Welcome and thank you for tuning in 5 to the California Citizens Redistricting Commission Communities of Interest Input Meeting. I am Commissioner 6 7 Toledo, and I will be co-chairing today's meeting with 8 Commissioner Russell Mark Yee. With that, I'd like to 9 ask Ms. Kaplan to take roll call. 10 MS. 1 COMMISSIONER SINAY: Presente. MS. KAPLAN: Commissioner Taylor? Commissioner Toledo? 3 CHAIR TOLEDO: Here. 4 5 MS. KAPLAN: Commissioner Turner? Commissioner Vazquez? 6 7 COMMISSIONER VAZQUEZ: Here. MS. KAPLAN: Commissioner Yee? 9 COMMISSIONER YEE: Here. 10 MS. KAPLAN: Chair, roll call is complete. Thank you, Ms. Kaplan. 11 CHAIR TOLEDO: I will start by sharing about the Commission. 12 13 10 years after the federal government publishes updated 14 Census information, California must redraw the boundaries 15 of its Congressional, State Senate, State Assembly, and 16 State Board of Equalization districts, so that the 17 districts correctly reflect the state population. 18 In 2008, California voters authorized the creation 19 of the Commission when they passed the Voters FIRST Act. It authorized the Commission to draw the new district 2.0 21 lines for State Senate, State Assembly, and the State 22 Board of Equalization districts. In 2010, a 2.3 Congressional Voters FIRST Act added the responsibility 24 of drawing Congressional districts to the Commission. 25 The fourteen-member Commission is made up of five

Republicans, five Democrats, and four not affiliated with either of those parties. The Commission must draw district lines in conformity with very strict, nonpartisan rules designed to create districts of relatively equal proportion, that will provide fair representation for all Californians.

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When we receive Census data, the Commission begins drawing maps using six line-drawing criteria as outlined in the California Constitution. One of these is minimizing divisions of counties, cities, neighborhoods, and communities of interest to the extent possible.

We can obtain the city and county information from those jurisdictions. But we need the neighborhood and communities of interest information from Californians directly. That's why we have launched these communities of input sessions, to get that valuable information from you directly. We encourage all Californians to participate in this process.

If you would rather submit your community of interest input over the internet, you can do so from our website by visiting drawmycacommunity.org. And, of course, you can skip the line and go online.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Commissioner Ahmad? 16 17 COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Good morning, everyone. 18 thank you for joining us today for our Bay Area focused 19 input meeting. I'm very excited to learn more about my 2.0 own surrounding communities from all of you. 21 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you. 22 Commissioner Akutagawa? 2.3 COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: Hi, good morning California 24 and the Bay Area. I'm Linda Akutagawa. I am from

southern California, born and raised in the east San

1 Gabriel Valley, and now living in Orange County. But I feel like the Bay Area is a part of my overall family history, as I have lots of family that live in the area. 3 4 So looking forward to hearing about the greater Bay Area. 5 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you. Commissioner Jane Andersen? 6 7 COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Good morning, California. 8 Good morning, Bay Area. My name is Jane Andersen, and I actually live in Berkeley. So I'm looking forward to 10 hearing this morning from all different people in the Bay 11 Area, and anyone else who would like to call in from 12 California. Thank you. 13 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you, Commissioner Andersen. MS. FRANKLIN: Good morning. My name is Nicole

Franklin (ph.), calling on behalf of BWOPA. And the area

I'm calling about is east Oakland; boundary from Lake

Merritt down to the Oakland Airport. Also, east up to

580, and then down to the Oakland/San Leandro border.

MR. MANOFF: Thank you. Go ahead please.

MS. FRANKLIN: Yes. My name is Nicole Franklin. My pronouns are she/her. I'm calling on behalf of east Oakland, as well as the organization Black Women Organized for Political Action, or BWOPA. The mission of our organization is promote, support, and educate African American women about the political process, encourage involvement, and to affirm our commitment in solving those problems affecting African American in the Bay Area and throughout California.

Founded in 1968, we are a statewide, nonprofit advocacy and membership organization with nine chapters and over 2,000 members. We held one community of interest session, we emailed, and made phone calls to various community groups and individuals. Our meeting drew nine community members. Some of those members were longtime residents of both east Oakland and west Oakland.

With the increase in gentrification, migration out of the Bay Area, voter suppression tactics, BWOPA wants to uplift our community to ensure that they are aware of the redistricting process, that our voices are being heard to ensure that we have strong representation in the U.S. Congress and at all levels of government. African Americans have lived in east Oakland since the 1940s due to being pushed out of other areas of the city and because of redline laws that did not allow Blacks to live in the surrounding east Bay cities. the recent skyrocketing housing prices, disinvestment in east Oakland, east Oakland residents have been quickly losing basic services and economic opportunity. To ensure that these areas receive the federal and state fundings that it needs to rebound, it is important to keep all of east Oakland and I would also add west Oakland together. On behalf of BWOPA I want to thank you for your time, and hope that you vote to keep east Oakland together. Thank you. Thank you for your testimony. CHAIR TOLEDO: COMMENT MODERATOR: Right now will be 0-0-4, and up next will be 0-0-7. 0-0-4, I will be promoting you now. 0-0-4, your

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speaker order number is number 2. If you'll please make

note of that for future reference. You can now enable your audio and video in the lower left corner of your screen. If you will please remind the mapper of what area you would like to discuss today, the floor is yours.

MR. KAHN: Yes. I want to speak -- my name is

Robert Kahn (ph.). I'd like to speak specifically about
the border between Contra Costa County and Alameda

County, at the Caldecott Tunnel, between Orinda and
Berkeley; yes, that's -- right exactly there. That's

precisely correct where the tunnel is, exactly. Thank

you.

As I said, my name is Robert Kahn. I'm a resident of Walnut Creek, and I'm calling about north Alameda and west Contra Costa counties. I'm calling to inform the Commission about how the Caldecott Tunnel serves as a major dividing line between Berkeley and Oakland on one side, and Orinda, Lafayette, and Walnut Creek on the other. This issue is surely familiar to Commissioners Yee, Turner, and Andersen, but probably less so to the others.

I've lived in Walnut Creek on the east side of the Caldecott Tunnel for 42 years. But during that time, I worked in Berkeley on the west side of the tunnel. The tunnel runs through the hills that divide our two regions, connecting Alameda and Contra Costa counties.

1 Anyone who drives through this tunnel will tell you how different one side feels from the other. On the east 3 side, the towns are suburban, a contrast to the much more 4 urban Berkeley and Oakland cities. As a consequence, 5 specific issues, schools, roads, congestion that confront the two regions are quite different. Indeed, the two 6 7 sides of the Caldecott Tunnel are even in different 8 climate zones. During the summer it is not uncommon for 9 Walnut Creek to be thirty degrees warmer than it is in 10 Berkeley. 11 Other than traveling through the tunnel to see family, we do all our shopping and go to a workout club 13 in the suburban towns in the east of the tunnel. 14 I ask the Commission to please draw the cities of 15 west Contra Costa County including Orinda, Lafayette, 16 Moraga, and Walnut Creek in the legislative district 17 separate from our neighbors in Berkeley and Oakland. Wе 18 are two separate sets of communities divided by the 19 Caldecott Tunnel and by the border between Alameda and Contra Costa counties. Thank you. 21 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you. 22 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 2.3 Right now is 0-0-7, and up next will be 0-0-5. 0-0-7, I will be promoting you now. 0-0-7, your

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speaker order number will be number 3. If you'll please

make note of that for future reference. You can now enable your audio and video in the lower left corner of your screen. And if you will please remind the mapper of what area you would like to discuss today, the floor is yours.

MR. PAYNE: Hi there, thank you. This is Jeremy

Payne for Equality California. I feel like I'm traveling

up the State of California with all the Commissioners

here. Again, I'm with Equality California, the nation's

largest statewide LGBTQ-plus civil rights organization.

I'm going to be talking about the East Bay region.

So south Contra Costa County and northern Alameda County,

kind of bordering -- actually, okay -- the city of El

Cerrito to the north, heading all the way down to

northern Oakland. Yes, so that kind of swath right

there.

And so -- yes, before I begin I just want to thank you again for taking an interest in our LGBTQ-plus community. We have over 154,000 members in Zone C and, of course, hundreds of thousands of members across the state of California. And as I'm sure you know by now, Equality California is engaged in the redistricting process to ensure fair representation for the LGBTQ-plus community.

And we have identified through our robust data set a

1 significant geographically specific LGBTQ-plus community in Zone C that is kind of outside of the traditional San Francisco area. And that, of course, is here in the East 3 Bay region, stretching from the city of El Cerrito in the 4 5 north, and kind of traveling down south to Albany, Berkeley, Emeryville, and northern and eastern Oakland 6 7 including the downtown of Oakland by Lake Merritt. All these regions have a history of voting 9 cohesively to elect candidates of choice, and that 10 includes both members of the LGBTQ-plus community and 11 officials who have been consistently responsive to our 12 LGBTQ-plus community needs as well. 13 This region, and the LGBTQ-plus community of 14 interest that represents this area, has historically been 15 represented by the 9th Senate District, the 13th 16 Congressional District, and two Assembly districts, the 17 15th and the 18th. And the representatives of these 18 districts were elected by the LGBTQ-plus community of 19 interest, which is growing and thriving in this 20 community. It's the same LGBTQ-plus community of 21 interest that has elected diverse LGBTQ-plus leaders 22 locally in the cities of El Cerrito, Berkeley, 23 Emeryville, and Oakland. 24 And this kind of just goes to show some of the 25 cohesive voting patterns of LGBTQ-plus representation in

- communities, as well as paving the way for LGBTQ-plus
  representation that truly reflects the diversity of the
  LGBTQ-plus community.
  - I just wanted to identify this not so commonly thought of LGBTQ-plus community of interest, and to thank you for your time, and to say I look forward to having future conversations as we continue to go through our data set. Thank you so much, and have a great rest of your day.

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- MS. CONWINER: Hi. I'm Deborah Conwiner (ph.), and
- 21 I'm calling specifically about the border between Orinda
- 22 and Berkeley.
- 23 COMMENT MODERATOR: Go ahead.
- MS. CONWINER: Okay. Hi. I'm a resident of Orinda,
- 25 and I'm calling about the cities of Orinda, Moraga,

1 Lafayette, Berkeley, Oakland, and Richmond. And I'm calling to ask the Commission to draw the cities of 3 Lamorinda into a separate district from Berkeley, 4 Oakland, and Richmond. 5 Years ago, when my husband and I moved back to the Bay Area from the East Coast, we wanted to live in a 6 7 suburban area to raise our family. I attended UC 8 Berkeley, but we chose Orinda because we wanted somewhere with more space and a neighborhood that was less dense. 10 Berkeley and Oakland have five to six times the amount of 11 people per square mile than Orinda, and a housing stock 12 that is four to five times older. Orinda fit better with 13 what we were looking for. 14 In 2019, the San Francisco Chronicle summed up about 15 how we feel about our community, quote, To describe 16 Orinda as succinctly as possible: It's over the hill, 17 through the Caldecott, and a world away from the noise, 18 chaos, and bustle of the cities like Oakland along the 19 Bay. 20 One of my sons played Lacrosse in high school, and 21 his team, Miramonte, completed in the Diablo Valley 22 Athletic League against other high schools in suburban 23 Contra Costa. We rarely crossed county lines for our

I hope I've been able to illustrate for the

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sports competitions.

1 Commission how the suburban communities of Lamorinda have interests that are distinct from the urban cities of 3 Berkeley and Oakland, and we would like to be represented 4 by someone who understands our unique needs, and we ask 5 that you draw us into separate districts. Thank you so much for your time. 6 7 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your testimony. COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. Right now is 0-0-5, and then up next will be 0-1-5. 10 0-0-5, I will be promoting you now. 0-0-5, your 11 speaker order number will be number 5. If you will 12 please make note of that for future reference. And if 13 you'll please let the mapper know what area you would 14 like to discuss today, the floor is yours. 15 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Hi. Yes, I would like to 16 discuss east Contra Costa County. I am in Brentwood, 17 California. Yes, right there and a little bit to your 18 east. Yeah, that area right there. 19 And I'm calling because we go really, really far out 20 to the east currently, and I think that one of the big 21 attributes that we have in our area is the Delta. 22 splitting up the Delta into many little small parts 23 currently, and I think we need them to be more cohesive, 24 brought together. We're seeing a lot of issues with

Delta issues and, you know, water being diverted, and

things along that line. And you know, increased salt levels. We need a greater focus on the Delta.

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So I would like for it to be more north than it is right now. I don't know if you can look up north. Right now, we don't include a lot of the areas that go over Antioch and Pittsburg, or up to Rio Vista. So I think that we need a stronger voice for the Delta. It is such an important and natural resource that we cannot lose sight of that.

