Choosing the Final Six: Three Considerations to Balance

First Eight Commissioners must choose the six:

1. To ensure the commission reflects the state's diversity. However, it is not intended that formulas or specific rations be applied for this purpose.

And also based on:

- 2. Relevant analytic skills
- 3. The ability to be impartial



What Does "Diversity" Mean?

Ensure the commission reflects the state's "diversity."

Diversity means the racial, ethnic, geographic, economic, and gender characteristics of the population of California. (2 CCR § 60815.)

However: It is not intended that "formulas or specific ratios be applied for this purpose."

Gov. C. § 8252(g))

What Are "Relevant Analytic Skills?"

- Gathering and comprehending information that bears upon redistricting;
- Evaluating the validity and significance of the information gathered by the commission to make sound decisions about the proper placement of communities in districts;
- Applying the appropriate legal standards;
- Working effectively as a member of a group to promote redistricting decisions that are factually and legally defensible and that the commission can agree upon. (2 CCR § 60827)

What Is the "Ability to Be Impartial?"

The capacity and willingness, while serving as a member of the commission, to set aside:

- Personal views;
- Personal interests including, but not limited to, personal financial interests;
- Biases for or against any individuals, groups, or geographical areas;
- Support for or opposition to any candidates, political parties, or social or political causes.

(2 CCR § 60800.)

Selection by Slates (2 CCR § 60860)

- Final six must be selected as one group of 6, or slate.
- A slate=2 Democrats, 2 Republicans, 2 Not affiliated with Democrats or Republicans.
- Any commissioner may propose a slate. Commissioners may build a slate cooperatively for proposal by one.
- Multiple slates may be considered, but only 1 slate per commissioner at a given time.
- A slate may only be modified by the commissioner who proposed it.
- When designing or modifying a slate no formulas or specific ratios may be applied to ensure commission diversity.
- The first slate approved by 5 votes is the one adopted.

(At least 2 Democrats + 2 Republicans + 1 Not affiliated with either.)
