13	MR. SINGH: You have a quorum, Chair.
14	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you so much, Ravi.
15	Before we get started today, I wanted to point to
16	the schedule which is posted in today's handouts for
17	today, we will begin I wanted to specifically note a
18	few changes to our typical schedule.
19	First, given the enormous amount of public comment
20	that we've been receiving, and public input, on our line
21	drawing process, we're going to reserve public comment
22	for the end of today's meeting, just to make sure that we
23	can get through all of the pieces of the meeting, and
24	that we can make sure we have enough time for public
25	comment.

1 We'll start off today with Director's Reports and 2 Subcommittee Reports. At 2:45, Karin Mac Donald from the Q2 Line Drawing 3 4 Team will join us as we debrief the visualization 5 process, thus far, and talk about changes as we move forward in this process. 6 7 At approximately 5:00 p.m., we'll anticipate taking maybe about fifteen to twenty minutes in Closed 8 9 Session, and finish up any additional business before we 10 move to public comment at the end of the day. So please 11 note that schedule which is posted online. 12 A few other general announcements that I wanted to 13 make; first, I know we've received a number of inquiries 14 about our District Map Input Meetings which will be held 15 later this week, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. We're 16 very excited to be welcoming the public on those days to 17 share with us their ideas for district maps. We worked 18 long and hard on our process to ensure that there was an 19 equitable opportunity for people to present those ideas, 20 those district ideas. 21 We discussed this back in September, I believe it 22 was on September 23rd, in which the Commission reviewed a 23 number of recommendations provided by the Line Drawing 24 Subcommittee, and adopted a fair and equitable process 25 for submitters to provide such submissions.

1	As a reminder, those were based on submissions, not
2	on individuals, not on organizations, and we did that
3	specifically for the purposes of equity.
4	So we wanted to just uplift that message, and ensure
5	that even if you didn't get a time slot, or multiple time
6	slots, if you may have wanted them, that there are a
7	number of ways to continue to submit your information and
8	your district ideas to the Commission.
9	You can most certainly use the online tool that we
10	have created, or send via email, or on our website we
11	have a submission form where you can submit to us even
12	during today's meeting as well. So we encourage public
13	comment throughout this process.
14	That being said, I wanted to also just note that we
15	have been in a process of visualizations. We do not have
16	any draft maps yet. We are simply thinking about what
17	are the possibilities.
18	And I know Commissioner Kennedy wanted to say a few
19	words about that process. Commissioner Kennedy.
20	COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Thank you, Chair. Yes. I
21	did want to take a moment to address, in general terms,
22	some of the feedback that we've received on the
23	visualizations that we reviewed last week.
24	The visualizations were the work product of our
25	mappers based on broad parameters established by

1 Commission; things like, keep cities together, as well as 2 input from our VRA attorneys, and public input through our community of interest input sessions, email, and 3 postal mail, as well as the Draw My CA Community tool 4 5 that was released earlier this year. As the Chair said, these are not maps approved by 6 7 the Commission. We are still several weeks away from that point. And some of the practical implications of 8 9 the broad parameters that we set are as much a 10 disappointment to us as they are to the public. And we 11 are eager to address the problems that they generate. 12 So I hope that Californians will be patient with us 13 as we go through the various stages of this process. Not 14 every member of the Commission is familiar with every community in the state. We've tried to learn as much as 15 16 we could about the state's communities, but the pandemic has not allowed us to do as much as we would have wanted 17 18 to in this regard. 19 You are the experts on your community, and we continue to rely on your input to help us find the best 20 21 way forward. 22 We really do appreciate any and all constructive 23 input into this process as we work to deliver the best 24 possible redistricting plans to the people of California. 25 We are not the enemy. We are not seeking to disempower

1	any community, though we all must recognize that
2	redistricting involves tradeoffs. We're seeing those
3	tradeoffs as we discussed these visualizations.
4	And we're not seeking to empower ourselves as
5	legislators in many states do. We are a diverse group of
6	Californians doing this work on your behalf, working
7	within the limits of the Constitutions and laws in place,
8	doing our best to put the voters first, not those already
9	in office. Thank you, Chair.
10	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you so much, Commissioner
11	Kennedy.
12	Are there any other general announcements from
13	Commissioners or staff at this time?
14	All right; seeing none, we will move on in our
15	agenda, and begin with Director Reports, starting with
16	our Executive Director, Alvaro Hernandez.
17	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Chair; and good
18	afternoon, Commissioners.
19	I want to go ahead and start today by introducing a
20	few new staff. First, I wanted to introduce our new
21	Budget Officer, Terri Isedeh. She joins us from the
22	Franchise Tax Board, where she was the project manager
23	and the advocate trends specialist, in the Taxpayer
24	Rights Advocate's Office. She managed the day-to-day
25	activities, and was responsible for tracking the

1	Advocate's Office budget, tracking expenditures,
2	preparing budget reports, and budget drills as needed.
3	Terri is a graduate from SAC State, with a BA in
4	communication studies. She brings strong leadership and
5	communication skills. She is a great problem solver, and
6	has extensive experience working in a fast-paced
7	environment that has changing priorities like this
8	Commission.
9	So I wanted to introduce you to her. Terri.
10	MS. ISEDEH: Hello, everyone. I just wanted to say
11	that I'm super excited to be here, to work with all of
12	you, and to contribute my skills and abilities to help
13	you do this very important work for the State of
14	California. So thank you very much for the opportunity
15	to join the Commission.
16	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Terri. I also
17	wanted to take this time to introduce some additional
18	folks that have joined our Data Management Team; looking
19	to see if our data manager, Toni Antonova, has joined us.
20	Hey, Toni, you can introduce the new members.
21	MS. ANTONOVA: Hello. Hi. We're very excited. We
22	have two new members joining the Data Management Team.
23	Karina and Madison (ph.) are going to be helping us with
24	the data digitization and ingestion, along with things in
25	the office.

1	Madison, would you like to introduce yourself?
2	MS. LEWIS: Of course. Hello. My name is Madison,
3	I am currently a junior at Pomona College, majoring in
4	public policy analysis and minoring in Spanish. And I
5	have a bit of background professionally in political
6	organizing work, and local government community
7	engagement. I'm very passionate about this process, and
8	excited to be part of the team.
9	MS. ANTONOVA: And Karina, would you mind,
10	introducing yourself.
11	MS. GUTIERREZ: Hi. My name is Karina Gutierrez. I
12	am a recent graduate of St. Mary's College of California
13	in Moraga. I am a double major in Spanish linguistics,
14	and ethnic studies, with a politics minor. And I am on
15	board, and very excited to be working with the
16	Commission, and reading all public input from the State
17	of California. I am very excited to read all of the
18	stories, and counter stories telling narratives that will
19	be sent in.
20	MS. ANTONOVA: Thank you. Thank you, both.
21	And Commissioners, some of you may see Karina in the
22	office if you are up in Sacramento today. So feel free
23	to say hi.
24	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Toni. Thank you,
25	Madison and Karina. Welcome, and welcome, Terri. We are

1 very excited to have you all on board. So thank you for 2 that.

3	Now, I'd like to move on to a couple of new things
4	that we have to talk about today. You'll find under the
5	Handouts a Meeting Schedule. It's been updated to
6	include all of December. There have been some minor
7	changes to the names of some of the meetings that we had
8	previously posted. So I wanted to make sure that you had
9	a chance to take a look at that.
10	We are still going to possibly have to fine tune
11	some of the times, and there may be some additional
12	adjustments that we have to make as we move forward. So
13	we'll keep you informed as changes are coming up. We'll
14	be posting the agendas, and they will provide additional
15	information.
16	I did want to ask the Commission to consider one of
17	the dates, and the time scheduled for one of the dates,
18	given that it is a Public Input Meeting for November
19	20th. It's a Saturday event, and we have it schedule
20	from 3:00 to 8:00, and I was wondering if that could be
21	changed or moved to earlier in the day.
22	Given that in the past when we've had Saturday
23	events, we have a lot more participation and engagement
24	earlier in the morning than we do in the latter part of
25	the day. So I was hoping that we could consider moving

1	that to an earlier time.
2	CHAIR SADHWANI: That seems reasonable, but I see a
3	few hands.
4	Commissioner Fernández.
5	COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: Thank you, Chair. Yes, I
6	think maybe like a 10:00 to 3:00 would be appropriate.
7	Like a five-hour block I think is a good time frame. And
8	then I was just going to I know you said that you're
9	going to change some of the times, potentially.
10	In December most of the meetings are at from 9:30 to
11	4:30, and those of us that'll be driving back and forth
12	every day, if we could maybe make it 10:00 or 11:00 start
13	time, because I anticipate our meetings going late and
14	for some of us who have to drive home and then come back,
15	it'd be nice to have a later start. But I don't want to
16	be very too selfish about it, just consideration.
17	Thank you.
18	CHAIR SADHWANI: A reasonable request.
19	Commissioner Andersen.
20	COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Thank you. That's exactly
21	what I would like to propose. And can we do we need a
22	vote on that? Or could we actually do 10:00 to 3:00 on
23	the 20th of November? And I think it's from the 11th or
24	12th on, 10:00 to 5:00. Do we need to do
25	CHAIR SADHWANI: I don't believe that we need a

1 vote. I think it would make sense to make those changes. 2 COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Great. 3 CHAIR SADHWANI: Okay. 4 COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: All right. Thank you very 5 much. 6 CHAIR SADHWANI: Perfect. DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: So I'll go ahead and repost 7 8 those -- the updated schedule for everyone to have. Are 9 there any other questions in regards to the schedule? 10 CHAIR SADHWANI: I don't believe so. 11 DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: All right. Well, thank you. 12 CHAIR SADHWANI: Was that the end of your report? 13 DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: No. Not yet. 14 CHAIR SADHWANI: Oh. Okay. Actually, I see some 15 questions coming in. 16 Commissioner Turner. 17 COMMISSIONER TURNER: Yeah. Thank you. I don't 18 have a question. I just wanted to say thank you to 19 Alvaro, and Ravi, and whoever else got the schedule out 20 through to the end of the year. It's extremely important 21 that I have them. And so I just wanted to say -- express 22 my appreciation for you doing that work of getting it in. 23 Thank you. 24 CHAIR SADHWANI: Indeed. And I share that 25 appreciation very much.

1 Commissioner Akutagawa, were you trying to get in 2 there? 3 COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: Yes. Again, too many 4 buttons to push right now; like, "lower hand", "raise 5 hand", and all that stuff. Can I just ask a quick question in terms of clarification around changing the 6 7 times? I know that we have to do the fourteen-day 8 9 notification. So does that mean -- because I do support 10 starting a little bit later, does that mean that then 11 from the November 4th meeting on, that we would actually change the time? Because then we could still notice 12 13 within the fourteen days; because the fourteen days is 14 November 3rd, but I'm just trying to get some 15 clarification on understanding time schedules? 16 DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: That's right, Commissioner 17 Akutagawa, we would try to do it within the fourteen 18 days, and the Executive Director and I are definitely 19 making sure that we hit that mark. 20 COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: Okay. So then are we 21 saying that any 9:30 meeting is going to now move to 22 possibly 11:00 a.m., or 10:00 a.m., or something like 2.3 that? CHAIR SADHWANI: Commissioner Fernández. 24 COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: 25 Yeah. That was not my

1	recommendation. My recommendation was for the December
2	meetings, like from the 11th through the 19th, where they
3	all start. I'm just anticipating long nights. So those
4	were the only ones that I was recommending that we
5	possibly change.
6	COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: Oh. Okay. Okay. Thank
7	you. I guess, can I just then add on that; could we
8	consider that for the even the November meetings?
9	Because I think we're finding that times are taking
10	longer. And so even if it's to start at, say yeah, I
11	maybe an 11:00 a.m. start would be good, just in terms of
12	those whom whether it's in LA, or whether it's here, I
13	think just having just been able to avoid some of the
14	traffic too, especially if we're going to be looking out
15	later nights too. Yeah.
16	CHAIR SADHWANI: Director Hernandez, perhaps we
17	could take a look at them off-line. And I'm happy to
18	work with you to make those kinds of adjustments.
19	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: That sounds like a perfect
20	idea.
21	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you.
22	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: All right. So I will continue
23	with my report here. I wanted to let you all know that
24	we have secured a location in San Diego, and we'll be
25	sending the Commissioners detailed information with

1 for that meeting set, which is from November 7th th 2 the 10th.	nrough
2 the 10th	
3 The other thing I wanted to mention, as we're	moving
4 forward with some of these meetings, we're moving t	chem
5 back should we need to go longer; you know, if we h	nave
6 them at 8:00 that puts us at, you know, let's say t	IWO
7 hours later, we don't end until 10:00; if we go unt	cil
8 5:00.	
9 And so those are some of the considerations th	nat I'm
10 looking at, because we do have vendors, our	
11 videographers, ASL folks, that we have to kind of	
12 coordinate with.	
13 So I am going to suggest that we have hard sto	ops, if
14 at all possible, for these meetings. I know that p	public
15 comment goes sometimes longer than we anticipate, a	and we
16 can make adjustments at that point. But it really	is
17 important because of our staffing requirements that	z we
18 have, our contractual obligations that we have with	n those
19 vendors, that we stick to somewhat of a schedule th	nat
20 doesn't constantly change.	
21 So I'm going to suggest that, and as we change	e and
22 make modifications to this meeting schedule, just &	keep
23 that in mind as we move forward. I appreciate that	
24 CHAIR SADHWANI: Yeah. If I may, I just wante	ed to
25 again, give a huge thank you to some of our vendors	s who

1	were able to support us last week as we did go late many
2	days, not just last week, and the week prior. I think it
3	does put a huge burden on much of our staff, so I
4	definitely want to uplift that message, Alvaro.
5	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: Thank you. I also wanted to
6	give a couple of updates on the following topics to
7	respond to Commissioner Kennedy's requests at the last
8	meetings.
9	So I'll begin by giving an update on the paper COI:
10	The printing of the paper COI has started. And we
11	estimate the shipping will begin later this week and
12	early next week, to the incarcerated population
13	facilities. Staff will send out copies to the other
14	organizations. These large amounts of copies of the
15	paper COI will be sent directly from the printing office,
16	or from the Office of State Printing, directly to the
17	facilities, because they are such large volumes.
18	Anything else, we'll be doing them from our office.
19	I've also been working and talking with our Data
20	Management Team, so they are prepared to, when we start
21	receiving those paper COIs back, how to ingest them into
22	the database. So those conversations have begun.
23	I wanted to also give you a breakdown of a quick
24	summary of some of the other activities. So the video
25	that Fredy's staff has completed has gone out to the

1	facilities. So they probably have already shared that
2	information and are anticipating the receipt of these
3	paper COIs.
4	The breakdown of the incarcerated population, so for
5	the adult population there are thirty-six facilities, the
6	volume of paper COIs that will be going out is 99,550.
7	For the juvenile population, there're forty-two
8	facilities, and the volume for that will be 3,705. For
9	the county adult population, there's 116 different
10	facilities, and the volumes for those is 5,750. For the
11	county libraries, or city libraries, there are seventy-
12	three locations that have requested paper COIs, and
13	that's a volume of 16,870.
14	So we have quite a few going out, over 100,000 of
15	these paper COIs that will be going out. We also have it
16	available on our website, in multiple languages, for
17	those who wish to download it and send them in.
18	Any questions on the paper COI?
19	All right. I'll move on. In regards to the 2010
20	website, I shared with the Webpage Subcommittee that
21	Staff has been reaching out, or has reached out over the
22	last couple of months to the Secretary of State, State
23	Archives Office, the California Department of Technology,
24	and the State Auditor, to see if there are any options to
25	hosting or maintaining the 2010 website somewhere.

They don't have a vehicle for that. They don't have options for us to have the entire website. There are some other options, and that's something that I will be looking into. But it's not looking like we're going to have an active 2010 website available, or displayed anywhere at this point.

7 We're still going to continue to work with the 8 subcommittee, and we'll be talking about whether other 9 options we might have, if not the webpage, maybe we have 10 a way to capture the documents, and maybe do a narrative. 11 Because I think, when I've looked at the website for the 12 archives, a lot of them are in a narrative format, so 13 they provide the context for the documents.

And so it appears to be much more than easy; just move that website over there. It might be a little bit more involved. So we're looking at those options.

I did want to remind everyone, and I'm going to highlight a couple of the concerns and issues that we've come across in regards to the 2010 website. One, and I mentioned it before, it's not ADA compliant, and it would require a complete overhaul which would -- you know, we need to have someone who has the expertise to do it, staff time, and other resources to do so.

24 The website is also unstable because it is 25 technology from 2010. So again, if we were to do a 1 complete overhaul, it would be with new technology, it 2 would look different, slightly different. But at this 3 point that website, as is, could potentially crash again. 4 It's already crashed one time before. So I wanted to 5 point that out.

And then finally, there is a minimum cost of \$500 6 7 per month to maintain the website. And that's something that we haven't really discussed, and that's something 8 9 that, moving forward, and I raised this with the 10 subcommittee, for the 2020 Commission, that's something 11 that we'll have to discuss how we're going to do that 12 moving forward as well, and the maintenance of it. 13 You know, because this particular website is very 14 unique in that we have embedded the database, we have a 15 lot of things on there that need some type of support. 16 And in eight years, I don't know how that's going to

17 work. So that's a conversation that we have to have at 18 some point.

And I'll be working with the Webpage Subcommittee. I believe this is probably going to be part of the Lessons Learned Subcommittee, to really figure out how we do that, moving forward, and what can we do now to ensure that this website is available for the 2030 Commission? Any questions on the 2010 website? Okay. I'll move on to the next topic. Transcripts;

1	this is another tonis that Commissioner Konnedy has
1	this is another topic that Commissioner Kennedy has
2	raised a number of times. And I have tried to provide as
3	much information as possible. What I can tell you today
4	is that we have a new vendor who will be starting next
5	week and will be doing the transcripts moving forward.
6	They're also going to be listening to the
7	transcripts from October and providing those listening
8	to the videos of this month and providing the transcripts
9	for October.
10	We are also working with our previous vendor to
11	provide those transcripts that have not already been
12	completed. And so I will apologize to Commissioner
13	Kennedy. I haven't had a chance to provide him a list of
14	those meetings that have received transcripts. I'm
15	working on it. And I will get to that as soon as I can.
16	Unfortunately, I haven't had the time.
17	And then finally well, let me stop there and see
18	if there are any questions in regards to the transcripts.
19	Okay. Let me move on to the last topic on my agenda
20	here. Database update: So the Commission has been
21	looking at visualizations, and they have been a little
22	bit hard to follow. So I hear. So I have been working
23	with our Data Management Team, and also the Line Drawers,
24	Karin, Jaime, Andrew, to figure out if there's an option
25	for us to display the Shapefiles, or the different

1 districts that are being provided, in easy-to-read, easy-2 to-access way.

And so at this point, I wanted to turn it over to 3 4 Toni, to share what we have come up with. So Toni. 5 MS. ANTONOVA: Hello, Commission. I would like to share my screen, to share with the Commission an exciting 6 7 interactive map that the Data Management Team was able to put together, using the Shapefiles created by Q2 and 8 9 Haystaq. Paul, our data analyst, is very adept in 10 creating and designing maps. And so this is his work 11 I'll be presenting.

12 So Paul was able to create an interactive map, where 13 we can upload different Shapefiles of the visualizations 14 as the number of layers. This is what it will look like, 15 more or less, but I do want to give the caveat that this 16 is a first pass, and that we don't have the real data yet. So this is a bit of a beta stage presentation. 17 18 Essentially, it's going to be a map like this that 19 you can zoom in on. The more you zoom in, the more 20 detail the map gives. You can see that Paul has uploaded 21 county lines, and incorporated places, and CDPs, but 22 those things can be turned on and off, if they're 23 crowding the screen.

As you zoom in, you know, you can go really indepth. If you really wanted to look at like street names

1	and things like that, that is available in the map. And
2	the idea behind that feature is that when you're looking
3	at the boundaries of the different district
4	visualizations you can you can get as detailed as you
5	would like.
6	So the way we are conceptualizing the visualizations
7	right now on the map, is to have them each as a different
8	layer in this panel on the right. Right now, we've
9	uploaded some dummy data of Assembly districts and State
10	Senate districts here, and these are going to be layers
11	that you can turn on and off, and play around with, zoom
12	in on, and so forth.
13	By the final web app stage, we should have layers
14	for every one of the district levels. And we'll be
15	creating that as soon as we receive the real data.
16	I hope that this makes the visualization interaction
17	process a lot easier. It's really exciting that we
18	actually have access to a tool like this, and Paul's
19	knowledge of maps and design. He really is able to
20	communicate a lot of information visually that I think,
21	you know, and this can really help the Commission, and
22	hopefully the public, have a better understanding of what
23	we're doing. Thank you. I'm happy to answer any
24	questions.
25	CHAIR SADHWANI: Perfect. I see there's a number of

1	hands; and so I put myself in there first, because I
2	wanted to just say, thank you. This is incredible. I
3	know that this District Viewer map was something that has
4	been in the works for some time, but we weren't
5	anticipating having it available until later on in the
6	process, in November, when we get closer to actual draft
7	maps.
8	On Monday, Commissioner Andersen and I met as a part
9	of the I don't know if the sound, did the sound just
10	go off, oh met as a part of the Line Drawing
11	Subcommittee, and said: We need this now. Today is
12	Wednesday, and this is an incredible mockup. So well
13	done to Toni, and the team, and Paul; thank you. Thank
14	you. Thank you.
15	We have a number of other changes that we're going
16	to talk about for the line drawing process and the
17	visualizations as well. But we'll save those for the
18	line drawing subcommittee.
19	Fredy.
20	DIRECTOR CEJA: Yes. Thank you, Chair. I just
21	wanted to add that, yeah, going through last week's
22	iteration of visualizations and posting that on our
23	website was a headache for everyone involved, I think I
24	can speak for. This was a great solution.
25	We no longer would be posting PDFs of visualization,

1	so this would allow folks to zoom in and out and see
2	multiple layers at the same time, without fumbling
3	through papers, or even the PDFs, which are very
4	limiting. So thank you so much for this. This is
5	amazing.
6	CHAIR SADHWANI: Awesome. Thank you.
7	Commissioner Ahmad.
8	COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Thank you for this. I echo the
9	sentiments of my colleagues. I just have a quick
10	clarifying question. Would each of the visualizations
11	have their own layer? Or are you planning to stitch them
12	together as shown in some of the more more later
13	visualizations?
14	CHAIR SADHWANI: Toni, you're welcome to answer it.
15	I can also just jump in to say, the next phase of this
16	process will be a statewide map. So the Line Drawing
17	Team is already planning to stitch everything together.
18	So we'll talk more about those details in the Line
19	Drawing Subcommittee Report back. But we will no longer
20	have individual regions, in any case, so it will be a
21	full map.
22	Toni, was there anything more you wanted to add to
23	that?
24	MS. ANTONOVA: No. That covered it. Thank you,
25	Commissioner Sadhwani. We'll be receiving statewide maps

1 of the district proposals.