The other thing about the area out here is that we're really big on outdoor areas. So we have a lot of outdoor regional parks. You know, we use the Delta for recreation. So that's another thing that we need to focus.

I'd also like to include more areas of Antioch and Pittsburg. We have seen a huge growth out in east Contra Costa County over the ten years. I personally moved here from east Oakland -- someone else spoke about east Oakland. And we moved out here just for a slower pace of life, and we're seeing increased traffic. So we haven't actually addressed the infrastructure with the growth. We need a strong voice for that.

We also need to work on having cities have control over their growth. Sacramento is sending a lot of rules and regulations. You are probably familiar with 89,

where they're demanding growth. But no one is addressing things like the roads or the schools. Our schools are being impacted as well, like we're seeing all over California. And all we're doing is adding portables.

So we need to make sure that we have strong voices

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So we need to make sure that we have strong voices that address the growth and the infrastructure that is going with that. Agriculture too; we have a very strong agricultural history out here, and we're seeing it diminished. We're seeing it being built over, which is just not the right thing to do.

So we need to find a district that is really going to protect our agriculture. We cannot afford to lose any more acreage to companies that want to just come build homes. We really need to make sure that we have these resources left for future residents.

In the beginning, I didn't introduce myself. I'm actually a newly elected Brentwood councilperson. I've never been involved in politics before, but I am here today, representing the Alliance for a Better Brentwood. We actually beat a measure, measure L, in 2019, that wanted to expand our --

MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- by 2,400 square feet. We showed up with forty percent turnout during a special election, which was double the usual of special elections

1 with strong voices to hold growth, and listen to residents when it comes to buildup. 3 Thank you so much for all the work that you're 4 doing. I know it's a lot. I appreciate it. 5 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you, Councilwoman. COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 6 7 Right now will be 0-1-5, and up next will be 0-0-2. And I would like to invite 0-0-6, 0-1-1, and 0-1-3, to 8 use the Raise your Hand button at the bottom of your 10 screen to enter the comment queue, as you have 11 appointments for this session. And once we are done with 12 the appointments for this session, we will be moving on 13 to the callers. And we appreciate your presence. 14 0-0-2, I will be promoting you now. 0-0-2, your speaker order number will be number 6. If you will 15 16 please make note of that for future reference. You can 17 now enable your audio and video in the lower left corner 18 of your screen. And if you will please remind the mapper 19 of what area you would like to discuss today, the floor 20 is yours. 21 MR. CHIU: Hi, good morning. My name is Alfred Chiu 22 (ph.). I live in Berkeley, California. I would like to 2.3 discuss the Alameda County area, yes. 24 First, like so many others have said, there is a

huge difference between the inner side of the East Bay

Hills versus everything east of the Caldecott Tunnel. So
I just want to echo that as well.

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The second thing I want to mention is that right now the East Bay is kind of split between the 15th and 18th Assembly Districts. And one of the consequences of that is that we've got a couple of clusters of Asian American population, one of them near UC Berkeley in Berkeley, and the other one near Oakland Chinatown in downtown Oakland, just south of the lake, that are currently divided into two different Assembly districts. And it would be great if in the next round of districting those two could be brought together, so that we could have more of a representation in that area.

As far as other Asian American clusters, if you go further south into the southern part of Alameda County areas like Fremont, Union City, but nowadays also we've seen more Asian Americans moving into places like Dublin, Pleasanton as well. And this community also crosses south into Santa Clara County, which is reflected in how the 25th District is currently drawn right now. So that is a cluster that should be kept as well. Thank you.

COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much.

Right now we have 0-1-5, and up next will be 0-1-0. And again, I would like to invite 0-0-6 and 0-0-8 to use your Raise your Hand button at the bottom of your screen to enter the comment queue.

0-1-5, I will be promoting you now. 0-1-5, your speaker order number will be number 7. If you will please make note of that for future reference. And if you will please let the mapper know what area you would like to discuss today, the floor is yours.

MS. MEYER: Good morning. Forgive me for sounding sick. I am representing far east Contra Costa County into your Brentwood area, specifically. There we go, that'll do.

My name is Susannah Meyer. I am also a Brentwood
City Council member. I'm a third generation Californiaborn. And my day job is actually working for the State
Senate. I'm a representative for the entire east and far
east Contra Costa County. And of course, I just
mentioned my night job is as a Brentwood City Council
member.

In previous work I worked for a very well-known nonprofit, representing the entire east county, and working to understand the needs of seniors in this area. So with those three different roles I'd had a very good opportunity to understand the needs, the stakeholders, the community leaders, the social service situations with the entire east Contra Costa County area. So I feel like I'm experienced enough to be able to speak about that.

I would say that one of the things we all really need to understand about this area is that, as a previous speaker noted, we've had incredible and very, very fast growth. The social services in this area have not kept up with the needs of the people in our towns. I would also agree that living along the Delta, we need to understand the needs of that; the tunnel and the water.

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We are currently in District 9 also supporting

Stockton, but I would say I don't believe that Stockton

is in the same situation when it comes to socioeconomics.

And the town that I represent, and the cities that are

surrounding for us, we're a variety of cultures and

political beliefs, and religions, ages, economic levels.

But we are united and known as east and far east Contra

Costa County.

District 9 does not currently include Pittsburg and Bay Point, but the way our social services work, the way the Delta works to support us in the economics and the community, the culture, the traffic, the infrastructure. All of those things, I believe, should be included into one.

I would actually love to see the area such as all those little small Delta towns, Rio Vista, included in this district as well as we are united around that. We are a community that loves our outdoor sports. We love

1 our boating and our hiking. We have our Mount Diablo views, and our Delta waters, and our East Bay breezes, 3 and our heat from the Valley. We do hike and boat, and 4 we all commute along Freeways that are congested. Our 5 kids go to schools that are overpopulated. I would like to see us working together as a voice 6 7 for east and far east county and potentially, like I 8 said, expand into other communities that are impacted and along the Delta. We as a whole have moved to this area 10 to get away from some of that really intense --11 Thirty seconds. MR. MANOFF: 12 MS. MEYER: -- and fast-paced Bay Area lifestyle. 13 And I think that unites us as well. It's something we 14 need to keep an understanding of. And I would say that 15 one of the other things that we unite as a voice over is 16 agricultural and open space protection. 17 MR. MANOFF: Fifteen seconds. 18 MS. MEYER: It is important for our communities. 19 Thank you very much for everything, and for allowing us a 2.0 voice --21 Sorry to interrupt, Councilwoman. CHAIR TOLEDO: 22 Can you please specify a little bit more about which 2.3 Delta towns you would want to include with your 24 communities? Just specifically which ones.

I think I would -- yes, Rio

Sure.

MS. MEYER:

1 Vista, Isleton, Locke. I would forget some of the names. I take that drive all the time. I don't think we need to 3 go super far up there, because Sacramento is a different 4 community. 5 But like Locke, Rio Vista, there are communities that are right along, right on the other side of the 6 7 bridge over Antioch, over -- and they go into the Sacramento River over the Delta. So it's right on the 8 other side of the bridge that those communities are 10 sitting. Yeah, you can see that -- Rio Vista and 11 Isleton. And we're already -- Bethel Island is part of it 12 13 too. As you can see, that all kind of works around the 14 same line along the Delta. 15 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you. That's very helpful. 16 MS. MEYER: Thank you. 17 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your testimony. 18 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 19 Right now we have 0-1-0, and up next will be 0-0-9as caller 8-1-8-0. 2.0 21 0-1-0, I will be promoting you now. 0-1-0, your 22 speaker order number is number 8. If you will please 23 make note of that for future reference. And if you will 24 please let the mapper know what area you would like to

discuss today, the floor is yours.

MS. SMITH: Sure. So I will be discussing the communities of Orinda and Berkeley. Okay, great.

So my name is Hannah Smith. I was raised in Orinda and attended Orinda public schools from kindergarten all the way through high school. I am now a rising senior at UC Berkeley.

Like others have said, Orinda and Berkeley are about fifteen minutes away from each other and are only separated by a hill. However, they are incredibly different in physical characteristics, demographics, problems, and interests. These communities generally do not come together to advocate on similar issues, services, and infrastructure, and as so, they should be kept in different districts.

Orinda is classified as semi-rural with much more space and a suburban feel than UC Berkeley. Community members in Orinda have consistently prevented the building of low-income or multifamily housing. As such, much of the town consists of large and expensive homes. However the housing situation in the communities surrounding UC Berkeley is much different. The city is much more urban, and most students live in apartments in the surrounding area. Although this community has also faced its own struggles with providing its members an affordable place to live.

However, while community members in Orinda have consistently fought multifamily or low-income housing proposals, the streets surrounding UC Berkeley are filled with new apartment complexes that will hopefully meet the growing needs for housing for students.

The demographics of Orinda and Berkeley are also very different. I received all of my education from Orinda public schools until I went to UC Berkeley. There were very few students of color in my classrooms, and often those students of color did not actually live in Orinda.

UC Berkeley is not nearly as diverse or supportive of students of color as they should be. But students of color are still much more represented in the population of UC Berkeley than in my hometown. Frankly, a lot of Orinda is old, rich, and White, which is very different from the population and students attending UC Berkeley and also the community members living in this area.

The communities within Orinda and UC Berkeley also face different challenges. UC Berkeley students have faced incredibly high rates of aggravated assault and theft. Students are often attacked on the street on their way home from class, or have had their computers stolen from coffeeshops, and many students can't afford to simply replace these items that are essential to their

1 | academic wellbeing.

Generally, you don't have to fear walking the streets of Orinda at night. I mean, most recently, the biggest fear plaguing those in Orinda was a single aggressive coyote.

I have highlighted a few of the differences between these geographical areas to demonstrate that these communities are separated by a lot more than just a tunnel or a hill. They have different populations, different goals and interests, which is why they should be kept in different districts. Thank you so much. I appreciate your time.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for sharing the morning with us and your testimony.

15 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much.

Right now will be 0-0-9 as caller 8-1-8-0. And then up next will be 0-1-1.

Caller 8-1-8-0, if you'll please follow the prompts
to unmute. Caller 8-1-8-0 --

20 MR. BIRSAN: Thank you.

COMMENT MODERATOR: Hi. I have a couple of brief instructions for you. Your speaker order number will be number 9. If you will please make note of that for future reference. And if you will remind the mapper of what area you would like to discuss today, the floor is

yours.

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MR. BIRSAN: Okay. Three areas. Number one, the city of Concord. Number two, Contra Costa. And number three, part of the Delta.

MR. MANOFF: Thank you. Go ahead please.

MR. BIRSAN: Okay. I'm Edi Birsan. I'm a City

Council member and former Mayor of Concord. And as full

disclosure, I'm on the Contra Costa Democratic Central

Committee, the State Executive Board, and the State

Delegate Board.

We've got an issue, where we're looking at the most logical community of interest. The very most fundamental community of interest is an incorporated city. They have come together as a community of interest to incorporate and run. Therefore, my request is that all these small cities, you know, everything under like a couple of hundred thousand, should not be divided. For twenty years, Concord was divided in two, and it was terrible. We're 130,000 people now. We were divided when we were 180.

Second, so places like Lafayette, Orinda, Moraga, et cetera should not be divided in their congressional districts or others.

Then furthermore, on our county level, if we respect the county lines, we won't have the problem of Orinda,

1 Lafayette, Moraga, and Berkeley, because they're in a 2 different county.

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Then, there is also the issue of political unity.

We've got a congressional district which includes the majority of Contra Costa except for the city of Pleasant Hill and Martinez. And Martinez is the capital of Contra Costa County. And Pleasant Hill, I don't know what Pleasant Hill has in common with Vallejo on the other side of the river. These are things that we need to take into account.

Furthermore, on the Delta, I fully agree that the Delta has certain unique characteristics that deserve concentration as their interest. Even though I would say, my first thing is don't divide the cities. But if you can keep the Delta cities or Delta locations together, that makes total sense to me. So those are my three points.

Oh, I should also add that the Democratic Party of Contra Costa voted on Thursday to advise our Board of Supervisors that we want to keep our cities together in their redistricting, because it is the fundamental community of interest. Thank you.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your testimony.

COMMENT MODERATOR: So right now we have 0-1-1, and then up next we will have 0-0-6. And I do invite 0-1-3

to use the Raise your Hand button at the bottom of your screen. I see your hand, 0-1-3. So right now will be 0-1-1, and up next will be 0-0-6.

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0-1-1, I will be promoting you now. 0-1-1, your speaker order number is number 10. If you will please make note of that for future reference. You can now enable your audio and video in the lower left corner of your screen. If you will please remind the mapper of what area you would like to discuss today, the floor is yours. 0-1-1, you can now enable your audio and video -- there you are.

