana Mountains to the south. It would also include cities of Santa Clarita, Aqua Dulce, Castaic, unincorporated areas of the County of L.A., and go out to Antelope Valley, including Lancaster and Palmdale, and a few other areas off to the east. The reason we're doing that is, we feel we needed an area that is geographically continuous and compact, and centered around communities of interest. We would like our boundaries drawn so we are all in L.A. County. Right

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now we have a very small sliver of Ventura County added

1 into some of our districts. Our area has shared services like emergency, fire, and sheriff. A shared sanitation district. We share our watershed. The Santa Clarita 3 4 River and tributaries on the north side of the San 5 Gabriels. We are communities that are similarly ethnically 6 7 diverse communities. We have shared lifestyles, kind of 8 a mix of a suburban and rural equestrian area. We like our recreation in the Angeles Forest including trails. 10 We enjoy camping, hiking, bicycling, and horseback 11 riding. We share the nature education of three county 12 nature centers. And we also have connections with work, 13 both employers and employees. And we are all serviced by 14 the same Antelope Valley Metrolink lines and coordinated 15 bus lines in between the communities. 16 We would like to see Congressional District 25 be 17 within this area, and Assembly District 38 to be on the 18 west side, and Assembly District 36 to be on the east 19 side, depending on how the population says we should draw 20 the lines, and our Senate District -- our State Senate 21 District to include those two Assembly Districts. 22 Thank you very much for this opportunity. 2.3 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 24 Right now we will have 0-1-2. And then, up next up

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after that will be 0-0-6.

0-1-2, I will be promoting you now. 0-1-2, your speaker order number will be number 4. If you'll please make note of that for future reference. You can now enable your audio and video in the lower-left corner of your screen. If you'll please let the mapper know what area you would like to discuss. The floor us yours. SPEAKER 0-1-2: Hi, I'm here to talk about the northwest Orange County and the cities along the Highway 39 corridor. MR. MANOFF: Thank you. Go ahead, please. SPEAKER 0-1-2: Hi, my name is Jaqueline Vu (ph.). Highway 39 is not only the major thoroughfare connecting the cities, but it also houses major hospitality, industry employers, including Knott's Berry Farm, Adventure City, Medieval Times, and others. Many workers and families use Highway 39 to get to businesses, as well as Disneyland, which is right around These cities on the northwest side of Orange County, some border on Los Angeles County, but these cities all look to Orange County Government to deal with homelessness, healthcare, transportation, and other issues, not L.A. County. They're an ethnically diverse working-class people, and many have hospitality industry ties. One -- one part of Fullerton doesn't fit with the rest, and that's the

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1 north central part of Fullerton. The folks who live in Fullerton County District 2 are far more affluent than those who live in other cities I discussed. Obviously, 3 4 they also look to Orange County Government for their 5 economy in terms of (audio interference). Transportation concerns are quite different from others. 6 7 Thank you. COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 9 And right now, we will have 0-0-6. And then, up next after that will be 0-0-9. 10 11 0-0-6, I will be promoting you now. 0-0-6, your 12 speaker order number will be number 5. If you'll please 13 make note of that for future reference. You can now 14 enable your audio and video in the lower-left corner of 15 your screen. If you'll please let the mapper know what 16 area you would like to discuss. The floor is yours. 17 SPEAKER 0-0-6: Hello. My name is Brandon Tang 18 (ph.), and I'm here to talk about the Hacienda Heights 19 area. If you could please zoom in on that. 2.0 So just to give a little bit of background. 21 Hacienda Heights is a community within the west San 22 Gabriel Valley area. And it's a pretty diverse 23 community, which means more Hispanics than White or Asian. And our school districts are with the Hacienda 24