2 CHAIR SADHWANI: Commissioner Turner.

COMMISSIONER TURNER: Thank you, Chair. Again, echo 3 4 the same sentiments. This is amazing. I thought 5 Commissioner Ahmad was going in this particular way, and maybe it took a turn. The question that I had was, 6 7 again, around the way the map will appear, and I'm asking specifically about the different visualizations. 8 So we 9 had visualization A and B, and then we also asked the line drawers to go back and do a different visualization. 10 11 So on this map, would we be able to toggle off and on, what does the connection look like if we choose 12 13 visualization A as opposed to visualization B? Or how is 14 that going to work? So that's -- so not necessarily 15 stitching together the entire state. That's going to be 16 wonderful. But I'm asking about the different choices or options of districts that we currently have. How does 17 18 that work with -- by toggling off and on? 19 MS. ANTONOVA: From what I understand, we're going 20 to be receiving one visualization for each level, each 21 district level. If we do receive multiple variations, 22 then each one of those will be a different layer that can 23 be toggled on and off. Yes. 24 COMMISSIONER TURNER: Uh-huh. And with that, will 25 the tool, will the new District Viewer Map, will it have

1	an opportunity to show where there are either gaps in
2	what has been submitted, or if there is overlap? And
3	part B to that; does it tell you the count? Or will we
4	retain that somewhere else the total population or
5	will we retain that somewhere else?
6	MS. ANTONOVA: So as far as the web app
7	functionality, we do have the option to add metadata,
8	like population for each one of the districts. And so
9	you can see here when you click on each, you know,
10	proposed district, a little popup shows up and we can
11	populate a number of different statistics here. And
12	whether or not in this kind of first iteration of this
13	will have that, will depend on what is in the data that
14	we receive.
15	I think the line drawers are working to put together
16	all of the Shapefiles and send them our way. And until
17	that process is finished, I'm not sure what statistics
18	will be embedded in the data there.
19	CHAIR SADHWANI: I'll just add a couple thoughts
20	here. So Commissioner Turner, in terms of visualizations
21	A and B that we saw last week, it was not the intention
22	to go back and take the time to upload that here, largely
23	because we've already given feedback on that, and we've
24	given additional direction on the changes we'd like to
25	see.

1	So right now, to save the resource of time, we're
2	working towards next week. There's pros-and-cons to
3	that. But next week, the anticipation is that there will
4	not be a visualization A or B, there will be one Assembly
5	map, one Senate, one Congressional that we'll be working
6	off of. They will be visualizations, it is not a final
7	draft map, but it will just be one that we start working
8	off of. So that's what would be loaded on there.
9	And I think if there's request for additional
10	pieces; so for example, I think members of the public
11	have requested such a map that might have current
12	Assembly, or current Congressional districts, or
13	something, I think that's something that we could,
14	potentially, explore just so that we can make those
15	comparisons if we wanted to. But that is my impression
16	on that.
17	And Karin Mac Donald will be here at 2:45, and can
18	certainly help answer more of those questions, regarding
19	the CVAP and data.
20	Did you have a follow up? It looks like you have a
21	follow up. Yeah. You're on mute.
22	COMMISSIONER TURNER: Oh, I hit it. It didn't take
23	it. Thank you. I do have a follow up, and it may or may
24	not be for Toni in the map, but it just does make me
25	wonder, coming out of the space, I do know that there

1	were comments and suggestions on the visualizations based
2	on the other Commissioners, that some preferred A, some
3	preferred B, and that we've received input that like A
4	or B. And what I think, from a process perspective, we
5	didn't necessarily take the time to do, or did not do,
6	was to then kind of discuss together which one,
7	collectively, do we want to put forward to the line
8	drawers to pursue.
9	So it does make me wonder what this next process
10	will look like when we get one or the other back. And if
11	we've either if we've actually gained forward
12	momentum, or if there'll be consensus in what is being
13	presented. So I just wanted to name that.
14	CHAIR SADHWANI: I think that's a really, a really
15	valid point. And I'm going to say, let's hold on to
16	that, if you don't mind, making a note. Because I think
17	when we have this conversation with Karin, I think she'll
18	be able to give us better a better answer than I would
19	be able to at this point. So I think let's hold that
20	question for 2:45, and let's certainly plan to come back
21	to it, if you don't mind.
22	Commissioner Fernández.
23	COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: Yes. Thank you, Chair.
24	And thank you, Toni. This is wonderful. I am not sure
25	if this was what Commissioner Turner was referring to,

1 but what I would love to see, and I love this map, but I 2 would also like to see all of the input that we've 3 received, like within the map, so that when we drill 4 down, we can see: Oh, okay there's -- we got a community 5 input saying, don't split this, or split -- or keep these 6 communities together.

7 Because right now, it's a little bit challenging for myself, and maybe the rest of the Commissioners it's not 8 9 an issue, but to have to look at how the maps are drawn, 10 and then go back to our database, and then try to compare 11 the two; it does get a little bit challenging. And plus, 12 with our time frames, in terms of the maps only coming 13 out like the day before, and then trying to review all of 14 that information again.

That's what I was kind of hoping for. And I wasn't sure if this was what Commissioner Turner was referring to in terms of gaps, because then we could see some of the information that we do have, versus maybe don't have. So I don't know if that's beyond the capability, but it'd be great if we could do something like that.

21 CHAIR SADHWANI: Yeah.

22 COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: Hopefully, I made sense.
23 Thanks.

24 CHAIR SADHWANI: You made perfect sense. And I 25 would love that, too.

1	I don't know. Toni, do you have thoughts on
2	feasibility?
3	MS. ANTONOVA: Yeah. Thank you for that suggestion,
4	Commissioner Fernández. That's a really that would be
5	very helpful, I think, to do. I will have to think it
6	through with the team to see how possible it is to
7	connect the feedback to the map. It's definitely
8	something that's technically feasible. The connection
9	part, the linking of the feedback to the actual districts
10	that it's talking about, is the piece that may take a
11	little longer.
12	That will require a bit of a manual touch. But I
13	love that idea. So I will I will think it through,
14	and try to give you all an update as soon as as soon
15	as I have one. Thank you.
16	CHAIR SADHWANI: You're just so amazing, Toni.
17	That's why we think it's doable.
18	MS. ANTONOVA: Oh. Thank you.
19	CHAIR SADHWANI: Commissioner Sinay.
20	COMMISSIONER SINAY: Thank you. First, I want to
21	say, Toni, your face just lights up, and it makes me so
22	excited that you get as excited as we are.
23	So Commissioner Turner and Commissioner Fernández,
24	both have touched upon what I wanted to say, which was,
25	you know, ideally ideally, I think we need to think

1	about how we tell our story of our process with our data,
2	and how do we go from COIs, to visualizations, to plans,
3	to maps, to whatever we're calling each time we keep
4	MS. ANTONOVA: Okay.
5	COMMISSIONER SINAY: But I think we need we need
6	some of and it might not be the same tool. So it
7	might be we have one tool for today, and all the work
8	that we're doing on that day. But we also need to think
9	about how, how does the community look at the past
10	visualizations. So that they, if they're like: Someone
11	told me this was being cut, where is it?
12	And I don't like them as a handout for the meetings,
13	but an actual I hate to say this a new tab, or
14	something, on our website so people can find them, or
15	even under Data, you know, you can click on Past
16	Visualizations.
17	And we call them "Past Visualizations", people know
18	they're past visualizations. I definitely you know,
19	from the very beginning, I know Commissioner Turner has
20	mentioned this, too, you know how how we got to where
21	we are. So what COIs are informing that iteration of the
22	visualization. Wow. That's a lot of iterations, or
23	whatever the right word is.
24	The second thing I wanted to say is, how are we
25	digitizing all the input we got on Monday? Because those

1	were communities of interest as well, some of them were
2	on the actual visualizations, but sometimes it was people
3	who called in for the first time, and I don't want us to
4	lose that.
5	And right now, it is getting complicated to go
6	you know, I just sat on the plane going through some of
7	the some of the reports I downloaded, and finally
8	figured out a system for myself. But how to keep track
9	of, even when we look at the visualization, or the map,
10	or the date whatever we're going to call this, we have
11	so many buzzwords.
12	But if we were going into today's visualization,
13	what you just showed, Toni, and we clicked on a region,
14	it wouldn't be just what COIs are feeding that, but also
15	what community district maps, and you know, all the data
16	that kind of went in there. So we can review all of
17	that. And then come back and say, okay, this is making
18	sense, or this isn't making sense.
19	And it might be by region. I don't know. But I'm
20	just that to me, is where I'm getting a little
21	overwhelmed of all the little scraps and pieces of
22	information. I feel like a hoarder of data, but not an
23	organized hoarder. You know, I'd like to be more
24	organized. And I want to be able to let the public know
25	we're hearing them, and I want to feel like I've heard

1	them, and I'm processing what they said in an organized,
2	systemic way.
3	And be able to say, you know and understand and
4	say: You know what, that's not going to you know, this
5	is where our conflicts are. We don't always know where
6	our conflicts are, because we're moving so quickly right
7	now, and our data in different places. Sorry, that was a
8	mouthful.
9	CHAIR SADHWANI: No. I think that was really
10	helpful. And I think one of the things I keep telling
11	myself is, this is like a sausage-making process, and
12	it's messy, and it's in full public view, and there's
13	lots of pieces to it, and we've got to get our hands
14	dirty, and pull up our sleeves. And I think that that's
15	a part of it. And I am also just incredibly amazed by
16	the technology that we do have available, especially in
17	comparison to ten years ago.
18	They were also receiving thousands of submissions,
19	and I think much of that was just being held in an Excel
20	spreadsheet. So I think we're definitely advancing this
21	process. Not perfect yet, but I think a lot of great
22	ideas there. So thank you.
23	Commissioner Andersen.
24	COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Yeah. Thank you. I really
25	appreciate this, Toni. And Paul, I see is on line now,

1 thank you. And it's great. We love to do it. And 2 there's so much that, ultimately, we could do. But I do 3 want to have to say, we've got over 4,000, I think, COI inputs. And because we asked this of the line drawers at 4 5 first, and unfortunately, their software, if you put all those layers on, and all the other layers on, the 6 7 software crashes.

And so this might be, just as a map, we might be 8 9 able to do this, but we might have to do it, like, only 10 certain numbers at a time, or something like that. 11 And I know Toni and Paul will look at that and see 12 what we can do in terms of, you know, you're not --13 you're not trying to all do all the bells and whistles 14 with the map -- with the software the line drawers are 15 doing, which gives you all kinds of other information as 16 you're going along.

17 And hopefully, that would be wonderful. But I just want to kind of give us all -- we also have to put it on 18 19 our website. And so there might be some constraints 20 with, you know, just straight bandwidth on it. Hopefully 21 not, but I would -- I think it would be wonderful when we 22 get on there, but I kind of want to brace ourselves in 23 terms of, we're not quite like the -- you know, The 24 Avengers when he's throwing stuff up in the air. We're 25 doing it this way. We're not quite there yet, at least

1	not budget-wise.
2	But thank you very much for all of this. It's
3	great. And what you can do, we're really, really going
4	to appreciate.
5	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you for that.
6	Commissioner Fernández.
7	COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: Yes. Thank you. And I
8	wasn't sure when to talk about this, but I'm just going
9	to bring it up now. And it's probably not so much for
10	Paul and Toni, although you're so incredible.
11	Well, it might be for you as well. But the
12	visualization feedback that we're receiving, that is real
13	time, as well as district map input, as well as public
14	comments during our meetings; my recommendation and my
15	request is that although right now, it's like the
16	visualization feedback is on a different it's still on
17	our database, but on a different I don't know what you
18	want to call it I think they should all be transferred
19	as an input so that we have it all in one location,
20	instead of different locations.
21	Because they are all input. Regardless of them
22	saying: It's a bad map, it's a good map. It's all input,
23	and should be identified as such as.
24	And also, like I mentioned, the meetings we're going
25	to go into the next few days, those maps should also be

1 considered as input, and should also go into our
2 database. And I believe that's why we hired some student
3 assistants; and if we need more student assistants,
4 because for me, personally, at least having everything in
5 one location; and not having to look at three different
6 things, plus all my notes, makes it easier as we move
7 forward. Thank you.

8 CHAIR SADHWANI: That sounds great. Thank you. So 9 I think that's a really helpful suggestion that both you 10 and Commissioner Sinay have raised here, about making 11 sure that we're capturing public comment or public input 12 on the maps when it comes in. So for example, Monday we 13 had over sixty callers.

So Alvaro, perhaps we can work off-line to make sure that that's happening with the Data Management Team and being loaded into the COI input database. Yeah.

DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: So my understanding is that the information is being captured in our database. What you're seeing in that grid view is just the view of that information that has come in through there. It is all still within the database. It's just a different view that we have available for you.

And part of that was, I believe you've requested to kind of break it out into different buckets, I guess you would call them. You don't want them all mixed up

1	because then you can't decipher which one is which. So
2	you have the paper you have the COI I keep saying
3	"paper". That you have the COI information, then you
4	have the visualization feedback, we will have map
5	feedback, all of it which will be captured within the
6	database as well.
7	Now, we can look to combine it. I don't know.
8	We'll have to look and see how we can present that
9	information all together, all at once, which is what I'm
10	hearing, that you want to have it all in one place.
11	We'll have to look and see what we can do, and how we can
12	do that, so that you have all the information, and you
13	can better use it all in one place.
14	So we'll go back and brainstorm on that, and see
15	what we can come up with. But I welcome your
16	suggestions. I appreciate your comments. And I'm glad
17	that you like what you see so far.
18	And as we have done before, we'll continue to try to
19	impress you. Thank you.
20	CHAIR SADHWANI: You've been doing a good job.
21	Commissioner Fernández.
22	COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: Yes, I do realize that the
23	visualizations, they're all in the same database. But if
24	we're looking at a specific area in California, if I go
25	into the visualization feedback part of it, it doesn't

1	tell me what part of California the feedback is, versus
2	on the input one, you can actually drill down to the map
3	and it'll show you. And you can drill down, and you can
4	actually sort it by area.
5	Like if I wanted everything that references Yolo
6	County, then I could bring that up. So it just makes it
7	more challenging to have to go through the every
8	single visualization to try to sort that out.
9	CHAIR SADHWANI: I see. So I think the request then
10	is for the Data Management Team to go through that live
11	feed and use some tags, right. Whether those are county
12	tags, or other racial you know, racial tags, or
13	economic tags, or whatever, whatever tags that we had
14	had, and established in the in the other side of that
15	database.
16	Commissioner Sinay.
17	COMMISSIONER SINAY: I think the "tags" is a great
18	idea. I just want to remind everyone that the purpose of
19	the visualization was to get it in real time. And so
20	when we created it as a public yeah, the Outreach
21	Committee worked with Staff to create that, it was like:
22	We don't want to wait two to three weeks like we have on
23	the COIs, we want them right away.
24	And so it's not and we wanted to keep it simple
25	for the public. So the public was our audience, and we

1	were the audience, you know, it was a double audience,
2	and to keep it as simple. And I think staff did an
3	amazing job.
4	And I also want to say thank you, because for the
5	district map the ones for the next few days, I was
6	like: Wait, what organizations are submitting these?
7	Because that column was missing; and within like
8	that's of me asking that that column was put in.
9	And you know, every I appreciate that we are
10	working collaboratively to figure this out. Some of the
11	things make sense for you all, for some reasons. And
12	then we still need other pieces, and we're just learning
13	from each other. So thank you so much to staff. And
14	just to keep reminding ourselves that this is an
15	iterative process, not only for the map making, but for
16	the data, and for collecting, and for working with the
17	public, and staff.
18	And so the visualization feedback form, and that
19	grid, just makes me giddy, because it is in real time.
20	And it, you know, it changes within five minutes it can
21	change. And so that's was exactly what we wanted.
22	And that was created within less than twenty-four hours
23	as well. So thank you so much, to everybody.
24	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you. With that, Alvaro, did
25	you have more on your Executive Director's Report?

1 DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: I did. Believe it or not, I 2 have quite a bit -- no. Not a whole lot to go. But I 3 did want to mention a couple more things. Back to the meeting schedule; we have the -- as I mentioned, the San 4 5 Diego location secured. That's on the 7th, 8th, and 9th, and 10th. And so thereafter, the other meetings will be 6 7 either virtual, or you know, you're welcome to come to Sacramento as well for those. 8 9 The meetings on November 22nd, 23rd, are as needed. And so more information will come, I think we just want 10 11 to have it on the calendar. But as we get closer to 12 agendizing those, I'll be working with the Chair at the

13 time; and so to finalize the agendas for those meetings. 14 And with that, I wanted to also raise the question 15 about the chair rotations. And I think Commissioner Yee

16 was going to share some information on that.

17

COMMISSIONER YEE: Thank you, Director Hernandez. 18 So as we have gone into the visualization and Yes. 19 line drawing phase, obviously our meetings have become 20 more frequent and more numerous. And so this raises the 21 question of whether we should adjust the chair rotation 22 to adapt to that.

2.3 And Commissioner Le Mons, the incoming chair, asked 24 me to take a look at that rotation. And I'll go ahead 25 and share my screen, and talk you through some ideas.

1	So up to now, so a quick bit of history. You'll
2	remember we started off with a policy back in last
3	September, September 2020, that was strictly
4	alphabetical, and a strict political rotation. And we
5	turned out to be unhappy with that, just the way it
6	turned out.
7	So last December, almost a year ago, we started a
8	new policy. This created mixed gender pairs of
9	Commissioners for most pairings, and that's the rotation
10	we've been operating under up to now. We never had a
11	strict time length per segment. It started off as two
12	full agendas plus ancillary meetings, and that just ended
13	up being about three weeks three weeks, three-and-a-
14	half weeks. And that's been a general time frame for
15	most of these terms, for pairs of chair and vice chair.
16	Including the current chair, Commissioner Sadhwani, who
17	has powered through an incredible series of meetings, and
18	for a full three, three-and-a-half weeks now, as she
19	finishes up later this week.
20	So the question is: What to do from here? Two
21	considerations, one is, do we go to a shorter rotation?
22	So for instance, do we go to a two-week term? That would
23	still involve about three clumps of meetings? And as I
24	looked at it, that seems, you know, fair. On the other
25	hand, that is a more frequent turnover of chairs.