MS. GORDON: Thank you. I'm going to leave my video off because I have some unstable Wi-Fi. My name is Vicky Gordon (ph.). And the area that I would like to discuss has been discussed at length quite a bit from speakers before me. So I will try and keep it brief. It's Contra Costa.

And I want to support the sentiments of the east county and the Brentwood area. They are a community. They have very special issues and interests, and the Delta is key to them and to all of us. But they understand it better than any of us in Contra Costa.

I'd also like to support the sentiments of everyone talking about the Orinda/Berkeley border in west Contra Costa. It looks like they're close, but those are two

worlds very different, and I think many of the speakers have eloquently said exactly what is -- which the communities represent there.

And the last one was new. Edi Birsan had brought up one of the -- I live in Martinez and have lived in Martinez/Pleasant Hill all my life here. And we are a part of a district that goes across the Bay into Benicia, Vallejo, and Solano. And while east county has -- because it's a Delta and not a Bay, they do have definitely areas of interest, whereas the Bay and the Carquinez Strait were a world away from Solano County. I'm hoping that we can -- Martinez and Pleasant Hill, can get back into our community of Contra Costa.

I will also say that I am a former trustee of the Contra Costa Community College District, and we are one of the few college districts that include all of Contra Costa, and it is a good thing. It brings this community together as a whole. And as Edi Birsan said earlier, we have -- the DPCCC has just voted to also let our Board of Supervisors know that we want to keep our cities together and our community as a whole together.

So thank you for your time. I don't want to be repetitive, but I do want to support the boundaries that have been explained prior to my time. Thank you.

COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much.

I would like to invite 0-0-8 to use the Raise your

Hand button at the bottom of your screen, as you have an
appointment during this session. And right now, we have

0-1-3, and following that we will be going to our phone

callers.

Right now 0-1-3, I will be promoting you. And

again, 0-0-8, I invite you to use the Raise your Hand button at the bottom of your screen to enter the comment queue line.

0-1-3, I am promoting you now. 0-1-3, your speaker order number will be number 11. If you will please make note of that for future reference. You can now enable your audio and video in the lower left corner of your screen. And please let the mapper know what area you would like to discuss today, the floor is yours.

MS. BUTLER: Hello everyone. I'm also going to keep my camera off because there is currently a thunderstorm, and my internet is going in and out. But I will be speaking about the City Council Districts 3 and 7 in Oakland. Three is near the port of Oakland, and District 7 is the Oakland/San Leandro border.

So just to introduce myself. I'm L.J. Butler (ph.) with Oakland Rising. We are a political organization comprised of a collaborative of nine grassroots organizations in Oakland. And so we work to inform and

1 mobilize the Black, Indigenous, people of color communities, specifically voters in historically disenfranchised and underrepresented communities in east 3 4 and west Oakland flatlands. And we mobilize folks to 5 take action on racial, economic, environmental, and social, and political injustices impacting their lives on 6 7 a day-to-day basis. And for over a decade we've actually gained twenty-9 five percent of Oakland's voter population as supporters. 10 And so we actually partnered with the Black Census & 11 Redistricting Hub to run a COI session, and then 12 successfully recruited seven participants from City 13 Council Districts 1, 3, and 7. 14 And we feel it's really important to uplift the 15 Black community because we definitely need to build 16 political power within the Black community, and have 17 value-based leadership in representation of our 18 communities. And allow community (indiscernible) 19 Districts 3 and 7, specifically, should remain the 20 current district they are, given that there is still a 21 significant Black population there. 22 However, some concerns were that we have a weak 23 Black economic system, and our communities have been 24 divested in given that there's gentrification, a lot of

folks have been displaced. And so it's important that we

1 keep our folks in their respective areas, given that the great migration actually brought 1.6 million Black folks 3 to the Bay Area. So it's important that we keep our 4 folks here, given that we built so much. There are so 5 many families. And the homeless population is increasing given that there is displacement. So it is really 6 7 important that we keep those lines strong, and keep resources and funds within our communities so that our 8 9 folks can live --10 MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds. 11 MS. BUTLER: -- and actually thrive and not just 12 And I really, really want to thank you all for 13 the opportunity to speak today, and I'm looking forward 14 to empowering our communities together. 15 CHAIR TOLEDO: A quick question for you --16 MR. MANOFF: Just a moment, Chair. 17 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you. 18 Welcome back, 0-1-3. The Chair had MR. MANOFF: 19 some questions for you. 2.0 CHAIR TOLEDO: I think you're still on mute. 21 MS. BUTLER: Oh, okay. 22 CHAIR TOLEDO: No worries. Just a quick question. 23 For state and federal redistricting purposes, can you 24 just describe the boundaries that you feel are important

25

to keep together?

1 MS. BUTLER: Yes. So it is west Oakland near the port. It's on the borderline of -- if you zoom in a 3 little -- so on the borderline of Emeryville and the port near the water. And then District 7 is that really bold 4 5 line. Can you move up a little bit? I'm sorry, down. It's that border next to the number 18. So yes, that 6 7 border right there. CHAIR TOLEDO: Is that the San Leandro border or 8 9 the --10 MS. BUTLER: It's below the 18, that's the San 11 Leandro border. 12 CHAIR TOLEDO: Okay, I see. Thank you. That's very 13 helpful, and we appreciate your testimony. 14 Thank you. MS. BUTLER: 15 COMMENT MODERATOR: Right now we have 0-0-6, and 16 then we will be going to our callers. We invite those 17 that have called in to please press star 9 to raise your 18 hand, indicating you wish to comment. We do have several 19 raised hands already. So right now will be 0-0-6, and 20 then we will be going to caller 2-7-3-9. 21 0-0-6, I will be promoting you now. 0-0-6, your 22 speaker order number is number 12. If you will please 23 make note of that for future reference. You can now 24 enable your audio and video in the lower left corner of 25 your screen. With that, the floor is yours.

MR. MONROE: Hello. My name is Ian Monroe (ph.). I live in north Oakland, and I would like to discuss the west side of East Bay, SD-09. Yeah.

so basically I would really urge the Committee members to look at the AC Transit District. I mean, not all special districts are historically significantly or relevant. But I think this bus district is actually a really useful way of thinking about things. Because it kind of grew organically as the bus service was added, and it represents a contiguous area of urban space.

So like not only -- this area is a community of interest not only because we have a bus system in common, but we share a lot of the same housing crisis, we're part of the same, like career and job shed. And part of that is highlighting the difference between east and west Contra Costa. What you see, the current Senate District 9 does largely respect AC Transit. The AC Transit District reaches all the way from, like Richmond down to Fremont.

And I think you've heard other testimony that might explain, like, where do you want to put lines within that area. I feel like all that area kind of makes sense for us to be together. The population is too big to be in any district that you're districting. But the whole area kind of makes sense together. That's really what I

wanted to highlight, and agree with others about the
difference between either side of (indiscernible). Thank
you.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your testimony.

COMMENT MODERATOR: And on to our lovely patient callers. Caller 2-7-3-9 will be right now, and then up next will be caller 0-0-7-3.

Caller 2-7-3-9, if you will please follow the prompts to unmute. Caller 2-7-3-9, you are unmuted. I have a couple of brief instructions for you. You speaker order number will be 13. If you will please make note of that for future reference. And if you will please let the mapper what area you would like to discuss today, the floor is yours.

MR. VAN METER: Good morning. I'd like to talk about Marin in the north coast counties. My name is Peter Van Meter. I'm a former Sausalito City Council member, and was very active in the 2010 redistricting process, where we combined Marin County with the rest of the North Bay counties into our districts.

Decades ago, we were linked to San Francisco, which was totally inappropriate, because that was totally different community of interest. We in the North Bay counties are suburban in character, coastal communities, large agricultural components, much different than

1 composition in the city of San Francisco.

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And when I see that we're in Outreach Zone 6, the other suburban counties, that is concern to me. Because that seems like a hint that you may want to combine our county with San Francisco as it was in decades past, and to which I say it simply did not work.

We want to continue the format of our existing districts, linking us to North Bay and to not link us together with San Francisco. So I'd much rather see this as part of Outreach Area A, because that's the way we exist today, and that's the way, in fact, that it should continue.

So the fact that we're in C may be tempting for you to try to balance districts by bringing people from San Francisco into our area, and I strongly, strongly urge you against that, because in the past that simply did not work. Frankly, because the representatives are going back to the area -- Milton Marks is an example, were elected mostly by people from San Francisco, and they did not represent the interests of the people in Marin County. Thank you.

22 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your testimony.

COMMENT MODERATOR: And right now we have caller 0-0-7-3, and then up next will be caller 6-3-5-1. And I invite those callers in the queue to please press star 9

to raise your hand, indicating you wish to comment.
Right now we have a couple of raised hands.

MR. AI: Of course. If you could pull up the city of San Jose and Santa Clara County.

discuss today, the floor is yours.

Hi Commissioners. My name is Mike Ai with Equality California, the nation's largest statewide LGBTQ-plus civil rights organization, with over 154,000 members in Zone C, and hundreds and thousands of members across California. Before I begin, thank you for taking an interest in our community.

As I'm sure you know by now, Equality California is engaging in the redistricting process to ensure fair representation for the LGBTQ-plus community. We have identified a very significant geographically specific LGBTQ-plus community of interest in the city of San Jose and Santa Clara County region, and we want it to bring to your attention as you hear form others in Zone C at today's hearing.

The city of San Jose and Santa Clara County region has served as a major building block of the local LGBTQ-plus community. And Santa Clara County has had a history of voting cohesively to elect candidates of choice, both members of the LGBTQ-plus community and officials that have been consistently responsive to the LGBTQ-plus community's needs.

This region, an LGBTQ-plus community of interest, has historically been divided in representation between the 17th and the 19th Congressional District, 13th and 15th Senate District, and 25th and 27th, and 28th Assembly District. The Santa Clara County LGBTQ community of interest was able to elect San Jose's first LGBTQ-plus elected official in 2000, who departed in 2006 when he became the first LGBTQ-plus person elected to the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors.

And since then, the city has seen a number of local LGBTQ-plus candidates demonstrating the influence of positive representation. The nearby cities of Sunnydale and Mountain View, the same Santa Clara County LGBTQ-plus community of interest, helped to elect the first Latina, an openly queer person, to the Sunnydale City Council in 2020; and the youngest and first openly LGBTQ-plus elected official to the Mountain View City Council in 2012.

1 This history of successful LGBTQ representation in pockets of Santa Clara County and region that continues 3 to this day demonstrates the sizeable and thriving LGBTQ-4 plus community of interest in the area. 5 Thank you for the time today, and we are looking forward to continuing our conversation with you about the 6 7 importance of representation that can be achieved through 8 this process. 9 CHAIR TOLEDO: I just had some clarifying questions. 10 MS. AI: Sure. CHAIR TOLEDO: Where specifically -- can you just 11 12 specify the boundaries of the community of interest which 13 you are talking about? Specifically, where in San Jose 14 you would draw the line? 15 MS. AI: I don't have the exact maps or the street 16 names for you, but I can provide that later in a written 17 testimony, if that's preferable. 18 CHAIR TOLEDO: Yes, it will be helpful to get the 19 written testimony just associated with your unique number 20 for this testimony. You would reference it with the 21 unique number that was given to you. 22 MS. AI: Okay, will do. 2.3 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you, we appreciate it. 24 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much.

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I want to speak about Marin County and the rest of the North Bay. And I'm speaking as an educator. I'm a teacher. I live in Marin County now. And I've lived and worked in San Francisco and Marin, and Sonoma over the years. I'm in Marin now. And my experience, my impressions, and the impact that I have as an educator, a teacher, has made it clear to me that there is a community of interest between Marin County and the North Bay.

Let's just say the educational philosophy, the educational values and infrastructure between the city, which I am very familiar with, and Marin and Sonoma, are very, very different. In terms of the educational landscape, Marin belongs with Sonoma County. It's much more than the fact that they're both agricultural counties, and they're both suburban. It's a -- we have a community of interest based on the, I think it's the shared values of the students and parents in the schools.

I think it would be an enormous mistake to put Marin County together with San Francisco. It doesn't make any sense at all. And I'm speaking from long, long experience here. I just wanted to focus on education in this case.

Once again -- I think that a previous caller

1 mentioned something about the letter C or another letter. If that means that there is any (indiscernible) that's a 3 grave mistake. Please be sure to keep Marin County 4 together with Sonoma County and the rest with the North 5 Bay where it belongs. I'll be happy to answer any questions if you have any for me. 6 7 CHAIR TOLEDO: A quick question, in terms of the North Bay counties you've referenced, which North Bay 8 9 counties are you speaking of? Or which North Bay 10 counties would you want to be kept together? 11 Physically, (indiscernible) UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: 12 County but also Mendocino, and frankly, all the way up to 13 (indiscernible). I think (indiscernible) County belongs 14 with the north coast, the North Bay. It's simply -- a 15 community of interest based on much more than just the 16 fact that they are suburban. It's based on shared values 17 in the educational community. 18 Thank you. That's very helpful. CHAIR TOLEDO: 19 appreciate your testimony. 2.0 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you. 21 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 22 Right now we have caller 4-1-5-1, and up next will 2.3 be caller 1-3-6-1. 24 Caller 4-1-5-1, if you will please follow the

prompts to unmute. Caller 4-1-5-1, you are unmuted.