and La Puente Unified School District, which also serves

1 La Puente, west La Puente, Industry Hills, and Valinda. 2 And these are the same communities that share District 4, the San Gabriel Water Company district. 3 they also share the same stretch of Highway 60 corridor. 4 5 And these few cities are also with other communities within the San Gabriel Valley Council or governments. 6 7 The Mount San Antonio College district also includes Baldwin Park, Covina, Hacienda Heights, City of Industry, 8 Irwindale, La Puente, La Verne, San Dimas, Valinda, 10 Walnut, and West Covina. These communities should belong 11 together along with others in the west San Gabriel 12 Valley. 13 We typically look to L.A. County to help our 14 homeless or other -- for other, like public 15 transportation. Yet, for some reason the 2011 16 Redistricting Commission connected Hacienda Heights with 17 Orange County in some districts, and that can take about 18 two and a half hours roughly, to travel from Hacienda 19 Heights to some parts of Orange County in public 20 transportation, which can add up to a five-hour round 21 trip to visit the electoral official with offices in 22 Orange County, if one doesn't own a car. 2.3 I'm sure you can all imagine that's not exactly the 24 most pleasant way to spend your day, and I honestly 25

believe that's not quite right. All in all, Hacienda

1 Heights is a wonderful place to live, and I wish to keep us with our neighbors in La Puente and Whittier, and 3 don't get us lost in a district dominated by Orange 4 County voters. 5 Thank you. COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 6 7 And right now we will have 0-0-9, and then up next after that will be 0-0-2. 8 9 0-0-9, I will be promoting you now. 0-0-9, your 10 speaker order number will be number 6. be designed as geographically contiguous and respectful

of political boundaries. And the San Fernando Valley is exactly such an area. The distinct cities of Burbank, Calabasas, Glendale, Hidden Hills, and San Fernando must be respected as unique communities that share only one common identity, the San Fernando Valley residency.

Communities in the cities of the Valley must be kept together as compact and contiguous districts that recognize geographic features and natural boundaries.

The San Fernando Valley is a thriving community of over 40,000 businesses, ranging in size from small storefronts to multi-million-dollar corporations. Too often our commercial interests have fallen victim to the wins of surrounding areas. And although we share ties with the city of Los Angeles, the business community of the Valley maintains distinctly different interest due to operations across the five Valley cities: San Fernando, Calabasas, Hidden Hills, Burbank, and Glendale.

The city of Los Angeles is made up of geographically designated communities. These communities within the city are not always recognized, and their interests are not always preserved. In the San Fernando Valley alone there are 34 communities. We urge the Commission to purchase those legally recognized boundaries for inclusion in the mapping software, to keep consistent with the County and the city of Los Angeles.

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        While we appreciate the neighborhood councils in
    L.A., their lines are self-drawn, divide communities, and
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    are often disputed. All recognized communities should be

SPEAKER 0-0-2: My name is Candace Burroughs, and I'm a coastal resident in south Orange County, and I'm here to discuss the issues involved with keeping one unique State Senator, and perhaps our Assembly people along the coast.

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Our districts currently now work fairly well. And they have two cities. Newport and Laguna have a lot of synergies. And they both have world class resorts, world class tourism, and we have workers that live inland. So it's very important that the needs of these districts here are met, and where we have the opportunity to work with one similar elected official.

We need transportation for the people who are the workers, who live inland. And there are opportunities for us to use the airports to get our people to the tourist districts. We need our coastal areas to be clean and healthy. And all of these things have a direct impact on those people who either visit or work in the area. So it's very important that we have one person that understands these issues.

Our closest affinity for Laguna, which where I have been pretty much since the early 1970s, is Newport Beach. So the affinity of keeping Laguna and Newport together is highly recommended. We have the coastal Highway 1 that is our main thoroughfare. And those issues, as far as

1 traffic and safety goes, are all very similar. We have a strong opportunity to encourage people to keep our beaches clean and safe. And the recreational areas are 3 4 what ties us together, and keep us having the opportunity 5 along the coast to employ lots of people that are inland and can afford to live in those beautiful homes. 6 7 And so I encourage you to, if at all possible, keep these two cities unified as much as possible for the 8 9 state representatives in the area. 10 I thank you for your time, and thank you for what 11 you're doing. 12 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 13 And right now we will have 0-0-4. SPEAKER 2-2-2-0: Good afternoon, Commissioners. My name is Ray. I'm here to talk about the central coast, specifically, the northern Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo County.