1	And Director Hernandez, if you have any thoughts on
2	whether that's you know, that makes life just a lot
3	harder for you, to have chairs changing more frequently.
4	We certainly want to hear that.
5	The other thing is that, going into early December
6	then, as the rotation is set out actually at the end
7	of November there, so upcoming we will have Commissioner
8	Le Mons after Commissioner Sadhwani; and then
9	Commissioner Turner after Commissioner Le Mons. And that
10	will actually end one full turn of this plan.
11	Now, of course, the thought was to simply go back to
12	the top and start all over again, but there's a catch
13	there, and that is that the top of the order goes back to
14	Commissioner Taylor. He's the one that started off this
15	current rotation. And as he shared with us, and I
16	actually checked with him last night; he said, especially
17	for that cluster of late night line drawing meetings,
18	December 12th through 19th, he can commit to most days,
19	but not all days
20	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Sorry. Who was that?
21	COMMISSIONER YEE: Commissioner Taylor, yeah. So
22	this raises the question: Do we, nevertheless, power
23	through with the current rotation, or do we, in fact,
24	call it a rap with the rotation, when we wrap up the one
25	full turn, at the end of Commissioner Turner's upcoming

1	term? And maybe think about some other chair arrangement
2	for the rest of December, you know, as we do the final
3	line drawing crunch time, red zone, extra innings, you
4	know, period, or what?
5	Yeah. So thoughts? I don't have any proposal for
6	that. I'm not you know I would certainly support,
7	Commissioner Taylor, if he wanted to simply power through
8	and make the real use of vice chairs while he were
9	chairing that term. Or maybe we do just reopen the
10	question, see if maybe there's some other chair pairing
11	that might make more sense at that time. I don't know.
12	I'm wide open, so.
13	CHAIR SADHWANI: Very good. Thank you. It looks
14	like there's some feedback.
15	Commissioner Turner.
16	COMMISSIONER TURNER: Yes, Chair. Thank you,
17	Commissioner Yee. I love any iteration shift or change
18	that would have me not chairing next. I love it. I'm
19	like, let's start oh, wait, did he say after me? No,
20	how about we consider something before me? Yeah. I
21	think there are those individuals that just love to
22	chair, and I think we should give them every opportunity.
23	COMMISSIONER YEE: So one full turn of the rotation
24	would be after you, Commissioner Turner. But there's
25	absolutely nothing to prevent us from reconsidering the

1	rotation any time, so. And you have certainly served
2	ably in the past, so.
3	CHAIR SADHWANI: That's right. We love your
4	leadership, Commissioner Turner.
5	Commissioner Kennedy.
6	COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Thank you, Chair. I would be
7	perfectly happy with Commissioner Taylor chairing those
8	that he's on there for, and to the extent that he's not
9	available, that is why we have a vice chair. So I'd be
10	perfectly happy with that. Thank you.
11	CHAIR SADHWANI: I would agree with that, in
12	general. And just to I will note that throughout the
13	time that I've been chairing, I really appreciated both
14	Commissioners Toledo and Le Mons supporting supporting
15	that process. I think that we do have to remember that
16	we are humans, we have other lives, we have other
17	responsibilities. So I definitely second that,
18	Commissioner Kennedy.
19	Commissioner Taylor.
20	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Hi. And please forgive me for
21	being a little bit camera-shy, as I'm in the parking lot
22	of my job. But attentive, I am here, and engaged.
23	That being said, you know, I find this a wonderful
24	experience. I would look forward to the opportunity to
25	chair when my turn comes. I believe that's part of the

1	team that we put together, and everyone pulling their
2	weight to the best way possible.
3	To that, though, I would you know, in full
4	disclosure, I would not be available for every single one
5	of those days, especially as we got to a point where we
6	might be meeting five or six times in a given week. So I
7	know that I would not be able to chair each and every one
8	of those events, although I'd be able to plug in at some
9	time during those days.
10	So I appreciate the words from Commissioner Kennedy.
11	If as vice chair, and decided to go that go that
12	route, I just would need the support of my vice chair
13	during that given time. Thank you.
14	CHAIR SADHWANI: Commissioner Akutagawa.
15	COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: Yeah. Thank you. And
16	thank you, Commissioner Yee, for doing this. I'd like to
17	make a maybe a couple of alternate suggestions to what
18	you have here. I think given the kind of the number
19	of actual days for the meeting, perhaps suggestion one
20	is, instead of three different meetings, like, for
21	example, I think we have upcoming for Commissioner Le
22	Mons, Commissioner Turner, perhaps having Commissioner Le
23	Mons chair the two meetings,
24	And then starting with the November meeting, have
25	Commissioner Turner chair two separate meetings. Because

1	they're adding up to about, roughly, six days, and then
2	what that could do is then it may bring up it will
3	bring up then Commissioner Taylor, so that he is not
4	having to chair that longer stretch.
5	Because I do support you know, I think
6	Commissioner Sadhwani, you're right, we're all human. We
7	all have things. And sometimes that is why a vice chair
8	is there. And you know, the vice chairs that have served
9	in place of chairs, when they cannot be available for
10	either a portion, or an entire meeting, is I think why we
11	had this.
12	And so I think I guess with my suggestion, I'm
13	just thinking then we would we would at least then
14	bring Commissioner Taylor up so that he would actually be
15	out of that range of that longer stretch. It would then
16	bring Commissioner Toledo into that long stretch, but it
17	may then be possible.
18	I also want to know, Commissioner Yee, I think we
19	should just keep with the current cadence, because I know
20	that even though our maps are due on December 27th, I
21	know that our work does not complete, or is finished, and
22	that there will be continued meetings to follow up even
23	after this. And so I think if we look out what those
24	meetings afterwards are and continue the cadence.
25	I think it just keeps things simpler, and it's just

1	one less thing that we have to try to figure out, what
2	are we going to do in terms of establishing who is going
3	to chair what meetings. So that would be my suggestion,
4	is that we just continue with the rotation as you have
5	established it. Thank you.
6	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you. Commissioner Sinay.
7	COMMISSIONER SINAY: Thank you. Commissioner
8	Turner, I want you to know, I did hear you. And you
9	shouldn't feel like you you know, if I think the
10	one of the first things we need to do is really ask, who
11	still wants to chair, and not make anyone feel bad for
12	not wanting to chair.
13	I think we're all pulling our weights in different
14	ways, and we have different strengths. I've only chaired
15	when we had public input sessions and I you know,
16	people have asked me why I've never chaired, and I can't
17	even tell you why at the last minute I decided not to
18	chair meetings.
19	But I can tell you that I definitely feel like I've
20	pulled my weight, and I've done a lot of work in other
21	ways. And it was a more productive way of using my time,
22	than me chairing. And that you all may I'm a great
23	facilitator, but I may not be a good chair. I don't
24	know.
25	So I think we should all have listen to what

1	Commissioner Turner just said. And she said she needs a
2	break. And let's give her the break, if that's what
3	she's asking for.
4	I'm putting a few words in your mouth, so I
5	apologize, Commissioner Turner.
6	But I think that the first step is doing it the way
7	we started, and say who is there anyone who doesn't
8	want to chair between now and the maps being submitted,
9	please send your name to Commissioner Yee. And then we
10	look at it and we create it from there. But I don't feel
11	like people should feel like they have to chair to be
12	pulling their weight.
13	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you. Commissioner
14	Fornaciari.
15	COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: Oh. So I am not on.
16	Where do I put my dollar, is what I said. So let's see;
17	a couple of observations from my recent time as chair.
18	It was a grind, and it's even more of a grind for
19	Commissioner Sadhwani right now.
20	And the grind was that there were so many different
21	things happening, and the background time that I spent, I
22	mean, it took a ton of time just to plan the meetings, to
23	have conversations about how we're going to change things
24	down the road. And I found that it was really difficult
25	during the time I was chair, to focus on the work, right.

1	And it's all the background work, and you're
2	chairing the meeting, and you're focusing on chairing the
3	meeting, and the timing of the meeting, and everything
4	else, and it's really difficult to engage in the work.
5	And so I guess what's coming up for me is, the
6	meetings we'll be having in the near future, through the
7	end of our maps, are kind of going to be sort of similar.
8	There's going to be some tweaking as we go along, but
9	maybe somewhat similar.
10	So maybe a week rotation would be best. I know it
11	makes it a little more challenged for Director Hernandez,
12	but I think it makes it a little fairer to the chairs, so
13	that they get time to spend, and go through the input,
14	and digest; so just my thoughts.
15	CHAIR SADHWANI: Commissioner Andersen.
16	COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Thank you for that,
17	Commissioner Fornaciari. I appreciate what everyone's
18	been saying. I actually had a really specific thing I
19	was going to say, and I guess I would like to hear what
20	Commissioner Le Mons has to say later. Because what I
21	was going to propose is, basically, the next three sets
22	of meetings are similar in that, you know the or you
23	know, the twenty-seven to twenty-nine statewide maps,
24	November 1st to 4th, similar statewide visualizations,
25	November 7 to 10, it's live line drawing.

1	That I would propose that Trena does, because,
2	Commissioner Turner, you were so fantastic at public
3	input meetings that you held, that you chaired. You were
4	really, really very good at that. And the 17 through 20,
5	and the 22, 23 are public input. So I was thinking if
6	you chaired those that would be amazing.
7	And then Commissioner Taylor would take over,
8	similar to what Commissioner Akutagawa said, the November
9	29th to December 2nd, which is reviewing the material;
10	and then the December 6 through 8, do those two sets,
11	those two meetings as chair.
12	And then have Commissioner Toledo, the 11 through
13	19, and possibly the other the remainder, and I'd be
14	his vice chair. So that's what I was going to propose.
15	I understand what Commissioner Fornaciari said, in
16	terms of if it's, entirely too much. I'd like to hear if
17	those people really don't want to do it, then certainly
18	would like to hear about that.
19	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you. I added myself to this
20	line up here, because I did want to piggyback a little
21	bit off of Commissioner Fornaciari, and just note that in
22	chairing these past several sets of meetings, it is very
23	difficult to engage. And I often found myself, in the
24	evenings, working on the changing schedule, which changed
25	every single day, on every single meeting. The demands

1	of Commissioners and staff; of when they are going to be
2	at meetings, and when they're not going to be at
3	meetings, and can you rearrange this so that I can be
4	there at this discussion.
5	And that all takes a whole lot of time behind the
6	scenes, for that reason, I actually want to put out
7	something totally different. In our COI input meetings,
8	we had different people running them each and every day.
9	I think when it comes to line drawing meetings; one of us
10	could each take a day to run those meetings.
11	I think once we're working off of an actual
12	statewide map and not these visualizations, it will
13	become a little bit more formulaic. It's already
14	becoming a little bit more formulaic as we're moving into
15	this process. And that way, on any given day, people can
16	engage, people have the time to, you know, kind of do the
17	homework that's also necessary. And you're only away
18	from that really for one day at a time.
19	The chair could still be the chair, and we could
20	even follow the same, same schedule. There's always
21	other chair responsibilities in the background, having to
22	do with the business of the CRC. So certainly there
23	could still be a chair, and they could be really
24	important in putting this together, but that would be one
25	of my recommendations.

1	I see a number of hands here. Let's take them. I'm
2	also getting the sense that we're not moving towards any
3	consensus here. So I see Commissioner Yee collecting a
4	lot of ideas, and I'm going to say let's take the hands
5	that are up, collect those ideas.
6	And Commissioner Yee, if you want to come back with
7	some recommendations for us at the next meeting, I think
8	that that would be reasonable, because I don't think
9	we're going to come to a consensus at this point in time.
10	And we're still on the on the executive Directors
11	Report. And I think we promised we would not go over,
12	for Kristian, today.
13	So with that, Commissioner Toledo.
14	COMMISSIONER TOLEDO: I just wanted to say that I
15	would support the Commission any way that is needed in
16	whatever capacity. So I'm very flexible. And I did
17	clear my schedule for the month of December knowing that
18	it was going to be a very busy schedule. And I know in
19	terms of staff, there's still the staff function that
20	happens, right, and the need to have at least one to
21	have a chair for the staff in the background. Whether
22	it's in the in the virtual setting, or behind the
23	scene, there needs to be. Okay. Thank you.
24	CHAIR SADHWANI: Great. Commissioner Turner.
25	COMMISSIONER TURNER: Yes. Thank you for that. I'd

1	like to thank Commissioner Sinay for your kind words and
2	what have you, but for all of what have been said. There
3	certainly is, and I guess for the public, and my point
4	is, is there, I understand and I remember that there is a
5	lot of background, and home work, et cetera, work to be
6	done, in addition to just any Commissioner with the
7	research. And for those of us that are bi-vocational and
8	tri-vocational, it just does get to be a real time crunch
9	challenge to be able to feel like you're coming into the
10	space prepared.
11	And so that's a challenge that I have. Though
12	chairing is not a passion, I certainly am not opposed to
13	it. I like to have fun and have a good time, so I'm
14	going to make it my own regardless of when I chair, or
15	not. So I just want you to rest on that. And though I
16	appreciate the sentiments, and your words, Commissioner
17	Sinay, for hearing just again, if there are those, and
18	because there could be, that's like: Oh, no, I love
19	chairing, I want you to have your way.
20	And outside of that, I certainly will fall into a
21	rotation and just recognize that, again I don't have I
22	haven't been able to carve it out as the only thing that
23	I'm doing just yet. And so it just gets to be a

24 challenge, so that's all the pieces of parts that I want

25 to say.

1	And I love what Commissioner Andersen suggested, as
2	well, as shortening the sessions, depending upon the
3	havoc that wreaks with our staff. That sounded to me to
4	be something that was pretty doable. Okay.
5	So I'm open and flexible. Just be prepared to
6	receive me, if indeed I'm going to do this with zero
7	sleep.
8	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you for that.
9	Commissioner Akutagawa.
10	COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: Yeah. Thank you. Well,
11	first off, I will just say, I think any of the ideas will
12	work.
13	So Commissioner Yee, whatever you kind of calculate
14	is going to work best for all of us, then I think you
15	know, I think I want to add myself to the group that is
16	just flexible, and will just go with whatever works best.
17	I do want to just maybe build upon a couple ideas.
18	One that Commissioner Fornaciari said, and what you,
19	Commissioner Sadhwani, said. I hear what Commissioner
20	Fornaciari is saying about just, you know, the amount of
21	work.
22	And it got me thinking that perhaps you know,
23	whether it's one time or two times, I think that's what I
24	proposed earlier, whether it's two meetings or one
25	meeting. Either one, I think, would make sense so that

1	it does free up the person who is going to chair, because
2	even if you do the rotation that you suggested,
3	Commissioner Sadhwani, there is still the business of
4	being the chair. And given how much busier it's going to
5	get, it may be just the most viable way to ensure that we
6	balance equal participation of the Commissioners, but
7	also making sure that there is the someone who's
8	continuing to usher the business through together with
9	the staff.
10	With that said, I think maybe building a little bit
11	upon what you're saying Commissioner Sadhwani. The
12	thought I had was, as we go through different
13	visualizations, and there're certain areas where, for
14	example, if let's say, Commissioner Le Mons is chairing,
15	and the day may be where we focus on Los Angeles. Maybe
16	he'll just ask Commissioner Turner to step in and chair
17	that meeting so that he could be a more active
18	participant in that conversation.
19	Because, you know, regardless of whether you're the
20	chair, or you call yourself the facilitator, your role is
21	to be the kind of removed party. And it's hard to
22	participate because you're watching everybody else. So
23	maybe on those days, that's where it makes sense that a
24	flip does happen, where, you know, the vice chair
25	takes you know, takes the role of being the chair.

1	So that then Commissioner I'm just using him as
2	the example. But even vice versa, where like if
3	Commissioner Turner is chairing but the focus is on the
4	Central Valley, it would make sense to have her then step
5	back, and let her vice chair step up, so that she could
6	be fully participative.
7	Because I think we all have our deeper knowledge of
8	some of the areas, and some of us may look at it and say,
9	I don't know enough to really be a more, full
10	participant. I could have my thoughts, but that may be a
11	way to ensure that equal participation. Thank you.
12	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you for that.
13	Commissioner Fernández.
14	COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: Yes. Thank you. And I
15	actually, I love your recommendation, Commissioner
16	Akutagawa. I like the going back and forth. I think
17	that would solve, and it make us all feel that we're
18	participating fully.
19	Again, I want to reiterate what Commissioner, I
20	think it was Fornaciari said. It's not so much to chair
21	a meeting, it's to chair it's to be responsible for
22	everything that happens outside of the meeting. And so
23	like one-week blocks would probably be good moving
24	forward, because it's just too much energy to take away
25	from being able to concentrate.

1	So if we rotate every week, I realize for staff that
2	might be a little bit challenging. But you know what?
3	We're also easy to work with, so that shouldn't be a
4	concern for you. I don't appreciate you laughing.
5	Director Hernandez.
6	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: So that is basically
7	interchangeable.
8	COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: Yes. And I like the idea
9	of just passing the baton. It's like: Oh, today we're
10	going to concentrate on northern, okay, you know,
11	Commissioner Akutagawa, can you take over, whatever the
12	case may be. But I love that concept. But I think one
13	week at a time will be sufficient. Thank you.
14	CHAIR SADHWANI: Why didn't we have this
15	conversation before I took over?
16	Commissioner Toledo.
17	COMMISSIONER TOLEDO: Yeah. I like the one week and
18	I also I'm also thinking about staff, right, and
19	consistent messaging. Because every time there's a
20	rotation of chair, there is a different personality, and
21	different just different person, right; different
22	priorities, different strengths. And so I worry about,
23	especially at the last portion of our line drawing, to
24	have that.
25	I do like the concept of Commissioners Akutagawa,

1	and Sadhwani mentioned about, you know, potentially
2	having rotating the chairs who are on you know,
3	visible to the public during our line drawing process,
4	and having just the more of the business chair, right.
5	Like making sure that the staff have like, they have
6	one person to go to, and have consistent messaging. And
7	I just worry about causing too much you know, being a
8	little bit chaotic for the behind the scenes.
9	CHAIR SADHWANI: Yeah. I would agree with that.
10	And I think that there's certainly, I know I feel like
11	I've had the chance now to work with Alvaro over the last
12	few months, about planning things out. So even the
13	planning of meetings, especially now that we're in the
14	hybrid mode, there's definitely a lot that the staff is
15	doing to ensure that we're able to meet in person like
16	this.
17	So I'm going to let Commissioner Yee have the last
18	word here, and then we'll move on. If there're
19	additional comments, I think, perhaps, we can send to
20	Alvaro. Are you happy to collect those and send them to
21	Commissioner Yee, so that we can continue on in this
22	discussion?
23	Were there oh, everybody put their hand down
24	were there additional? Okay. Commissioner Yee.
25	COMMISSIONER YEE: So please do email me,

1 Commissioners, and let me know how you feel about 2 chairing; want to, really don't want to, would love to. You know, and just be frank, at this point we just need 3 4 to know. It would be a very helpful data point for us. 5 Then just wondering if -- maybe our Director is present, Director Hernandez, and Ceja, and Kaplan, might 6 7 just say a word about what a one-week rotation would look. I mean, how doable is that, really? I know you'll 8 9 say you'll just -- you'll do with whatever we give to 10 you, but maybe you can give us some concrete 11 considerations to think about.

12 DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: Sure. I would say at this 13 point things are moving rather quickly; so one of the key 14 things is planning for the next meeting fourteen days out ahead of time, and getting the agendas posted. 15 That is 16 moving along very quickly. So changes to any agendas 17 need to happen far in advance. That would be the only 18 consideration that I think will be challenging having the 19 one-week rotation because the continuity of what's going 20 on, what's being planned, has to be there. So that would 21 be my only concern with that.

But despite that, I enjoy working with all of you, and my time working with each one of you as chairs, has been very enjoyable, and we've gotten a lot done. So I welcome the opportunity to continue to work with all of

1	you, whether it's a week, two weeks, or however long it
2	is.
3	I do like the idea, I will say this, I do like the
4	idea, similarly to what we did with the COIs, we have a
5	chair, but we have facilitators for those public input
6	meetings, or the line live line drawing meetings, where
7	it doesn't have to be the chair doing it. We have a
8	facilitator for those meetings, similar to what we did
9	with the COIs.
10	And that alleviates the chair from having to do all
11	of those meetings, which are a lot, and they're constant,
12	but it also gives some continuity to us, the Staff,
13	should something come up, we have a better we don't
14	have to start over again and explain what's going on in
15	the background.
16	So I think that would be very helpful, from my
17	perspective, if we were able to do something like that.
18	It's more of a hybrid of what's been discussed already.
19	Thank you.
20	CHAIR SADHWANI: Very good. And good answer, that
21	you like working with all of us. Thank you for that.
22	And any additional pieces for the Executive
23	Director's Report at this time? Alvaro, it might be the
24	longest Executive Director's Report that we have on the
25	books, but really good conversation.

1	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: Indeed. Just two more things
2	that I have I know. I'm sorry.
3	CHAIR SADHWANI: Just an FYI. We are up against a
4	2:30 break.
5	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: I know. I will carry us to the
6	2:30 break.
7	CHAIR SADHWANI: So we've got ten minutes there.
8	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: I'll carry us to the 2:30
9	break. Now, for those public input meetings that we have
10	scheduled from the 17th to the 20th, you know, if we are
11	going to have someone facilitate those that would be
12	great.
13	One of the things I wanted to ask, did the
14	Commission want to or does the Commission want to have
15	appointments for those meetings? Or are we going to do
16	them where we just open the lines and take calls? I
17	think the appointments worked very well when we did the
18	COIs. It really kind of allowed us to plan ahead, and
19	keep the ball rolling, essentially.
20	So I would recommend that. If the Commission is on
21	board with that, that would be my preference. But I
22	wanted to ask if that's what you would like to do.
23	CHAIR SADHWANI: I think Commissioner Fornaciari in
24	the subcommittee has some recommendations.
25	COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: I think that was in the

1	recommendation, right, to have appointments. So it's to
2	run them like we ran the COI meetings, and that's what we
3	approved.
4	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: Okay. I wanted to confirm
5	that. Just to make sure. And then the final note that I
6	have here actually, that was it, Chair. Can you
7	believe that?
8	CHAIR SADHWANI: Wow.
9	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: Ahead of schedule.
10	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you.
11	COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: So you know (indiscernible)
12	CHAIR SADHWANI: Fantastic. Director Ceja, do you
13	have something?
14	DIRECTOR CEJA: Yeah. I can power through my
15	report.
16	CHAIR SADHWANI: Perfect.
17	DIRECTOR CEJA: Seven minutes, right?
18	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you. Yeah. You've got it.
19	DIRECTOR CEJA: Yes. Thank you so much, Chair. I
20	wanted to update the Commission and the public. As far
21	as radio spots and billboards, everything is running in
22	all regions. So I posted the plans or reports for each
23	region. So you know which radio stations we're
24	advertising in, and where our billboards are, or bus
25	shelters for that matter, because they're all different.