1 have a couple of brief instructions. Your speaker order number will be 16. If you will please make note of that 3 for future reference. And if you'll please let the 4 mapper know what area you would like to discuss today, 5 the floor is yours. MR. STICKNEY: Hi. Can you please bring up the city 6 7 of San Francisco? Specifically, everything west of Route 8 1. 9 MR. MANOFF: Go ahead, please. 10 MR. STICKNEY: Commissioners, my name is Joshua 11 Stickney with Equality California, California's largest 12 LGBTQ-plus civil rights organization with over 154,000 13 members in Zone C, as I'm sure you've all heard now. 14 a proud resident of San Francisco's Mission District, a 15 key center of both the LGBTQ-plus and Latino communities 16 in the city, I'm here today to discuss the significant 17 geographically specific LGBTQ-plus community of interest 18 in Zone C. 19 Specifically The Castro, an internationally 20 recognizable LGBTQ-plus community, the LGBTQ-plus and 21 LEATHER cultural district, which encompasses much of 22 SoMa, The Tenderloin, home of the Transgender District 23 and site of the famed Compton's Cafeteria riot, and 24 stretching down to west of Twin Peaks, (indiscernible) 25

Heights, Noe Valley, Glen Park, and Bayview, have all

served as major building blocks of the local LGBTQ-plus communities in San Francisco, and have a rich history of voting cohesively to elect candidates of choice with members of the LGBTQ-plus community and allies who have been consistently responsive to the LGBTQ-plus community's needs.

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For example, when the San Francisco Board of
Supervisors transitioned to district elections in 1977,
this community was able to elect candidates of choice for
the first time. District 8 has continued to elect openly
LGBTQ-plus supervisors for the last two decades, many of
whom have gone on to represent San Francisco in the State
Assembly and Senate and what are currently Assembly
District 17 and Senate District 11.

Senate District 11, which encompasses San Francisco County and parts of San Mateo County, has elected two consecutively openly LGBTQ-plus senators. Both have been the LGBTQ-plus community's most effective advocates during their time in Sacramento, passing first in the nation civil rights legislation, benefitting lives and wellbeing of LGBTQ-plus San Franciscans and the communities statewide.

Congressional District 12 has repeatedly elected one of the United States top representative most ardent champions for the LGBTQ-plus community and people living

1 | with HIV from 1987 to date.

Finally, ten years ago this Commission worked to keep San Francisco's significant geographically specific LGBTQ-plus community of interest together in Assembly District 17, Senate District 11, and Congressional District 12, actually consolidating part of the community that was previously separated into Congressional District 14.

We simply ask that the Commission once again keep

San Francisco's LGBTQ-plus community of interest together, again in these districts as they currently exist, so as not to dilute the community's power to elect candidates of choice. Thank you again for your time.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Caller, quick question on the districts, if you have a second?

16 MR. STICKNEY: Sure.

CHAIR TOLEDO: So are you -- can you just specify the districts you want to be kept together, or is it that you're asking that the districts just remain the same?

Can you just specify the districts?

MR. STICKNEY: Correct. So specifically Assembly

District 17, Senate District 11, and Congressional

District 12 we would request be kept the same. And then
in regards to some of the city's supervisorial districts,

for Supervisor District 7 the goal would be again to keep

1 the lines the same and to ensure that it is inclusive of west of Twin Peaks. And for Supervisorial District 8, that nothing is removed including Diamond Heights. 3 CHAIR TOLEDO: Okay. So because the focus of this 4 Commission is state and federal. So we definitely will 5 be able to take that into consideration. Any local 6 7 redistricting would have to go through the appropriate 8 redistricting commission. 9 MR. STICKNEY: Of course. 10 CHAIR TOLEDO: We appreciate your testimony. 11 MR. STICKNEY: Given the consolidation of the 12 community, it is important to mention. Thank you. 13 CHAIR TOLEDO: Absolutely. Thank you for your 14 testimony. 15 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 16 Right now we have caller 1-3-6-1, and then up next 17 will be caller 0-7-0-9. And I do invite those that have 18 called in to please press star 9 to raise your hand, 19 indicating you wish to comment. Please press star 9 to 20 raise your hand, indicating you wish to comment. 21 Right now we have 1-3-6-1, if you'll please follow 22 the prompts to unmute. Caller 1-3-6-1, you are unmuted. 2.3 I have a couple of brief instructions for you. Your 24 speaker order number will be number 17. If you will 25 please make note of that for future reference.

1 you will please let the mapper know what area you would 2 like to discuss today, the floor is yours. MS. LOVE: Hello, can you hear me? 3 COMMENT MODERATOR: Yes we can. Go ahead. 4 5 MS. LOVE: Awesome. Thank you. Hi. My name is Caroline Love (ph.). I use she/her pronouns. And I grew 6 7 up in several towns of Marin County, but mostly in Corte 8 Madera, California. I am now a college student living in 9 Oakland. And I have taken several courses at Mills 10 College and at UC Berkeley regarding the U.S. Census and 11 the use of its data including one on redistricting and 12 gentrification. Last summer, I was also an enumerator 13 with the U.S. Census, going door to door conducting 14 Census interviews in east Oakland in English and Spanish. 15 I would like to highlight the very first speaker's 16 testimony, and reiterate the importance of keeping all of 17 east Oakland and also west Oakland together if at all 18 possible. 19 Today, however, if you could please zoom in on the 20 North Bay area of Marin, where I was raised. And before 21 2011, as two other speakers have mentioned, Marin used to 22 be in a district with San Francisco. Thankfully it is 23 not anymore, and I'd like to urge that Marin not be 24 lumped in with San Francisco again. The Golden Gate 25 Bridge clearly separates San Francisco from Marin.

Instead of putting the less populous areas of Marin with the bustling city of San Francisco, all of Marin County must remain together. It's better Marin be a North Bay city such as other areas of Napa and Sonoma than with San Francisco. Just one example, Marin City near Sausalito is an integral but underserved area of Marin. And just two years ago the Sausalito/Marin City School District was found to be knowingly segregating schools they fundraised and was forced to integrate.

As Marin County continues to grapple with a history of disenfranchisement of its Black and Latino residents, it's imperative that all of Marin stays together as to not further disenfranchise any of our minoritized community members. This includes Marin City, the San Rafael Canal neighborhood, and all of west Marin. Marin should not be lumped in with San Francisco, as Marin and San Francisco are geographically and culturally separate.

Thank you, and I can answer any questions you may have.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you. A specific question. So you referenced North Bay. Can you just specify where the lines would be with -- where you would want Marin to be connected to in terms of -- you referenced Sonoma and Napa. Is that all of those counties or is that -- so can you give more description in terms of where your lines

1 would be? 2 MS. LOVE: Yes, thank you. I think, in my 3 experience Marin ends with Novato. But other areas up 4 there, I'm not from there exactly, but it's more so on 5 the eastern and western borders. The Richmond Bridge is the end of Marin on that side, and then the Golden Gate 6 7 Bridge on the other side. And then up north, I'm not the expert on that area, but I'd say those are more kind of 8 9 connected culturally, but around Novato mainly. 10 CHAIR TOLEDO: We appreciate your testimony. Thank 11 you for --12 MS. LOVE: Does that help? 13 CHAIR TOLEDO: Yes, absolutely. Thank you for 14 joining us this morning. 15 MS. LOVE: Thanks. 16 COMMENT MODERATOR: Right now we have caller 0-7-0-17 9, and up next we have caller 0-4-2-9. 18 0-7-0-9, if you will please follow the prompts to 19 unmute. 0-7-0-9, you are unmuted. I have a couple of 20 brief instructions for you. Your speaker order number 21

brief instructions for you. Your speaker order number
will be 18. If you will please make note of that for
future reference. And if you will please let the mapper
know what area you would like to discuss today, the floor
is yours.

MR. MALHI: Thank you very much. Good morning,

1 Commission. My name is Satinder Malhi, and I'm calling as a resident of Martinez, which is located along the northern waterfront of central Contra Costa County. By 3 4 way of background, I am a first generation Sikh American, 5 an elected delegate to the California Democratic Party for Assembly District 14. And I've worked in the State 6 7 Legislature for nearly a dozen years. I'm also a current member of the Parks Recreation Marina and Cultural 8 9 Commission and the newly constituted Anti-Racism And 10 Discrimination And Pro-Inclusion And Equity Taskforce For 11 The City Of Martinez. 12 I'm calling this morning to ask that you please keep 13 the communities of Martinez and Pleasant Hill with the 14 rest of central Contra Costa County. For example, Senate 15 District 3 was redrawn in the last go-around to include 16 both Martinez and Pleasant Hill, and thereby placing it 17 in the same district as Petaluma, Davis, and Woodland, 18 which simply doesn't make any sense and by any objective 19 measure cannot be viewed as being communities of 2.0 interest. 21 As the County seat for Contra Costa, Martinez has 22 much more in common with the neighboring Senate District 2.3 7 communities of Concord, Pacheco, Walnut Creek, among

others around regional issues such as transportation,

education, healthcare to name just a few, than it does

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with communities far to the north of us.

Therefore, I would respectfully ask that the Commission please place the entirety of these two cities back together with the majority of central Contra Costa at both the Legislative and Congressional levels. Thank you for your time and consideration.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your testimony.

COMMENT MODERATOR: Right now we have caller 0-4-2-9, and then next we have caller 5-3-0-2. And I would like to invite the other callers in the queue to please press star 9 to raise your hand, indicating you wish to comment. Please press star 9 to raise your hand, indicating you wish to comment.

Right now, we will go to caller 0-4-2-9. If you will please follow the prompts to unmute. Caller 0-4-2-9, you are unmuted. I have a couple of brief instructions for you. Your speaker order number will be 19. If you will please make note of that for future reference. And if you will please let the mapper know what area you would like to discuss today, the floor is yours.

MR. KEARNON: Yes, good morning. My name is Peter
Kearnon (ph.). I live in Novato, so that's part of Marin
County. I want to address the community interest for the
North Bay. I am a supporter of MALT for open space

1 preservation, as well as Greenbelt Alliance. lot in common to the North Bay with the, you know, 3 contiquous coast. We have agriculture, a transportation 4 system. 5 So I want to see the continuation of that community of interest that Marin County be included with Sonoma, 6 7 Mendocino, up the north coast to the Oregon border. Except for a bridge, we do not have continuity with the 8 urban part of the Bay Area, and I think it is appropriate 10 for the community of interest of Marin County to remain 11 in the north coast, North Bay, if you will. 12 So again, I live in Novato and, you know, I want to 13 see us stay as a district right now. 14 CHAIR TOLEDO: So your communities of interest are 15 Marin all the way up to the Oregon border. Is it 16 specifically those counties. I'm just getting a question 17 what you meant by North Bay. Is it the north coast 18 counties that you mentioned? 19 MR. KEARNON: Yes --2.0 CHAIR TOLEDO: If you could just elaborate on that. 21 MR. KEARNON: Well, certainly Marin and Sonoma have 22 specific continuities and comparables. Again, with the 23 agriculture that both counties represent, with the coast, 24 we have the Pacific coast that is contiquous. The open

space that we've developed and preserved for agriculture

purposes as well as for recreation, is consistent with how Sonoma is being laid out and planned.

The transportation system we have, although it ultimately, you know, ends in Santa Rosa, is contiguous through both counties. We share 101 and the issues, whether they are headaches or not that are related to that transportation system. So I'm not sure how far to the east that, you know, I think is an open question, whether Solano or Napa, or other counties are North Bay as well. I would say not. I believe Marin, Sonoma, Mendocino represent the North Bay, and continue following the Pacific coast, that would be my recommendation.

CHAIR TOLEDO: We appreciate it. We have the information that we need. Thank you. And thank you for your testimony.

MR. KEARNON: I appreciate that. Okay. Bye now.