MR. MANOFF: Thank you. Go ahead, please.

SPEAKER 2-2-2-0: I'm a 59-year-old resident of the central coast Santa Maria, and I ask that you keep Santa Barbara County and northern Santa Barbara County, and San Luis Obispo County connected in State Assembly, State Senate, and Congressional Districts. I'd also like to echo what your first speaker had to say, Glenn Morris, with the city of Santa Maria Chamber of Commerce.

Our local community in Santa Maria and Santa Ynez
Valleys, Santa Maria, Orcutt, Solvang, Buellton, and Los

Olivos have far more in common with our neighbors in San Luis Obispo County than we do with the southern Santa Barbara County residents. We're so different that we've had, in fact, had several attempts to split our county over the last few decades.

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Contrasting that against our neighbors to the north, which is San Luis Obispo County, we are a working-class community. Northern Santa Barbara County's economy, like San Luis Obispo County's economy, is based on agriculture and energy primarily. A reasonable workforce travels back and forth across county lines constantly to shop, go to school, to access healthcare. Our county governments even work closely together.

When Governor Newsom looped San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, and Ventura Counties together in a mega southern California region during the heights of the last COVID surge, the three counties worked together in an effort to delink the central coast from southern California.

In closing, I'd like to ask that you continue to keep Santa Barbara County linked together with San Luis Obispo County, so that our communities may continue to work to move the central coast forward.

Thank you, Commissioners. I appreciate your time and efforts.

Over the past 10 years the Tri-City area in 20 21 particular, the communities of American Canyon, Vallejo, 22 and Benicia, have established strong ties and a long-term 23 relationship, which is all shared between the counties. 24 We have been well represented. And through the 25 cooperation between our communities and our local

1 representative, we've been able to provide a number of services and so forth. We have shared programs. 3 believe that keeping Napa and Solano in the same 4 Congressional District will continue to provide the 5 services and support that this area has benefited from. Again, I urge the Commission to please keep Napa and 6 7 Solano Counties within the same Congressional District. 8 Thank you. 9 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 10 And right now we have caller 0-0-6-0. And then, up 11 next after that, we will see if we can get in touch with 12 0-0-4 again. 13 0-0-6-0, if you will please follow the prompts to 14 unmute at this time by pressing star 6. And some of our interest includes bills dealing with police accountability and reforms, such as the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act of 2021. The number of incidents that have affected people of color in an unfortunate way has just skyrocketed and been terrible. And so we need to have representatives that are concerned about that and push legislation to address those issues.

Other concerns for that community is restoring

1 federal protections for voting rights nationwide, so that states can't individually enact legislation to suppress 3 the vote. And such legislation that addresses that issue is the John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act of 2021. 4 5 We would like to be able to continue to choose representatives that support that type of legislation. 6 7 Another concern is climate change. The frequency and severity of droughts, excessive heat, and fires that 8 9 have escalated in recent years are the result of climate 10 change issues. And we want to continue to be able to 11 choose a representative that supports legislation that 12 addresses those issues. 13 And the onslaught of two different worlds that exist 14 as far as reality in this information, we need to have a 15 representative that speaks truth to power, and addresses 16 and holds their colleagues accountable for information 17 that does not align with the truth.

So the existing boundaries of Congressional District 43 has had representation that represents the people within those boundaries. And we request this to maintain those existing boundaries for that Congressional District 43.

And that also looking at Fresno -- west Fresno, 18 which is a historical black community, does not have 19 much, if not nothing, in common with the city of Kerman, 20 and some of the outer lying communities in the county. 21 Then I'd like to offer a little bit of clarity with 22 our neighboring community, Madera, Madera County, and

looking at those historical black communities within the

region, and keeping them together, which are Chowchilla,

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Atwater, and Fairmead.