1	And they're grouped in clusters. So A, B, D is one
2	vendor, C is another, E is another, F and G is coupled
3	together, H, J, and I, K. So you can find that
4	information on the handouts today.
5	As Director Hernandez mentioned, the PSA for
6	incarcerated populations was completed and sent to the
7	proper institutions to accompany the paper coil tool.
8	And I did want to also give kudos to Anne, from the
9	Outreach Team, because she managed to get another video
10	to help individuals fill out that paper COI tool, an
11	instructional video. So thank you for that.
12	I have been working with the Outreach Team to
13	develop a road map to the final maps, a one-pager, that
14	explains to the public how to get involved during these
15	next few weeks as we finish out our process, and what the
16	next few weeks will look like. So we're finalizing that,
17	and we'll put it out shortly.
18	Our social media ads are up and running on Google
19	ads and Facebook ads. If you see those, please give us a
20	"like", or share it with your sources so that we can get
21	more people to like our pages and our ads.
22	Print advertisements are running. So in addition to
23	billboards and radio advertisements, we did print
24	advertisements in local papers, and they've been running
25	in 48 daily newspapers in 26 counties, and 142 community

1 papers throughout the state.

2	And I did want to add, Commissioner Ahmad; that
3	Milpitas is one of the daily papers that we're
4	advertising in. So I found that interesting, when I saw
5	that.
6	We have replaced the "Contact Us" page on the
7	website with a form. Before, we just had a simple
8	comment space for individuals to leave feedback. We've
9	revamped that working with the Data Team. So we now have
10	a form that folks can fill out. They can attach
11	attachments, maps, or any other documents, PDFs, and that
12	goes straight into the Airtable.
13	And we wanted to do that in order to alleviate the
14	staff time that it takes to input all these all this
15	input, and also to standardize it, to make sure that
16	folks have direct process to get the information into the
17	Airtable. And then have Commissioners have it at their
18	disposal, to look over immediately. So that is taking
19	over the that form is on the Contact Us page on our
20	website.
21	Our social media feeds are also live on our website,
22	at the bottom of all pages.
23	So Commissioner Kennedy, you asked about the social
24	media feeds. They are now featured on every page on our
25	webpage. If you go down to the bottom, scroll down to

1	the bottom, you'll see all four or five of our social
2	media feeds.
3	We've also separated the past meetings into a new
4	tab to avoid visitors from scrolling all the way to the
5	bottom of our Meetings' page. I know that that was a
6	some folks would get lost in there when they were looking
7	for previous meetings, so we've included an additional
8	tab, on its own, for Past Meetings.
9	And we will be importing the public comment directly
10	into our table, just like we are with the public input,
11	and create a view to appear on the Comment tab, so that
12	will get standardized as well, so that we get real-time
13	views of what people are commenting on.
14	We did hold an Ethnic Media Roundtable on October
15	11th. We got 86 RSVPs, 75 attended, and 60 were actual
16	media reporters. So this is our initiative to focus on
17	those hard-to-reach populations. And their next goal is
18	to continue with many town halls with those hard-to-reach
19	communities.
20	And they plan on visiting Fremont, and East Bay, and
21	targeting the API residents: Humboldt, Del Norte, or
22	[Del-Nort], with Native American populations; Fresno
23	County with the Hmong, Lao, and Cambodian communities,
24	Richmond, California, for the African-American community;
25	and then Los Angeles for immigrant communities.

1	And what they plan to do is, again, invite ethnic
2	media to be present, and listen firsthand to what
3	constituents are saying, and then translate that into a
4	comment and input for the Commission.
5	As far as interviews are concerned, we did speak to
6	the Northern California Record. We attended a Sac Bee
7	Editorial Board Meeting. We spoke to the San Francisco
8	Chronicle. We also attended an L.A. Times Editorial
9	Board Meeting. We spoke to KQED. Commissioner Sinay,
10	did an op-ed for San Diego Union-Tribune. We spoke to
11	KRON4, CapRadio, MPR, and then Bloomberg News tomorrow,
12	as well as KJLH with the Steve Harvey Show, that's
13	scheduled for tomorrow. So look out for those.
14	And as far as our website is concerned I have two
15	more minutes we have 17,662 contacts in our database.
16	And what's interesting is that we've now connected the
17	analytics for the website. This past month we had 89,758
18	views to the website. So that's a record. This does
19	include repeats of people going through different pages.
20	So it's different clicks. We had 17,784 visits to the
21	Homepage. And the visualizations for last week captured
22	14,103 visits.
23	So people are paying attention to what we're doing.
24	And I'm sure everyone's efforts around this table, and on
25	the screen, have everything to do with that. So thank

1 you so much.

2	As far as our e-blasts are concerned, we sent out
3	the October Newsletter that had a twenty-five percent
4	open rate. So that's increasing. Our Visualizations
5	Announcement with the plan for last week went out, and I
6	got twenty-seven percent open rate. So that's a record.
7	And then our explanatory e-blast for this week had a
8	twenty-three percent open rate. So we're breaking
9	records everywhere. So that's great.
10	Social media: We have the Facebook number is at
11	1,856, Instagram at 305, Twitter at 1,851, LinkedIn at
12	312, YouTube about 85 subscribers one more minute.
13	And what I did want to share, it was really amazing.
14	On YouTube, we have 85 subscribers, but our "Why
15	Participate" short video has been viewed 82,000 times.
16	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Wow.
17	DIRECTOR CEJA: Yeah, that's pretty amazing. So all
18	that to say that, I think everything that we're doing is
19	gathering attention, and folks are paying attention, and
20	it's a perfect time for Californians to get involved; so
21	we welcome your input. And you have various ways to get
22	that to us.
23	CHAIR SADHWANI: Kristian, "time".
24	DIRECTOR CEJA: Yeah. Ten seconds. So thank you so
25	much for your participation. We're just getting started.

1 So continue participating. Thank you.

2	CHAIR SADHWANI: Very well done. Thank you, Fredy,
3	for all of your incredible work; and for staying on time.
4	With that, we're going to go to a break. When we
5	come back, we're going to skip forward to the Line
6	Drawing Subcommittee. Karin Mac Donald is going to be
7	joining us when we're back at 2:45. Thanks, everybody.
8	DIRECTOR CEJA: Awesome.
9	(Whereupon, a recess was held from 2:30 p.m.
10	until 2:45 p.m.)
11	CHAIR SADHWANI: Welcome back to the California
12	Citizens Redistricting Commission, at our Business
13	Meeting, on this Wednesday, October 20th.
14	We are going to jump forward in our agenda just a
15	little bit, to agenda item number 5, the Line Drawing
16	Subcommittee.
17	We have with us Karin Mac Donald from Q2, from our
18	Line Drawing Team. Welcome, Karin.
19	We wanted for the Subcommittee Report today, to
20	spend a little time debriefing from the last two weeks,
21	and also to offer some changes, and improvements that
22	we're making to the plan, as well as discuss what the
23	plan is, moving forward.
24	So in doing so, I actually just wanted to start a
25	little bit, and we have actually already begun to hear

1	about some of those plans. And Director Hernandez did a
2	really great job of kind of queuing us up for this
3	conversation with a presentation from Toni, of the
4	District Viewer that we anticipate being available.
5	So I just wanted to take a little bit of time and
6	walk through some of the pieces that we had heard, as
7	well as some of the changes that we discussed in the Line
8	Drawing Subcommittee Meeting earlier this week, before
9	opening it up to for further conversation.
10	And Karin is here to also answer questions, as well
11	as talking us through the next the next phase of this
12	process.
13	So we heard loud and clear, both from Commissioners,
14	as well as the public, that the public the viewing of
15	the visualizations was very difficult. I think that we
16	are all in agreement with that, on a number of levels.
17	And so some of the pieces that we've discussed for
18	improvements to that process include the District Viewer
19	tool that Toni shared with us earlier today, as well as
20	the PDFs; and I think Karin's team is working on ways to
21	improve some of the views that would be available on
22	those PDFs.
23	We recognize that, especially for a lot of
24	Commissioners, myself included, the PDFs were a really
25	helpful way of being able to print it out, write all over

1	them, write our notes down on it, kind of keep our
2	thoughts organized a little bit, and really do that
3	homework. So we really wanted to make sure both were
4	available. As well as, you know, and we saw that
5	improvement from the first week to the second week,
6	adding on the CVAP, the total population, all of those
7	the population information, which is really important as
8	we move forward in doing this job, the population
9	deviation as well. So those are some of the improvements
10	just on the map piece, there's other pieces.
11	But Karin, or Commissioner Andersen, did either of
12	you want to jump in, just on that first component?
13	MS. MAC DONALD: Yes. Thank you so much. Hello,
14	Commissioners. Thank you for having me. And yeah, we're
15	definitely going to go back to old-fashioned PDF-ing one
16	at a time so that we avoid having visualizations that
17	look like donut holes, basically, on a map. That was not
18	helpful. So if we're doing them one at a time, then we
19	can actually control what goes on to the map.
20	And you know, again, apologies for that happening.
21	Also, again, CVAP, obviously, will be on there. And
22	yeah, we're going to be working with Fredy on finding a
23	better way of posting the individual visualizations so
24	that people can print them. There will be page numbers
25	on there. And we just had a little chat, and we will get

1	back together, Fredy and our team, to figure out how that
2	can be accomplished, within the framework of the website
3	that the CRC has set up.
4	So yeah, I'm pretty confident that we're going to be
5	able to give you a much better product.
6	CHAIR SADHWANI: Great. Perfect. Thank you.
7	MS. MAC DONALD: Yeah.
8	CHAIR SADHWANI: And I also wanted to just update.
9	You know, we've had numerous requests from the public for
10	the Shapefiles themselves. Thus, far, we have held off
11	on releasing the Shapefiles, not for any other reason
12	than it takes an enormous amount of time just to upload
13	the PDFs, let alone all the Shapefiles. And by the time
14	we would have had all the Shapefiles up, we've given
15	direction on how we want them changed.
16	So you know, especially when we're operating on
17	hundreds of visualizations, which is what the number has
18	been, we've held off on doing so. But the intention for
19	next week, for October 27th, I believe is the date, is
20	that we would, indeed, post those Shapefiles for the
21	public. At that point in time we'll be operating off of
22	one Assembly map, one Senate, and one Congressional map.
23	And so certainly we anticipate loading those Shapefiles
24	to our website as well.
25	So I just wanted to point that out and note that

1 that's another piece for Director Ceja to try and figure 2 out this week as well, as we continue to move forward in 3 this process.

4 So those were some general improvements that we've 5 talked about making to the visualization process. Ι wanted to talk also a little bit about extending the time 6 7 of review. One of the things that came up, repeatedly, last week, as well as the week before, was that we have a 8 9 lot to say. There's a lot to figure out, right? There 10 are many parts of the state that are new to us. We're 11 trying to get our bearings, and California just happens 12 to be a really large state.

13 So in doing so, to ensure that we have enough time, 14 we've actually moved the Business Meeting that was 15 originally scheduled for Saturday, to that following 16 Monday. And we anticipate that this is only an as-needed meeting, so my apologies. We were up against the 17 18 fourteen-day timeline, so we didn't have a Business 19 Meeting in which we could discuss that as a Commission, 20 but we went ahead and made that change.

You already had Saturday the 30th on your schedules in any case, so please continue to reserve Saturday the 30th. If we need to, we will issue a continuance and use that Saturday as well. Maybe we won't. But I know that we have a lot to discuss, and so I just wanted to put that out there, that rather than putting the stress on our vendors, on ourselves to try and have twelve-hour days, and the public for that matter, to have to miss Dodgers games in order to watch that Commission, we would really like to keep to a schedule, and not to go over time.

7 And you know, I said this earlier in today's meeting, but we're only human, right? I mean, doing 8 9 these long days, with a ton of homework to do in between, 10 right? I don't know about you all, but after the 11 meetings I'm staying up reviewing the next day's 12 visualizations, trying my best to go back and look at the 13 COI input, trying to really wrap my head around all of 14 this. It's a lot to take in, as well as sitting in all-15 day meetings.

16 So that's the plan for next week. And I think, moving forward, I really want to want to push that we 17 18 have to be more time conscious. And it's a balancing 19 act. There's of course, everyone wants to be heard, and 20 everyone deserves to be heard. But we also, as 21 Commissioners, have to work on being as precise as 22 possible in our words. 2.3 So I wanted to throw out there, and we can talk

24 about it in a minute, just a recommendation, that as we
25 move forward in this process, that we actually set some

1 time limits for ourselves. It doesn't mean you can't 2 talk more at another point in time. But I think if we 3 put some time constraints on ourselves, the way we asked 4 for the public, it might push us to be a little bit more 5 concise in our -- in the comments that we're having, as opposed to having a free, free-flowing thought during our 6 7 during our meetings, which ultimately leads to having to extend the staffing time, and which does have financial 8 9 considerations as well. 10 I wanted to talk a little bit also about, just 11 finally, the approach. So for next week; you know, thus 12 far we have gone on this process of looking at 13 visualizations. 14 As Commissioner Kennedy so eloquently pointed out 15 earlier in the meeting today, we've been looking at the 16 districts based on populations, based on the communities 17 of interest testimony. We don't have maps yet. These 18 are ideas for maps. But this approach continues to be 19 refined each week. So the very first week of October, we were looking at hundreds of possible visualizations and 20 21 we learned some ideas could not be districts, some really 22 could be. 2.3 In the second week, we were really thinking about 24 some of the tradeoffs that we would have to make if we

25 wanted to take one course of action versus another. And

1 so we had visualization A, versus visualization B. 2 Next week, we're going to be getting full maps. And 3 I know there were some questions actually about this. Commissioner Turner had raised a question earlier today. 4 5 And so Karin, if you're okay with that, I want to turn it over to you to talk through: What should we 6 7 expect for next week? How are we -- how, from a line 8 drawing perspective, do you take all of the feedback that 9 was given on visualizations A and B, and come up with a statewide visualization for our consideration? 10 11 COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Just a minute; one, Karin, 12 before you jump into that. I really want us to be 13 careful about visualizations. As Commissioner Sadhwani 14 ended her -- you were, so quickly say "maps", these are statewide visualizations. We're not doing actual maps 15 16 until a couple of weeks from now. So remember, these are 17 visualizations. You know, we think this, we think that. 18 And now, I just want to make sure, I know it's a bit 19 of a wordsmith, but let's try to be really careful with 20 that. When you want to say "map", think: Am I actually 21 talking about draft maps, or am I talking about 22 visualizations? So a few other nice ways to think --23 think of something as well, in how to say a few things, 24 we're trying to come up with that, to help us all through 25 this.

So please, carry on, Karin.

1

2 CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you for that.

3 MS. MAC DONALD: Yeah. Thank you so much. So 4 perhaps we need another word that's in between. I think 5 where we are is full plans, and they are visualizations of full plans. So what we're doing, and we're working on 6 this right now, and you know, I'm not going to tell you 7 that this is easy, because you were all in the same 8 9 meetings that we were in, and it was a lot of direction, 10 and there was conflicting direction.

11 And you know, we're sorting through that, and it's 12 actually going better than I thought it would, honestly. 13 So based on what I'm hearing from my colleagues, and what 14 I'm seeing, some of these things -- you know, some things 15 are just, you know, are very difficult, because they were 16 completely conflicting. So we have to just, you know, 17 figure out what fits with other direction, but we'll walk 18 you through it.

And by Saturday, we will start to put together the four pieces into a full plan, and then, you know, figure out the overlaps in the handouts from there. So that's where we're at right now. And please, just remember that we also reserved a little time over the next three days to reach out to you if we need some clarifications. And I will know by the end of the day today whether we're 1 going to need that time for tomorrow.

2	I am anticipating at least a couple of my colleagues
3	coming to you with some clarification questions on the
4	direction. So I'm glad that we have that time. And as
5	we move forward, we'll know whether or not we need that
6	time for Friday and for Saturday also.
7	So looking forward to that, and really looking
8	forward to seeing what your direction has resulted in,
9	you know, which we will see next week. I may see you it
10	a little bit before you do, since I'm working on it, but
11	really looking forward to showing this all to you.
12	We have in the last few weeks always, started with
13	Los Angeles. And I know we've had conversations about
14	why that is.
15	And the reason for it has been that Los Angeles is
16	the area that has the least flexibility because you
17	know, because of voting rights issues, and so forth. So
18	it was just it's just, frankly speaking, a little bit
19	more flexibility in some of the other areas. So we have
20	started in the least-flexibility area and then moved
21	outward.
22	I have not yet had the conversation with the Mapping
23	Team, with everybody on the Mapping Team about how they
24	feel about sticking with that plan. It may be that we
25	suggest to you that we take a different approach this

1	time, but if that's okay with you, I would like to
2	reserve that conversation for, maybe in a couple of days
3	or so, once I've had it with the Mapping Team, and once
4	we're seeing how everything is coming together.
5	I would again suggest that next week we start
6	perhaps with looking at the Assembly, because again,
7	those are just the most districts, and the most
8	individual visualizations, and we'll probably need the
9	most time for the Assembly.
10	And then, move either to Congress or the Senate, and
11	that's your choice, obviously, what you would like to
12	take next. You know, we've heard from some of you that
13	the Senate makes the most sense afterwards. But if there
14	were other opinions, then that's obviously fine, and
15	we're happy to go with whichever order you would like to
16	go with. We could also start with another plan type.
17	So that's my basic overview. I think what we should
18	probably do, again, is do an overview of what's happened,
19	so we can do this regionally again, so that we're not
20	walking you through an entire plan, because that would be
21	pretty overwhelming.
22	So essentially, start with one region, and walk you
23	through what's been happening, and then from that it can
24	flow into another region. Also, we will be providing you
25	with some detail on what went into the individual into

the individual visualizations of the districts that are
 going to be on these plans.

3	So there will be some notes, probably not, you know,
4	a novella, or you know, War and Peace, but they will be
5	major points about how these individual visualizations
6	came together. Like what's the direction that's in
7	there. What's in there? What are you looking at?
8	Because even with the PDF, as you know, some of
9	these districts, they're just so large because we have
10	some areas that are not you know, not very densely
11	populated. So even, you know, with a PDF of just one
12	individual visualization you may not know exactly what's
13	in it, so I think these notes are going to be very
14	helpful.
15	And of course, Commissioner Yee brought this up last
16	week, and we're very happy to put something together
17	that's actually you can actually read, so it's not
18	handwritten, and we'll be able to send that up when the
19	visualizations are posted. So on Tuesday, you should
20	have all of that available. And we'd love to get it up
21	earlier to you, and we'll see how it goes.
22	CHAIR SADHWANI: Very good. Thank you so much. I
23	think that's super helpful. And unfortunately, we
24	haven't heard the report from Director Kaplan, yet, who
25	is going to give us a full update also on what's to come

1	this	week.

2	So I think just for everyone, we heard Karin talking
3	about how we do have time reserved each day this week to
4	provide additional clarification to the line drawers if
5	they have questions. We will see how that how we end
6	up using that time.
7	I see some hands raised. So let's start with
8	Commissioner Sinay.
9	COMMISSIONER SINAY: Thank you, Karin. And thank
10	you, Chair. A few questions; and maybe this is in the
11	report that you were just inferring, too. But how do we
12	get from last week to next week, jumping over this week
13	when we're getting a ton of different input, and we need
14	to process that?
15	And for the next three days, we chose not to ask
16	questions of the groups, and I think, Chair, last week
17	you said we also chose not to discuss it. And so I'm
18	really stuck and feeling like the line drawer like
19	we're going to be a week behind.
20	You know that the line drawers are already
21	whatever they present, we've already gotten a week's
22	worth of input from the community and may have public,
23	and may have different views already. And so that is one
24	of my concerns, is that we're jumping over a whole week
25	worth of inputs. So that was number one.