COMMENT MODERATOR: Right now we have caller 5-3-0-

2. I would like to invite the other callers in the queue

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23 Right now we have caller 5-3-0-2. If you will
24 please follow the prompts to unmute. Caller 5-3-0-2, you
25 are unmuted. I have a couple of brief instructions for

1 you. Your speaker order number will be number 20. you will please make note of that for future reference. 3 And if you will please let the mapper know what area you 4 would like to discuss today, with that the floor is 5 yours. MS. DONETTE: Hi, good morning. My name is 6 7 Dominique Donette (ph.). I'm representing the California Hawaii State Conference NAACP. We represent fifty-six 8 9 branches of members who are deeply invested in this topic 10 throughout the state of California. 11 Our main concern is keeping African American 12 businesses and communities strong throughout the state. 13 We have a strong desire to unite the Black communities in 14 Oakland under one State Assembly and one State Senate 15 District. The city of Oakland should be united into one 16 Assembly AD-18, and Senate District SD-9, and there is no 17 reason or rationale why the areas of the city north and 18 downtown, and Interstate 580 should be bifurcated from 19 the rest of the city by assembly districts. 2.0 The split not only hurts representation for Oakland 21 residents, but continues the division of the Black 22 community along a Freeway barrier. 2.3 In the northern East Bay Area, another area of 24 concern is the city of Vallejo. While located in Solano

County, Vallejo has much more in common with the urban

1 areas of the East Bay like Richmond and San Pablo, and the Commission should consider including Vallejo in East Bay Assembly District 15, and Senate District SD-9. 3 4 also includes the shores of the San Francisco Bay Area. 5 Additionally, we want to continue to encourage you all as the Commission to think about who and how you are 6 7 partnering with to get the word out about this community 8 input process. Many of the callers I've heard on this 9 call today do not represent the African American 10 community. That is of great concern to a statewide 11 entity like the NAACP. Equity and equality, and the 12 drawing of the lines is important to us. Community 13 involvement and collaboration is critical to this effort. 14 And keeping communities whole and not causing disruption 15 is also critical to us. 16 On behalf of the California Hawaii State Conference 17 NAACP, we thank you for your consideration of our 18 concerns. 19 CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for joining us this 20 morning, and thank you for your testimony. 21 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 22 I like to invite those in the queue to please press 23 star 9 to raise your hand, indicating you wish to 24 Again, if you'll please press star 9 to raise

your hand, indicating you wish to comment.

1 Caller 9-7-5-5, if you'll please follow the prompts to unmute. Caller 9-7-5-5, you are unmuted. I have a 3 couple of brief instructions for you. Your speaker order 4 number will be number 21. If you will please make note 5 of that for future reference. And if you will please let the mapper know what area you would like to discuss 6 7 today, the floor is yours. MS. NICHOLS: Hello Commissioners. 8 COMMENT MODERATOR: Hello, go ahead. 10 MS. NICHOLS: Yes, hello Commissioners. I'd like to 11 give some information. My name is Vicky Nichols (ph.). 12 I'm in Sausalito. And I would urge you to keep the 13 contiguous district -- the north coast district from 14 Sausalito on up to the coast. I agree almost identically 15 with the comments made by the previous speaker, Peter 16 Kearnon. 17 But I would like to emphasize another important 18 factor of us not being part of the San Francisco 19 District, and that is the many environmental conditions 20 that we share in Marin County. We know that we're having 21 a severe drought issue. We know that fires are a 22 problem. There has been much preparation and allocation 23 of assets for fire prevention. Though we are underway 24 with our geographic areas, these two conditions know no 25 physical boundaries.

So I think that not having San Francisco connected with us makes sense. I was here when it was part of the district, and I believe a previous caller mentioned 2011. So I would urge you to -- in fact, I think the current district configuration is actually working well for the adjoining counties, to do this planning. And I think at this point that's then my main comment.

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It's more about the geographic quality and conditions that we have from the Golden Gate Bridge north that some robust planning is being done, and I think it will be financially prudent that we can do this long-term planning collectively with inter-county planning. So I urge you to consider that. Thank you very much for your time.

I'd also like to mention that it was with great difficulty, and I felt almost discouragement, that I got on your site today. I continuously got a message that the site was not secure. So I think that's discouraging to people. So I would urge you to have some kind of preparation that that either gets corrected, or there is another message involved. I'm sure a lot of people gave up, which is very unfortunate. Thank you for your work.

CHAIR TOLEDO: Thank you for your testimony and for

joining us this morning and for your feedback. We appreciate it.

1	With that, we are going to go to a fifteen-minute
2	break. I want to thank everyone who has joined us this
3	morning and provided testimony. We will continue to
4	accept testimony in the afternoon, when we get back in
5	fifteen minutes. When we return, Commissioner Yee will
6	be chairing that session. And we'll start with
7	individuals who have registered with an appointment, and
8	we'll open up the lines after those individuals have
9	given their testimony.

13	CO-CHAIR YEE: Welcome back. We continue with
14	today's communities of interest input meeting for the
15	California Citizens Redistricting Commission. I'm
16	Commissioner Russell Yee, here in Oakland, and I'll be
17	chairing this part of this morning's meeting.
18	We encourage you, as always, to visit our
19	communities of interest online tool. It's at
20	drawmycacommunity.org; drawmycacommunity is all one word,
21	dot org. And there, you can submit a community of
22	interest map and description, and we will receive that.
23	That will be considered with all the same weight as calls
24	taken today. That's drawmycacommunity.org.
25	We continue with those who have appointments for

1 today's session, and then once those are done, we will take calls from those who do not have appointments. 3 So I will now pass it over to Katy, our comment 4 moderator, to continue with public input. 5 COMMENT MODERATOR: Welcome to the public input session. Please use the Raise your Hand button at the 6 7 bottom of your screen to enter the queue. When it is your turn to speak, you will be identified by your 8 assigned unique ID number, which you were emailed 10 yesterday. You will be reconnected to the session with 11 the ability to enable your own video and/or audio. 12 You will then be assigned a speaker order number 13 before you begin speaking. mode. At the beginning of your input, please remind the mapper of what area you would like to see on the screen.

Right now we have 0-1-6, who is our only appointment in the queue at this time. So I will invite the other two callers there, if you would like to press star 9, it will raise your hand, indicating you wish to comment. So please press star 9 if you would like to raise your hand.

0-1-6, I will be promoting you now. 0-1-6, your speaker order number will be number 22. If you will please make note of that for future reference. You can now enable your audio and video in the lower left corner of your screen. If you will please remind the mapper of what area you would like to discuss today, the floor is yours.

MS. BONNER: Good morning. I hope you all can hear me. I'm actually going to be discussing Contra Costa County, specifically Antioch. So more to the right, yeah, there we go. Specifically, I want to talk about Antioch District 1.

So my name is Chala Bonner, and I'm the current manager of the Safe Return Project. The Safe Return Project is based in Richmond, California. Although we are currently building base in east Contra Costa County, where we focus on Antioch, Pittsburg, and Bay Point.

We are a nonprofit organization whose mission and

vision is to re-enfranchise those that have been
disenfranchised by the criminal justice system. And we
are invested in building a base of power at the
political, social, and economic level of formerly
incarcerated people across the state of California,
addressing the root causes of poverty and the impact of
the criminal justice system.

We conducted a community of interest session that focused specifically on the Antioch area. Our COI included eight community members who live and/or work in east Contra Costa County. Our group was very diverse in ethnicity. And what we want to do is actually lift up the specific community, which is Antioch District 1. It pretty much is from north of Highway 4 all the way to the waterfront, and it goes from Summerville Road all the way to Highway 160. And that's what's considered Antioch District 1.

And we're uplifting this specific community, because we have seen an increase of Black and Brown people in this area due to the rent increases in other parts of the Bay Area. Specifically the Sycamore corridor, for example, is predominantly working class Black indigenous people of color. They are in need of more resources, and currently have more liquor stores than grocery stores that are easily accessible. There are no youth centers

in this area for young people to go to get tutoring,
college prep, or help job applications.

Some people in our community of interest session expressed that they feel like they are the forgotten community. They don't feel like they are represented very well because there is such a great need for resources in their community. They feel they have to go way across town to get groceries, a nice place to eat, to enroll their kids in different programs and services. And we want to stop this by making sure this community stays together and receives adequate representation and resources that are so desperately needed.

MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds.

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MS. BONNER: In closing, it is very important to keep Antioch District 1 together, and that they be represented by someone who will listen to their needs and concerns, someone who will treat them -- who will not treat them like a forgotten community, and someone who -- MR. MANOFF: Fifteen seconds.

MS. BONNER: -- has the passion and wants to end excess disparity in this community. Thank you for your time, and for considering our community.

Let's stand at ease for two 11 12 minutes. 13 COMMENT MODERATOR: And we do -- go ahead. 14 CO-CHAIR YEE: I see that we actually do have a 15 caller. We can go ahead to that caller. 16 COMMENT MODERATOR: Caller 1-5-0-8, if you will please follow the prompts to unmute. Caller 1-5-0-8, you 17 18 are currently unmuted. I have a couple of brief 19 instructions for you. Your speaker order number will be 20 number 23. If you will please make note of that for 21 future reference. And if you will please let the mapper 22 know what area you would like to discuss today, with that 23 the floor is yours. 24 MR. FARLEY: Hi. My name is Jesse Farley (ph.).

would like to discuss Martinez and Benicia within Contra

1 | Costa County.

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I'm calling in today to talk about keeping Martinez and Benicia in the same legislative and congressional district as they are now. I was born and raised in Martinez. My family has been in this town for their entire lifetime. And I also have extended family who live in Benicia, who have participated in the community there as firefighters and on the police force.

While there is a body of water between us, we are a community united by many bonds. The Carquinez and Benicia Bridge easily connects our residents and our economy. We are both small suburban communities with a historic charm of quaint downtown. Our kids play in the same sports league, our high schools interconnect with their communities. We also recreate together.

One of our most heavily utilized trails was my personal favorite, is the Carquinez Strait and Shoreline. It runs along the ridge overlooking the Carquinez Strait, and serves as a link to the San Francisco Bay Trail, and the trail offers cyclists and walkers with a great view of the water and our neighbors of Benicia. Also, both of the shorelines contain multiple fishing docks and piers.

Martinez and Benicia have been situated in the same districts for the last ten years, and the districts have served us well. We share similar challenges,

1 specifically shared exposure from the refineries located in both of our towns. In Martinez, we have the Tesoro and Shell refineries. Benicia is home to the Valero 3 4 refinery. And our nearby community of Rodeo also has the 5 ConocoPhillips refinery. All four of these refineries need a strong regulation to monitor both their emissions 6 7 and any leaks into the Bay. The fact that our representatives have four refineries in their district really forces them to pay 10 attention to those emission concerns to respond with 11 emergency when emergencies occur, and to carefully follow 12 proposed regulation and corresponding community input. 13 This would not be the case if the refineries were split 14 into different districts. 15 Thank you for your commitment to ensure that our 16 communities of interest, like Martinez and Benicia remain 17 connected and in the same district. Thank you for my 18 time. 19 CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you. 2.0 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 21 And I would like to remind those in the queue to 22 please press star 9 to raise your hand, indicting you 2.3 wish to comment. 24 And at this time, Chair, we do not have anyone in

the comment queue.

1 CO-CHAIR YEE: Okay. Now we will take that two-2 minute stand at ease. 3 (Pause) 4 MR. MANOFF: That two minutes, Chair. 5 CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you. It looks like we still don't have anybody with their hand raised. Why don't we 6 7 go ahead and queue up the five-minute video and run that, 8 and then we'll come back after that. 9 (Media played) 10 CO-CHAIR YEE: Welcome back. We'll hear the call-in 11 instructions again from our comment moderator, Katy; the 12 short version, please. 13 COMMENT MODERATOR: Yes, Chair. 14 The Commission will now take community of interest 15 input by phone. The full call-in 19 instructions have been read previously in this session, 20 and are provided in full on the livestream landing page. 21 And at this time, Chair, we do not have any raised 22 hands. 2.3 CO-CHAIR YEE: Okay. Thank you, Katy. 24 While we wait for other possible callers, why don't 25 we have a round of stories? Bay Area memories,

restaurant recommendations, things to do, growing up stories, anything else from our Commissioners that they would like to share about the Bay Area.

COMMISSIONER AHMAD: I can share.

CO-CHAIR YEE: Please, Commissioner Ahmad.

COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Rent prices are way too high.

CO-CHAIR YEE: Call your representative today.

Yes, Commissioner Sinay.

COMMISSIONER SINAY: Well, I'm going to think like Commissioner Akutagawa and bring up food. Of all the places I've lived, except for Peru, I would say just going out to eat in the Bay Area, especially San Francisco, is just such a treat. And as much as everything else is overpriced, I've always found restaurants to be priced appropriately and accessibly.

I remember friends who lived in the Bay Area before the dotcom bust, who lived down in Silicon Valley, would come up and visit us, and slum it with us in Haight-Ashbury. And they would take us to these restaurants I couldn't afford on a nonprofit salary. But one time it was, like let us choose the restaurant. We took them to a few places, and they were like, oh my gosh, this is so good, oh my gosh, this is so affordable.