And truthfully, when we met with some elected officials, they did not realize that a small chunk of Yolo County was in their area, which I think is very problematic.

Many programs and services, especially for older adults and persons with disabilities, are County-based and County-implemented. So if at all possible, we would love to welcome back west Sacramento into the district with the remaining parts of Yolo County. So I do hope that when you are drawing the lines, you will consider making Yolo County whole again.

My name is Leana (ph.). I'm a rising college junior in the University of California system, and a graduate of the Martin Luther King Jr. Freedom Center. The Freedom Center is an independent nonprofit organization that promotes youth civic engagement and community organizing throughout the Bay Area, and statewide. The Freedom Center has a long history of outreach and advocacy throughout the east Bay Area, and we are overjoyed to have the opportunity to advocate for our communities during this redistricting cycle.

This summer, I led a team of Freedom Center students in researching communities of interest in Congressional District 13, and neighboring cities and Districts 11 and 15. With consistently higher than average school

1 diversity ratings, high numbers of ethnic and cultural

2 businesses, especially among the African American

3 community, and the widest variety of religious

4 institutions we discovered, D-13 perfectly exemplifies

5 California's vast array of culture.

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Of all the neighboring cities that we studied, we found that Richmond has the most in common with District 13. Specifically, the 94804 ZIP Code in Richmond has a large concentration of cultural businesses and community centers, resembling areas in D-13. If expansion becomes necessary, we would want to extend into Richmond.

However, since expansion into Richmond may require our district to extend into El Cerrito and Kensington as well, we would prefer to maintain D-13's current boundaries, as those two cities do not share many of our communities of interest.

I have lived in Oakland my entire life. From attending schools in Oakland and San Leandro, shopping in Piedmont, Alameda, and Emeryville, attending summer in extracurricular programs in Berkeley, and driving down Solano Ave with my family in Albany, I've spent years witnessing all that D-13 has to offer.

I also spent a lot of time in our neighboring D-11 and D-15 cities. I visited family and friends in El Cerrito and Orinda, supported black businesses in San

1	Pablo, shopped in Richmond and Hayward.
2	With that said, I have never felt the same sense of
3	inclusion, acceptance, diversity, and unity anywhere
4	outside of Congressional District 13.
5	I humbly ask you to please keep the needs of our
6	diverse communities, and to protect our communities of
7	interest by not splitting up the 13th Congressional
8	District.
9	Thank you very much for your time and consideration.

It's just unfortunate that we're where we are, the COVID and the like, and haven't had a chance to do that.

COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Along those lines, funny you should mention it, if and when we do have a full inperson meeting, or as close to a full in-person meeting in Sacramento as possible, it occurred to me yesterday, I

guess that, you know, I drove up last year for the first meeting of the first eight, and I drove up the 99 and back down Interstate 5.

So I'm thinking of another road trip up 395, cut across at Yosemite because I think the fires would preclude me from cutting across further north to get to Sacramento. And then from Sacramento down through San Jose to Santa Cruz, and then through Watsonville and Salinas down the 101.

So if any other southern California Commissioners are interested, let's chat. We can have plenty of meals along the way.

COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: That's a -- that would be quite a road trip. And in fact, just last night I was talking to Commissioner Fernandez, and I mentioned to her that I thought of doing basically the opposite of that road trip, to come down to southern California and stop by and see you.

So I have Commissioner Fernandez, then Commissioner Sinay.

So I'm just so grateful for everyone that's called in, written in, phoned in to educate all of us on all the different areas in California. So thank you so much.

And I do have a list of places I'm going to visit in my immediate two-hour zone, so thank you so much.

I learned from doing a road trip with two young boys that was very necessary.

COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: All right. Well, and just following up, Commissioner Fernandez. When I was driving back down Interstate 5 and got off before to Grapevine, cutting over to Lancaster and Palmdale.

You know, it wasn't a lot of time that I spent in the Antelope Valley, but I certainly was able to understand the Antelope Valley input much better having gone through the Antelope Valley on my way back from