1	Number two, when are we getting the official VRA?
2	You know, we were told from the very, very beginning,
3	from just then, you know, don't start mapping until you
4	have your VRAs in place, and then you put everything else
5	around it. And we you know so I wanted to kind of
6	know that piece.
7	And then building on that, you know, a lot of the
8	input that we've been receiving has been saying that
9	there are, potentially, a lot of VRA in San Bernardino
10	and Riverside. And so I think it's important to look at
11	Los Angeles, but also keep in mind that San Bernardino
12	and Riverside are going to be critical in building from
13	there.
14	So if we can you know, let's not just think of
15	Los Angeles, life has gotten complicated in other places
16	as well. And I just want to make sure that when we're
17	allocating time and thinking about this, that that piece
18	is connected as well. Thank you.
19	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you for that. Karin, did you
20	have any?
21	MS. MAC DONALD: Would you like me to respond?
22	CHAIR SADHWANI: Yeah. Sure. That would be great.
23	Thank you.
24	MS. MAC DONALD: Okay. So yes on San Bernardino and
25	Riverside, absolutely, have noticed; so yes, thank you
20 21 22 23 24	have any? MS. MAC DONALD: Would you like me to respond? CHAIR SADHWANI: Yeah. Sure. That would be great. Thank you. MS. MAC DONALD: Okay. So yes on San Bernardino and

1 for that. Still a little bit less than Los Angeles -- I 2 didn't mean to say that, San Bernardino and Riverside are 3 not complicated, because most certainly that is a 4 complicated area that also does not have a lot of 5 flexibility. And I can tell you that Jaime and John are working very closely together. 6 7 And again, we are working within an entire team. And VRA Counsel, of course, is a big part of our team. 8 9 And I will let them address that with you, that 10 particular piece on how the communication should go with 11 you, separately, and I think perhaps later; if that's all 12 right. 13 And with respect to the meetings over the next three 14 days; super exciting that you've had -- you know, that so 15 many Californians are participating in this process, and 16 are submitting maps. 17 We've most certainly also looked at the submissions. You know, I mean, it's just wonderful that this is such a 18 19 collaborative process. And my personal suggestion would 20 be, take a look at what people are doing, because there 21 are many ways to go. And if there is something that 22 stands out, take notes, you know, take notes and see how 23 they were explaining getting from A to B. 24 And maybe compare it to some of the visualizations

25 that we presented last week, and to your notes that you

1	took last week. And you know, just write it all down.
2	This is not you know, next week is not the last time
3	that we get a shot at these visualizations, these full
4	plans.
5	In fact, that's the first time we're looking at full
6	plans, and as you know, there are ripple effects. If you
7	do something over here, it can have an effect over there.
8	So I think once we have full plans, you know, ask
9	questions about why X, Y, and Z was visible, you know,
10	some place, and why we didn't do it. Is there a
11	particular area that we may be able to reconfigure?
12	But you know, just take notes on it. That would be
13	my that that would be my suggestion. And feel free to
14	ask us to explore things. But I will leave that to your
15	Counsel on how to instruct you, on how you work with
16	that.
17	But generally speaking, I mean, these are ideas.
18	And again, there's more than one way of looking at
19	things. There is more than one way of accomplishing
20	certain things. And it's always good to have other
21	people's ideas. And what a great process where you get
22	to look at this and compare it to what you're doing, you
23	know? So that's where I'm at on this.
24	CHAIR SADHWANI: Perfect. Thank you for that. And
25	I think if we recall back to our discussion about these

<pre>1 district map input meetings, from the very beginning, 2 know we went back and forth of, do we have it while 3 we're doing this line drawing process, do we have it 4 after draft maps?</pre>	the
3 we're doing this line drawing process, do we have it	the

5 And we specifically opted to do it earlier on in	l
6 process so that we could learn and get some ideas from	
7 folks in communities, and on the ground, and who have	
8 different perspectives. And some of them we might lik	e
9 and want to use, some of them we might not. And that'	S
10 okay. That's kind of, you know, a big reason why we	
11 opted to do it when we did.	
12 Commissioner Turner.	
13 COMMISSIONER TURNER: Yes. Thank you, Chair. Ar	ıd
14 this process, I think, is fascinating that we're going	ſ
15 through. We're all learning a lot. I think it's very	7
16 challenging. I think it's a complex process to be abl	e
17 to follow. So just a couple of things I wanted to nam	le
18 that I'm thinking through.	
19 So number one, I'm wondering what is driven by th	le
20 inflexibility that's caused by the truth of the conder	sed
21 population in Los Angeles. That that's a factor, that	's
22 a reality. But I'm also wondering what's driven, what	's
23 caused by us, by us having to look at that. And then,	of
24 course, we have our other criteria that we have to	
25 consider. It just does seem that at some point, number	er

one, it is what it is. But at some point, we had Lessons Learned, be it -- are we attempting this, are we coming at this from the best perspective? Are we locking ourselves into what will always be because of the complexity of certain areas? Or the inflexibility of certain areas based on population.

7 So it's things that I'm thinking out loud. That's 8 going to always be; does that mean other areas then, are 9 negatively impacted by shape and geography, as far as 10 representation? I'm thinking of that, because I'm 11 looking at some of the comments, some of the input that 12 we're receiving. There seems to me to be a developing 13 pattern of those that are saying: Bravo, you got it 14 right. I want my area exactly like you've done it, and I 15 love it, and don't change it.

16 And then there is a pattern of those that say: We 17 keep getting messed over. This is not right. I don't 18 like it. And so you're looking at that and then you fall 19 back on, we know the whys of why it's shaking out like 20 that. And it's almost feeling to me that there aren't 21 necessarily a lot of ready answers of how to fix that. 22 So then it starts to feel like: Is this a process 23 that we really can impact? Or is it not? And to what 24 degree can things not be changed? And if that's the 25 case, when will we name it so that everyone in California

1 will understand, this may never change, right? And so I 2 just feel like we need to name that and have that kind of 3 conversation.

And then the last part I quess I want to say for 4 5 right now is, is that this individual review part that we do, this: Go home and do your homework, and look at what 6 has been submitted. I think part of the brilliance of an 7 Independent Commission in going through the whole process 8 9 that we did to get here, pulling from different 10 backgrounds, expertise levels, et cetera; I think the 11 beauty in that, it was for everyone to come together and 12 be able -- there's, my faith frame talks about, "The 13 wisdom of a multitude of council", right? 14 But we lacked the multitude of council, because I 15 feel like each of us is trying to come up with answers on 16 our own, as individuals, which means we're trapped in our 17 own thought processes, without benefiting from the whole

18 of the fourteen-Commission.

And there is not a space where we say: Hmm. This map was just submitted by whoever submitted it, it doesn't matter, this is what it makes me feel, and think, and this is what I think about that. What are you thinking, Commissioner Kennedy? Well, you know, this is how I process it with what I

25 need. And there's not a space or time that I know of yet

1	that we do that. We're all looking at it as individuals,
2	and then we're coming to the table and we're because
3	of time, we're throwing up something really quick. This
4	is what I think should happen for this area based on what
5	I know and the background, which for the short time that
6	we've worked together, I can say: Okay, well, I trust
7	Commissioner Yee, he's worked in that area, and I know he
8	wants the best for Californians.
9	But I don't ever get a true sense, and understanding
10	of why he wants what he wants, which then makes it really
11	easy. As hard as we're trying to work for all
12	Californians, and be unified, and present the best maps,
13	a lot of it just is on trust that we really haven't had a
14	whole lot of time to build, because there's not a lot of
15	time to talk about the "whys" of what we're doing, and
16	why we're doing what we're doing.
17	And so I just wanted to name that. And I don't know
18	where the place is, and when we can fix it, but I feel
19	that there is, inherently, something wrong and broken
20	about the process of us trying to, individually,
21	determine, and research, and not be able to come together
22	as a whole with this information, and really be able to
23	kind of have a healthy debate and dialogue, and talk
24	about how do we represent the whole of California.
25	And so I don't necessarily, I'm looking for an

1	answer right now. I just am naming it because there is
2	something different, or something I feel is missing in
3	the process to be able to do that.
4	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you for that, Commissioner
5	Turner. And before we move on, I'll just say I feel you
6	on that, right? I mean, I think we're pushed to give
7	direction, be precise, be concise, be specific.
8	Sometimes we're not we don't know yet, right? And
9	there's not that and having sat in that position of
10	chair, of like: We got to go. We've got a time you
11	know, we've got time constraints.
12	Yeah. I think that this is, this is one of the
13	great challenges. And so I look forward to hearing
14	others' thoughts on how we best advance to create such a
15	space, while understanding our time constraints, and
16	while understanding our mapping time line, and all of
17	those important pieces as well.
18	Commissioner Fornaciari.
19	COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: Yeah. Let's see.
20	Commissioner Turner said, much more eloquently than I
21	could ever have said it; what is on my mind. And to
22	expand on what she said. You know, I think the "why" is
23	an important question that we haven't addressed, right?
24	You know, we all just give individual and
25	Commissioner Toledo brought this up the other day. You

1	know, we give individual input, but there's no "why"
2	behind it, or not much "why" behind it, and so we all are
3	just sort of in a space of trust and wondering.
4	But you know, and it's I'm going to go back to
5	the Mapping Playbook. And if we look at attachment 2 of
6	the Mapping Playbook, it talks about the line drawing
7	phases, right? Preliminary direction, visualization,
8	public plans, and statewide plans.
9	And then it talks about, you know, what is happening
10	in each of these parts of the process. And to some
11	extent, what are we supposed to be doing? How are the
12	Commissioners supposed to act? What is expected of the
13	Commissioners? How do we get to the point where we are,
14	you know, having these conversations? And so you know,
15	in here I see, you know, phase 1 and phase 2 lined out.
16	So that's a little bit retrospective, right?
17	And I'd really like to know what are your what
18	are the expectations of the Commissioners for when we get
19	together next week, ahead of time, so that we all have a
20	sort of process understanding of what we're going to do.
21	And how we're going to, you know, kind of get to the
22	point where we're addressing the issues that Commissioner
23	Turner brought up.
24	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you for that.
25	Commissioner Andersen.

1	COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Yeah, I completely
2	understand. But again, you're right, Commissioner
3	Fornaciari. Commissioner Turner, put it much more
4	eloquently than I would. But there is a time for actual
5	full-on review: Why? What do we think, da, da, da?
6	That's after, you know, the draft maps we have
7	tentatively targeted for the November 10. And then that
8	following, the 17 to 20, in those next couple of days,
9	those are the public input on those draft maps.
10	When we come back, after Thanksgiving, that week is:
11	What do we see? As we're reviewing everything; what do
12	we see? What do we think? You know, we did that map.
13	Now, do we want to just, you know, throw sections out
14	completely? Why? It would be lovely to be able to do
15	this a little bit more. And then spend like the first
16	day, and really going over: Okay, what do you think, et
17	cetera? What did you hear?
18	We did get cut short. I mean, to put it bluntly.
19	We got our timetable got cut short. We don't actually
20	have time to do a second draft. And so you know what?
21	We could possibly put in a bit of one thing we
22	could I'm sticking to when I say: Hey, I'd like to see
23	this, this, and this. I could be saying why I want to
24	see this, this and this.
25	Be a little more concise. But because of this COI

1	input, that COI input this, you know, physical location,
2	et cetera, et cetera, et cetera. So I think that might
3	help. Now, people might not might disagree with that.
4	And we aren't having a space to actually say: That's not
5	what I heard. And I know it doesn't sound like: Oh,
6	that's lovely. No, we have to wait until November 29 to
7	actually discuss all this in public, with each other.
8	But I did want to say that there is time before we,
9	you know, okay, are we throwing out the first draft map
10	entirely? Or what are we doing? We will actually spend
11	all that time. And then when we get down to: Where we go
12	from there? For what that's worth.
13	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you. Commissioner Kennedy.
14	COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Thank you, Chair. And I want
15	to thank Commissioner Andersen for pointing out where in
16	the timetable we're likely to have time for some of the
17	dialogue that Commissioner Turner pointed out the need
18	for.
19	My concern goes back to something that Ms. Mac
20	Donald had mentioned a week or two ago, which is, you
21	know, we're very quickly going to get into a situation
22	where making wholesale changes is going to be incredibly
23	difficult.
24	And so if we find ourselves in a point at a point
25	where making wholesale changes throws the entire thing

1 into chaos, and throws it of course, you know, I kind of 2 feel like Commissioner Turner does, that part of the reason for that could be that we have not had sufficient 3 4 opportunity for that deep dialogue that she points out 5 the need for. And I just -- I really want us to be aware of that 6 7 and to be aware of, you know, when doors start closing on 8 things. And you know, would certainly appreciate hearing 9 from Ms. Mac Donald, and the Line Drawing Subcommittee 10 on, you know, when we see certain doors closing for us, 11 so that, you know, we can have the dialogue that we need 12 to before any of those doors close. Thank you. 13 CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you. Commissioner Turner. 14 COMMISSIONER TURNER: Yes. And amen, to 15 Commissioner Kennedy; that's exactly the point. There's 16 one thing to add in a review after things have already 17 been created, we're trying to add in ingredients after 18 the soup has been made, and you then are hamstrung, 19 you're kind of caught into some things, when it -- then 20 that will be the next response is: It's too late to do 21 something different. 22 I'm lifting up, are we having the best dialogue, the 23 best thought now, before we create something or what --24 when are the points of no return? So this is not just 25 commenting, or reviewing, on a review -- or a review of

1 what was already created.

2	Did we utilize the best gift that we have in front
3	of us, in all of us, now to talk about: What are we
4	putting into the mix to create the original maps? And
5	with that, again, when we created zones based on our own
6	places of comfort. When we did that, we stated over and
7	over, that this was just for outreach purposes only for
8	areas that we were comfortable with.
9	We cannot continue to carry this theme throughout
10	the whole time period. It was my hope and aspiration
11	that by this point, or at some point in the process, I'm
12	not sitting back waiting to have someone else just tell
13	me about what's going on in Humboldt, or in Anaheim, or
14	whatever area. We've talked about it enough to where I'm
15	just as comfortable representing whoever is in, you know,
16	the Harbor District, or whatever else this area is. But
17	our time constraint, again, in this process that we're
18	creating, and rush home and just do a quick review of
19	input that was provided.
20	We are not computers. We are not. And we have
21	amazing data people, and things that's put together for
22	us, but to try and review the whole of California, all of
23	the information, learn geography you don't know, and come
24	back and believe that you're representing the whole state
25	is a misnomer. I think it's a fallacy, at best.

1 And so you then do just rely on areas that you think 2 And I hate to tell you that for the whole of you know. the Central Valley, as large as it is, I would again, not 3 4 be representing the full truth and say I know every community that's there. 5 This requires dialogue. It requires time. 6 Ιt 7 requires an understanding. And not just to continue to speak what you think you know, we need to stop speaking 8 9 and listen to what someone else is sharing and be able to now talk about. How did that inform me? What do I shift 10 11 now? What do I think about, now that I've learned new 12 information? 13 And to me, that's the missing component that should 14 be happening now before we kind of double down and say: 15 This is what our maps are. Now, let's make tweaks here 16 and there to it. 17 CHAIR SADHWANI: And I wonder -- if I might just 18 jump in here. I'm wondering, as we move forward, I'm 19 thinking procedure, right? And what does the agenda look 20 like for next week? I'm wondering as we -- so if we took 21 on the Assembly, for example, map -- excuse me --22 visualization first, and as Karin suggested, we are going 23 regionally. So we start with Los Angeles, and then go to 24 Southern California, or whatever region that comes next, 25 perhaps -- I mean, I think we've embarked in this process

1	where it's like: Is that direction? Is that direction?
2	Make sure it's clear. Is that your direction?
3	What if we built in some time, after the line
4	drawers presented those visualizations for that region,
5	just for a conversation? What are the tradeoffs that
6	were made? What are what are we seeing here? How does
7	it differ from the maps that were drawn ten years ago?
8	What is the impact for various communities? How does it
9	relate to the COI testimony that we've received.
10	And maybe do that high-level discussion. I'm going
11	to still suggest that there's a time limit to that
12	discussion, just for the purposes of being, you know,
13	practicable of moving through the entire state. But what
14	if we had a conversation like that and then moved into
15	more specific direction.
16	Would that help to create some of that space that
17	we're talking about, so that we can learn from one
18	another? So that we can talk about it kind of at the
19	more bird's eye view; rather than getting into, you know,
20	just Glendale south of the 134, go with Eagle Rock, or
21	not.
22	I mean, is that would that be helpful? If so,
23	are there thoughts on how to structure that conversation
24	to ensure that it would be helpful? I want to be
25	responsive, although I'm not going to be chair next week

1	so that, you know but at the same time, I think we
2	need to think collectively on how to make this process
3	more meaningful for everyone.
4	Commissioner Sinay.
5	COMMISSIONER SINAY: Thank you. One of the things
6	I've learned as a facilitator, is if you don't allow for
7	that space to have those good conversations, I'm not
8	going to say dialogue, because it is discussion and
9	conversation. It's not just a dialogue. And be able to
10	say: Hey, I'm uncomfortable with that. Or that's not
11	what I heard. It will mess us up later. There's no way
12	around that.
13	And it's not just because we're stuck, but it's
14	because that trust wasn't built, and we're not all moving
15	together. We're moving as individuals. And at the end,
16	we may not get the maps approved by the numbers we need.
17	I'm going to be that blunt with it. And I have felt
18	really uncomfortable on how the process is working. And
19	I still feel uncomfortable between what's happening this
20	week and what's going to happen next week.
21	You know, I feel like sometimes we say, well, I
22	heard this from COIs, and it's just the backup. But you
23	know, did we hear that or did we not you know, but
24	so some of the things I recommend is that we throw out
25	Robert's Rules. Robert's Rules don't work for a

1 dialogue, and they never have in the work that we've been 2 doing. And we keep using Robert's Rules. We need to --3 if you're going to have a conversation, you need to be able to facilitate a conversation and say: Okay, we're 4 5 talking about East LA right now. Just raise your hand if 6 you have a comment on East LA. What are we going to talk 7 about? Okay. And kind of work on that noodle, and then go to the next -- if "noodle" is the right word -- and 8 9 then work to the next one.

10 Because if we keep jumping around like we have been, 11 we're not building on each other's thoughts, comments, 12 and we're not building a map. I mean, we kept saying 13 that the reason we do this all in person, and the reason 14 why we don't have the software on our computer, to go 15 play with the maps, when we're home, and stuff was 16 because we were going to have these dialogues and these 17 conversations together.

18 And putting time constraints, or this, or that, I 19 get that there's some reality to it, but we also need to 20 make sure that we're all in the same place, and that 21 we're building -- you know, building these maps 22 cohesively, these plans cohesively and together. 2.3 We also had two people for each of the regions; one 24 that felt comfortable and one that did not feel 25 comfortable. And that was for a reason. And I, you

1 know, I think that we all, it's still important, you 2 know, for some -- for those two people to really take the 3 lead because we're getting a lot of input. But there 4 have been times, you know, that will say: Okay, I'm a little stuck on this one. And that's kind of been my cue 5 to say: Hey, hey, you all, what are you -- you know, what 6 7 have you read, or what have you heard? Honestly, for some of those in San Diego, I know we 8 9 haven't gotten information, but it's important that we 10 build on each other's thinking, that we know where we're

12 maps to say our "whys", our "whys" should be going all 13 the way through.

coming from. And we can't wait until after the draft

11

14 So I completely -- I thank Commissioner Turner and 15 Commissioner Fornaciari for bringing this up, because 16 I've been really worried about how we move forward as a 17 group, versus as individuals giving direction.

18 CHAIR SADHWANI: So I'm going to try and capture 19 notes here, just to make sure that we're actually 20 progressing in this conversation. So some of the things 21 I'm hearing is: "Whys" need to be said, right? Like 22 there needs to be that space at a minimum to talk about 23 those "whys".

And I'm hearing also a little bit of a back and
forth about the role of the field or not the field -- the

1	zone leads. Do the zone leads continue to play a more
2	prominent role? Or is this at are we at a stage where
3	we should be moving away from that. And I'm kind of
4	hearing some differing thoughts on that idea. So those
5	are a couple pieces there.
6	Yeah, Commissioner Fernández.
7	COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: Thank you, Chair. Yes. I
8	probably am more in line with Commissioner Turner, and
9	her thinking. I've felt this way for a while. When I
10	have provided visualizations, I try to explain why, you
11	know, I want this area and that area, because of this
12	reason, rural versus urban.
13	And I think maybe moving forward, what a good idea
14	would be is if we explain why we're doing and then, if we
15	can have follow up. Like I do remember Commissioner
16	Sadhwani, following up with one of mine, it was: Oh, I
17	don't I'm not familiar with that area. Why? Why do
18	you want Placerville to be included with these other
19	areas? And that was great because, you know, we're
20	educating each other on the areas.
21	However, the piece that I'm most uncomfortable with
22	right now, that we've been working so well, is our
23	outreach to acquire the input. And as Commissioner
24	Turner noted, we are not computers. We cannot retain all
25	of that information, although we've read it.

1	And so I'm going to, what is it, throw up the flag,
2	and ask for help, and see if maybe our outreach with our
3	analysts, if they can take that information, those 5,000-
4	plus input that we've received, either in our
5	visualization feedbacks, or our communities of interest,
6	or our public comment, or public input, if they can take
7	that information and sort it in a way where it goes from
8	north to south, or south to north, so that when we're
9	reviewing the visualizations visualizations that we
10	don't forget those pieces of it.
11	And as Commissioner Sadhwani noted earlier, the 2010
12	had a spreadsheet, but which sounds challenging, but it's
13	also challenging what we have now to really say, yeah, I
14	remember every single input. I can't see that right now,
15	and I need it organized. I can't have it randomly in a
16	database, and I know there's a way to sort it, but also
17	the sorting does not get down to specific areas.
18	So I'm just I'm just kind of hoping that Outreach
19	can help us with that. And maybe I'm the only one that
20	feels that way; if so, if you can help me, because I also
21	want to feel more comfortable with the rest of
22	California, than Northern California. And I'm learning
23	from each of you, which, thank you so much. But there's
24	also 5,000 other input that we've received, and I'd love
25	to learn from all of them as well. And I am learning

1	from all of them. I just want to continue to remember
2	what they've told us.
3	And I think that was it. The only other question is
4	if, in the future, if any of the handouts or
5	visualizations are updated after the initial, can you
6	please send out an email to us to let us know that it's
7	been updated? Because it's really frustrating when you
8	get to the meeting, and you're ready to go, and you
9	realize it's been updated.
10	So I think that was it. I want to make sure I got
11	all of my yeah. And I realize we're stretched for
12	time right now. I would like to have two days to review
13	our visualization, instead of having to stay up until
14	3:00 in the morning to review them. But if I have to do
15	that, I have to do that. And I think that was it. Thank
16	you.
17	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you. Commissioner Akutagawa.
18	COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: I am thinking. Well, one I
19	appreciate this conversation. I think having some way in
20	which we can build upon each other I think would be
21	helpful.
22	I think, Commissioner Sadhwani, just to respond to
23	the question that you asked, like what might work? For
24	me, I'm just thinking it would be helpful, and I thought
25	I heard differently, so please forgive me if I got it

1	backwards. But I'm thinking, it would be helpful to have
2	this conversation at the beginning before any
3	visualization conversations, so that when we go back into
4	visualization conversations, we have some of our our
5	kind of thinking.
6	And it is in a way, I think, like what Commissioner
7	Fernández says, it is also a way for us to also help
8	explain some of the bigger dynamics that may be apparent
9	in some of the COI comments. You know, because there're
10	some conflicting ones. And so you know; there may be
11	some questions about: Well, why is there this kind of a
12	conflict?
13	And I think I would say, as objectively as we can
14	speak to, if we understand where some of the kind of
15	different schools of thoughts are, if there's a way that
16	we can explain it. And we would be doing this in public,
17	too, obviously, so people could correct us if they
18	disagree with our assessment of, you know, why this may
19	be why there's conflicting, you know, COI input.
20	That would also be helpful to also understand, too.
21	I think that's what we're also sorting through. We're
22	hearing a lot of different things, you know, a lot of
23	conflicting testimony, as well as a lot that is very
24	much, you know, alike, some very exact.
25	But I think having, just this, out loud. And I

1	think, like Commissioner Fernández, I do try to say why
2	I'm thinking it, but I also I'm conscious of the time
3	that we take up by saying that. So sometimes I choose
4	not to say it, and I'll just say what my direction is.
5	But I feel like it would be helpful to understand some of
6	the rationale behind some of our kind of direction, or
7	comments, or our thoughts. But it would be helpful at
8	the beginning, not afterwards, so.
9	CHAIR SADHWANI: So just, if I may just clarify what
10	I'm hearing. So for example, for next week, if we come
11	in and we have an Assembly visualization, and we're going
12	to start with Los Angeles, before the line drawers give a
13	review of those of that visualization, you would want
14	some time set aside for a conversation about Los Angeles.
15	COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: Yes.
16	CHAIR SADHWANI: Based on people's review of
17	those based on people's review of it?
18	COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: Yeah.
19	CHAIR SADHWANI: Okay.
20	COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: And we could, if it helps.
21	I mean, maybe we could ask the Commissioners to indicate,
22	will they want to have some time to, you know, maybe say
23	something. Because I think there are some that are going
24	to be like: Yeah, it's LA, I'm going to want to say
25	something.