And when I first moved to San Diego, besides my friends and my colleagues, I really missed just being

1 able to go to a restaurant and know I was going to walk away with a good meal. Now, having said that, people in 3 San Diego don't get upset. Our restaurants have gotten a 4 lot better in the past twenty-three years. Commissioner 5 Kennedy and I had a wonderful lunch a few weeks back, and we have wonderful views and different ones of our 6 7 restaurants. But when I first made the move, it was 8 hard. 9 CO-CHAIR YEE: I still want to come down for fish 10 tacos. Although Oakland considers itself the taco truck 11 capital of the world, so. You can come up and try ours. 12 COMMISSIONER SINAY: The tacos are very different in 13 northern California than southern California. It's 14 fascinating. We don't really put rice and beans in our 15 burritos the way you all do up there. 16 CO-CHAIR YEE: Could you describe the geography of 17 that taco region for us? 18 Other Bay Area thoughts, memories, recommendations? 19 Although I've been here my whole life, I always discover 20 new places. Yesterday, my wife and I took a hike for the 21 first time ever in Wildcat Canyon, which is behind 22 Berkeley/Kensington, that area. 2.3 Beautiful views of the Bay, and then we had lunch on 24 Point Molate, which is an old Navy Field Depot right

above the Richmond Bridge there, Richmond-San Rafael

1 Bridge, in the Black Pirate Barbeque Grill. We splurged. Beautiful day and beautiful view there on the Bay. 3 Anyone else? Commissioner Toledo, any growing-up memories? 4 5 COMMISSIONER TOLEDO: I mean, growing up in Alameda was just a great experience, especially with the Naval 6 7 Base that was there at that point. So it was a very 8 diverse community and just a great place to grow up, and still a very wonderful community. I still go there quite a bit because I still have lots of friends and family in 10 11 the city of Alameda and neighboring Oakland. 12 And just one shoutout. I know that the executive 13 director for a long time, I think she was there for over 14 thirty years, Sherry, for the Executive Director for 15 Asian Health Services, has retired, and has a new 16 leadership team. So that's really wonderful that they 17 promoted from within the organization, and such a 18 wonderful organization that serves the Asian American 19 community in Chinatown and across the Alameda County, and 20 so mostly Oakland. 21 But you know, just a lot of changes during COVID, a 22 lot of folks retiring. I was a little shocked to see 23 that she has been such an active player with community 24 health centers and with the healthcare sector for such a

long time. Actually, I ended up being elected on to the

board of La Clinica de la Raza Community Clinic. 1 was my childhood community clinic in a joint townhall between Asian Health Services and La Clinica, which are 3 4 two of the community health centers in Oakland. 5 And they brought, you know, patients or they bused patients from all over Oakland to a church and, you know, 6 7 like (indiscernible), and had a townhall and held an election. And I was voted on to one of the 8 (indiscernible) at that point. And so that is the memory 10 that I remember. It was a joint townhall where both 11 Clinica and Asian Health Services were doing similar 12 joint governance, and there are different organizations 13 that are working together on advocacy and, you know, 14 health improvement. 15 And so I was, you know, shocked to see Sherry 16 retiring. I think I never expected -- I never expect 17 anyone to retire. I want them to continue on forever. 18 And so when they do, it's just a reminder that, you know, 19 that things change. But she has done so much to improve 20 the health services for the people of the East Bay and 21 for the Bay Area. 22 CO-CHAIR YEE: Give her that shoutout. 23 actually the clinic where my wife has been a physician 24 for many years. And it has been amazing to see the

The organization

leadership there and how it has grown.

1 is over 500 employees now, and really thriving and providing great care, as well as health education and political advocacies for the community. 3 4 Any other memories? Stories? 5 COMMENT MODERATOR: Chair, I would like to remind those calling in to please press star 9 to raise your 6 7 hand, indicating you wish to comment. As for those that have just called in, please press star 9 to raise your 8 9 hand that you wish to comment at this time. 10 And we do not have any raised hands at this time. 11 Again, if you will please press star 9 to raise your hand 12 when you wish to comment. 13 COMMISSIONER TOLEDO: I'm sure, Commissioner 14 Andersen has stories for us from Berkeley and all over. 15 CO-CHAIR YEE: Pick one, Commissioner Andersen. 16 COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Well, I do actually. One I 17 might think of right now is when Commissioner Yee 18 actually kind of triggered this thought. There is a lot 19 of areas in Richmond and Point Richmond that people have 20 no idea about, one of which is Know Regional Park. 21 it's actually end up going through an old train tunnel to 22 get to it. It's right on the Bay, but it's sort of -it's south of the Richmond Bridge. 2.3 24 And it has a wonderful park. Families go and 25 have -- you know, teach their children to ride their

bikes. There are picnicking areas. But it also has a marvelous model train building, which -- it only has G-model and HO-models in its enormous train buff area, which is truly, truly fun.

And also, then up in the Berkeley Hills there is, of course, the steam train rides, which is one of the very few still that are going on; and it's in Tilden Park.

And it shuts down -- actually part of the road actually shuts down for the newts crossing in the winter across one of the roads there. That actually was written up in National Geographic even.

But they have a huge train area, and they also have a large area where people who have worked on trains, the ride-on version, like the size of your lawnmower. And those all go around that area too. So it's quite interesting. Very, very different. I just thought I'd bring that one up.

CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you, Commissioner Andersen. We need for the newt community of interest to call in.

COMMENT MODERATOR: Again, I'd like to remind those and ask those calling in to please press star 9 to raise your hand, indicating you wish to comment. Please press star 9 to raise your hand, indicating you wish to comment.

If you will please make note 5 of that for future reference. And if you will please let 6 the mapper know what area you would like to discuss 7 today, the floor is yours. And if you also please mute 8 your livestream audio? 9 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Hello. We're calling from 10 Inverness in Marin County. And we are very concerned 11 about --12 MR. MANOFF: Just a moment, caller. Could you 13 please speak up and get very close to your phone. And 14 please make sure there is nothing between your phone 15 microphone and yourself. 16 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay. We --17 MR. MANOFF: Can you speak a little louder? 18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay. We are very concerned 19 about the redistricting. We live in Inverness, Marin 20 County, and we are very rural area, and closer in 21 commonalities with Sonoma County, and not happy about 22 being aligned with or redistricted into San Francisco or 2.3 other urban areas. So that is our comment from out here 24 in the country. 25

Thank you.

CO-CHAIR YEE:

1 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Hello? 2 CO-CHAIR YEE: Yes, thank you so much. 3 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you. 4 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 5 And up next we have caller 5-3-8-4, unique ID code 0-2-0. Caller 5-8-3-4, if you will please follow the 6 7 prompts to unmute. Caller 5-3-8-4, you are unmuted. have a couple of brief instructions for you. Your 8 speaker order number will be number 25. If you will 10 please make note of that for future reference. And if 11 you will please let the mapper know what area you would 12 like to discuss today, the floor is yours. 13 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you. I'm a resident of Novato in Marin County. I would like to advocate for 14 15 keeping the area defined by the Novato Unified School 16 District boundaries together as a community of interest, 17 as that is the greater area of the city of Novato. 18 Novato is a suburban city that is developed from a 19 farming town with lots of open space. The area is 20 committed to preserving the open space. The city voters 21 overwhelmingly approved measures to protect its open 22 space through an urban growth boundary. The area also 23 faces significant wildfire risk, and shares a school 24 district, water service, and its own fire protection 25 district.

I'd ask that you keep Novato united in a district along with all of Marin County, and to pair Novato and Marin County with Sonoma County, and not San Francisco.

Marin and Sonoma counties share significant commonalities including infrastructure projects, dealing with the Novato Narrows, which is a significant bottleneck on Highway 101 connecting Marin and Sonoma counties. That has been a thorn in the side of local officials for decades, and that is being worked on at the state and federal levels. As well as the Sonoma Marin Area Rail Transit, which voters in both counties support through local taxes and use to commute.

Both areas also have significant agricultural industries and lots of open space. And Marin receives a lot of its drinking water from Sonoma County. Nearly three-quarters of the water in Novato, where I live, comes from the Russian River in Sonoma County. And a lot of the teachers in Novato also live in Sonoma County.

I'd ask that you respect the commonalities and include Marin in a county -- in a district, excuse me, with Sonoma County. And I'd ask that you do not pair us in any way, shape, or form with San Francisco. Marin has a lot of open space and significant wildfire risk. San Francisco does not have any of those things. It is an urban county with significantly different needs.

1 And while Marin has been paired with San Francisco in the past, I would point out that this is not because 3 they have anything in similarity. It's because they are 4 fundamentally different. The pairing of Marin with San 5 Francisco in the past was not done to advance Marin in any way. It was done to dilute our voices. Because in 6 7 previous iterations, most notably in the 1970s --8 MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds. 9 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- and 1980s, Marin was 10 paired with San Francisco because Marin was a republican 11 stronghold, and San Francisco was not. And so in the 12 1980 and 1982 congressional elections, John Burton and 13 Barbara Boxer --14 MR. MANOFF: Fifteen seconds. 15 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- both won a Marin/San 16 Francisco district, by winning San Francisco but losing 17 in Marin. So I'd ask that you keep Novato together, keep 18 Marin together, pair us with Sonoma, and keep us in a 19 district outside of San Francisco. Thank you so much. 2.0 CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you. 21 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 22 I'd like to invite those in the queue to please 23 press star 9 to raise your hand, indicating you wish to comment at this time. Please press star 9 to raise your 24

hand, indicating you wish to comment.

At this time, Chair, we do not have any raised hands in the queue.

CO-CHAIR YEE: Okav. Any other Bay Area stories any

CO-CHAIR YEE: Okay. Any other Bay Area stories any of you Commissioners like to share.

Commissioner Andersen?

COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: So I've got -- hiking areas.

It's amazing the hiking you can do through -- I actually hiked all through Marin, all through Contra Costa, Alameda, San Mateo, down into Santa Clara. You can actually do the full Bay Area ring, which is very interesting.

Another thing that is also very interesting in the Bay Area is, you can do a transportation ring as well. You can go on a ferry, you can do a full ring from San Jose up to Richmond on BART and come back down on -- you can also do the train through up to Martinez, and then take that back down around. And then you can go ferries, back and forth to San Francisco up to Marin. And then there is another rail now from Marin, the ferry, up through Sonoma.

So it's really great ways as, of course, everything goes into San Francisco. But it's a great way to get around and really see the whole area instead of just staying in one, you know, your immediate neighborhood.

It's a great area to live and go around in.

1 CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you, Commissioner Andersen. Yes, indeed. There is a Bay trail along the shores of the Bay. It's been worked on for decades and it's 3 4 getting pretty close to complete. There is also a Bay 5 Area Ridge Trail that follows all the coastal hills all the way around the Bay, a much longer trail, of course. 6 7 And spectacular views all the way around. 8 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you, Chair. We do have a 9 raised hand at this time in the queue. 10 CO-CHAIR YEE: Very good. 11 COMMENT MODERATOR: You guys have inspired them. Caller 9-9-9-6, if you will please follow the 12 prompts to unmute. Caller 9-9-9-6, if you will please 13 14 follow the prompts to unmute by pressing star 6. Caller 9-9-9-6, you are unmuted. 15 16 MR. SCOTT: Hello. 17 COMMENT MODERATOR: Hi. I have a couple of brief 18 instructions for you. Your speaker order number will be 19 number 26. If you will please make note of that for 20 future reference. And if you will please let the mapper 21 know what area you would like to discuss today, the floor 22 is yours. 2.3 MR. SCOTT: Yes, hello. My name is Scott, and I live here in Berkeley in Alameda County within AD-15. 24 25 And I've lived here in this district for most of my life,

1 between Albany, Berkeley, El Cerrito, Alameda County, Contra Costa County. And I'm extremely happy, and I'm bringing up my family within the same community. And you 3 4 can probably hear the 2-year-old in the background, 5 trying to get me off the phone. And what I've really grown to appreciate now that I 6 7 have a family of my own, is how amazing this community is 8 and how connected we are. The East Bay Regional Park 9 system is amazing and offers opportunities for children, 10 and Bay City Transit connects us. We have 11 (indiscernible) and so many different organizations and 12 facilities that connect us here in the East Bay District. 13 And having our area represented by AD-15 and other 14 representatives gives us a strong voice in Sacramento 15 that allows -- provide a unified voice in Sacramento and 16 helps us to get our needs properly communicated up. 17 So thank you very much for letting me speak. 18 CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you. COMMENT MODERATOR: And that was all of our callers 19 20 at this time, Chair. 21 CO-CHAIR YEE: Okay. Why don't we wait two minutes. 22 Commissioner Fernandez. 2.3 COMMISSIONER FERNANDEZ: Okay. I'm going to share a 24 kind of a funny story a little bit --

Please.

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CO-CHAIR YEE:

COMMISSIONER FERNANDEZ: -- since Commissioner

Fornaciari shared his Disney Land story; I figured I'll share this one.

A few years back, we went to Santa Clara, the university there; my nephew was graduating. And I have a friend at work that is from that area. So you know, of course, I say where are the good places to eat? So he gives me the name of a pizza place, and I can't remember the pizza place. But he also adds, you'll probably see my brother, because he frequents the bar. He didn't tell me the name of the brother and whatever.

So you know, of course, we get there. I have two young kids. We go to the pizza place, and we're sitting there eating. And I keep looking at this guy at the bar, and I'm thinking, man, that really looks like my friend. So you know, my husband and my kids are, like oh-oh, what is she going to do? And so what I do is I get up and go talk to this gentleman at the bar that I didn't know. And I just say, hey, do you happen to know this person who is my friend. He said, yeah, that's my brother.

So anyway, I just wanted to pass on this really -you know, because we're meant to -- moms are meant to
embarrass their children. I embarrassed my children, and
he actually came to the table, and we sat and we talked
for about half an hour. So never be afraid or approach

someone if you think he might look like someone. So you never know if you might make a new friend.

That was my fun little Santa Clara -- everyone we met in the area was just absolutely wonderful. But I always kind of have that memory, that really nice memory of, you know, we chat once in a while. It's not going to hurt.

CO-CHAIR YEE: That's a great story. Thank you so much, Commissioner Fernandez.

Commissioner Andersen mentioned trains. There is, of course, a lot of train history in the Bay Area.

Original terminal is for the Transcontinental Railroad, and so forth. I was a boy of eleven, when BART first opened our Bay Area Rapid Transit system. It was the first new rapid transit system built in the nation for many, many, many decades. And the first one to be computer controlled, the first one to use those magnetic-striped cards, and so forth.

And as a boy of eleven or twelve, that was an amazing gift that, you know, the whole region gave to all of us, and to use the best. I mean, this was space-age technology, ticket machines made by IBM. You know, it was so dazzling. And the idea that, you know, my world had given -- had taken its best and given it as a gift to the public, that really made an impression on me. And my

first rides on it were just amazing.

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So as I think about high-speed rail, to mention that again, I'm still hoping that we can find it in us to 3 4 bring our best once again to the public good. In the Bay 5 Area Terminals there has been a long debate whether it should come up to San Francisco or to Oakland. 6 7 Francisco, that would be through the Pacheco Pass, and 8 Oakland through the Altamont Pass. And I believe, the 9 current line it is through the Pacheco Pass to San Francisco, to the Salesforce Transit Center there. 10 11 We'll see if it happens. I would love to take a 12 ride on it. Not as a boy of eleven, but as a senior of 13 many years. Hopefully in my lifetime, that would be 14 amazing.

It looks like we have a caller? Katy?

COMMENT MODERATOR: We do. I would actually like to invite 0-1-8, to use the Raise your Hand button at the bottom of your screen, indicating that you wish to comment at this time. Thank you so much. I see that raised hand. 0-1-8, I will be promoting you now. And then, following up, it will be caller 0-6-3-2. So right now is 0-1-8, and up next will be caller 0-6-3-2.

0-1-8, your speaker order number is number 27. If you will please make note of that for future reference.

You can now enable your audio and video in the lower left

corner of your screen. And if you will please remind the mapper of what area you would like to discuss today, the floor is yours.

MS. SIMS: Hello, my name is Taylor Sims. And I am the special projects coordinator at Lift Up Contra Costa, representing east Contra Costa County.

Lift Up Contra Costa is a coalition of nine organizations, looking to uplift all marginalized voices within Contra Costa County. Lift Up Contra Costa is committed to fighting against all forms of oppression including anti-Black racism, racism, anti-immigrant, anti-LGBTQ, and the classes anti-work movements. We envision a county in which all people are benefitting from our shared resources. We believe in the value of all of our residents, and are fighting for an environment in which everyone can flourish.

We conducted two COI session with community organizations such as the Safe Return Project, the Central Contra Costa Labor Council, Alliance of Californians for Community Empowerment, and east county residents.

We are uplifting east Contra Costa County, because this community is filled with many Black residents who have been pushed out of other parts of the Bay Areas, and their values are not being represented with local elected

1 officials. In east county specifically, we see there are access disparities within certain areas and districts. 3 For example, grocery stores, places to shop, places to have a nice dinner, quality parks, et cetera. 4 5 For example, the unincorporated town of Bay Point is considered more Concord, but residents share values with 6 7 the residents of Pittsburg. Bay Point students have to 8 bus to Concord for schools instead of going to Pittsburg schools, which could be right down the street from their 10 house. 11 In Antioch, Black residents are fearful their 12 community input may not be considered in the 13 redistricting process where their political power will be 14 weakened. It is important to have elected officials who share east Contra -- excuse me, east Contra County's 15

Black residents' values, work towards equity in their district, and have their voices heard.

Thank you for considering our community.

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CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you. Caller, could you stay on a minute and tell us just a little bit more what you consider east Contra Costa County. You mentioned a few towns.

MS. SIMS: Yes. So east Contra Costa County would be Bay Point, Pittsburg, Antioch, Brentwood, Oakley.

CO-CHAIR YEE: Perfect. Thank you so much.

1 MS. SIMS: Yes, of course. Thank you. 2 CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you. COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 3 And our next -- up next is caller 0-6-3-2. 4 5 0-6-3-2, if you will please follow the prompts to unmute 6 by pressing star 6. 7 MR. BAIER: Hello. Can you hear me? COMMENT MODERATOR: We can. I have a couple of 9 brief instructions --10 MR. BAIER: Okay. Thank you. 11 COMMENT MODERATOR: -- for you. Your speaker order 12 number will be 28. If you will please make note of that 13 for future reference. And if you will please let the 14 mapper know what area you would like to discuss today, 15 the floor is yours. 16 MR. BAIER: Thank you so much. I'm actually going 17 to follow up with the last caller, because I'm going to 18 talk about west Contra Costa County, as well as sort of 19 north Oakland, Berkeley, that area. 2.0 My name is Jonathan Baier (ph.). I'm a resident of 21 Oakland. I grew up in north Oakland, Berkeley, and the 22 Richmond area. I went to high school in the Richmond Unified School -- what was then the Richmond Unified 23 24 School District, now the West Contra Costa County Unified

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School District.

And I think that I want to say that north Oakland,
Berkeley, Albany, El Cerrito, and the west county part of
Contra Costa County make up a community of interest that
is more similar to one another than two areas to their
east, even though east county is part of the same county
as west county, and you know, and then northern Alameda
County is a different county.

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But despite those county lines, there really is a community of interest in the west Contra Costa area and the northern Alameda County area, because these are areas that are very dense, very diverse, majority/minority areas, and places that share a bus system. And of course, the West County Unified School District goes all the way down to the county line in El Cerrito.

So I want to urge you to keep those areas together. They are currently in Assembly District 15. I think that really makes a lot of sense.

And I do want to specifically talk about the Richmond Unified School District as representing a community of interest. The Richmond area is really split up into lots of little cities and suburbs in unincorporated areas, and that's a legacy of disinvestments and a lot of other things that, you know, Richmond is kind of a struggling city in many ways. And it is unfortunate that, you know, it's so split up into

1 lots of different cities. But they're all united in one 2 school district.

And so I urge you to look at that school district as the greater Richmond area, and keep it together when drawing the lines.

And then finally, I just want to say that, you know, the Independent Redistricting Commission is a really great thing, it's a great change that we made ten years ago. But I want to ask you not to make big changes just for changes' sake. Ten years ago the Independent Redistricting Commission really made very major changes to the lines throughout California. And I think the fact that there is less interest this time around shows that they did a really good job ten years ago, that they did a better job than the politicians had done before.

So I think that, you know, you --

MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds.

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MS. BAIER: -- shouldn't start from a blank slate, but look at the great work that was done ten years ago from the independent perspective. So that is my comment. Thank you so much.

22 CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you.

COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much.

COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: Yes. You bringing up the BART story reminded me. When BART first opened, we took a school field trip to ride BART. We took a school bus from Pleasanton to Bay Fair Station in San Leandro, hopped on BART, rode up to Richmond, and then rode back, and then took the bus home. And it was -- I just remember vividly, it was just the coolest thing. Very, very modern and space age, and very cool and exciting for a young boy to ride on BART. So that was a lot of fun.

I do want to -- we had some callers from Inverness, and my wife and I have been fortunate enough to have had a couple of really, really great weekend trips up to Inverness, staying at hotel right there on the water.

It's a little tiny bay that is actually formed by the San Andreas Fault.

And there is a park just south of the tip of the Bay that shows a fence -- there is a fence line that got separated by a bunch of feet during the 1906 earthquake.

And it's still there. You can take a walk right on the

1 fault line and see that. There's a couple of beautiful hikes in that area. And then we were talking about Point 3 Reyes the other day, which is also beautiful. That's 4 all. 5 CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you. Indeed, nobody has mentioned earthquake risk as one of our community of 6 7 interest concerns, which just goes to show the denial we live in, right? I live about a mile from the Hayward 8 Fault, which last had a big one in 1868. Geologists say 10 the average time between major quakes on the Hayward 11 Fault is about 140 years. So we are overdue. 12 course, there is a lot of earthquake preparedness, but 13 many more to do. 14 Okay, if there are no further callers at this time 15 or no further stories, why don't we go ahead and go to 16 the twenty-minute video. Kristian, if we could roll 17 that? And come back at 1:00 p.m. 18 (Media played) 19 CO-CHAIR YEE: Welcome back to our communities of 20 interest input meeting with an emphasis on the Bay Area. 21 We invite all those who had appointments for today to 22 call in. Debra Vinson 16 calling to speak about specifically Antioch, the entire 17 Antioch area going from east Contra Costa all the way 18 back to all of the other cities, which would be 19 Brentwood, unincorporated areas, Oakley. 2.0 I just want to say that Antioch has grown 21 tremendously. And we had our first redistricting of our 22 school district and our city council last year. So I 23 don't feel, even with the redistricting that was approved

by the city council members, that we have equity within

all of the districts in terms of our representation.

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example, those of us who are mixed race have indigenous ancestry, like myself, don't feel that we're getting the complete representation.

The other thing that I want to say is that I'd like for some consideration to be taken into effect so that if an area, say for State Assembly, Congress, Senate, is redistricted, that the economic concerns are taken into place. For example, it wouldn't be fair to have everyone that I would say was considered low income, I know Antioch has disparity by zip code. So I would like to see a more broad representation, a broader integration in terms of economics.

And I would also like to see a broader consideration of the areas in which we live in. For example, some areas are poorer than others, blah-blah-blah. And so many of these people don't participate because they don't feel that their voice is heard.

So I represent -- I am the Chair of the East Contra Costa Democratic Club. I am the District 3, two-time elected rep for our area, and I just wanted to say that I appreciate all of you and the work that you are doing. But I would like for you all to achieve as much as possible on economic balance, so that all the voices can be heard and people can integrate rather than separate based on lower socioeconomic status. I think we need to

take a look at that. And thank you.

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CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you so much. Could you stay on and just tell us a little bit more about what areas you would like kept together in a state level district? Like what are the boundaries?

MS. VINSON: That's a good question in terms of the boundaries. So our Senate area, for example, covers Bay Point, Pittsburg, it covers the entire area. And I think it even covers some areas of the San Joaquin area. So I don't know what can be done about that. And the same with the Assembly District area. The Assembly District area goes all the way out to Vallejo -- I think it's Vallejo-Fairfield. And so those are really large areas.

And so I often feel like Antioch and east Contra

Costa County is often left out. For example, our

Assembly Member used to have an office, and he has

offices in different cities, but no office in the city of

Antioch, for example.

So we're often left out -- we're often -- our voices are not always heard, even though it may appear that way, and we can reach our members. I know our Senate and our Congressman tried to have offices within Antioch, but there is no guarantee either that that is going to happen.

So I'd really like for you all to give some

1 consideration -- you know, you're making those decisions for accessibility to our elected representatives and how accessible they will be to our needs; and the same for 3 4 the Supervisorial District. They think the people seem 5 to like the outer-lying cities. CO-CHAIR YEE: Yes. For those, you have to get 6 7 connected with your County Redistricting Commission. 8 we're only on the Stateline Districts. But we understand 9 your concerns. Thank you for your input. MS. VINSON: Yes. And this is in reference to some 10 of those state -- like for example the Assembly District. 11 12 I think the Senate Districts and the Congressional 13 Districts be fine, but I just want that consideration 14 taken. 15 CO-CHAIR YEE: Very good. But I would believe that this Commission could have the authority to do multi-member districts, so that the majority is not the only group in a district represented. And I think it's really important that labor geographic density is considered as one of the communities of interest in the Bay Area and, of course, communities of color, who have all special needs.