1 For others, they may say: Well, you know, I may have 2 a question for clarification, but I don't really want to say something. So it may also help you get an 3 4 understanding of how much time is this really going to 5 take. Because I know the balancing act that you're trying to meet. 6 7 CHAIR SADHWANI: Yeah. I mean, I hear what 8 COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: 9 Commissioner Sinay said about, as a facilitator, you've 10 just got to let the conversation go. But also, as a 11 facilitator, you've got to manage that, too, and not let 12 them -- you know, not let it go unendingly. So I think 13 it's just finding that right balance between ensuring 14 that everybody can say something, but also, you know, 15 continuing to move us along, too. CHAIR SADHWANI: Got it. Okay. 16 17 COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: So yeah. 18 CHAIR SADHWANI: Let's think about that. From the 19 professor hat, I feel like, that feels like a pop quiz. 20 Like, oh, you didn't do your homework, yeah, I'm going to 21 know. But no, but I think that's a great suggestion. 22 Thank you. 2.3 Commissioner Turner. 24 COMMISSIONER TURNER: Thank you. And thank you all 25 for just allowing this conversation. I think it's really

1	good and helpful for me. But I also want to be really
2	clear that I do not claim to know the whole of the
3	Central Valley, and I think it's important to name that.
4	And there perhaps are Commissioners that have been in
5	your same area forever, and you know it inside and out,
6	and everybody I can tell, I was shocked to hear
7	Dogtown, whatever it is, in San Joaquin Valley, you can't
8	get much that is my county specifically, right?
9	So there are places that and I can look it up,
10	and I can read about it. But if we're going to talk I
11	don't want to just hear about what Commissioners and I
12	say "just", because I do want to hear that, and I'll talk
13	about what I do know about it, but I'm wanting to have us
14	talk about what the Californians that have chosen to call
15	in and talk about their areas, I want us to collectively
16	be able to talk about what they've told us. They've
17	given us the gift of what they think about their own
18	areas, and their communities, and where they live.
19	And the discussion that I'm talking about is, we're
20	not able to it's almost like a book, or a movie, or
21	anything else, you'll read something, and you'll go back
22	and talk about what resonated with you, what your
23	highlights were. Someone can see the same thing and get
24	something else out of it, right?
25	So as Californians are telling this information, I

1	think the space that needs to be held is for us to
2	collectively say, for this area, this is the input that
3	we've received. This is the background that we know
4	about this area. Was this an area that was split before?
5	Where were the splits? I know that I've seen that. I
6	promise you, I read this stuff. I read it somewhere. I
7	know there is a document that tells us every area in the
8	2010 report that they split, but we're not bringing that
9	upfront into conversations that says: And in this area
10	before they were split; and as a result of that, no
11	feedback. It wasn't a problem for them. Well, this
12	caused an enormous outcry in this area.
13	And so that where were the areas that were
14	negatively impacted, and of that negative impact, was it
15	because of a concession that was made, because of an
16	inflexible area? Or was it because of something that
17	just you know, always will have to be?
18	So in talking about the different areas, we have the
19	benefit of countless of people that are calling in about
20	their areas. We have the benefit of those of us that may
21	have spent some time. I grew up in the Bay Area, that's
22	not my area, but for me to talk about what happened back
23	in '78, and '80, and '95, and what have you, in the Bay
24	Area, and I've been gone for 20-some years. Yeah, I
25	might can, some. But it's outdated and it's not current,

1 right?

25

2	And so I just want to be real clear that the
3	discussions we're having is not based on any biases that
4	we hold of a particular area that we spent at some point,
5	that we're looking at what is current from the people
6	that's coming in.
7	So anyway, so I just think it's important that we
8	go into the spaces with some sort of process, a Professor
9	Sadhwani, with some sort of Commissioner I said,
10	"Professor" on purpose. With some sort of process that
11	says: How do we collectively take the information, not
12	spread out everywhere, but we are focused right now on
13	the Morongo Valley, right on the, whatever area.
14	And how do we take all the information received from
15	this area, let's talk about how it touched each of us.
16	What did we get out of that? What was the understanding?
17	And now, with that in mind, what are the maps that we're
18	drawing? Where are the concessions? And if someone had
19	to suck it up ten years ago, is there a way that we can

20 make them whole, or make life better for them now, so
21 that the -- so that we're not making that same repeated
22 choice -- I'll say, not a mistake; so that we're not
23 making that same repeated choice without being informed
24 about what we did last time.

And so I know we're trying to be cautious about this

1 is 2020, and we're not just using 2010 lines, we're not 2 bound by the previous districts. But to me, all of that 3 matters. And it's part of the story that we want to 4 tell, and be able to continue to improve on what we're 5 providing for California.

CHAIR SADHWANI: Perfect. Thank you. Thank you so 6 7 much for that, Commissioner Turner. I really appreciated that, actually, because I think that gives me a better 8 9 scope of how to think about this. As opposed to kind of 10 a free flowing conversation, of how are people feeling. 11 What you're saying -- what I'm hearing, you suggest 12 is analysis. I recall many months ago, when we were 13 discussing the development of the Data Management. 14 Department within the CRC, a lot of conversation about: 15 What does a data manager do? Yeah, there's a setup 16 piece, but there might also be analysis. And I feel like we're coming back to that. I think this coincides very 17 18 much with Commissioner Fernández's comments about, you 19 know, the data management -- we have this amazing tool, 20 but it's difficult to use, especially on the fly when we 21 need the stuff.

It almost feels like we need like a -- like a virtual briefing book that, you know, when we're talking about the Morongo Valley, we can click Morongo Valley and boom, all of that COI testimony is there. And someone,

1	whether that's the zone leads, Marcy's team, I don't
2	know. Somebody is like prepped to kind of give us
3	remind us of that high-level view of: Hey, we received a
4	lot of testimony from this area. Let me point you to
5	where it is if you need to see it. Let me recall some of
6	the areas where there where there was different kinds
7	of testimony that said different kinds of things.
8	Now, we can think more about the tradeoffs that we
9	have in front of us. I don't know how we get that all
10	together by next week, but I really love the idea.
11	Commissioner Toledo.
12	COMMISSIONER TOLEDO: Yeah. I love the idea of
13	analysis, I think, that's what we're getting at. That
14	somehow we need to take the information we have because
15	we have we're data rich. I mean, we have so much
16	data, but now we have to figure out what to you know,
17	process it, process and analyze it, and so that we can
18	collectively use it. And we are data rich, because we
19	have by going through that data it's a full time job.
20	The other thing I wanted to point out is that we all
21	process information very differently. Some of us
22	process, you know, verbally, and others of us prefer to
23	read the information, review it, analyze it on our own,
24	and then come back and maybe have a brief or
25	conversation, potentially.

1	So as we think about how we have these conversations
2	we you know, so really think through how it's going to
3	work for all of us, given the time constraints. And I
4	love the idea of having staff help us to analyze this
5	information, and get it back to us, so that we can have a
6	more effective conversation, rather than, you know, a lot
7	of a brainstorming conversation, because sometimes we
8	get you know, we end up brainstorming a lot, because
9	we all have wonderful ideas, and I'd love to hear them.
10	But time is of the essence, right? We only have a couple
11	more weeks. Thank you.
12	CHAIR SADHWANI: We don't like to brainstorm; do we?
13	Not us.
14	Commissioner Akutagawa
15	COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: One, I like the idea of the
16	analysis. I think that Commissioner Turner's
17	clarification was really helpful. And for example, I
18	guess it got me thinking about a zone that Commissioner
19	Andersen and I were focused on, which is the Eastern
20	Sierras. And you know, some of the very specific kinds
21	of COI testimony that we were hearing from there.
22	I don't want to promise that, you know, just
23	because I think it's Commissioner Turner said,
24	well, you know, do we take into account what happened
25	before to what's happening now, and what's I mean,

1	that's a harder, you know, question, I think, to answer
2	right now. I mean, we can't promise anything. We can
3	just go where the data is taking us.
4	And that is also contingent upon what the VRA is
5	also telling us as well, too. So that has implications
6	on other things. I mean, I don't know if this is
7	appropriate to ask, I guess, maybe. I don't know,
8	Anthony, maybe you're going to just, like, slap my hand,
9	but to what
10	CHIEF COUNSEL PANE: I'm too far away.
11	COMMISSIONER AKUTAGAWA: what Karin was saying
12	about LA being most complicated, you know, so we have to
13	start there. But at the same time, I think, you know,
14	how do we also try to honor some of the other areas
15	where, you know, perhaps to what Commissioner Turner was
16	saying, you know, we're like, how do we help make some
17	places whole, because maybe they were separated, and you
18	know, there were things that they really felt like they
19	did they got the short end of the stick because, you
20	know, there is just population grabs, or other things
21	like that.
22	And I feel like those are also the balancing acts
23	that we're all trying to achieve; and you know how do
24	you know, do we prioritize? I mean, you know, obviously
25	right now, LA is the starting place. So I don't want to

1	call it the priority, but it is the starting place. But
2	are there other starting places throughout the state that
3	we need to also keep in mind that may not be a VRA
4	district.
5	And I don't know if that's really something that we
6	can do. I guess I just, you know, in the spirit of our
7	conversation, I wanted to bring that up because I feel
8	like it kind of connects to what we've been talking
9	about.
10	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you. Commissioner Toledo,
11	did you have another comment? No. Okay, sorry.
12	Commissioner Sinay.
13	COMMISSIONER SINAY: Thank you. I think some of my
14	comments were misconstrued. But I definitely do believe
15	that there are time limits. My concern is that if you
16	focus more on the time and less on the process, you will
17	end up needing much more time later, versus in the
18	beginning.
19	But it is also very, very difficult, almost
20	impossible, to chair, to participate, and to facilitate.
21	I mean, I think the largest skill set that a good chair
22	needs is facilitation. But facilitation means you're
23	pulling yourself out of the process, because you're
24	objective, and you need to so I want to know, is there
25	a possibility we have a chair but that we actually ask

Karin, or someone else to be able to facilitate? Because I often feel like the line drawers have questions for us and have -- they have an idea of how we could be moving more smoothly, or where we have pain points, and stuff, but they're waiting for us to come up with it. And so is there anything that's keeping us from having a facilitator.

And Karin, I called on you just because you're --8 9 yeah, you're there. No. But pulling the chair out of that role, so that all fourteen Commissioners can be 10 11 present, and all fourteen Commissioners understand that 12 their job is to be present, and to participate, and not 13 to just chair and leave when you're chairing position is 14 over, or whatnot. But that our expectation and the 15 public's expectation is to really build on the wisdom --I think Commissioner Turner called it "The wisdom of 16 17 councils." I've used "wisdom of crowds".

18 But we were selected for a reason, and let's build 19 on our thinking and have someone else facilitate us 20 through this process. And really, I think saying: Hey, 21 let's talk about LA is good, but LA is huge, all these 22 places are huge. So it's more like West LA, and then 23 move to the next one, you know, what have we heard? 24 And I think as we process what we've heard, we will 25 also identify what our next steps are, very clearly,

1	versus kind of, yeah, what we've been doing. So anyway,
2	my main point is, would it be possible to have an outside
3	facilitator, versus our chairs be facilitators?
4	CHAIR SADHWANI: Yeah, well, I think, you know,
5	Commissioner Yee is working on that chair rotation
6	schedule. One of the ideas had been that we rotate out
7	almost on a daily basis who is facilitating the line
8	drawing session. So that that is definitely a piece that
9	was already mentioned earlier today, and I think
10	certainly can be taken into consideration. Yeah. All
11	right. Great. Thank you.
12	Commissioner Kennedy.
13	COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Thank you, Chair. Yes. I
14	will wholeheartedly endorse the idea of exploring
15	divorcing the chairmanship from meeting facilitation,
16	particularly at this point in the process. You know,
17	I've had this in my list of issues to discuss during
18	Lessons Learned for some time. But I do think that this
19	is something that we really need to explore at this
20	point.
21	My main point was going to be going back to
22	something that several colleagues had alluded to, and
23	that is that we're facing, what I consider, kind of a
24	classic issue of knowledge management versus data
25	management. So we've solved the data management, not in

1 this, but if anyone has read Thomas Davenport's 2 Information Ecology, or any other book on the subject of knowledge management, you know, you come to realize that 3 4 data management is not all there is to knowledge 5 management. And so the question becomes, how do we -- as 6 7 Commissioner Toledo said, we are data rich, so how do we 8 transform these riches of data into real knowledge? And 9 there's an intermediate step between data and knowledge, 10 and that's information. So you know, we need to look at, 11 you know, this classic pyramid of knowledge management 12 and say: Okay, we've got the data part solved. How do we 13 transform data and information, and then how do we 14 transform information into knowledge? Thank you. 15 CHAIR SADHWANI: So Commissioner Kennedy, if I can 16 just respond to that. The idea previously was around having analysis presented prior to the -- to going into 17 18 the review of a map. Perhaps that's staff, perhaps 19 that's the zone leads. We can figure out who exactly 20 that would be to cull our data management system to 21 identify those COIs, to take a look at some of the 22 intersections, some of that high-level considerations for 2.3 each area. 24 Would that be consistent with what you're -- what 25 you're thinking about here? In terms of, I think this is

1	a really helpful distinction that you've made between
2	data management and knowledge management. Do you think
3	that that would be a potentially a step in the right
4	direction?
5	COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: It's definitely a step in the
6	right direction. I don't know that it gets us all the
7	way there. I think, you know, we've talked about the
8	wisdom of crowds, the council of outsiders. You know, I
9	think that will get us, you know, even farther. But you
10	know, what you're mentioning is definitely a step in the
11	right direction.
12	CHAIR SADHWANI: Okay. Great.
13	Commissioner Fernández.
14	COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: Thank you. And I'll be
15	brief on this one. I think it was brought up that the
16	zone leads continue to be, I guess you would want to call
17	it the extra the further zone. Personally, that's a
18	lot of pressure, to make sure that I catch everything.
19	And I'm not sure that that's entirely fair to my fellow
20	Commissioners, as well as all the Californians.
21	So I really, really, really want us to consider,
22	potentially, using the field leads to organize that
23	information for us somehow, so that we can have a
24	discussion. Because I would I would love to have an
25	informed discussion with everyone as we go through each

1	map, and we all hear the same information that's been out
2	there, plus our own knowledge.
3	And again, I will say it, for probably the hundredth
4	time, we may think we know our area, but I keep learning
5	from my fellow Californians that I don't know it as well
6	as I think I do. So we really just need to be able to
7	organize this information so that we can have a very good
8	discussion. Thank you.
9	CHAIR SADHWANI: Perfect. Thank you very much.
10	Commissioner Andersen. And this could be our last
11	comment. We're going to close out this. I have some
12	notes that I've taken, that I'll share with you, so we
13	can move on. Commissioner Andersen.
14	COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Great. Yeah, I'm a person
15	of "how". I think a long time ago we all said this is
16	what we want to do; and so "how"? And I'm thinking, you
17	know, are we going to take an entire day and when we do
18	this, which I don't think makes a lot of sense, because
19	you really need to be looking at a map to then discuss
20	it.
21	So are we saying we're going to take the 27th and
22	28th to do the Assembly? And as we look at it, okay,
23	we're starting to look at the Greater Los Angeles, you
24	know, the area. Are we going to say: Okay, let's stop
25	now, and talk about what, I see this, I see that, this is

1 the information we have.

2	Or do we want to do it, like if someone says: I
3	really don't like that line there, and let's talk about
4	that section. I mean, how do we want to do this? We're
5	all good on, "we want to"; let's get into the "hows",
6	because this is our Business Meeting. The next Business
7	Meeting we have is going to be in two weeks.
8	So I'm going to push this forward here, folks, in
9	terms of, how do we actually do this? Because we have
10	to like I sort of like the idea if, I'd like to see
11	this, da, da, da, da, whatever it is, I want to see
12	this line moved there, because da, da, da, da, da,
13	follow-up questions?
14	And then anyone who says, I don't like the idea,
15	well, that's not what I heard. We'll wait. You know,
16	and we can actually have the analysis on the side. Do we
17	want to do it that way as we kind of go through an area
18	of the map? And then come to like, you know, yeah,
19	I'll yes, you know, I think, wow, I like that idea.
20	We shouldn't keep Garden Grove with Cypress or I know
21	if they're next to each other but you know, something
22	like that.
23	You know, how do we want to do this? We have to
24	stop just talking about what we want to do, and get into
25	the nitty-gritty of how, because we are at that point.

1	CHAIR SADHWANI: I would agree with you'll and if I
2	can jump in here, Commissioner Andersen?
3	COMMISSIONER ANDERSEN: Perfect.
4	CHAIR SADHWANI: I think what has what, what I've
5	come away with from this conversation, is actually some
6	really good notes about what the Commission is asking
7	for. I really appreciated Commissioner Turner kind of
8	kicking this off with this conversation, and
9	Commissioners Fornaciari and everybody. I mean, I
10	think we've all had a chance to weigh in to some extent
11	on this.
12	That we do need more time to think kind of at a
13	higher level, to hear and learn from one another, that
14	there also needs to be an evidence-based component to our
15	process that is currently missing, at least missing on
16	the Commission level. It might not be missing from the
17	perspective of our experts who are working with the data
18	each and every day.
19	But it's been very difficult to connect some of the
20	dots between all of this data. And as Commissioner
21	Toledo mentioned, that we are data rich. But really
22	transforming it into an analysis that we can use to
23	inform us, as we draw the lines, which is our saying
24	here.
25	So I'm getting the head nod from Marcy. That I

_	
1	think staff could probably help us out with some of this
2	analysis.
3	I'm going to I'm going to suggest, Commissioner
4	Andersen, that you and I take this back to the Line
5	Drawing Subcommittee. I have a lot of ideas about how we
6	could try and implement this. And maybe it's you
7	know, maybe next week it'll just be a test run, and we
8	can continue to provide feedback.
9	I'm pretty sure it's not going to be perfect, but
10	better than nothing. And we'll see how far we can get in
11	culling through the data tool that we have, and
12	providing I'm thinking something like twenty to thirty
13	minutes in advance of beginning the review of an actual
14	region in which the staff leads would provide the
15	analysis maybe for max, eight to ten minutes, followed by
16	some open discussion from Commissioners.
17	It would still need to be time bound, my friends. I
18	think there is no way around that. We have contractors,
19	we have ASL interpreters, we have mandatory breaks, so it
20	will need to be time bound. But I think that that we
21	can, at least attempt to create some of the space that I
22	hear everybody is looking for. And we'll see how it
23	goes. We'll see how it goes. And that's, I think, as
24	best as we can get, at this point.
25	I hope that's a reasonable solution and path

1	forward. I think this is a really helpful conversation.
2	Karin, thank you so much for being here with us. I
3	don't know if you have any final thoughts or words. I
4	know you have been through the redistricting process many
5	times before. I know you know, it's crunch time, it's
6	complicated. There're so many elements, and it's fast
7	moving. I don't know if you have any final thoughts for
8	us after this, this long conversation.
9	MS. MAC DONALD: Thank you so much. I suppose, if I
10	may, I would just like to clarify a couple of things.
11	And one is about Los Angeles, and you know, how Los
12	Angeles has the least flexibility. I just would like to
13	clarify that that doesn't mean that Los Angeles drives
14	the entire state, because it doesn't. We have four
15	mappers that are working on separate regions, and while
16	they are working on handoffs with the other mappers to
17	see how, you know, their areas will interact with the
18	other areas; they have really been largely working off of
19	the direction that you have provided.
20	So just because we've taken Los Angeles first, it's
21	just, Jaime is the most experienced mapper in this
22	process. And as you all know, the first day where we're
23	starting, because the process has basically been at a
24	different stop, this is a train that just keeps growing,
25	right? And we just keep on stopping at a different

1 stopping point.