And it tends to be overlooked with business and corporate money coming into the legislature, we end up -- and to the Congress, sometimes getting the short end.

None of the reforms have gone through, and we see even around the country, minimum wage being ridiculously low.

So I just wonder if you were also considering the multi-member district option?

CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you, caller. So our Commission has essentially the responsibility to draw single-member districts, and we do not have that authority. That would be something to bring to the attention of our legislators in Sacramento, if you want to pursue that or promote that option. That is not something we have an option to do.

COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much.

1 CO-CHAIR YEE: You did mention labor. Was there a particular geography to that thought of keeping labor 3 interests together? UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes, it is a way to take the 4 5 geographic density of union membership and organizations into consideration in laying out districts. 6 7 And then one other thing is, you know, a number of 8 cities around the state have multiple senators, and San 9 Francisco only has one. And I just wonder why Fresno and 10 Bakersfield, you know, they have districts that swirl in. So they have two senators, and San Francisco who once 11 12 used to have, in the old days, the majority of the state 13 legislature at one time, you know, we only have one. 14 And if it's possible to consider, you know, if 15 medium and large size cities, you know, other cities have 16 more than one if, you know, how that's distributed. 17 that with the neighboring cities perhaps there are more 18 interests in alignment. 19 CO-CHAIR YEE: Right. 2.0 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Like in San Francisco, the 21 west side or the east side are very different, and the 22 north side, especially, is a bit more affluent and has, 23 you know, a sort of divided presence as well.

And whilst I 12 recognize that today's meeting is about California as a 13 whole for redistricting, I would like to just comment 14 that the importance of regional economies, environmental 15 stewardship, and (indiscernible) as a whole. 16 So if you are looking at a region where I live, east 17 county, we have the Delta and the issues we have with 18 increased salinity. We have farmland, and we just have a 19 lovely environmental backdrop. So when we're looking at 20 redistricting, I think it is very important that we look 21 at it as a region as well. 22 Cutting communities up just for the sake of being 23 able to say we've redistricted, it has the potential to 24 have a very negative impact socially, environmentally,

and economically. Not just for families, but also for

1 businesses and social services. So again, I'm speaking as a resident homeowner in 3 Oakley. Thank you for this opportunity today. 4 CO-CHAIR YEE: So caller -- are you still there? 5 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes. 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1 MR. BOWMAN: Zoom in to San Francisco. I only see 2 the regional map here. 3 MR. MANOFF: There is a slight delay on your 4 livestream, sir. We see the map now. Go ahead, please. 5 MR. BOWMAN: Okay, thank you. What I'd like to say is that the redistricting that was done in San Francisco, 6 7 not under the gerrymandering of (indiscernible) Brown machine back in 1970, 1980, and 1990, with the governor's 8 special master's, there was the court-drawn lines in 10 1991, and then the legislature in 2001 drew the lines as 11 they should be, that basically created east/west Assembly 12 Districts, renters on the east side, homeowners on the 13 west side. 14 And what happened under the California Redistricting 15 Commission was that that was all turned over. 16 basically the homeowners were diluted on the west side 17 and added to the heavily renter areas on the east side by 18 adding the Portola, the Visitacion Valley, and Excelsior 19 districts, which are over sixty percent homeowner, into a 20 district that was roughly twenty-three percent homeowner. 21 I think homeownership, whether you're wealthy or 22 you're just struggling and working class, does represent 23 a community of interest. I think that basically the 24 Commission violated that community of interest when it

25

drew its lines.

1 If you look at the Congressional District as well, you'll see that west of Twin Peaks that the Forest Hill, 3 basically west of Twin Peaks neighborhood, was divided 4 and split down the middle. And that makes absolutely no 5 sense from the standpoint of communities of interest. There is the West of Twin Peaks Council, which represents 6 7 twenty neighborhood groups, that was split down -- right down the middle. 8 So I would strongly urge the Commission this time to 10 basically restore the eastern boundary to put the 11 Portola, Visitacion Valley, and Excelsior back into the 12 west district, which is the homeowner district. And then 13 move the eastern district north into basically Cow 14 Hollow, the Marina, and Pacific Heights. And then, 15 whether you will balance for population, that's where 16 you'll end up. 17 The other thing that I would like to point out is, I 18 think that it's important that you look at institutions 19 and keep them intact. 2.0 MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds. 21 If you look to the finetuning for the MR. BOWMAN: 22 district boundaries, you'll find for instance that Kaiser 23 Hospital, which is in the western addition, but on the 24 verge of -- or on the edge of Anza Vista, is divided 25 between two districts.

(ph.). I am a school board member actually out here in the Brentwood area. And I want to talk about the kind of area of interest of Brentwood, Knightsen, Oakley, Discovery Bay, a little bit of Antioch, and areas surrounding it.

What I want to say about this area, particularly from the perspective of education, but also from the perspective of social class and growth, because our area has grown over the last ten to twenty years, and where we have always been a rural area, there are many more families and many more people of varying social class.

And the reason why I think that is important, is because our issues, when it comes to our elected officials, they vary, they vary. But they're very important. Particularly the issue of education and resources for education to make sure that students who come from different families of various social classes have what they need. And it has been a big revelation during the pandemic for us to understand the differences in household in terms of access to these resources for families.

We are a diverse community. And we're growing more and more, and becoming more ethnically diverse, which brings with it its own challenges. And whereas before we were seen as a sparse area that is becoming more dense,

1 and I believe that our area needs to stay together when it comes to drawing district lines. And I think that 3 we're specialized. In other words, we don't look like, 4 you know, even as close as Pittsburg; we're very 5 different. We have a lot of different needs as far as growing business opportunities, as well as agriculture. 6 7 When I think about the Census, I enjoyed the twenty-8 minute presentation about how you draw these lines, and not specifically depending upon the Census. And as you 10 know, some people out in our area, particularly those who 11 work in the agricultural field, may not be on the Census. 12 And so that's why I believe that the area of Brentwood --13 MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds. 14 MS. HOLLY: -- Oakley, Knightsen, Discovery Bay, and 15 even parts of Antioch, we really need to be considered an 16 area of interest. 17 I appreciate your time --18 MR. 1 for -- there are parts that are connected -- pretty much connected to Brentwood, along Lone Tree, starting with A 3 Street and coming on down. They're in my district in 4 terms of being on the school board. 5 CO-CHAIR YEE: Okay, so --MS. HOLLY: So we would hate to have that area 6 7 separated. We want to include Antioch, because we want 8 to make sure that my constituents have the same voice as those in Brentwood, because they do go to our schools. 10 People in that particular area do come to my schools. 11 CO-CHAIR YEE: Very good. Thank you so much. 12 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 13 I would like to invite those who have called in to 14 please press star 9 to raise your hand, indicating you 15 wish to comment. 16 At this time, we do have one raised hand. Caller 3-17 9-6-0. But I would like to invite those that have called 18 in to please press star 9 to raise your hand, indicating 19 you wish to comment. Caller 3-9-6-0, and then up next we 2.0 will have caller 1-9-4-0. 21 Caller 3-9-6-0, if you will please follow the 22 prompts to unmute. Caller 3-9-6-0, you are unmuted. 2.3 have a couple of brief instructions for you. 24 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay.

COMMENT MODERATOR: Your speaker order number will

2 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay.

COMMENT MODERATOR: -- your speaker order number will be number 35. If you will please make note of that for future reference. And if you will please let the mapper know of an area you would like to discuss, with that the floor is yours.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay, thank you. I am a resident of Marin County, and I have been -- I'm in my 70s. I was born and raised in Marin County. And I am just calling with my request that the senatorial and assembly districts remain in Marin, and Sonoma, and north rather than going back across the bridges.

I remember from many years, when Senator Marks was our senator, and he was a great guy and he put a lot of attention into Marin County. But the issues that he was interested in had a lot to do with his home area of San Francisco. And since we have -- our State Senatorial District has been Marin north, and Senator McGuire now is our senator. We have been able to focus on issues that are particularly important and cogent for our community. Everybody knows we are not densely populated as the city on the East Bay and the South Bay.

And our mix of basically suburban small town communities and our ag and open lands relate much, much

1 more strongly and productively to similar areas in Sonoma 2 and north.

So if there is any question about redrawing us back into more into the dense urban core, I would vote against it as an individual citizen and say, please keep us on the north peninsula and north. We participate with ABAG and all the other government associations that bind the Bay Area together on those larger issues.

And so that's my comment.

CO-CHAIR YEE: Caller, you said Sonoma and north?

How far north are you thinking?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Well, as it is now, I mean, my main point in calling is to say to please align Marin as it is now with Sonoma County and, you know, I know our Assembly District goes even further north. And I have just paid attention to issues that have to deal with Marin and more, you know, the Santa Rosa, Petaluma area, and south.

So however the lines might be drawn north of there,

I think that people who live in those areas have much

more to the point observations about that. My

observation is that we relate much, much better to the

North Bay, the north coastal area, than we do to the more

densely urban areas on the other side of the bridges,

either San Francisco or the East Bay.

1 So I just request that consideration be given to 2 keeping the lines and our associations at least in the southern part of our districts as they are now. 3 4 CO-CHAIR YEE: Very good. Thank you so much. 5 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. I would like to invite those that have called in to 6 7 please press star 9 to raise your hand, indicating you 8 wish to comment. 9 Right now we have caller 1-9-4-0. If you will 10 please follow the prompts to unmute at this time by 11 pressing star 6. 12 CO-CHAIR YEE: A reminder also, excuse me, Katy, we 13 will be taking calls until 2:00 p.m. So get in line. Ιf 14 you're in line by 2:00 p.m. we will get to you. But you 15 want to call in and get in line by 2:00 p.m. This is for 16 public input or public comment. Thank you. 17 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much, Chair. 18 Caller 1-9-4-0, you are currently unmuted. Your 19 speaker order number will be number 36. If you will 20 please make note of that for future reference. And if 21 you'll please let the mapper know what area you would 22 like to discuss, the floor is yours. 2.3 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I will be discussing Marin 24 and the coastal counties north. I live in Marin. I have 25 lived here for over fifty years, relocated from New York,

directly from Greenwich Village to Mill Valley in 1969.

2 And part of the reason was because I was drawn to the 3 physical beauty and the rural nature of the county.

I'm not quite sure how the zones were drawn, but I'm hoping that placing Marin in Zone C doesn't in any way reflect the Commission's understanding of the demographics of Marin, or projecting their intentions for the redistricting process. I'm sure it was somehow just a convenient way of doing things.

But Marin is, you know -- well, we have a suburban aspect to us. We are eighty percent open space, so we are primarily a rural county. And we fit much better, as we have been in the last ten years, with the counties to the north of us going directly up the coast. Currently now that's part of Sonoma, Mendocino, Humboldt, Del Norte, all coastal counties that share the same interest in protecting the coast. We're a continuous coastline as opposed to the San Francisco or East Bay, where we are separated by water and we have to get there by bridges. So it is not a contiguous connection.

We also share the 101 corridor, which leads then into 1, heading up to Crescent City. We also, you know, again because of the rural nature, we share agricultural interests, fishing interests, and so I really do hope that the Commission will keep those communities of

- 1 interest more in mind. That's really how we are aligned
  2 in Marin County.
  - CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you so much. And you're correct, the zone designations were planned just for outreach purposes, convenience purposes. They do not relate to actual redistricting lines in any way.
- 7 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much.

- At this time, I would like to ask those that have called in to please press star 9, indicating you wish to comment. As the Chair mentioned previously, we would need your hands raised prior to 1:55.

  Debra, and I forgot to say that Antioch, the city of

  Antioch, is the largest city in eastern Contra Costa

  County, and as you heard from a previous caller,

  surrounded by the other cities. And I just want to say,

  prior to the previous redistricting, we had our

1 congressman changed, our supervisor changed, blah-blah-2 blah. So I just want -- you guys, when you're making these 3 4 decisions, to take all of that into consideration for 5 what is in the best interest of the residents. And I simply say that because when the stores in all the areas 6 7 are doing their demographics, Antioch is the city with the largest needs but often doesn't get the best 8 9 representation, even though -- we have the most beautiful 10 parks, and the most diverse community with the most 11 diverse people, also educational and economic background, 12 which I mentioned earlier. 13 So I just want you to, you know, just reconsider 14 that. And thank you. 15 CO-CHAIR YEE: Thank you. 16 COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much. 17 At this time I would like to invite those that are in the queue to please press star 9 to raise your hand, 18 19 indicating you wish to comment. Please press star 9 to 20 raise your hand, indicating you with to comment. 21 And Chair, would you like me to read the short 22 instructions as it is about 1:55, and it's going to be 23 closing? 24 CO-CHAIR YEE: Yes please. And a reminder to all

folks listening. We will be closing the line at 2:00.