2	So Jaime has been the person that has gone first
3	because, again, she has the most experience, and that has
4	allowed you to figure out the process for the next couple
5	of days, or so. And I understand that that has still
6	been very fast. And you know, we have a deadline,
7	unfortunately, in December. So we have to get there
8	somehow, and we're trying to help you get there somehow.
9	But that's really why we've taken Los Angeles first.
10	Aside from the fact that just that, you know, your second
11	criterion, looms large over Los Angeles, and because of
12	that, there is just less flexibility. And you know, so
13	the combo or that is why we started with Los Angeles.
14	So I really don't want anybody to feel like their
15	region, a particular outreach region, or so, has received
16	less attention, because from our perspective, it has most
17	certainly not. I guarantee you, it has not. Everybody
18	is working really hard on, you know, implementing the
19	directions that you have given, and that will continue
20	that way.
21	I think that next week we will be able to have more
22	of the interactive conversations that I think you may
23	want to have, because we're going to be on one map.
24	We're not going to be hopping from one map to the other.
25	There will be a little bit more time to kind of open this

1 up to conversation.

2	And I would just offer to you, to remember that the
3	regional mappers, that they are a resource to you also,
4	and you should feel free to ask them, why something is
5	happening or why, you know, they perhaps think that
6	something whether something can be implemented or not,
7	or what the what the repercussions or the ripple effects
8	are of that.
9	And they can walk you through it, because they are
10	also reading the public input. They're also using
11	Airtable, they're doing keyword searches, and so they're
12	not just looking at the direction, but also when you're
13	saying, you know, community of interest information, they
14	are also looking at the COIs that have come in. And
15	they're trying to understand them, and try to make sure
16	that they're meeting all the other criteria.
17	I really think that next week is a really
18	significantly different process that starts. And I'm
19	really hoping that that will allow everybody to become a
20	little bit more comfortable with this, and feel a little
21	less rushed.
22	This Commission is at such a much better stopping
23	point, right now, looking at how many days you have left,
24	as the last Commission was. I mean, even looking at the
25	visualizations that you had last week, and most certainly

1	what you're going to be looking at next week, the level
2	of input, and the level of care, and just the way that
3	it's configured, it's just a better product at this
4	point, because you've had all these conversations, and
5	because you have spent so much time giving us direction.
6	So I think you should feel good about that. And I
7	know it's really hard, because it really is fast, and
8	it's unsettling, and it's hard to wrap your hands around
9	it. But let me just tell you, from the person that was
10	there ten years ago, based on my experience, this is
11	you're not in a bad spot. You really are not.
12	And you will, next week I really think that
13	you'll feel better about this starting next week because
14	we'll be on one, on one map.
15	And I also wanted to say, while we did say that at
16	some point it's going to be too late to make dramatic
17	changes. That's obviously true, because, you know, we
18	have to be done at some point. At some point, you're
19	going to have to put a draft map out. But I think it is
20	your draft now. And you know, if things are really
21	sideways, and you, as a Commission, come to the
22	conclusion that this is just horrible. Then you as a
23	Commission will talk about it, and we will implement what
24	we need to implement to figure out that it's a product
25	that you can feel good about.

1	So it's also true that when we go into live line
2	drawing, so basically you're all sitting there, and
3	you're saying, move this particular area into this
4	district. That is a time when dramatic changes
5	they're just not possible during live line drawing
6	because, you know, moving the entire architecture around,
7	that can take days. And you don't want to sit there and
8	watch the wheels spin; that is a better process to
9	frontload and tell us to do when we're going back and we
10	have a couple of days to actually work that out for
11	you or more than a couple of days, as it turns out.
12	But you know, I just don't want there to be that
13	misunderstanding out there that you're going to be locked
14	in at any point from, you know, getting to a map that you
15	feel good about. So I hope that made sense. And again,
16	I'm here for questions, obviously.
17	CHAIR SADHWANI: Perfect. Thank you so much for
18	that, Karin. I really appreciate it. I appreciate this
19	conversation. I think we needed to have it, I think is a
20	really helpful debrief from the last couple of weeks.
21	And I think, I think it's really going to put us in a
22	stronger position to move forward. And I really like
23	many of the ideas that were generated here today. And
24	I'm excited to see them put in motion.
25	So with that, I'm going to close out this agenda

	120
1	item. This was agenda item number 5, the Line Drawer
2	Subcommittee. And to do so we will need to take public
3	comment.
4	We're also up against a break at 4:15, so we will
5	take, Kristian, and I think Katy is with us today; is
6	that right?
7	We will take public comment on agenda item number 5,
8	the Line Drawer Subcommittee.
9	MR. MANOFF: Yes. We can help you with that, Chair;
10	just a moment.
11	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you.
12	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: I am here, Chair.
13	CHAIR SADHWANI: Hello, Katy.
14	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: I was expecting 4:30.
15	Okay.
16	In order to maximize transparency and public
17	participation in our process, the Commissioners will be
18	taking community of interest input by phone. To call in,
19	dial the telephone number provided on the live stream
20	feed. It is 877-853-5247. When prompted to enter the
21	meeting ID number provided on the live stream feed, it
22	is
23	Kristian, can you read that part? I don't have the
24	number.
25	MR. MANOFF: 87869154817.

PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you.

2 When prompted to enter a participant ID simply press the pound key. Once you have dialed in, you will be 3 4 placed in a queue. To indicate you wish to comment, 5 please press star 9. Caller with the last four, 19 5566, if you will, please, follow the prompt to unmute at this time, by pressing star 6? The floor is yours. 20 21 CAROLYN: Hello. My name Is Carolyn (ph.), I'm from 22 Arcadia in Humboldt County. I have a couple comments and 23 questions. One, I'd like to know if there is anyone that 24 is directly familiar with our area on the North Coast,

25 and that we've been aligned with the 101 Corridor for, I

1	don't know, I've been up here for forty years, and we've
2	always been aligned with 101 Corridor.
3	All of a sudden we're being told we might be joined
4	in with Redding, and we have our economy, our educational
5	formatting, I'm a special education retired teacher,
6	everything is directed down the 101 Corridor, it's not
7	directed east. And we have different ecosystems. We
8	have everything different, they raise rice, we raise
9	vegetables. We have redwood trees I don't I mean,
10	yeah, everyone has a little bit of oak, but I just, I'm
11	not hearing that there's someone who actually knows our
12	area.
13	So the two things I'm saying is, one, we're not
14	connected to the Redding area in Humboldt County. And
15	number two is, who knows our area, who is in this
16	conversation?
17	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you so much that.
18	CAROLYN: That's it.
19	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you, Carolyn.
20	Yeah, sure, Commissioner Toledo.
21	COMMISSIONER TOLEDO: I wouldn't say that I have,
22	but we're not going to respond to every comment. But
23	this particular comment that what we were proposing is
24	visualization, nothing has been set in stone. But I've
25	been to the United Indian Health Services Clinic, and

1 I've actually toured that whole area, and I'm familiar 2 with the connection to the rest of the North Coast as well as, you know, the northern part of the state. 3 But I just wanted to let you know that there are 4 5 some of us who have been to Humboldt County, and other 6 places on the North Coast. Thank you. 7 CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you for that, Commissioner Toledo. And just as a helpful reminder that Commissioner 8 9 Kennedy gave at the beginning of this meeting today. 10 Nothing is set in stone. These are just visualizations. 11 So we really appreciate you calling in and providing 12 that feedback. All right. So with that, I am going to 13 say we take a twenty-minute break. We will come back at 14 4:30, and finish up our Director's Reports with Director 15 Kaplan, and Chief Counsel Pane. And then continue on 16 with our agenda. We will take a short break at 5:00 p.m. 17 for Closed Session. And then be back to finish the rest 18 of the agenda later this evening. 19 Thanks, everybody. We'll see you back at 4:30. 20 (Whereupon, a recess was held from 4:10 p.m. 21 until 4:30 p.m.) 22 CHAIR SADHWANI: Welcome back to the California 23 Citizens Redistricting Commission. And it appears that I 24 have not turned on my video. So there we go. 25 We are back. We finished agenda item number 5, and

1	we are going to return to agenda item number 3,
2	Directors' Reports. We have already heard from Director
3	Hernandez, as well as Director Ceja.
4	So we're going to pick up where we left off, with
5	Director Kaplan, and the Outreach Directors Report.
6	Director Kaplan.
7	DIRECTOR KAPLAN: Hi, Commissioners. So I wanted to
8	just go over the Outreach Report document that's posted
9	on the website. The first section includes presentations
10	that Outreach Staff are continuing to provide across the
11	state. There's fourteen upcoming presentations, and
12	nineteen completed per direction from the Outreach and
13	Engagement Subcommittee.
14	We've updated the PowerPoint and presentation to a
15	broader overview of background on the Commission, and
16	ways to participate. And this new PowerPoint and script
17	is now posted in the outreach materials.
18	The PowerPoint includes an overview of Draw My
19	California.Org, which includes the three Statewide
20	Database mapping tools, as well as the other ways to
21	provide input listed on the Participate page of our
22	website, including via email, mail, our Contact Us Form,
23	and Visualization Feedback Form.
24	I also wanted to highlight that Outreach Staff have
25	been focusing on directing the public to, you know, what

1	the Commission is focusing on per week. And so really
2	giving that overview of the visualization process, and
3	the ways to participate, and provide input.
4	I also wanted to highlight that based on the
5	continued input that the Commissioners received, Staff
6	continue to identify areas where the Commission has not
7	heard from, or heard limited feedback from, and they are
8	reviewing sectors and demographics that have been
9	outreached too, to also identify gaps.
10	And in some of that review, they're also increasing
11	engagement with higher education institutions, now that
12	schools are back in session, and many now have students
13	returning to campus. And also, highlighting at a state-
14	wide level, there has been a target focus on gaps,
15	including organizations that serve incarcerated
16	populations and their families, seniors, tribal
17	communities, disability, and MENA populations, as well
18	as that was it for that one. I didn't finish my
19	sentence in my notes.
20	So I also wanted to highlight the input that's in
21	our database. So on the handout online, there's a total
22	of 4,754 in the database that includes feedback coming in
23	from email, letters, the Contact Us Form, Draw My CA
24	Community Live Meetings, and visualization feedback. And
25	so this is as of October 5th. I included the breakdown

1	from 9/17, which was the previous Commission meeting,
2	where I presented this. So you could just see some of
3	the increase here.
4	And then also just the highlight of additional input
5	that's on our website that's not yet in the data tab from
6	the input page. And Fredy talked about that a little
7	bit.
8	And then, I also just wanted to reiterate this week,
9	our Commission Meetings on October 21 to 23, is the
10	Public Map Input sessions. I've included the link for
11	the meeting appointment list and schedule that's included
12	in the handouts for the October 21 to 23 meetings. The
13	three days are going to include three ninety-minute, or
14	so blocks of time where the public will be presenting
15	district maps. And then there's going to be time at the
16	end of the meeting for direction to line drawers and
17	public comment.
18	And I really just want to reiterate the extensive
19	amount of staff time that was spent coordinating and
20	prepping for these meetings, including creating an
21	appointment system, sending out reminders of required
22	maps and narratives that needed to be submitted in order
23	to secure an appointment. And then staff working
24	together to compile documents that were sent to the
25	Commission to organize them for the Commission and the

1 public's review.

2	On October 15th, the full schedule of appointments
3	was posted, that I just highlighted, on our website under
4	the handouts for the October 21 to 23 meetings.
5	And also members of the public were emailed directly
6	with details on their appointment time, and designated
7	unique I.D. Staff also supported with developing a very
8	detailed schedule for the three days, really kind of
9	puzzling together all the presentations to fit within our
10	time frame; and worked together with our Video Team on
11	logistics for the three-day meeting.
12	Today, participants received their Zoom logins, and
13	brief directions for the presentations.
14	Just want to remind everyone that the Commission
15	approved participant's screen sharing. And we have
16	reminded participants to have their maps handy to enable
17	screen sharing at the beginning of their presentations.
18	I really just want to recognize the tremendous work
19	of everyone on my team, in other departments, including
20	Sulma, Ravi, Marlene (ph.), and the Coms and Data Team,
21	to support with this effort.
22	And then I also wanted to so I did update the
23	goal activation rate, the tables that I went over at the
24	previous Commission meeting. And per the Commission
25	direction, sorted so it's sorted by county, but then

1 also a second sort based on the percentage of goal 2 activated. And just want to, again, highlight that this information is based on public input received to the 3 Commission. 4 5 Sorry, but I'm going to update the document online, but it says through 9/17, it should be through October 6 7 5th, that mentions respective counties. So it's not just whether it's: Put us together with this county, or don't 8 9 put us together. There's different ways that counties 10 are mentioned. 11 What this table doesn't include is visualization 12 input prior to 10/15. We did on 10/15 worked together 13 with Toni to update the feedback form, to include a 14 question for the public to select counties that are 15 relevant to their feedback. So we will be working with 16 Toni to go back to the input -- the visualization input 17 that came in prior to that date, to tag it with county 18 also; so that is now an automatic field in there, as 19 those visualizations start to come in, as well. 20 And I'm just scrolling through the document. And 21 then I wanted to also just go over the Data tab on the 22 website, so I'll do a quick screen share. Hold on. 2.3 And so I'm on the Data tab, and I just want to 24 highlight that there were some additional views that were 25 posted, so to just flag this to the Commissioners, and to

1	the public. If you click on this blue square here,
2	you'll see the additional views. And so I do want to
3	highlight the translated submissions. So we have now
4	been batching written input that's come in to the non-
5	English written input that's come into the Commission, to
6	send to our translator or language access vendor to
7	put these up in English as well. So you'll see the non-
8	English submission.
9	And then sorry, the English submission should be
10	on here, but let circle I don't know where that went,
11	but it's also posted on our on the attachments for
12	this week's meeting. And so I'll just go there right
13	now, so you can see that in the handouts for today, a PDF
14	of the translated non-English input, to date. So I will
15	circle back with the Data Team, because it looks like the
16	English is not on that translated tab right now.
17	COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Marcy?
18	DIRECTOR KAPLAN: Yeah.
19	COMMISSIONER AHMAD: It's there.
20	DIRECTOR KAPLAN: Oh.
21	COMMISSIONER AHMAD: It's just under if you click
22	that translate or the little side window, it pops up
23	as one of the tables, saying, "Translated Submissions".
24	DIRECTOR KAPLAN: Oh. Yeah.
25	COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Yeah.

1	DIRECTOR KAPLAN: I'm looking at it, but I don't
2	actually see the link; the English version of the input.
3	COMMISSIONER AHMAD: Oh, that's interesting. I'm
4	looking at the English version right now.
5	DIRECTOR KAPLAN: Maybe I have a "view" on there
6	right now. All right; that was my report. Sorry.
7	CHAIR SADHWANI: Well, thank you so much, Marcy, and
8	to your entire team. I don't know about everybody else,
9	but I'm feeling super blessed right now, because I'm
10	hearing about all of the staffing, all of the great
11	efforts, from Communications, and Outreach, and from our
12	Executive Director. And I'm sure from our Chief Counsel
13	as well; just enormous amounts of work being done behind
14	the scenes; so big thank you for that.
15	Commissioner Kennedy.
16	COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Thank you, Chair. And yes,
17	certainly thanks to Staff for an enormous amount of work
18	done. But it does seem to me that, you know, that data
19	page, when you click on "data", and it pops up a table
20	with a lot of capabilities, but there are no instructions
21	on how to access all of those capabilities of that table.
22	So we really need to put some effort into putting
23	some instructional text at the top of the Data page so
24	that people can actually make good use of the wealth of
25	information that's there. Thank you.

1	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you. Commissioner Fornaciari.
2	COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: Yeah, basically, it's kind
3	of the same thing. I just was going to thank Marcy,
4	because I didn't know how to find the visualization
5	feedback, other than going back into my email, and
6	digging through the email to find the link, to click on
7	to find it. And now, I know, but I think directions
8	would be would be helpful.
9	CHAIR SADHWANI: Great. Thank you.
10	Commissioner Turner.
11	COMMISSIONER TURNER: Yeah. Thank you. I was going
12	to say I'm not sure. Marcy, Director Kaplan, what you're
13	clicking on, but when I am also under the Translated
14	Submissions, mines come up in English as well. So maybe
15	there's some other button, something that you're pushing.
16	So it's there, and it works. It's coming up for me.
17	Yeah. So I just wanted to say it is, it is there.
18	CHAIR SADHWANI: Very good. Thank you for that.
19	Any final comments or questions for Director Kaplan?
20	If not, let's move on to our Report from our Chief
21	Counsel; Chief Counsel Pane.
22	CHIEF COUNSEL PANE: Thank you, Chair. Very brief,
23	I just want to highlight for you, when we get to the
24	subcommittees, I'll be looking to the Administration and
25	Finance Subcommittee to help with a personnel update.

1	Specifically, a hire of a retired annuitant for the legal
2	division, the proposed individual is very well qualified.
3	Been chief counsel for a number of years, and has worked
4	for commissions, state bodies, and departments. So we're
5	very lucky to have him. But then I will defer to the
6	Subcommittee at that point.
7	And that is all of the legal affairs update at this
8	time.
9	CHAIR SADHWANI: Very good. Thank you.
10	Commissioner Fernández.
11	COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: Yes, Chair. If you want we
12	can go we can go through that motion right now.
13	CHIEF COUNSEL PANE: That'd be great, sure.
14	COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: The subcommittee,
15	Commissioner Fornaciari and I have gone through the
16	application, and we are recommending approval, and that
17	we move forward with the hiring of a retired annuitant
18	attorney. And I will make that motion.
19	COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: And I will second.
20	CHAIR SADHWANI: Perfect. Thank you. So we have a
21	motion on the floor; and a second. Any discussion?
22	Yeah.
23	COMMISSIONER FORNACIARI: I'll just kind of
24	reiterate what Chief Counsel Pane said, really super,
25	super well-qualified individual, a lot of chief counsel

1	experience in a number of different agencies, and chief
2	counsel experience in a commission-like setting; so
3	really, really well qualified.
4	CHAIR SADHWANI: That sounds fantastic. Looking
5	forward to meeting the new candidate.
6	With that, I think we're going to need to take a
7	any additional comment, I should ask?
8	Oh. Excuse me. Commissioner Yee.
9	COMMISSIONER YEE: Thank you. I'm just wondering
10	if, Chief Counsel, if you could say a little bit more
11	about the duties for this hire.
12	CHIEF COUNSEL PANE: Sure. So as with retired
13	annuitants, they are hired on a project-by-project basis,
14	on an hourly basis as well with that. So this retired
15	annuitant would be addressing Public Records Act request
16	issues, help assisting with Bagley-Keene issues, perhaps
17	even stand in for a meeting or two, and helping a lot
18	with the other legal tasks, to assist the other retired
19	annuitant who is out for a period of time. So he might
20	step in for contracts in conflicts of interest issues.
21	But primarily, he's going to be focused on assisting with
22	Bagley-Keene and Public Records Act issues. Thank you.
23	CHAIR SADHWANI: Commissioner Toledo.
24	COMMISSIONER TOLEDO: You know, just curious about,
25	in terms of the org chart, with this hire, are you fully

1	staffed in legal affairs at this point, or are there
2	additional hires that you're planning to make; because
3	I'm remembering others, but I can't?
4	CHIEF COUNSEL PANE: Yeah. So we've looked to have
5	two retired annuitants, for a period of time we did, and
6	now we're down to one. And so this is the goal to get
7	back up to two, and we should be fully staffed at that
8	point.
9	CHAIR SADHWANI: Very good. Any final comments or
10	questions?
11	CHIEF COUNSEL PANE: Chair, if I could?
12	CHAIR SADHWANI: Sure.
13	CHIEF COUNSEL PANE: I forgot to mention that this
14	individual would also be doing the Legislative updates.
15	I didn't want to leave that out. Thank you.
16	CHAIR SADHWANI: And very important. Actually,
17	that's been very helpful to get Legislative updates
18	throughout this process. Although I think they're in
19	recess at this point, so hopefully not too much more, in
20	the near term.
21	Any additional comments before we move we will
22	need to take public comment on the motion on the floor?
23	Director Hernandez, do you have the motion up?
24	Perfect.
25	Katy or Kristian, could we do could we go to

1	public comment on this motion?
2	MR. MANOFF: We sure can.
3	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Sure, Chair.
4	The Commission will now take public comment on the
5	motion on the floor for the hiring of a legal affairs
6	retired annuitant.
7	To give comment, please call 877-853-5247, and enter
8	the meeting ID number, 87869154817, for this meeting;
9	once you have dialed in, please press star 9 to enter the
10	comment queue. The full call-in instructions have been
11	read previously in this meeting, and are provided in full
12	on the live stream landing page.
13	We do not have anyone in the queue at this time,
14	Chair. And we will let you know when the instructions
15	are complete.
16	CHAIR SADHWANI: Very good. Thank you.
17	Any additional comments while we just await the
18	finishing of the stream, for that to pick up?
19	COMMISSIONER FERNÁNDEZ: Yeah, just one. Can you
20	spell out "retired annuitant", instead of just because
21	I have to find something? And Commissioner Akutagawa did
22	not comment, so.
23	CHIEF COUNSEL PANE: I chose not to type it out, in
24	case I misspelled it. I was: No, don't do it.
25	CHAIR SADHWANI: We have full faith in you, Alvaro.

1	MR. MANOFF: And those instructions are complete on
2	the stream, Chair.
3	CHAIR SADHWANI: All right. Very good. And so with
4	that, I think Director Hernandez, we are ready for a
5	vote.
6	DIRECTOR HERNANDEZ: Very well. Thank you.
7	We'll start with Commissioner Sinay.

12	public comment on agenda item number 3, Director Reports.
13	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Okay, Chair.
14	The Commission will now take public comment on
15	agenda item number 3, Director's Report. To give
16	comment, please call 877-853-5247, and enter the meeting
17	ID number 87869154817, for this meeting. Once you have
18	dialed in, please press star 9 to enter the comment
19	queue. The full call-in instructions have been read
20	previously in this meeting, and are provided in full on
21	the live stream landing page.
22	And we not have anyone in the queue, Chair. And we
23	will let you know when the instructions are complete.
24	CHAIR SADHWANI: Very good.
25	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Oh.

1	CHAIR SADHWANI: Oh.
2	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: I spoke too soon. We do
3	have people in the queue.
4	CHAIR SADHWANI: Okay.
5	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: One moment.
6	And we will have caller with the last four, 3818, if
7	you will, please follow the prompts to unmute at this
8	time by pressing star 6. The floor is yours.
9	MS. GARNER: Good afternoon, Commissioners. This is
10	Grace Garner (ph.). I'd like to address the issue of map
11	presentations, and provide a bit of additional
12	information to all of you. I've been watching every
13	Commission meeting on behalf of the Black Census and
14	Redistricting Hub.
15	We have listened intently on the issue of map
16	presentations and have called and written in to request
17	clarification. It was our understanding that groups or
18	individuals with more than one map should sign up for one
19	forty-five-minute slot.
20	We followed this direction. Since the map
21	presentation schedule was released, we have had multiple
22	team members; we watched that section of the meeting and
23	have come to the same conclusion. However, we also
24	acknowledge that there was ambiguity within that
25	conversation and have heard from other organizations that

1 when they clarified with staff, they received information 2 that was not stated publicly, and was differed -- and 3 differed from what was presented at the meeting. 4 From what we have seen, the Black Hub has submitted 5 the most districts with three full statewide maps. It is receiving less time than those who submitted less, and 6 7 all, because we closely monitor the meetings. We are concerned that there was, and continues to be 8 9 confusion on this issue among our colleagues. We feel it 10 is insufficient to ignore these concerns and encourage 11 the Commission to address the issue more fully by 12 providing equitable time to the groups that followed the directions as laid out during that September 23rd 13 14 Commission Meeting. Thank you very much. 15 CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you for that, Ms. Garner. We 16 appreciate you calling in. I think we addressed this in 17 the beginning of the meeting, that there was nothing 18 written on the instructions that would prevent multiple 19 submissions. We had talked about it in the meeting, that 20 that was something that could happen. We didn't 21 encourage groups to do that. Certainly, I don't believe 22 staff did that, to the best of my knowledge. Certainly, 2.3 we didn't at the Commission level. 24 So I'm so sorry that there was -- if you felt that 25 there was ambiguity. But we worked very hard to ensure

1	an equitable process. In fact, that was the key driving
2	factor. In fact, many groups had requested that we have
3	meetings only for organizations, and we felt like that
4	would also impinge an equity issue.
5	So my apologies if you feel that you weren't able to
6	get the time slot that you wanted. You know, this was
7	based on the submissions that we received, and that's
8	what people, what people got. Thank you for calling in.
9	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much.
10	And right now, we have caller 0514. And up next
11	after that will be caller 7296. Caller 0514, if you
12	will, please follow the prompts to unmute at this time by
13	pressing star 6? The floor is yours.
14	MS. SHELLENBERGER: Good afternoon, Chair Sadhwani,
15	and Commissioners. This is Lori Shellenberger,
16	redistricting consultant for Common Cause. I'd like to
17	start by saying we appreciate the work of Director
18	Kaplan, and Staff, and the huge logistical undertaking of
19	getting the public map presentations coordinated. Please
20	don't take our comments today as a criticism in any way
21	of the amazing work you've done and continue to do to
22	engage the public in the process.
23	But when Common Cause looked at the presentation
24	schedule for this week, we were very surprised by the
25	times allotted in relation to what was being presented,

1	because it did not appear to be consistent with the
2	policy you adopted.
3	So we sent an email to Executive Director Hernandez
4	yesterday flagging that concern and suggesting that an
5	email be sent to all presenters, offering them the option
6	to amend their requests for time, since there were,
7	potentially, presenters who would have signed up for more
8	time if they'd known that was an option.
9	At the top of today's meeting, I did hear the
10	explanation that the Commission's intent was that
11	presentations could be scheduled by submission, not
12	individuals or group.
13	However, we watched the robust and thoughtful
14	discussions of this over many meetings that you had,
15	including on September 23rd. And our takeaway was the
16	opposite of what you stated today, and what appears to be
17	in the written proposed policy that you voted on.
18	Specifically, that you provided a much debated larger
19	timeslot of forty-five minutes for individuals or groups
20	with multiple map submissions.
21	And you accommodated their concerns about having
22	multiple presenters during those presentations, by
23	allowing multiple presenters into the Zoom. And we
24	imagine others interpreted the policy similarly. Given
25	the confusion

1	MR. MANOFF: Thirty seconds.
2	MS. SHELLENBERGER: and the resulting inequity,
3	we urge you to look again at the policy, and ensure
4	everyone is being treated equitably and fairly.
5	Recognizing some folks, you know, who got multiple slots
6	had called the Commission Staff and for advice and you
7	know
8	MR. MANOFF: Fifteen seconds.
9	MS. SHELLENBERGER: to support their request for
10	more time. But for those who did not call staff and
11	instead watched the meeting and read the policy, which is
12	difficult to find on your website, they may be at a
13	disadvantage. So we just urge you to review that policy
14	again and again. Thank you for your
15	MR. MANOFF: Time.
16	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you, as always, Ms.
17	Shellenberger, for your attention to our process.
18	Katy.
19	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Next we have caller 7296.
20	If you will, please follow the prompts to unmute, by
21	pressing star 6. The floor is yours.
22	MS. KITAMURA: Good evening, Commissioners. My name
23	is Deana Kitamura, and I'm with Asian-American Advancing
24	Justice, Asian Law Caucus. I'd like to comment on the
25	map presentation time slots as well.

1	First off, thank you for providing the public the
2	opportunity to present their submissions, my organization
3	signed up for, and is scheduled for multiple slots. We
4	were initially confused by the signup instructions since
5	we have three mappers and each is each is presenting
6	is the primary presenter for their respective maps.
7	So we contacted Commission Staff who was very
8	helpful in clarifying clarifying the process to us.
9	We only learned yesterday that other groups, who have
10	equally large submissions, or even larger submissions
11	than us, have less time than we do because they signed up
12	for one extra-large presentation slot, even though they
13	may have multiple presenters as well.
14	That means that those who have one presentation slot
15	and submitted three statewide maps will have only fifteen
16	minutes, on average, to present each map. The
17	consequence is that you, the Commission, won't get the
18	full benefit from such a truncated presentation. So in
19	the name and in the name of equity and fairness, we
20	urge you to provide those organizations additional time
21	if they've requested it. Thank you.
22	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you for that, Ms. Kitamura.
23	Katy, are there additional callers?
24	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: There is one more caller
25	that called in. If you wish to call caller 7554, if

1	you called in they did choose to raise their hand. If
2	you will, please follow the prompts to unmute at this
3	time by pressing star 6. The floor is yours.
4	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Good afternoon. Thanks again
5	for all of your good work.
6	I'm calling because I wanted to just reinforce how
7	difficult it is for public to call in at the right times
8	during meetings when the call-in times are not specified.
9	And Staff are advising me that I should just watch the
10	three- to eight-hour long meetings. I do work. It's
11	very difficult.
12	And I just looked at the outreach results that have
13	been recorded for the process the cycle. And since
14	we're dealing with a very low twenty-five percent, I
15	think it is, state-wide level of citizens' participation.
16	I would just really encourage Staff to try to do the best
17	that you can to give public the slot time when we should
18	be queuing up to give our input. And thank you.
19	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you for that. And certainly,
20	ensuring that we take public comment is of utmost concern
21	to us. It's also really challenging on our part just to
22	know how much public comment we'll have, how much time we
23	will need to allot to it. So we're doing our very best
24	to do that.
25	And just always remember that there are numerous

<pre>1 ways to contact us. You do not have to wait in the p 2 line queues to get a hold of us. As I've mentioned 3 before, you can email us at any time. You can submit</pre>	
3 before, you can email us at any time. You can submit	
4 your maps to us with a written narrative. I know my	
5 colleagues are avid readers, and our reading public	
6 comment and input on a regular basis. We also have t	hat
7 live stream feed that and form that you can fill o	ut,
8 so thank you so much for all that comment.	
9 From the very start, we had always said that we	
10 would take into consideration the possibility of havi	ng
11 additional days for folks to present district maps.	So
12 that might still be an option, and that could be on t	he
13 table for future discussion.	
14 With that, we will be going into a short Closed	
15 Session under the pending litigation exception, and w	е
16 anticipate being back in half-an-hour, at 5:30.	
17 COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Sorry, my	
18 CHAIR SADHWANI: Commissioner Kennedy, my apolog	ies.
19 Yes. Sorry. Go ahead. I did see your hand earlier.	
20 COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Okay. Well, it got lower	ed
21 somehow, and I tried to raise it again, and it got	
22 lowered again. So I raised it again. I just wanted	to
23 ask Staff to please update the meeting schedule docum	ent
24 so that the last column reads "location" rather than	
25 "languages". Thank you.

2	And if no other comments, we will proceed to closed
3	session and plan to be back at about 5:30. Thank you,
4	everybody.
5	(Whereupon, a Closed Session was held from 5:00
6	p.m. until 5:30 p.m.)
7	CHAIR SADHWANI: Welcome back to the California
8	Citizens Redistricting Commission. We are just returning
9	from Closed Session where no action was taken.
10	We have a little bit left on our agenda. I believe
11	there are some subcommittee reports, some public comments
12	standing between us and the second half of the Dodgers
13	Game.
14	So we will continue with agenda item number 4,
15	Subcommittee Updates. My understanding from
16	Commissioners is that most of the subcommittees actually
17	don't have a whole lot to report back this evening. So
18	I'm just going to call on those who I believe do have
19	some items to raise for the Commission.
20	And we'll start with F, Website; Commissioners
21	Kennedy and Taylor.
22	Oh. Is Commissioner Kennedy not back yet?
23	Okay. Well, we will come back to him momentarily;
24	unless, Commissioner Taylor, did you want to take that

10	come back next week with the answers to a couple of
11	questions that were asked the week before.
12	CHAIR SADHWANI: Was that the conclusion? Very
13	good, thank you. Way to be precise.
14	L, Mapping Playbook Subcommittee: Commissioners
15	Turner and Yee.
16	COMMISSIONER YEE: Thank you, Chair. So
17	Commissioner Turner and I incorporated all the changes
18	that were suggested to the Mapping playbook the last
19	Business Meeting. That meeting we at that meeting we
20	already approved the Playbook with the proposed changes.
21	So I've incorporated those and posted those in
22	today's handouts. So these now, are the final documents,
23	the Mapping Playbook itself, and then the two attachments
24	to it. The only open question, is whether the second
25	attachment, the lane drawing phases plan, might at

1	some point have phases 3 and 4 added to it. If so, then
2	we would seek further approval for that. But that may or
3	may not happen.
4	Also posted today is a more updated version of the
5	Ready Reference. I got such good feedback on that, I
6	just got excited, and kept adding more. So it's about
7	twenty percent longer, more definitions, including
8	exogenous, and endogenous, and a whole page-and-a-half of
9	websites that you might find interesting.
10	So you might glance over that, if you find errors,
11	or corrections, or things you'd like to add, give them to
12	me. I'd love to keep improving that document, and
13	eventually bequeath it to the next Commission. That's
14	all.
15	Unless, Commissioner Turner, unless you have
16	anything.
17	COMMISSIONER TURNER: Nothing at all. Thank you so
18	much.
19	COMMISSIONER YEE: Thank you.
20	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you. And thank you for your
21	work on that. I had a chance to start taking a closer
22	look at it today, and it's a wealth of information in
23	there and really helpful, I think, for Commissioners, and
24	also for the public; so really great.
25	I don't believe there are any other subcommittees

1	that wanted to go with the exception of Commissioner
2	Kennedy and the Website Committee.
3	Do we know if Commissioner Kennedy has joined us?
4	Oh, oh. Well, with that then, we will conclude this
5	piece. If Commissioner Kennedy does jump back on, we'll
6	try to allow him some time to talk about the Website
7	Subcommittee, and his update that he wanted to share.
8	With that, I believe VRA compliance doesn't have
9	anything to add? Correct, Commissioner Yee.
10	COMMISSIONER YEE: (No verbal response)
11	CHAIR SADHWANI: We will go to public comment, both
12	on agenda item number 4, as well as general public
13	comment, at this time.
14	Katy, take it away.
15	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Absolutely, Chair.
16	The Commission will now take comment on agenda item
17	number 3 (sic), and on subcommittee report wait, and
18	general public comment. Once you've
19	CHAIR SADHWANI: Agenda item 4.
20	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: agenda item 4, and
21	general public comment. To give a comment, please call
22	877-853-5247, and enter the meeting ID number 87869154817
23	for this meeting. Once you have dialed in, please press
24	star 9 to enter the comment queue. The full call-in
25	instructions have been read previously in this meeting

1	and are provided in full on the live stream landing page.
2	And we do have someone in the queue. Caller with
3	the last four, 4328, if you will, please follow the
4	prompts to you at this time by pressing star 6. The
5	floor is yours.
6	MR. ICHINOSE: Thanks. My name is Dan Ichinose; so
7	last name is spelled, I-C-H-I-N-O-S-E. I'm research
8	director at the Orange County Civic Engagement Table. We
9	want to express our appreciation to the Commission for
10	the opportunity to present our plan over the next three
11	days, or so. We did want to reiterate some confusion,
12	and I know other folks have expressed, about kind of the
13	reservation system, and the opportunities to present
14	during multiple slots.
15	I know that there were some partners of ours who are
16	presenting statewide plans, who I think based on that
17	confusion, were only able to get one slot to present
18	those maps.
19	So we were hoping that the Commission might
20	reconsider the number of slots given to those groups, and
21	allocate the time necessary to present the plans that I
22	know were very well orchestrated and thought through. So
23	appreciate if you would entertain that possibility.
24	Thank you.
25	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you so much, Mr. Ichinose.

1	As I mentioned earlier, you know, we put a lot of time
2	and effort into ensuring an equitable and fair process.
3	I believe all of the submissions that we received,
4	received time to present to us. So at this point, if
5	folks weren't able to get additional time slots that they
6	would have other ways like to do, so they are welcome to
7	still send us send us those submissions along with a
8	written narrative, and they will be received by the
9	Commission.
10	Katy?
11	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Chair, we do have another
12	caller. I did see that Commissioner Kennedy joined us.
13	Shall we continue with public comment?
14	CHAIR SADHWANI: Yes. Let's continue with public
15	comment, please.
16	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Okay. We have caller
17	6855. If you will, please follow the prompts to unmute
18	at this time, by pressing star 6. The floor is yours.
19	MR. SUKATON: Commissioners, good evening. Sam
20	Sukaton, from California Environmental Voters Education
21	Fund here.
22	I want to echo Dan's conversation. I appreciate the
23	Commission's response, and continued engagement, both in
24	building this process and moving it forward, also happy
25	to see that material will be accepted after the October

1	11th deadline. But you know, looking forward to kind of
2	some continued work, and hopefully resolution, on
3	expanding appointment times, if that's at all possible.
4	You know, we have our forty-five minutes tomorrow.
5	I'm very excited to see all of you then. And I don't
6	think we're going to be asking for any time for
7	ourselves, particularly, but recognizing some of our
8	partners, that there was some confusion.
9	I know that you've done a lot of work on that today.
10	I know that there's going to be probably more work come
11	up in the future.
12	And you know, I hope you have a good rest of the
13	meeting. And I will see all of you tomorrow.
14	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you, Mr. Sukaton.
15	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Yeah. We have another
16	caller. Caller with the last four, 6562, if you will,
17	please follow the prompts to unmute at this time by
18	pressing star 6. The floor is yours.
19	SELENA: Hi. My name is Selena (ph.). And I am
20	calling from Yucca Valley in the Morongo Basin. I have
21	concerns that none of the visualizations last week had my
22	community in the San Bernardino County-based District. I
23	have friends in Coachella and love to visit there, but my
24	community is much different than the Coachella Valley.
25	We are much more rural. All of you have to do

1	all you have to do is drive around our streets and
2	
Z	Coachella to see the difference. Yucca Valley has dirt
3	roads, we don't have a lot of grass and fountains because
4	we conserve our water. Driving around Coachella, you see
5	that they are not they are not conserving water.
6	They have a lot of upscale communities with fancy
7	resorts. We are actually tied to the High Desert and
8	Victor Valley with respect to water and culture. We have
9	the same law enforcement agencies as the rest of San
10	Bernardino County High Desert, same agency partnerships
11	with fire protection, as the High Desert. Our school
12	districts work with San Bernardino County districts.
13	I think we should be really I think we should
14	really be with our rural desert communities in San
15	Bernardino County, not the much more developed, and urban
16	areas in Riverside County.
17	Yucca Valley has less than 30,000 people, and
18	putting us into a district with a population based in
19	Riverside County, could mean that we don't get fair
20	representation. And I wanted to pass that concern to the
21	Commission as well. Thank you.
22	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you.
23	PUBLIC COMMENT MODERATOR: Thank you so much.
24	I believe that is all of our callers at this time,
25	Chair.

1	CHAIR SADHWANI: Very good. Thank you. I had noted
2	earlier, while we were finishing up the Subcommittee
3	Reports that Commissioner Kennedy had wanted to speak on
4	the Website Subcommittee. So I just wanted to get back
5	to that, very briefly, before we adjourn for the night.
6	Commissioner Kennedy.
7	COMMISSIONER KENNEDY: Thank you, Chair. As
8	Director Hernandez mentioned, you know, there have
9	there are issues, there have been issues, there are
10	issues, there would be issues with the 2010 Commission's
11	website. And I certainly appreciate the work that has
12	been done to look into this.
13	But I think I have good news, and I want to put that
14	out there and request some additional information from
15	Staff.
16	It occurred to me recently that it might make sense
17	to check the Wayback Machine. I don't know if colleagues
18	are familiar with the Wayback Machine, but the Wayback
19	Machine is an archive of, supposedly, the entire
20	internet, or at least the most relevant parts of the
21	internet.
22	And sure enough, the Wayback Machine includes a
23	number of snapshots of the 2010 Commission's website,
24	including one dated 27th June 2020, just before we were
25	selected. So while we cannot it doesn't seem that we

1	can get the state in any way to provide access to the
2	2010 Commission's website, it does appear that the
3	Wayback Machine may be the way that we can ensure that
4	folks have continued, ongoing access to the contents of
5	the 2010 Commission's website.
6	I noted from the Wayback Machine there is something
7	called, Archive of the California Government Domain
8	CA.gov. The description of that says:
9	"This archive preserves access to hundreds of
10	California state agency sites. State agencies
11	utilize their websites to publish everything
12	from press releases, agendas, minutes, events,
13	reports, and statistics. This material is
14	especially volatile as leadership changes,
15	whereas, time-sensitive issues are no longer on
16	agendas or in the news. The archive is
17	maintained by government information
18	specialists and web curators across several UC
19	campuses, the Stanford University Libraries,
20	the California State Library, and the
21	California State Archives."
22	Commissioner Taylor and I have spoken. We are very
23	much in agreement that access to the 2010 Commission's
24	website is important, and will remain important for some
25	time. We will certainly be discussing ongoing access to

1 our website at some point.

2	So what I would ask at this point is that Staff
3	provide to us, the Website Subcommittee, with all of the
4	contact information for individuals that they have spoken
5	to in the Secretariat State's Electronic Records Program,
6	or the state archives, or the state library, or anyone
7	else. And we will continue to work on this and see what
8	progress we can make.
9	I do know that not all of the videos, for example,
10	are currently accessible through the Wayback Machine, but
11	if we can work with these government information
12	specialists that the Wayback Machine website talks about,
13	maybe we can find a way to ensure that everyone has
14	access to all of the information that was on the 2010
15	Commission's website.
16	Alternatively, as Director Hernandez indicated, it
17	may be that we get that content, whether it's from the
18	Department of Technology, or someone else, and someone
19	can use the Wayback Machine to find the place where the
20	information that they want would have been, and request
21	it from us and we could readily provide it to them.
22	But I do think that the Wayback Machine looks like a
23	good way for us to ensure content from the 2010
24	Commission's website is accessible to people; and wanted
25	to put that out there.

1	I don't know if Commissioner Taylor is with us. He
2	does seem to be with us, and I just wanted to invite him
3	to add anything that he wanted to at this point. Thank
4	you.
5	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: No. That's correct. And I
6	think I hit it on the hit it on the head when I said,
7	Commissioner Kennedy can eloquently express our views.
8	The Wayback Machine is a powerful device. And I think in
9	conjunction with our staff in the subcommittee, it might
10	be a viable solution.
11	CHAIR SADHWANI: Thank you so much for that thorough
12	report. I really appreciate that. And I'm very excited
13	to see the outcomes of the Wayback Machine.
14	I'm sorry, the name just keeps getting me.
15	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: The name can be slightly
16	beguiling to the I guess to the usefulness of the
17	other website. Maybe it's better to go with Archive.org,
18	but it is the "Wayback Machine". And I've been using it
19	for years as an investigative tool, but it is it's
20	very powerful.
21	CHAIR SADHWANI: Well, thank you for that.
22	And with that, this meeting is adjourned. Thanks,
23	everybody. And go, Dodgers.
